HORNETS MAUL PEP, 69-23

The Hornets took time off from their busy district schedule last Friday night to host and literally annihilate the Pep Buffaloes 69-23. The contest saw 11 Hornets break into the scoring column while hitting 42% of their field goal attempts compared to a lowly 17% for the Buffaloes.

Getting off to a slow start, the Hornets trailed 0-4 early in the contest and led by only 9-8 at the first quarter break and those points due largely to the outside shooting of Mike Robinson who was chosen as the "Hustlin' Hornet" for the game.

At halftime, the locals led convincingly 25-10, and a last half man-to-man press enabled the Hornets to pull steadily a-

way from the outmanned but game Buffaloes.

Richard Tamplin topped the Hornets with 17 points and 19 rebounds, followed by Mark Hanna with 12, Mike Robinson 10, Luther Robinson 6, Danny Williams 6, Bobby Phillips 4, Kyle Martin 4, Craig Pickett 4, Ronnie Harrison 2, Carroll Legg 2, and Jerry Williams 2. Dennis Flowers didn't score but picked up two assists and a steal in the fourth quarter.

In an important district clash with Hart, the Hornets lost a tough encounter as their defense faltered in the last quarter 63-50.

Hart led 13-12 after the initial quarter but Sudan came back to take the lead throughout most of the second stanza. A controversial call at the buzzer enabled a Longhorn basket to stand and Hart took a 25-20 lead to the dressing room.

The Hornets narrowed the deficit to 38-34 after three quarters but fouls caught up with Tamplin and Hanna in the last quarter and Hart outscored the locals 25-16 in that period to take the victory.

Sudan is currently one half game out of fourth place with a 3-6 record while Hart is 4-6. For the season, the Hornets are 13-10 and must finish in one of the top four places to be assured of a playoff berth.

The Hornets captured an impressive 46-36 district win over the Hart fems last Tuesday night there and upped their district mark to 4-6. Sudan led at each intermission, 12-6, 33-12, 39-20 but saw the lead cut to 10 as Hart outscored them 14-7 points in the final period of play. All 12 varsity members saw considerable action, however two guards got into foul trouble and retired to the bench late in the game. The second quarter was a big one for the locals when they scored 21 points when Debra Edwards hit the net for baskets and six points, Linda Edwards for two baskets, Joan Hedges for two baskets, Phyllis Ray with four points at free throw line and Evelyn Caldwell one at free throw line and one basket. One of the Sudan forwards accumulated four fouls in the first period of play but failed to receive any more in the remainder of the game. A total of 28 fouls went to Sudan compared to 16 for the hosts.

Miss Hedges led the locals with 14 points and L. Edwards followed with 10.

The Pep varsity basketball girls defeated the locals 32-29 Friday night in the local gym. Sudan needed two last halves it appeared, as the first half was where the ax fell on them. They could muster only four points in the first quarter to 11 for Pep, and only two in the second quarter to Pep's eight to give the visitors a 19-6 half-time lead. The Hornets led in scoring in both the remaining periods of play, 12-6 and 11-8 but it was too late. Miss P. Demel led all scoring with 21 points for Pep. Joan Hedges led Sudan with 17, Mary Ann Bellar had 6, L. Edwards 4 and D. Edwards 2 in the non-

SCS News

Farmers concerned with using the best available acreage to increase their cropland can get valuable data from a soil survey, Dan Blackstock, area soil scientist from Lubbock of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, said today. He was here providing soils training to the Littlefield office staff.

"Soil survey field work has been completed for 123 counties in Texas," Blackstock said. "And the data is available to anyone making land use decisions."

Work is currently underway on soil surveys for all remaining

counties... lackstock added.

"With a soil survey map, you can read the soil book," said Blackstock. "Some soils are ideal for a particular crop. Others are better off in another crop, or left in grass. And on some soils, the owner can choose between pasture or crops."

"The point is that a great deal of soil information is available to farmers and other land users. The survey for Lamb County has been completed. The Soil Conservation Service—working through the Lamb County conservation districts—can provide soils data to anyone considering a change in land use."

Blackstock added, "Although farmers are the biggest group of users, soil survey information is also very helpful to engineers and urban land use planners who need to know about drainage patterns, depth to bedrock, foundation hazards, or other uses being planned for them. A number of cities in Texas have made changes in their land use plans after checking a soil map—and as a result, they saved a great deal of money in construction costs."

Local soil survey maps and information can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service office at the Courthouse in Littlefield.
