ONCE EACH month, this newspaper receives a copy of the Purple Martin Capital News, mailed to us from Griggsville, Ill. The first couple of issues I saw fascinated me, not because I found their content interesting, but because I find it difficult to accept the fact that a newspaper is published—and apparently circulated nationwide—strictly for the birds.

Judging from the terrific number of letters from readers which the newspaper publishes, I'd better be pretty careful about what I say in regard to purple martin lovers, because there must be flocks of them. Personally, I wouldn't know a purple martin from a yellow canary, but it seems pretty evident that many, many persons indulge in the hobby of watching birds in general, and purple martins in particular.

IF YOU own a horse born since last year's vaccination campaign for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis, and you haven't given the critter its VEE shots, it's time to quit foaling around.

Anyway, Assistant Lubbock County Agent Jimmy Vanstorty warns that "a vaccination program for the deadly horse disease should be activated now before the mosquitoes which transmit the disease become active."

Having lived at Plainview in recent years, we have been kind of spoiled in regard to the mosquito spraying program which keeps this nuisance to a minimum (although they do show up at times between sprayings). But we can remember too well how it was before they started that program. Some of the mosquitoes were big enough to carry off a small horse.

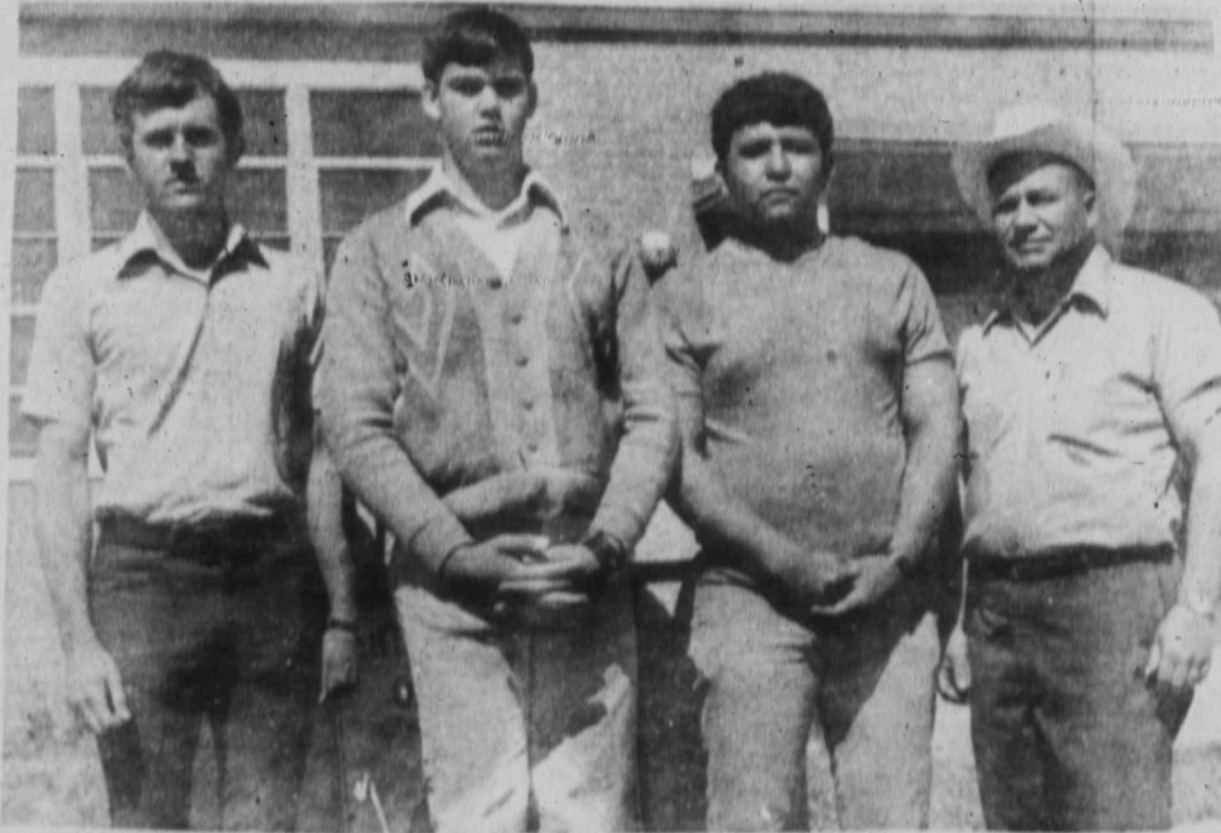
Horses, mules, ponies and donkeys that were vaccinated last year need not be vaccinated again, says Vanstorty. If you're uncertain, though, you should vaccinate again to be sure.

THIS NEWSPAPER received another release from the same office which sent out the VEE warning, only it was attributed to "Associate County Agricultural Agent" Tom Hemphill. Now we don't know what the difference is between an assistant county agent and an associate county agent unless one helps and the other just goes along, except in this case one of them is on horse and the other is on grass... and they're both trying to give us the straight dope.

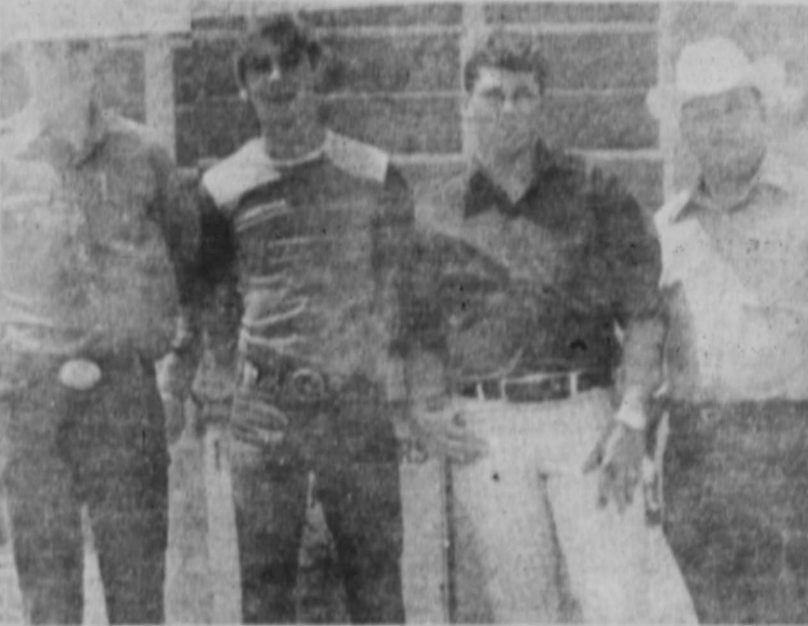
The release on grass, like the one on horse, has nothing to do with narcotics. Hemphill is giving data on lawn management chores such as fertilization, mowing and watering.

There's a lot of that sort of thing happening around town, and it sure does mess up a good game of golf or tennis. Hemphill tells us when to apply fertilizer, what kind to use, how close to mow it (I like to stand off about three blocks), and how often.

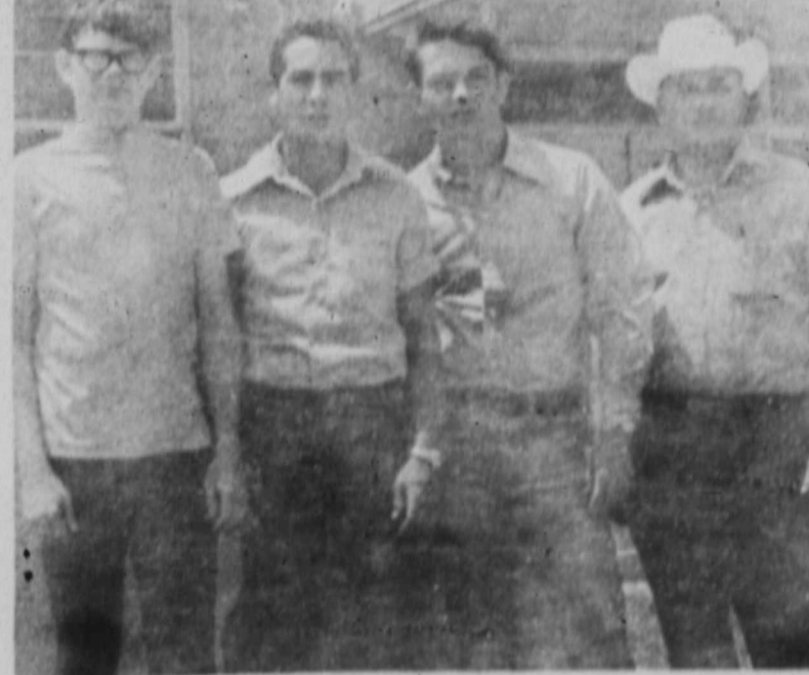

## FFA TEAM GOES TO STATE

The Sudan FFA Livestock Judging team qualified for the State Judging contest by placing 8th in the area contest Saturday, April 22, on the Texas Tech campus with some 180 schools represented in the contest. The team, consisting of Eugene Lopez, David Doty and Jim Fields, also placed first in district.

The State contest will be held Saturday, April 29, on the Texas A & M campus at College Station.

The Daylight Savings time will continue until the last Sunday in October when it will revert to Central Standard time.

The team, along with advisor Don Ham, will leave today, Thursday. Along the way they are scheduled to stop several times for practice judging sessions on grading slaughter steers on the hoof. The contest included grading slaughter steers, feeder cattle and feeder calves; judging market and breeding cattle, market and breeding sheep and market and breeding swine.

The Sudan Dairy Team, consisting of Don Noles, Bruce Pierce, and Curtis Chester placed second in the district contest and missed qualifying for the contest by only four points. The team scored 734 points from a possible 900 with the lowest qualifying score being 738. The

top ten teams in the area contest qualify for the state meet.

The Meats team of Mitch Chester, Rex Baccus and Carroll Legg placed third in district.

LOST GENERATION will be shown on Wednesday, May 3, at the First Baptist Church, Sudan.

The latest Billy Graham film, LOST GENERATION, features special appearances by Art Linkletter and "Dragnet" star Jack Webb.

to be here for quite a stay, and our objective is to inform ourselves as best we can on how it works and how it can work better," he said.

Most of the problems with contract performance can be avoided if contracts are complete enough that each party has a clear understanding of what is expected of him.

Contracts should contain provisions, attorney Bill Blackledge stated, to cover all foreseeable areas in which misunderstanding might arise. These would include language clearly defining the farm and acreage covered, deliverable quantities, delivery deadlines, crop care during the growing season, harvesting and ginning requirements, payment specifications, liens and encumbrances, when title to the crop is to be passed, and whether or not the contract applies to shares of the crop that may be owned by landlord, tenant or spouse.

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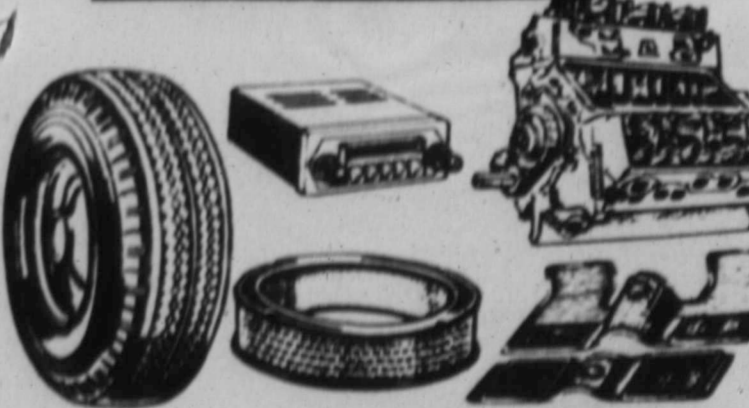

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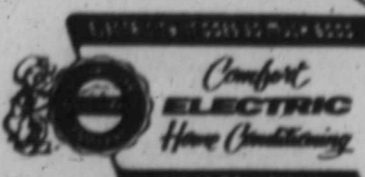
