Football is a funny game. As everyone knows who follows the sport, that little funny shaped pigskin can take some whacky bounces.

Last season, Friona High School had returning a good nucleus from its 8-2 team of the preceding year. At the beginning of the season, fans were expecting the team to be off and flying at the opening gun.

Yet, the team won only one of its first five games.

This year, the team, hit heavy by graduation, by injuries and sickness in its first four games, have had anything but bright prospects. Even the most staunch fan probably figured that the team might be doing well to duplicate the -13 mark it had after four games last season.

Yet, after the same number of games, the 1966 Chieftains have exactly reversed the season record to read three wins, one loss, and have opened the earlier - than - normal district schedule with a victory.

These strange happenings are hard to figure out, but that is one of the things which makes football the interesting sport that it is. If it were not for the element of surprise, there probably would not be the big crowds at every game.

Now, if the Chiefs can beat Lockney this Friday, they will have completely reversed last year's won-lost record for the first half of the season.

After that, Coaches and fans alike will be happy if the team can duplicate the record posted by the 1965 team. And if it does, they'll probably refer to the 1966 edition of the Friona Chieftains as the "Miracle Eleven," or something along that line.

Would you believe that Texas -- which already has a nation-breaking record of 243 museums -- has 60 new museums a' building?

Spurred by the historical renaissance nurtured by growing pride of counties and communities in their own local heritage, museums are springing up like wild flowers in spring.

From tip to stern and the width and breadth of Texas, 57 counties -- many of which already have museums -- soon will have new museums to tell the story of Texas history in depth.

In some, the plans are just the gleam of an idea in the eyes of history buffs. Others are searching for a building to house collections. Buildings are being constructed; historic homes restored. Some are nearly ready to open their doors, others are starting to collect.

Here's where the Texas State Historical Survey Committee arrives on the scene. Most of the new museums are small, and their staffs have no place to turn for professional guidance. Large museums at best can offer suggestions only by correspondence or telephone.

Hence TSHSC -- with the Smithsonian Institution for its cosponsor -- will conduct its first official Texas Institute for Small Museums at Woodville Sept. 30 and Oct. 1-2. Anyone interested in museum development and operation may attend; 200 already have registered.

This is the first institute of this type that the Smithsonian has co-sponsored with a state agency. Frank Taylor, director of the Smithsonian's U.S. National Museum, will head the faculty. Gov. John Connally gave an address at the session Oct. 1.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee has long encouraged the development of county historical museums, and the museum institute will expand its services in offering professional guidance.

Museums in Texas have increased from 82 in 1964 to 243 today, a total unequalled by any other state. The institute will cover all phases of museum development and operation, based on the needs of small museums, in workshop form.

## Re-Charged Chiefs Go To Lockney Friday

The Lockney Longhorns will be out for revenge Friday night when the Friona Chieftains invade Lockney for the second District 3-AA game of the season.

The game will begin at 8 p.m. It is the last 8 p.m. starting time of the season. The rest of the games for the season begin at 7:30 p.m.

Lockney has double reason to be fighting like the traditional wounded bear. The Longhorns

will be remembering last year's 12-7 loss at the hands of Friona, when Lockney was favored to win. On top of all that, the Longhorns dropped their opening district game to Memphis last week, so will have to win to keep its chance of winning district alive.

The Longhorns carry a season record of two wins, two losses into the contest, compared to Friona's 3-1 record. Lockney beat Crosbyton and

Ralls, dropping its other game to highly-rated Post, 20-6, in the season's second outing.

Friona, likely as not, will start the same lineup against Lockney as faced Olton last week in the district opener. "Those players who were out last Friday probably will miss this Friday's game as well," Coach Don Light said early this week.

Halfback Bobby Jordan, out with a severe case of influen-

za, had not even started back to school the first part of the week, and will not see action for the second straight week. Sophomore quarterback Johnny Barker rejoined the team in workouts this week, although going slowly at first.

The game marks the eighth renewal of a football rivalry which has been played off and on since 1938. Friona has won four of the seven games played, winning in 1940 and 1946 in addition to 1964 and 1965. Since Coach Don Light became coach of the Chieftains, the team has a 2-0 record over the South Plains representative, both coming in important district games.

Using previous meetings as a yardstick, fans who make the trip to Lockney on Friday probably will not be disappointed.

Concerning the Olton game, Coach Light said this week that the game was the best defensive game the Chiefs had played this season. Except for the 86-yard run by Dale DeBerry for Olton's only score, Friona contained the Mustangs well.

## City Sets Two Standard Trash Residential Collections Weekly

The installation of the new Dempster Dumpster trash system in the downtown section of Friona recently has made for a vast improvement in the overall trash collection schedule for the city, according to City Manager A.L. Outland.

The Dumpster boxes will assist in the control of rodents and flies in the commercial district, while the packer truck is allowed to make rapid and more frequent trips over the residential areas, Outland points out.

A regular collection schedule for the city can now be established for the residential areas, Outland states.

The schedule which has been adopted is as follows; all of city east of Cleveland Avenue -- Mondays and Thursdays; all of city west of Cleveland Avenue -- Tuesdays and Fridays.

The schedule also means that for the first time, trash collection in the residential section of Friona can be made on a regular twice per week basis. Previously, once per week was

about the most which could be achieved, but the new downtown Dumpster boxes free the packer truck for full-time duty in residential areas.

"It will be greatly appreciated if all residents will place their trash-refuse in the containers in the alleys. If there are limbs, tree trimmings, etc. that will not fit into the barrels, please call the city office so that a work order can be made for a special pick-up with the dump truck," Outland says.

## Bank Deposits Given For Third Quarter

Deposits at Friona State Bank stood at \$6,195,550.36 for the third quarter "call," it was revealed by bank officials this week.

The call date was September 20 this year, earlier than normal. Deposits on last year's third quarter statement totaled \$6,492,126.17; but this came on October 13, some 23 days later than this year's statement, after many crops were sold.

The statement was up somewhat from the bank's second quarter statement, which showed \$6,112,851.67 in deposits on June 30.

Looking back two years ago to a third quarter statement more near the date of this year's, deposits on October 1, 1964 totaled \$5,544,257.40, which would indicate a nice increase for the current statement.

Total assets for Friona State Bank stood at \$6,872,382.49 on September 20, also an increase over the June figure of \$6,734,739.40.

Other figures on the current quarter's statement included loans and discounts \$4,664,434.99; municipal bonds and

warrants, \$87,309.79; U.S. Government Bonds, \$561,608.26; cash and exchange, \$1,471,077.69.

Quarterly statements for the first two quarters of 1966 set all-time records for the statement periods.

### Bond Sales Are Announced

Frank A. Spring, chairman of the Farmer County Savings Bonds Committee, has announced that Savings Bond sales in Farmer County totaled \$4,411 during August.

Series E and H Bond sales in Texas during August totaled \$12,805,089 which is an increase of 8 per cent over the same period last year. Texas sales for the first eight months of 1966 totaled \$103,042,978 which is 70 per cent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million. Texas Savings Bond volunteers and the Treasury Department extend their thanks to all media for their fine cooperation during the past 25 years.

# "Depression Of 1966" Never Came About

Recovery of the stock market has abated fears of a 1966 depression.

It now appears that such fears were never justified. At the grassroots of the American economy the probability of a serious recession was never accepted.

While stock prices were declining, production and distribution of consumer goods continued at an accelerated pace. The consumer had more relative buying power than at any time in history.

Confidence of retailer was reflected in the largest increase in newspaper advertising in recent years. There has been a corresponding rise in the volume of retail sales.

Indeed, retail sales for August, 1966, were 10 per cent higher than for August, 1965. Of course, such an increase in the demand for goods and services has resulted in higher prices for some products. However, the buying power

of the American consumer has far out-paced price increases. Production in key industries has mounted and gained in efficiency.

Neither serious inflations nor recession seems probable so long as ample goods are available to a public which has the wealth to buy on an unprecedented scale.

Perhaps what has confused market speculators and some economists has been the change in consumer buying habits which affected a few industries adversely. The goods that are selling on the burgeoning retail market today are not the same goods which sold in 1960. And by 1970 an entirely new complex of goods and services will be in demand.

Retailers who have been increasing advertising to meet changing demands have been prospering while the timid talk of recession and tight money.

Nation's Agriculture says: "The worst fed American is the teen-age girl who skips or skimps on breakfast, consumes one fourth of her calories intake in poorly chosen snacks and doesn't drink enough milk or eat enough fruits and vegetables."

Fire and burglary take a large toll of U. S. Savings Bonds, but not a penny is ever lost by the owners as a result.

A Pennsylvania manufacturer watched as his building burned to the ground, taking with it a safe containing valuable papers and a number of Savings Bonds. The bonds, of course, were replaced, in keeping with the Treasury's pledge to restore any bonds lost, stolen, mutilated or destroyed.

In New York, a fireman bought a bond for his girl friend but, before he could deliver it, the alarm sounded. The bond fell from his shirt pocket into the fire. He was a fireman and received a replacement. Sixteen years after fire destroyed a mid-western home, leaving an 11-year-old girl orphaned, the girl discovered that there had been some bonds in the house. Inquiry turned up the prior existence of three \$25 bonds. Replacements were ultimately mailed to the lone survivor, then married.

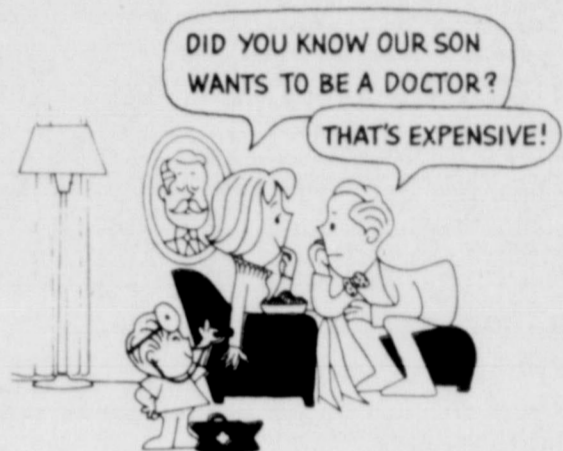

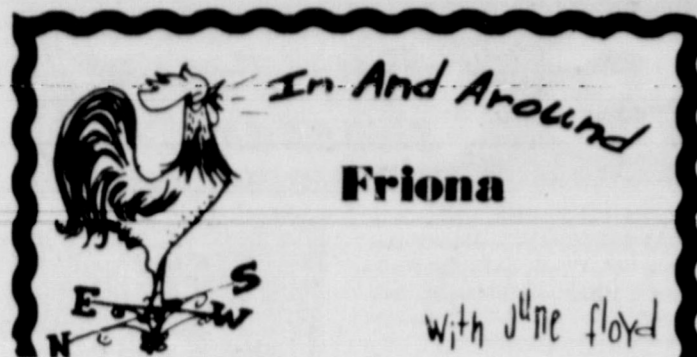

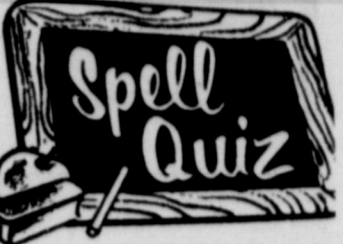

**DEFENSE SHINES**

# 'Re-Shuffled' Chieftains Ambush Mustangs, 24-8

The Friona Chieftains parlayed what coaches termed their best defensive showing of the year and a good performance by versatile backfield men into a 24-8 victory over Olton in the opening District 3-AA game here last Friday.

Ted Renner, listed on the program as a 172-pound full-back, took over the signal-calling chores in a re-shuffled Friona backfield.

All he did was pass for one touchdown, run for another, kick a 21-yard field goal and three extra points, and keep the Ponies in a hole with his booming punts.

Friona took a 14-0 lead in the first half, but the Mustangs closed the gap to 14-8 in the third quarter.

In fact it appeared Olton might be on its way to a comeback. But Renner came through with a clutch third down pass completion, and the Mustangs kicked in a 15-yard penalty that paved the way for Friona's third touchdown.

That took the starch out of the Mustangs' comeback and Friona added its field goal with 1:15 to play.

As play opened, the Mustangs seemed to be having the best of it. HB Dale DeBerry almost broke clear on a 16-yard run the first time Olton ran for scrimmage.

Neither team was able to reach enemy territory, however, until seven minutes deep in the first period when the Chiefs recovered an Olton fumble at the Mustang 43.

Two plays gained eight and on third down Renner faded to pass. His receivers were covered and a pair of Mustangs bore down on him at midfield. But Renner put on the speed and sailed down the sidelines on a 35-yard scamper that put the Chiefs on front, 6-0, with 4:44 showing on the clock.

Renner kicked point and it was 7-0, Friona. On the first play after the kick-off, Olton fumbled again, and the Chiefs took over at the Mustang 37. Two Renner passes went incomplete and one running play lost three, so the Chiefs punted.

Olton took over at its 20 and got nowhere, but the Chiefs were guilty of roughing the kicker on fourth down and the Mustangs had a first down at the Olton 40.

Only two plays later, however, the Mustangs fumbled again and Friona recovered at the Mustang 45.

Olton's defense, again a tough one to crack, stood up and the game turned into a punt exchange until Friona took over at its 47 with 2:30 left in the half.

Two running plays moved the ball to the Olton 46 and then Renner hit end Mike Riethmayer with a TD pass. Riethmayer was 10 yards clear of everybody and Renner's toss was perfect as the big end took it at the Olton 20 and breezed in without a hand laid on him.

Renner kicked point again and it was 14-0, Friona, with 1:58 left in the half.

Renner was Friona's man-of-the-hour a moment later,

intercepting QB Charles McClain's long pass at the Friona 20 just before time ran out. Olton came back strong in the third quarter, driving to the Friona 39, where a fourth down rush by Fullback Albert Key was stopped for no gain, inches short of a first down.

Friona took over, but four plays later Renner had to punt. This time he hit a 50-yard beauty that was touched dead at the Olton four.

HB Benny Akin ran twice for four and Key got a first down with a six-yard punch to the 14. DeBerry, again showing his running skill, broke off tackle and sailed upfield about 10 yards before cutting back and going all the way. He literally outran the last two Friona defenders in going the 86-yard route.

Coach Don Beck pulled a rabbit out of the hat on the extra point play. Making it appear they had 12 men on the field, the Mustangs sent HB Steve Spain toward the sidelines.

But McClain, holding on the extra point, rose from his crouch and passed to Spain, who had turned back down the sideline. Spain could have walked across and it was 14-8, Friona, with 2:56 left in the third quarter.

The Mustangs tried an onside kick, but Friona recovered at the Chieftain 47. Two plays gained only two yards, but then Renner passed complete to Riethmayer, who took the strike between a pair of Mustang defenders.

That aerial gave the Frionans

a first down at the Olton 36, and a personal foul against Olton a play later moved the ball to the Mustang 19.

Renner again came through on a third down situation, running 11 yards to the Olton 9. Two plays later, HB Eddie Barker darted through a hole off tackle for eight yards and a TD.

When Renner booted the extra, it was 21-8, with 11 minutes left in the game. After the kick-off, Olton ran four plays, the last of which was a fake punt. When the play netted only a yard, Friona took over at the Olton 26.

But Olton's defense rose up and the Mustangs took over at their 20 after Renner's 45-yard field goal attempt was short.

The Mustangs moved out to the Olton 36, but a bad pass from center on fourth down sailed far over the kicker's head, and Friona nailed DeBerry at the three as he attempted to run it back.

The Chiefs got nowhere in three plays, and Renner booted his 21-yard field goal. It was 24-8 with 1:15 left.

Friona stopped a last-ditch Olton try when Ray Lynn Murphree intercepted McClain's long pass at the Friona 30. Standouts offensively for the Mustangs were DeBerry, Key and Spain. DeBerry gained 126 yards in 11 carries, while Key had 44 in 12 and Spain 43 in nine.

Tony Perea led Friona rushers with 36 yards in eight car-

ries, while Barker had 25 yards in 13 carries.

Defensively, the Mustangs were led by Guard Jim Schreier and HB Butch Hudgens. Standout defenders for Friona were Ricky Hurst and linebacker Joe Garcia.

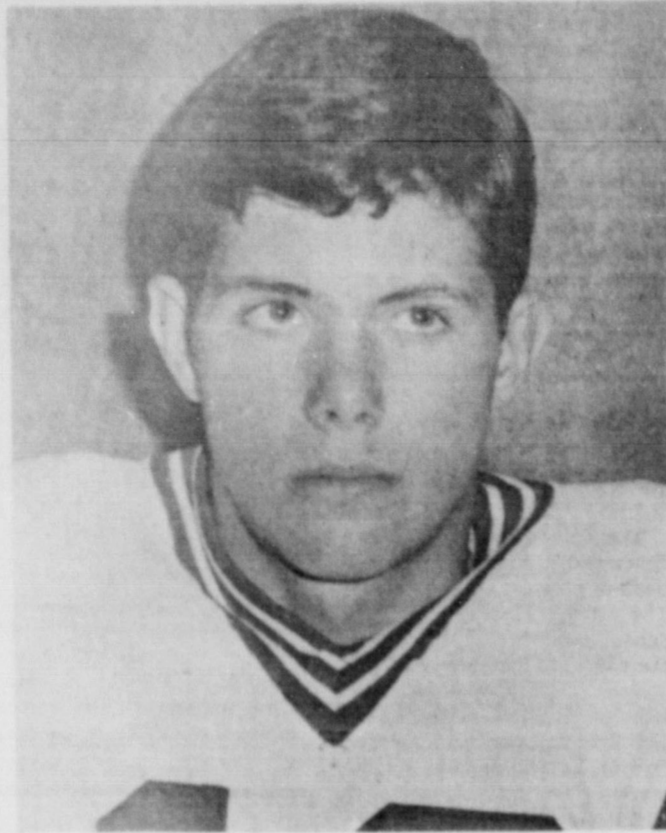

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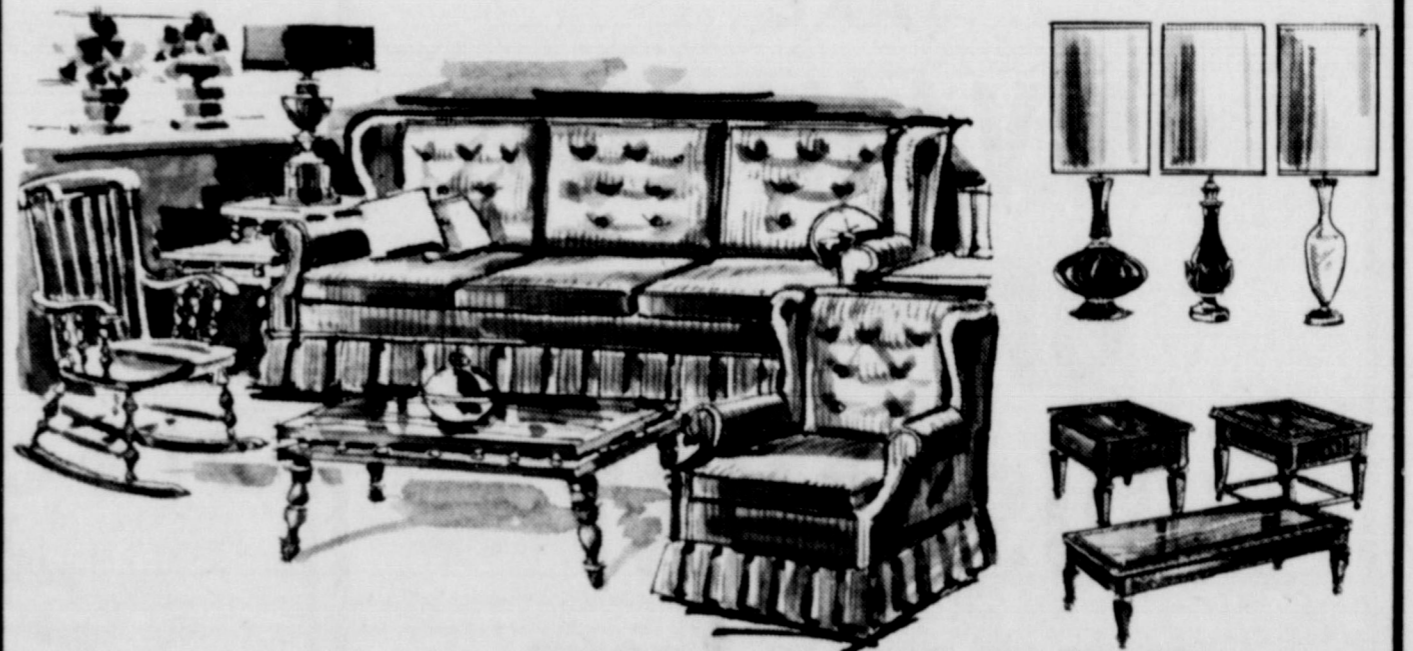

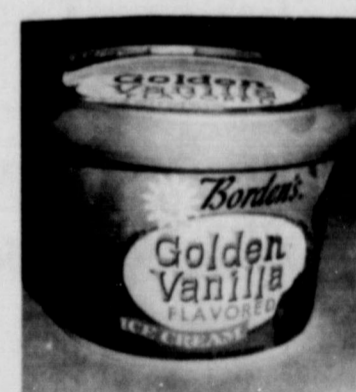
