WOODWORK

ALL IN ONE DAY I found out what a dulcimer is, learned of a unique statewide arts and crafts fair, was reminded that there is beauty in things we often consider ordinary, and read that the thing to do for mother is make her look like Susie Wong or Madame Chiang.

A fellow who lives in Slaton came into the office the other day and said, among other things, that he makes dulcimers. The first time he said it, I let it go by, figuring I hadn't heard him right. But a little later he he slipped it in there again, so I just came right out and asked him, "What in the world is a dulcimer?" It sounded to me like part of a mathematical equation—you multiply this times that and then count off three dulcimer places to the left.

He told me what one is, but we'll get to that later. After he left, I was plowing through the mail and a release from the Texas Tourist Development Agency told me this:

"AUSTIN—Slaton will be represented at the first Texas State Arts and Crafts Fair May 31-June 4 in Kerrville by Simon H. Behlen, who had just visited me, and this arts and crafts fair sounds like it will be quite a deal, but that wasn't what he came in to tell me about. He came in to give me a list of "the beautiful things of life as seen around town this week!" He had just jotted down some things he had noticed which struck him as being of unusual charm and beauty. Here are some of them:

"A 1934 Chevrolet driving down the street, looking like new..."

"A beautiful hand-painted 'Garage Sale' sign..."

"A large array of climbing red roses at an empty house, God's handiwork is everywhere if you will just notice it..."

"An antique tailor's pressing iron, being used as a door stop..."

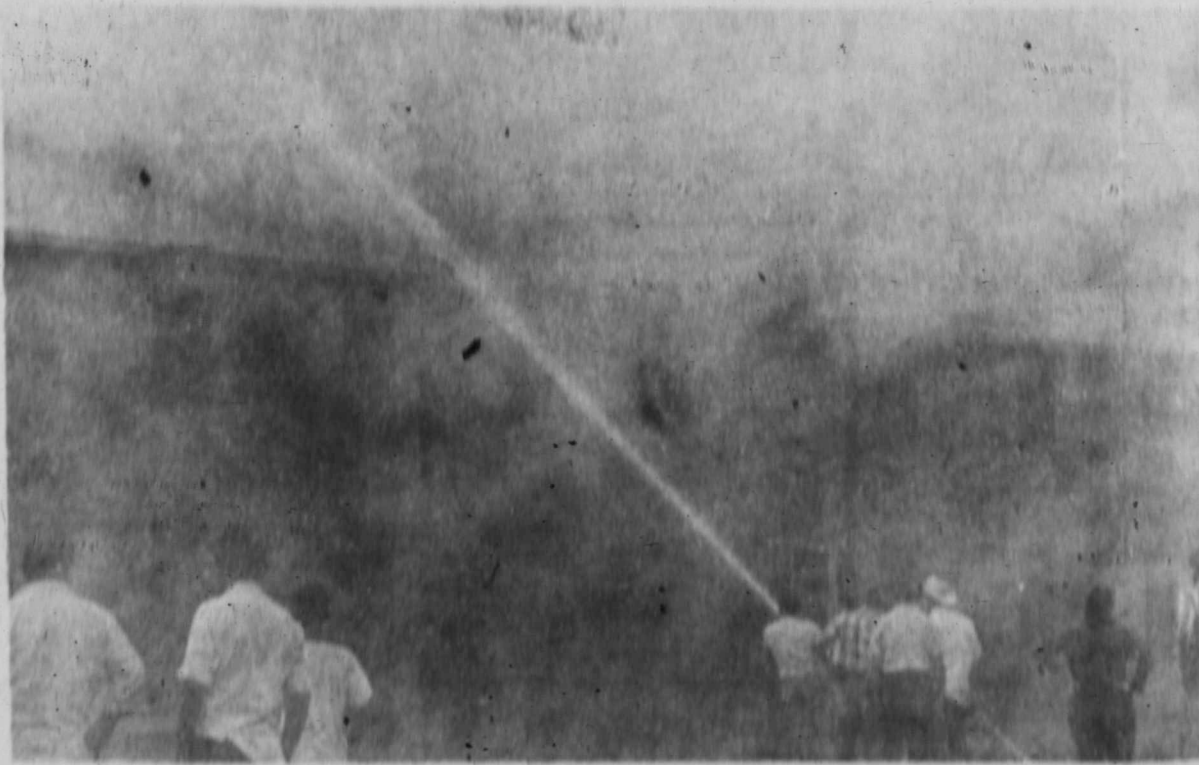
"A woman working in her flowers, and wearing a bonnet..."

"The cool, refreshing rain... and a mockingbird sings merrily..."

A man who can observe beauty in such ordinary things has to be one who has found peace. Behlen also noted that he enjoyed playing his dulcimers, which gets us back to that.

A dulcimer, says the American Heritage Dictionary, is "a musical instrument with wire strings of graduated lengths, played with two padded hammers."

Behlen says he'd better not catch anybody beating on his dulcimers with a hammer, because they're designed for picking. (Immediately there flashed into my mind the picture of a recent 5-hour period when I was shut up in a tiny pickup camper with two printers near a lake while it rained like crazy so we couldn't get out. For four and a half hours I played my banjo gaily and with abandon, and even sang 30 or 40 numbers so companions wouldn't be depressed by the rain. But I stop-

ped when they began to dipso hitting my banjo with a hammer. I guess they thought it was a dulcimer.)

THE ARTS AND CRAFTS Fair will include Behlen and about 200 other craftsmen from all parts of Texas. The five-day event will be on the campus of Schreiner Institute, with fair hours 10 a.m. until dark Wednesday through Saturday and from noon until dark on Sunday. It will cost \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children. Also, a food pavilion will offer visitors a wide selection ranging from barbecue to homemade ice cream and from hot buttered corn on the cob to turkey sausage and jerky. (That's what it said, but I'm not sure what turkey sausage is, either.)

One of the features of the fair will be a children's tent, where youngsters will be instructed in basic arts and crafts skills.

There will be a folk music festival and special stage productions in Kerrville at the same time.

Fair visitors not only will be able to watch craftsmen at work but also will be able to buy their wares. Crafts to be represented include leather, wood-working (they could probably learn a thing or two from the old Woodworker), pottery, glass blowing, rag dolls, puppets—and dulcimers.

COACH HIRED, THREE RESIGN

Reading the agenda for the regular school board meeting of the Sudan Trustees Monday night, was the hiring of a head football coach. Hired was Jim Warren who has coached for the past three years at Plains High School. Warren has served as head coach for the past two years with the varsity team win-

ning district in 1971. The Cowboys finished second in district, going down to Seagraves, in the preceding season. He has also coached at Apton and Mount Pleasant. Warren, whose teaching major is English, is a graduate of Plains High School, McMurry College, and is presently working on his masters

degree at Texas Tech. He is married and the father of three boys. His wife is also an accredited teacher.

Other action taken by the Board includes the accepting of resignations from Bill Smith, junior high coach; Mrs. Cynthia Smith, second grade teacher; Mrs. Beth Manning, school counselor.

Teacher contracts were approved by the board in the same form as 1971-72 contracts with salaries set the same. Summer trips for school organizations and faculty were approved. The Board also approved the purchase of new uniforms for the Girls Varsity basketball team and selected the recipient of the Sudan Livestock and Feeding scholarship which is in the amount of \$500 presented annually to a graduating senior based on scholastic ability.

Election Returns

Some 214 persons cast their ballots Saturday, May 6, in the Democratic party primary and selected their choices of candidates. Dolph Briscoe took the majority of the votes in the governor's race, 119 with Preston Smith getting 45, Ben Barnes 34 and Frances Farenthold, 16. Briscoe received some 44 per cent of the State's votes and will be in the run-off with Frances Farenthold.

Sudan gave Wayne Connally 71 votes, Bill Hobby, 64 and Ralph M. Hall, 44 in the race for Lieutenant Governor. They There will be a run-off between Connally and Hobby.

Ralph Yarbrough ended with 49.5 per cent of the votes in the state but will be pitted against Barefoot Sanders in the June run-offs for U. S. Senator.

In most of the other races Sudan followed the state trend with the majority voting for the state winner by electing Crawford Martin, attorney general; Calvert, comptroller; Jesse James, state treasurer; Byron Tunnell, railroad commissioner.

On the county-wide level Jack Young received 166 for District Attorney; Curtis Wilkinson, 175, county attorney; E. D. McNeese, 176, sheriff; Herbert Dunn, 180, tax assessor; Glenn Babson, 160, county chairman; Guy Walden, 174, precinct chairman.

Sudan voters also voted 160 for the anti-bussing amendment and 24 against.

The Democratic run-off will be held Saturday, June 3,

This would assure them of continued upkeep of the grounds.

The City performs constant maintenance of the cemetery including irrigation. They recently restored another water well at the site to assure plenty of water for this purpose.

The Sudan Junior Babe Ruth team is scheduled to play Roden Drug in Littlefield.

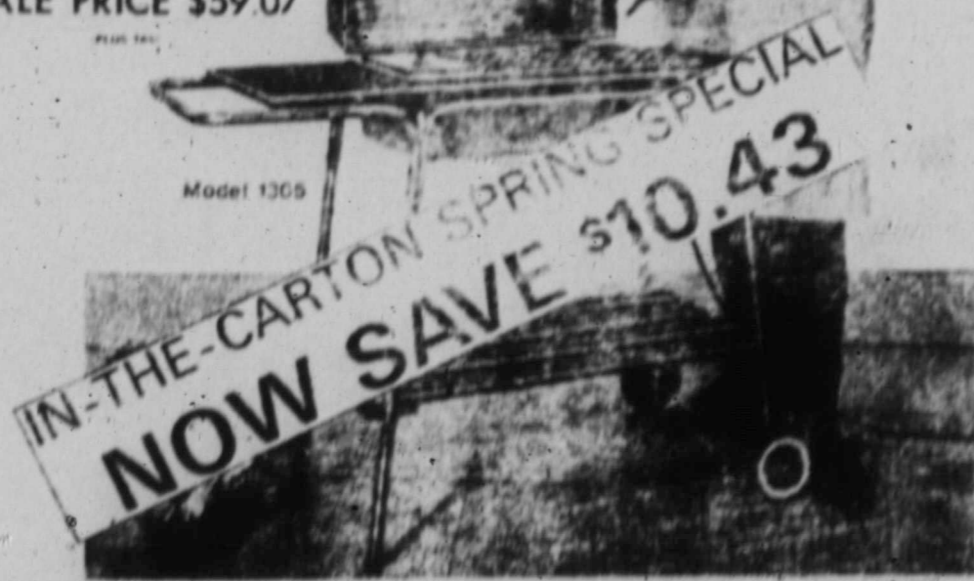
On Saturday, the Braves will host the Dodgers in Amherst and the Cardinals and Angels will meet for the first time in Sudan.
