WOODWORK BY DALTON

THE TEXAS Dept. of Agriculture has published another booklet, answering questions which many may have about various things, but few of them have anything to do with agriculture.

They don't answer the questions we non-farming types want answered. Everybody takes for granted that we know what all these agricultural terms mean. But I figured out for myself that when a farmer is listing, his tractor is lower on one side than on the other, a mold board is a shelf for holding stale bread and a bed roller is a farmer who can't sleep nights for worrying about his crops.

One fellow told me he had spent the day "laying by his land," which confirmed my suspicion that some folks just won't work a lick, although you'd think he could find a more comfortable place to recline.

The TDA release telling about their new booklet does contain some interesting material, though. It begins with these questions:

How much is a cord of wood? How many feet in a nautical mile? How high is a hand? How long is a horseshoe court? How big is an acre?

The booklet answering these and other sometimes perplexing questions is called "Everything You Have Always Wanted To Know About Weights and Measures But You Didn't Know Who To Ask." It probably takes three pages to list the title.

The booklet contains detailed information on just how much a pinch or dash is (it's 1/16 of a teaspoon), or one gill (it's one-half cup or four ounces liquid), and so on.

Also included are measurements for linear, nautical, square or area, cubic or volume. Also covered are liquid, dry, metric weights, angles and arcs, paper, decimal equivalents of common fractions, weight of water, winds, Roman numerals, and standard measurements for baseball, football, tennis basketball, horseshoe court, men's volley ball, girls' volley ball, and single handball court.

A cord of wood is four feet high, four feet wide, and eight feet long. There are 6,028 feet in a nautical mile; a hand is four inches high; a horseshoe court is 40 feet between pegs; an acre is 43,560 square feet. You can get a copy of the booklet by writing to John C. DPS REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 4 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1972 shows a total of 21 accidents resulting in one person killed, and 18 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1972 shows a total of 420 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 218 persons injured as compared to March, 1971 with 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1972, occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Hale and Dallam three each; Briscoe, Gray, Hardeman, Hutchinson, Parmer, Wheeler, Crosby, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Knox, Lynn, and Young, one each.
