SUDAN LANDMARK CEASES OPERATION AFTER 56 YEARS

The Sudan Hotel, one of the city's oldest businesses has been closed. The present owner, Mrs. Pauline Fulcher reported that the

hotel is permanently closed. She added that the building is for sale but that she has no plans for re-opening the business.

The original hotel was built in 1917 by the Wilson-Turner-Lind Company for prospective buyers as they sub-divided the land in the surrounding area. Its location was probably chosen due to its convenience to the railroad depot. It was first operated by Mr. and Mrs. Pete Boesen and became the social meeting place for all local and area functions. The first post office for Sudan was located in the corner of the lobby.

A historical plaque recognizing the landmark was placed at the hotel several years ago by the Lamb County Historical Survey committee. As far as can be determined, this is the first time that the hotel has been closed (except for repairs and remodeling) since its opening some 56 years ago.

Deluxe Cafe To Open
