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THE AMERICAN Automobile Assn. is a bit upset over an apparent finding that car dealers aren't complying with new consumer safety data laws,

The AAA did a spot check of new car showrooms and found that the safety data, required by federal law since 1970, is difficult to obtain. The AAA also found that the public "either is not taking advantage of the consumer legislation, or is not aware of it. "

The law says that dealers must have available in the new car showrooms pamphlets containing information on stopping distance, acceleration and passing ability and tire reserve loads. In addition, since January, the law stipulates that these pamphlets not only must be available, but that customers should be allowed to retain and take home the information free, or have it mailed to them upon request,

AAA recommends that anyone who finds salesmen refusing to comply with the law write the Office of Consumer Affairs (and maybe Ralph Nader and Dick Tracy) and tell on them,

## That's the Spirit!

Yeah, man!"

That's how one popular sports cheer begins. Back in high school, we yelled:

"We've got the spirit that a great team needs. Spirit it's grrreat!"

What did we mean? That our team had the aggressive, alert, confident attitude that characterizes winning teams.

President Nixon's plane. Air Force One, was renamed for its flight to China, "The Spirit of '76." The love of independence, belief in equality, confidence in the victory of right, determination to succeed against the odds - these are aspects of the traditional American spirit.

"Spirit" means a frame of mind (e.g., in high spirits), enthusiasm (g. g., a spirited reply), loyalty (e. g., school spirit), the true intention (e.g. the spirit of the law), a living principle (e.g., spirit of democracy). A man's spirit is the motivating force within

. That's what "spirit" means in most popular usage. But, of course; that's not all it means. And it's not what it means in the Bible

More than an Attitude

When Jesus said, "God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and in truth" (John 4), He did not mean only that the acceptable worship of God is a true and sincere attitude. He did not mean really that a man cannot worship God unless he allows God to influence his ba-

The King James translation, "God is a spirit," is misleading. Many people would be willing to paraphrase it, "God is an attitude," an attitude of love, kindness, forgiveness, sacrifice, and similar virtues.

The truth is, "God is Spirit." He is a living person, without physical, tangible manifestation. The spiritual world cannot be experienced by man's five senses, nor can a man communicate with the spiritnal world by his physical capacities. To worship God "in the spirit" requires a supernatural capability. It requires the Holy Spirit residng within the worshipper.

Paul explained, "The Spirit helps our inability; for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words; and He Who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is." (Romans 8)

Similarly, God cannot accept the worship of "spiritual" (that is, virtuous) people; He can be worshipped only by people who have the Spirit. All true believers have the Holy Spirit, yet many still try

REFRIGERATOR PART OF ECO-SYSTEM

Everything in the universe s interrelated and must therefore be protected That's the ecologist's credo. The very word "ecology" derives from the Greek 'eco'' meaning "house" and "logy" meaning "study so we can conclude that everything in the home is part of the eco-system and as such must be pro-

Take the refrigerator. It protects you by preserving-the food you eat. Your responsibility in this chain of protection is keeping it clean. Ideal for this purpose is pure, natural baking soda which won't scratch the surface when used dry as a scourer, is safe around your food and routs odors.

To trap escaping food smells between cleanings, fill a peanut butter jar or container with dry baking soda. Punch holes in the lid and store your odor-eater in the refrigerator. Shake up the container occasionally to expose a fresh surface of soda and renew the supply about

World on Wheels

Q. What causes rear wheels to fock upon light applica-A. The cause is probably a

faulty or leaking seal. Q. There's too much play in my car's steering while driv-

A. Improper tire inflation or 'rear suspension should be suspected. Q. Our car pulls constantly

to one side when stopping. A. Possible causes include poor wheel alignment or brake lining worn on one side or oil soaked on one side, both due to wheel cyl-

inder defects. Q. A friend recommended a "cool" oil for my car. Please explain.

A. Because your engine's oil must do at least 40% of the total cooling job, that was good advice. Cooling is a big job, especially with today's higher speeds, smaller engines, heavier loads and demanding accessories. It's too big an order for some oils. For instance, Castrol developed its GTX oil specifically to solve these problems. It has been tested in the lab and on the track (non-stop for 1,440 hours in one test alone) and really does the trick.


