

WHEREAS this school district has fewer than 500 scholastics and is subject to the terms and provisions of Article 2746a; and WHEREAS on the first Satura

day in April, 1972, being April 1st, 1972, a trustee election will be held in said School District for the purpose of electing 2 members to the Board of Trustees of said School District,

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDER-ED BY THE BOARD OF TRUS-TEES OF Sudan INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said School District on April 1st, 1972, for the purpose of electing 2 members to the Board of Trustees of said District,

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writting and filed with the County Judge of the county in which this district is located not later than 30 days prior to date of said election.

That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

At Community Center Building, in Sudan, Texas, in said School District with Coleman Terrell as Presiding Judge and Margaret Smith, Gwon West, and Mildred Chisholm, Visginia Rone, Clerks.

Lucy Kent is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Calvin Vernon and Kenneth Notes are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Superintendent's Office within the boundaries of the above named District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election, Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:30 A. M. and 4:30 P. M. on each day for said absentee voting.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of this School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the County Judge and return the ballot boxes and other supplies of said election to the County Judge for safekeeping, and the Commissioners' Court shall canvass the returns of said election and notify the candidates and this Board of Trustees of the results thereof.

A copy of this order shall serve as notice of said election, and posted in three different places in said School District, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election.



Then, tragedy. Jimmy's kite crossed a high-tension power line and deadly voltage crackled downward, killing him instantly.



Could the power company be held legally liable by the boy's family? In a court hearing, they blamed his death on the fact that the high-tension line had not

However, the court held the company not responsible. The judge said Jimmy's use of copper wire instead of an ordinary string was too unusual to have been foreseen and guarded

Courts generally agree that power companies cannot be expected to take precautions against freak accidents. Nevertheless, since electricity is such a dangerous product, they do carry a higher-than-average burden of responsibility.

In another case, a boy's kite snagged on a power pole. When he climbed the pole to retrieve. his kite, he touched an uninsulated line and suffered a bad

The Church Relevant

Evans, chaplain of Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, danced down the aisle of his church during a service, accompanied by a girl wearing hot pants, he set off a wave of criticism which apparently exceeded his expectations.

Pictures of the chaplain and the girl dancing in the aisle have been printed in newspapers across the country. Many have written to the chaplain to express their indignation.

But Chaplain Evans defends his action, saying, "Worship needs to preserve a spirit of spontaneity and freedom so worhipers are free to . . . tap their feet, clap their hands, and, yes, even dance in the aisles,"

He cites Psalms 149 and 150 as Biblical sanction for this sort of freedom. These psalms speak of praising the Lord with song, with trumpets, harps, dancing, and the sound of cymbals.

Freedom Desirable Certainly some church services are unnecessarily stiff and staid. Probably some degree of freedom from this stiffness would be quite desirable. Church services should be enjoyed-not just endured. Peter wrote in one of his

epistles of a "joy unspeakable and full of glory"-a heart-filling joy that is the birthright of every Christian-and yet it is hard for me to imagine Peter two-stepping down the church aisle with a girl in hot pants. Some, in recent years, have

proclaimed that the church must be "relevant" to survive in this age of widespread rejection of traditional and historic values. Agreed-but relevant in what way? Relevant in the sense of ing like the world? Or relevant remedy for the world's ills?

not greater than his lord." The proper function of the church is to be relevant to the world in the way in which medicine is relevant to a sick

When the church becomes relevant to the world in the sense of becoming a carbon copy of it, so that a worldling feels completely at home in the church, not aware of any difference between the life-style demanded by Christ and the one to which he is accustomed, then the church fails to be relevant to his need in the way that Christ intended.

Not Conformed-Transformed

Jesus has been properly portrayed as a friend of sinners. The only true accusation that His enemies could bring against Him was "This man receives sinners and eats with them." -

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But notice what Jesus said about this: "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance

The significant part of this statement, which is often overlooked, is contained in the last two words. Jesus came to call sinners to a new way of life-a way which required that they repent (change their minds completely) and follow Him instead of continuing in their old ways.

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


