We're happy to be able to bring you the "good news" concerning Friona's newest industry on this page today, just as we had hoped we would be able to do in this column last week.

Also, we're glad we had a hand in helping to "sell" the Grahams and their salad dressing to Frionans, and in focusing their interest on Friona.

Theirs is, we believe, a real good example of what Friona needs to be working for -- the small industry with possibilities of growing with the town.

Other things which we are proud of this week include the extra good showing made by students from Friona High School and Junior high school in Interscholastic League Literary contests and other events.

The students did real well in literary events, in industrial art contests, and in band contests, which proves that our students are excelling in a variety of fields, and that athletics are not the only thing being pushed, nor the only area in which good results are being secured.

Our congratulations to these students, as well as to the faculty members who spend countless hours (on their own time) helping the students prepare themselves for the extra-curricular activities.

The Texas Highway Department's annual survey of the travel industry shows a record 12,688,000 out of state persons travelling by automobile visited the State last year. A second record was set as this group's expenditures broke the \$613,148,000 mark, a 16.8 per cent increase over 1964.

While the total visitors represented an impressive eight per cent gain over last year, the biggest plus for Texas was in their total expenditures. The fact that the average visitor remained in Texas a full one-half day longer than in 1964 accounted for a large portion of the \$88 million increase.

In addition, the Texas Tourist Council, an Austin headquartered association of travel-related businesses, estimates that over four million visitors came to Texas via commercial carriers, adding more than \$293 million to the automobile total spent for Tourist services.

In its survey to secure data rapidly developing Travel industry, the Department analyzed information from nearly 14,000 questionnaires returned by automobile visitors. These questionnaires provided data regarding expenditures, length of stay, purpose of visit, number in party, income groups, age groups and other key information.

Returned questionnaires indicated that over half of Texas' visitors in 1965 listed vacations as their primary purpose for visiting the State. Nearly one-third came to visit family and friends, while 19 per cent said they were in the State for business reasons.

Motels were the favorite for overnight accommodations by the highway traveler. The group staying with friends and relatives was second in number. The remainder used hotel, trailer, camping and other facilities.

A ninth tourist information Bureau is scheduled for completion this fall by the Department at Amarillo. It will be located to service south-bound traffic entering Texas on U.S. Highways 87 and 287 as well as east-west traffic on Interstate Highway 40.

Last year the Travel and Information Division, in addition to assisting over 3/4 million visitors, also received and processed 224,000 mail inquiries for information and literature on Texas.

During the year color slides and film strips were furnished to more than 227 organizations. In addition, the Travel and Information Division's travel film, "Texas - Land of Contrast" was viewed by some 278,000 persons. The film is now being produced with Spanish, French and German narrations for showing in foreign tourist markets.

## NEW INDUSTRY

### Building Secured; Shares Are Sold

Decision on the location of Billy Graham Foods, Inc. in Friona was announced this week by the Graham brothers, following the sale of 300 shares of stock in their corporation, and the securing of a Friona location.

The company, which makes several varieties of salad dressing,

will move to Friona shortly after May 1. It has been turning out the dressing on a small-scale operation in Dimmitt for the past few months.

The Grahams terminated the financing of their operation by the sale of 300 shares of stock at \$80 per share. After preliminary arrangements were completed for a building for the company, the Friona Chamber of Commerce helped clinch the company's location in Friona by assisting with the financial arrangements concerning the rent. Several local merchants made cash donations to apply on the first year's rent.

The new Friona manufacturing concern has secured the building which has been occupied by Friona Market just south of the city on the Muleshoe Highway. A.L. Carlton, owner of the Friona Market, plans to give possession to the Grahams by May 1. The Grahams secured a five-year lease on the Carlton building with a five year option.

Already manufacturing and selling nine varieties of its salad dressing, the Billy Graham company has been employing six persons in its makeshift operation in Dimmitt. Plans call for the employment of 10 persons initially in Friona.

Prior to moving, the company is busy preparing a 500-case order of their salad dressing for the Furr Food super market chain in West Texas.

Furr is the first large chain organization to agree to carry the products, although the Grahams have been supplying 172 super markets in High Plains and Panhandle towns for the past few months.

The most popular of the Graham salad dressing is the thousand island, which is a recipe of older brother Earl, who operates Earl's cafe in Friona. The blue cheese recipe is by Billy, whose name the products bear. Billy Graham has operated a restaurant in Dimmitt. The third brother, "Mutt" has a restaurant in Bovina.

The Grahams got the order from Furr Food after supplying the company with 30 cases of samples, which the company said it would stock for a month. Two Lubbock stores sold all of the samples in 13 days.

One of the first things which

the company plans to secure within the next few days is an automatic bottling machine. "We have already got to the point that this hand-bottling is far too slow," the Grahams say.

The Grahams have been making their own salad dressing for many years, and have been toying with the idea of producing it commercially for the past 10 years. Finally the past year the brothers bought an automatic blending machine, and the idea began to become an actuality.

Other products currently on the market with the Billy Graham label are Western French dressing, Spanish hot sauce, avocado salad, and tartar sauce.

Several other products are also envisioned by the Grahams, along with the possible processing of vegetables which are grown in abundance in the Friona area.

The new facility will make good use of many vegetables which are grown around Friona, chiefly onions and tomatoes.

## School Board Approves Major Curriculum Change

A major change in the curriculum and grading system for Friona schools was approved at the regular meeting of the Friona Independent School District board of trustees last Tuesday.

Main changes in the grading procedure is including grades of "D" (60-69) among those considered as passing. Two types of curriculum requirement will also be put into force. One plan will be for "college prep" students, calling for four years of English. The other plan, for vocational students, will cut the English requirement to three years, and make an additional elective.

Reasons for making the changes in grading and curriculum were to further enrich the higher English, math and science courses to fit the need of the college prep students, and to make it possible for slower learners to achieve the requirements for admission to vocational schools and colleges.

The new system will enable the student to route himself so that there will be a more homogenous grouping in each class.

"Students who are facing continuous failure are a big percentage of those who become drop-outs with social adjustment problems. We feel this problem would be reduced with the recommendations put into effect", the group study committee's report said.

Under the new program, two years of either home economics or vocational agriculture may be substituted for one of the sciences required under the vocational plan. A minimum grade of C will be highly recommended for college prep students in all courses.

Members of the group study committee were nine from the school and nine parents. From the school were John R. Cook, Baker Duggins, Alton Farr, J. T. Gee, Mrs. James Hamilton, Tom B. Jarboe, Mrs. Benny

Fryor, Mrs. Frank Truitt and Mrs. Otto Whitefield.

"Lay" members of the committee were Mrs. Doyce Barnett, Mrs. Franklin Bauer, Paul Fortenberry, Mrs. Richard London, Steve Messenger, Curtis Murphree, Mrs. James Procter, Bob Riethmayer and Dr. Paul Spring.

In other business at the board meeting, Dr. Spring was elected president of the board for the 1966-67 school year. Cordie Potts was named vice president and Mrs. J.V. Zeman was elected secretary.

Tax assessor-collector Porter Roberts reported tax collection for the month.

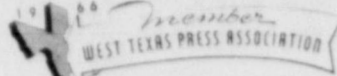

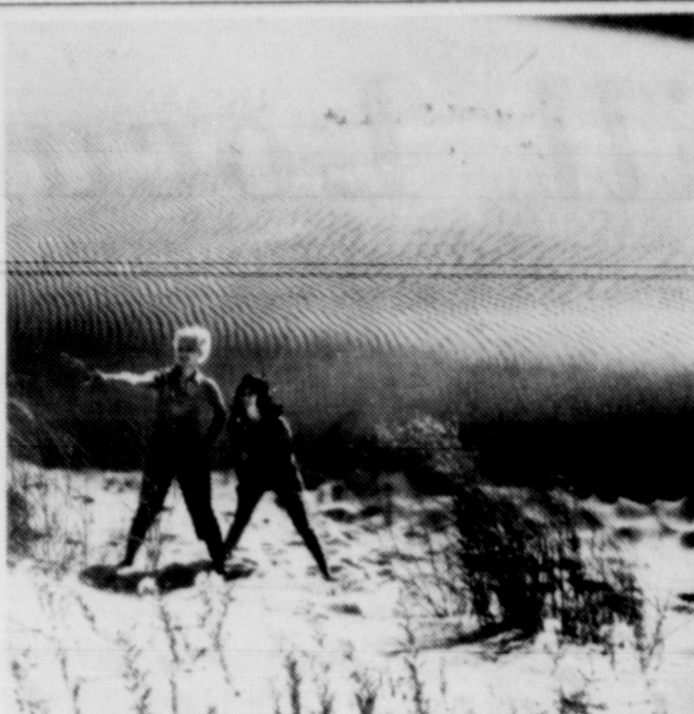
### Support Is Urged For Public Library

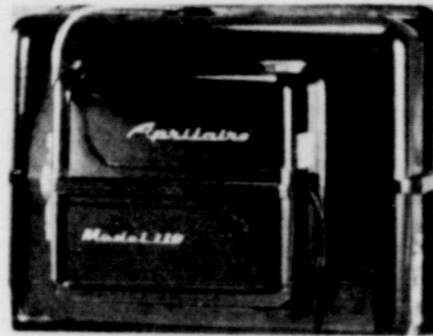

## On The Farm In Parmer County

By JOE VANZANDT  
County Agent

1965 official crop estimates have been released by the Texas Crop Reporting Service recently. Parmer County is still the top grain producing county in the state and probably in the nation also.

For wheat we were first in total production with 4,529,000 bushels and first in yield per acre with an average of 52.4 bushels per acre.

In grain sorghum, we were also first in total production with 1,046,276,000 pounds and first in yield per acre with an average of 5,734 pounds.

These are all big achievements on crop production and something we can all be proud of.

### RESULT DEMONSTRATIONS

We are in the process of setting up several demonstrations, on cropland and livestock production for this year. We will have some demonstration with cotton fungicides, grain sorghum varieties, possibly some cotton varieties, and vegetables as well as some fertilizer research trials. Farmers can help themselves and their neighbors by putting in check plots or plots that compare a different way of doing a practice. Demonstrations help tell each farmer the value, benefit, profit or loss to be had by each production practice if it is fairly compared with another method. We think demonstrations can serve as a good means for farmers to continually check to see year by year if a practice is profitable.

### Bloat Drug Discovered

The discovery of a new drug, poloxalene, represents a major breakthrough in the search for a preventive of legume bloat in livestock. It will be marketed in the United States in the near future under the grade name of "Bloat Guard," reports Dr. C.M. Patterson, Extension veterinarian at Texas A&M University. It is a dry product which may be spread over grain as a top dressing. If fed to livestock a few minutes before they are pastured or fed freshly cut legumes, bloat will be prevented.

I do not hear about. You can help us all by letting me know of your demonstration plans and results. Here's hoping we hear from several of you. Remember, the end result is really how much net profit did you derive from one method as compared to another way. Farmers must be good managers to stay in business. Farmers need to know that a particular practice returns more net profit, so put in some demonstration plots.

### 400-Mile 'Parade of Trucks' Shows Farm Crops' Appetite

A line of trucks, extending from Corpus Christi to Dallas would cause a migraine traffic headache — but it could cause even more serious problems for agriculture in Texas.

Those farm trucks, 80,000 or more of the five-ton type, would be needed to carry the 400,000 tons of plant nutrients contained in this region's crops each year," according to a noted agronomist.

"Crops consume huge amounts of nutrients during a growing season, and take them off to market," Dr. S. M. King, agronomist with International Minerals & Chemical Corporation, world's largest producer of agricultural chemicals, says in illustrating the problem of maintaining adequate fertility in farm soils.

#### Findings are Valid

Based on acreage reports and known nutrient consumption data for major crops, agronomists can determine the amounts of each nutrient removed each year.

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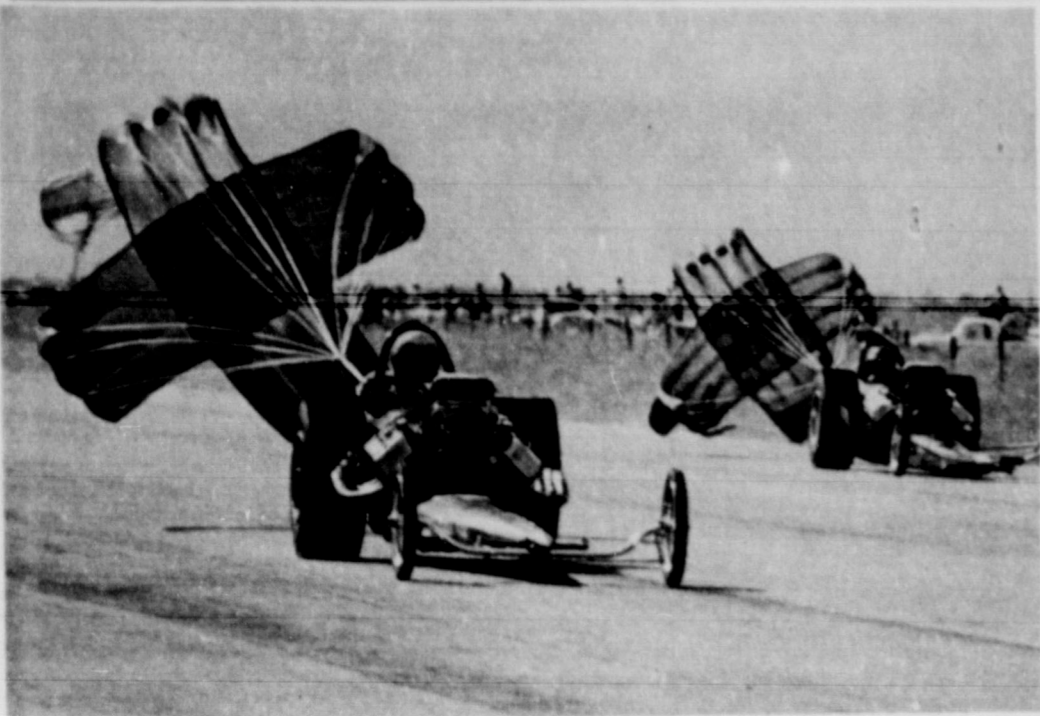

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# Andy Rogers Gives His Views On Senate Race

Due to the Federal Court's ultimatum your Texas Legislature was forced to re-district. The old 30th District I have represented for nearly 14 years has been greatly enlarged --- 300 miles across.

The job if State Senator belongs to YOU, the people, not to me or any other candidate. The whole object of filling this post is that YOU elect the person best able to serve you --- not necessarily the most popular, best known and certainly not just the one who can spend the most money in a campaign. I wish very much to see and visit personally with everyone, and will do so, as much as is humanly possible.

However, the huge size of our district, very limited money resources and the work and responsibility my Seniority places on me limits this personal contact, by me, quite severely.

Therefore, I sincerely request you to examine my record, satisfy yourself and help me spread the word to others.

I am a farmer, stockman and small businessman, 41 years of age, have been active in church, lodge, civic work and farm and Veterans organizations. My wife, myself, two daughters, and one son are native West Texans, of the area including our Senate district. I served three years in the United States Army during World War II and have seven years of college -- Texas A & M and the University of Texas.

It is dangerous in our State Legislature not to be a "go along to get along" person. It is dangerous to speak loudly and firmly against some big office holders when you do not agree with them 100% of the time or oppose some of their programs you believe harmful to your District or State. It is dangerous to seek to really stop pollution of our surface and ground waters. It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against cor-

ruption in high places when it arises or to oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations who have so much power in Austin -- those who seek to evade their fair share of taxes and seek to shift an ever greater burden to the worker, farmer and Texas-owned businesses.

Andy Rogers has done all of these and therefore is on their list for extermination. When I first ran for the State Senate in 1952 --- there was then a great hue and cry to clean up the "mess in Washington". I was an oddity among candidates THEN, as I charged that "Austin is as rotten as Washington" and that "moral integrity is needed most."

I further demanded a law to require state officials and legislators to file for public record, a statement showing their income and it's source.

This wasn't, and still isn't the way to be very popular in Austin and certain other circles.

In 1954, I, and a few others, urged investigations into several matters, including the Insurance Commission, certain land transactions and certain state contracts. For our efforts we were slandered.

A few months later the lid blew off.

Yes, I have made many good friends among those who work for the interests of our District. I have also made many good enemies of those selfish minority blocs whose interests conflict with those of our District.

In two of my more recent races they have used every trick; deceit; slanderous anonymous mail and threats to me and my closest friends.

During this race they have, so far, at least, been more subtle. But their money and power behind my opponents become more obvious each day.

This is not to say that my two opponents would employ or use these tactics --- they both seem like nice guys --- but they don't have to use them --- some others will gladly and freely do this for them if they think it will work.

These methods of deceit, etc. have been perfected to an art. And, as has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art". But look closely --- it is obvious they are at work --- not necessarily because all of them love my opponents, but because they seek to destroy an old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

Meanwhile, my opponents readily seek and accept campaign money from various ones of these enemies of the people.

I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run from them in the past --- I will not do so now, or in the future.

### ISSUES

1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post is: Can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their

advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money.

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker, and very rich oilman, among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and rave how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me.

The truth is that in 1959 your then Senator George Moffett and other leader in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution at Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful results. But the banker and oil men who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered one of the worst violators of pollution control.

Most of our oilmen, including the major companies have cooperated wonderfully with the pollution authority --- but not this gentleman.

He regularly contacts our legislators and other state officials to try to destroy the pollution authority. He is regularly known to be one of the major contributors to candidates on every political level.

Shall we let him destroy Andy Rogers who passed the bill to protect our water for all our citizens?

3. The "Iron - Curtain press." In my eighteen consecutive years in politics I have never encountered any news media as slanted and biased as the Wichita Falls newspaper.

They have persisted in making "news" for their favorite son and denied every opportunity possible to let their readers know there are even other candidates running.

They have arrogantly and flagrantly denied the public of its "RIGHT TO KNOW".

Shall the voters reward this un-American like institution? 4. Seniority. If a candidate has a voting record to please most of the voters, the next most important thing in his ability to represent them, is his Seniority.

Andy Rogers now ranks 6th in Seniority in our Texas Senate by virtue of 4 years in our House of Representatives and nearly 14 years in our State Senate.

Seniority in our Senate is the most important factor in determining which committees a Senator will serve on and the ones of which he will be chairman --- and therefore his ability to serve.

Nothing else can take the

place of experience and Seniority --- it can't be purchased at the Supermarket or acquired by taking a pill.

This job belongs to the people, not me or any other candidate. The people of our area have an 18 year investment in the experience and seniority of Andy Rogers. To elect either of his opponents would mean at least a 12 year wait to again have another Senator with this important asset.

Should the voters throw away this most valuable asset they already own?

There are many other subjects I would like to discuss but I will close by saying it has been a privilege to co-author and work for the bill that made Midwestern a four year state-supported school, to co-author and work for the bill that changed the name of West Texas State to a University and to have a vital role in the efforts to place Texas Tech where it stands today.

Yes, check my record --- ASK THOSE WHO KNOW.

Andy Rogers' long record of service for the people of our area is clear. You can know where he stands --- while many have been known to falter and will in the terrible heat and pressure of the jungle of Austin politics.

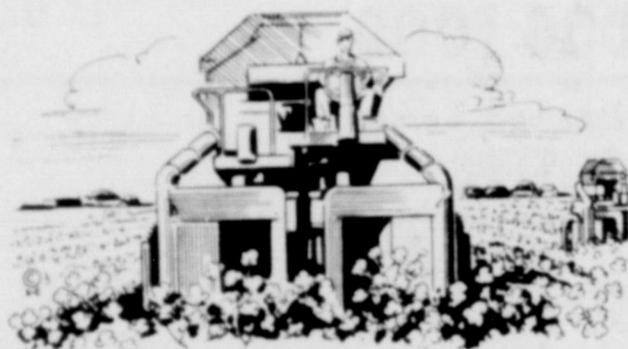
## Friona Student Makes Dean List

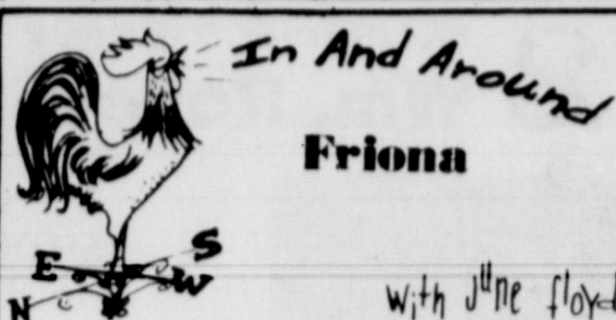

Mrs. Alin Smith, 22, Farwell, has received a \$100 "token of appreciation" from the Santa Fe Railway for her courageous rescue of a motorist stuck on a railroad crossing a mile east of Texico, Feb. 19.

Mrs. Smith, an expectant mother, is employed as a messenger in the Santa Fe's telegraph department at Clovis, N.M. J.H. Nail, superintendent of communications Amarillo, who presented the company's check this morning, also ordered 30 merit marks be credited to her service record.

The Texas Highway Department credits Mrs. Smith's quick action with saving the life of Winfred Reeves, 49, 114 Sandia, Clovis.

Mrs. Smith was returning home about 9:00 p.m., Feb. 19, when she noticed the lights of an automobile on the tracks beamed at an angle. Realizing the Santa Fe passenger-mail train No. 3 was due to pass there momentarily, she stopped to investigate. Mrs. Smith discovered Reeves' car was straddled the tracks and apparently stuck. Unable to get Reeves out of his car, Mrs. Smith raced back to the highway and flagged down Mr. and Mrs. Morris Deaton of Friona. While Deaton was getting the motorist out of his vehicle, Mrs. Smith started running east up the middle of the railroad track in a desperate effort to halt westbound No. 3

whose headlight was now bearing down on them. Because she had no flashlight, Mrs. Smith said she chose the middle of the track, hoping the engineer would see her in time to stop. Mrs. Smith ran the length of three telephone poles before she had to abandon her position and throw herself in a barrow ditch. She lay sobbing in the weeds as she heard the train strike the automobile, demolishing it.

Mrs. Smith and her husband, who is employed by Swift & Co. at Clovis, are the parents of a 2-year-old son, Timothy.

## State Of Texas Has Fewer Dropouts

More children are staying in school longer now than ever before, says Mrs. Patsy R. Yates, Texas A&M University Extension specialist in family life education. A recent report by the Office of Education says that nationally, for every 1,000 children in the fifth grade in 1957-58, an estimated 710 graduated from high school in 1965. Increases in staying power have been steady. This educational trend is favorable for the future economic and social development of Texas. With 4,024,000 children under 18, Texas ranks third in the nation in numbers of children eligible for enrollment in school, Mrs. Yates says.
