Sudan students prepared in earnest this week for the UIL Literary contests to be held Thursday and Friday, April 13-14.

The one-act play, "Antic Spring" will compete in the district contest today at Farwell. Following modern trends, this does without properties, thus emphasizing pantomime and character portrayal. For scenery it uses six chairs representing an open car. The story evolves around teenagers going on a picnic. Members of the cast include Ginger (Toni McWilliams) earnest and overbearingly sunny; Robert, (Roger Swart) the sensitive poet; Blossom (Rene' Markham) the exuberant and idiotic teenager Sam (Keith Downs) and Gwendolyn (Cecile Bandy) adolescent love; and Elbert (Rex Baccus) the little brother who looks with noisy criticism on the others. The play is directed by Speech instructor, Ann Hedges, with Mattie Scott as student director.

Young Men Must Register

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, state director of Selective Service for Texas, has reminded young men of their requirement under Federal Law to register with Selective Service.

Some young men may believe that future military manpower requirements may be met by volunteers that the requirement to register is past; however, the law does require registration by all native born young men and all resident aliens within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Legal registration may be completed 30 days before, or 30 days after the young man reaches age 18.

Rory Manning and Richard Tamplin received a bye in the first round, lost to Bovina, then defeated Vega to grab third place in the Junior boys doubles.

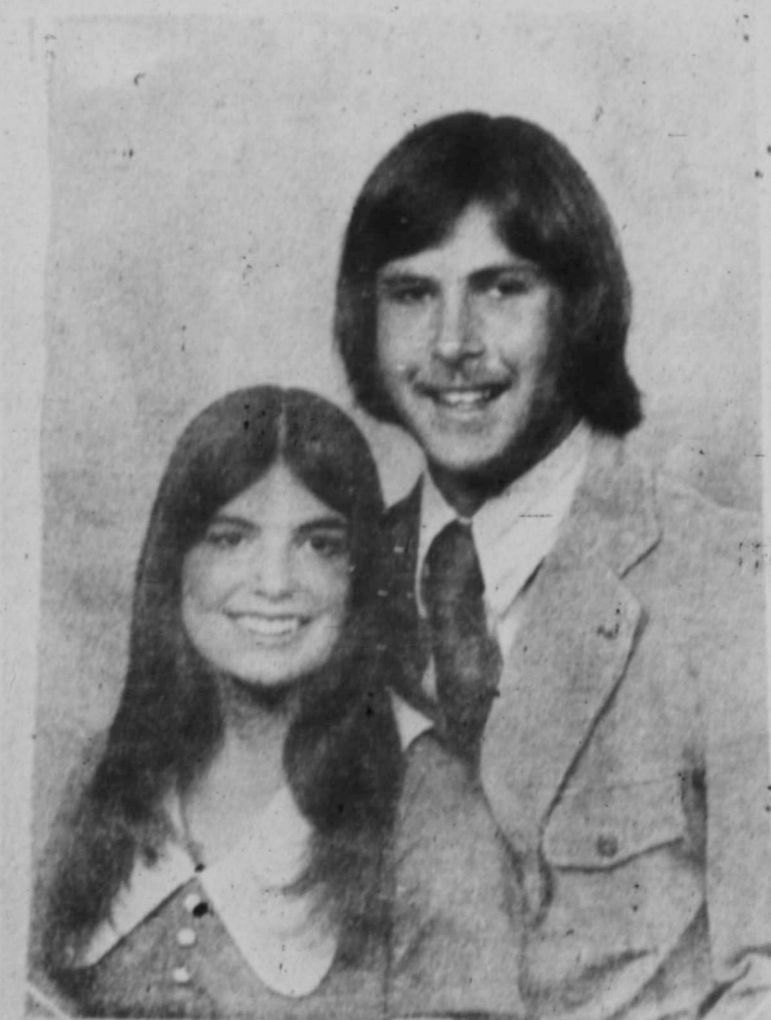
Mitch Chester placed third in the Junior boys singles by first losing to Vega, and defeating Kress.

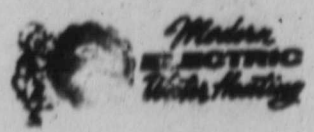

been greater," Speir said.

"For example, vehicle miles driven increased from 68 billion in 1970 to over 70.7 billion for 1971. This represents a rise in total driving of 4%. From another standpoint, the number of licensed Texas drivers rose by 12 million during the past 12 months to a total near 76 million.

"Despite these sizeable increases in both miles driven and numbers of drivers, actual deaths increased only slightly.

This means that our death rate per 100 million miles of travel—the nationally accepted indicator of traffic safety effectiveness—decreased 3% from 5.2 in 1970 to 5.1 in 1971. As recently as 1966, our death rate in Texas was 6.2 so progress is being made," the DPS director added.

Of the 3,594 deaths, 2,184 occurred on rural roadways and 1,410 in urban areas. There were 2,993 fatal accidents and total accidents reported for 1971

TEXANS TO ATTEND CONFERENCE

Seventy-one delegates from Texas, including 10 from the Northwest conference, will attend the international conference of the United Methodist Church April 16-29 in Atlanta, Ga. One thousand delegates from some 80 countries will participate in the meeting of United Methodism's supreme law-making body.

A meeting of this type is only held every four years and rather extensive alterations in the denomination are under study by

commissions who will give their reports at the meeting. These call for restructuring the church's general boards and agencies, restating its social principles, rethinking its doctrinal standards, changing its attitudes toward the role of women, reducing the number of its theological schools, and complete elimination of racially-segregated conferences.

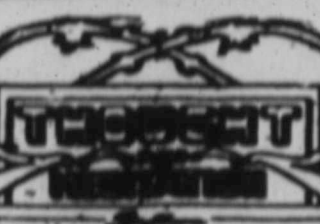
