
Sudan is currently one half game out of fourth place with a 3-6 record while Hart is 4-6. For the season, the Hornets are 13-10 and must finish in one of the top four places to be assured of a playoff berth.

choose between pasture or crops." "The point is that a great deal of soil information is available to farmers and other land users. The survey for Lamb County has been completed. The Soil Conservation Service-working through the Lamb County conservation districts-can provide soils data to anyone considering a change in land use. "

Blackstock added, "Although farmers are the biggest group of users, soil survey information is also very helpful to engineers and urban land use planners who need to know about drainage patterns, depth to bedrock, foundation hazards, or other uses being planned for them. A number of cities in Texas have made changes in their land use plans after checking a soil map-and as a result, they saved a great deal of money in construction costs. "

Local soil survey maps and information can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service office at the Courthouse in Littlefield.

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
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
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
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
