THIS IS THAT time of year when you run your air conditioning for one day and then run the heater the next. Or maybe you run the heater in the morning and the air conditioning in the afternoon. And, if you have evaporative air conditioner in a window or on top of the house, the first time you turn it on for the season can be a traumatic experience.

You are choking in stifling heat, but you can't open the doors and windows because the sand is blowing outside, so you suggest turning on the air conditioner! Your wife says you can't do that, because you haven't beat the dirt out of the pads yet, and you never did put the cover on the air conditioner like you were supposed to have done at the end of last summer.

Sure enough, you muse, that cover is still in the garage. But you were going to get around to putting it on the unit; you just never could seem to find the time. So the day you decide to put the air conditioner into service is a day when the dust was blowing full speed ahead, and it was 80-sumpin degrees, and just standing up on top of the house is a chore, even if you didn't have to work on the air conditioner.

You take the pads off and beat on them with your hand and create your own private little dust storm in the middle of the bigger one. Then you soak the pads with water, oil the motor, discover the pulley is slipping, discover you can't find your allen wrenches, and discover that your water line is still broken and so the water won't cut off.

(It was broken last summer, too, but you never did get around to fixing it.)

The pulley slips a little, the water runs until it overflows and comes off the side of the house, and your water bill goes up, but it works after a fashion. Except that the two-speed motor just works on one speed (high), so you have to leave it on high until icicles start forming on your chill bumps, then you cut the whole thing off until 10 minutes later when it gets hot again in the den.

Your wife asks you if you got it all working okay, and you reply that of course you did (in a tone of voice that lets her know you are quite capable of handling such simple projects whenever you are willing to apply your brilliant talents to them). Then she asks if you fixed the water line so it won't run off the house all the time. And you indignantly remind her that you can't do it without the proper materials, and this is Sunday, and the hardware store is closed (and you secretly wonder what you're going to tell her the rest of the week).

Finally you stretch out on the couch to read a book and enjoy the air conditioning, even though you have to keep cutting it on and off about every 10 or 15 minutes. While reading, you become aware that the roar of the air conditioner seems a lot louder than usual. Then you remember that the air conditioner outlet blows directly on the thermostat controlling the heater, and that both are running at the same time.

## COTTON OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR 74-75

A sharp increase in consumption at home, combined with growing demand overseas, will keep cotton prices strong and steady this year, a study by Cotton Incorporated shows.

Cotton Incorporated President J. Dukes Wooters Jr. predicts domestic demand for the 1974 U. S. cotton crop will reach at least 8 million bales and the

export market will consume 6 million bales.

As head of Cotton Incorporated, Wooters is spokesman for cotton farmers in 19 states. The company represents growers with research, sales and marketing programs at home and abroad.

"All things considered, the outlook for cotton in 1974 is the brightest in many years," Wooters said. "And the outlook continues to be bright well into the future, even beyond this decade and on into the next."

Wooters said his company's market analysts calculate that American cotton growers will plant almost 15 million acres of cotton this year. The acreage should yield 14 million bales—but it may not be enough.

"Simple arithmetic shows that cotton production will about equal combined domestic and export demand," he said, "leaving little or nothing to increase U. S. carryover, which is already at a critically low level. So 1974-75 could well be another year with tight conditions of supply and strong prices."

He pointed out that foreign cotton consumption has been rising for the last decade and should continue to do so. Foreign mills are also increasing their own inventories, in view of the rock-bottom level of U. S. reserves.

Wooters said his company's study shows that while the production of synthetic fibers will not drop significantly below 1973 levels, it also will not go up.

An average cotton yield is one bale an acre. At a price of 56 cents a pound, a 480-pound bale of cotton would produce revenues of \$269 an acre. Every time a farmer produces one bale of cotton, he also produces 800 pounds of cottonseed. At the current price of \$110 a ton for cottonseed, that figures out to an additional \$44 an acre.

The Cotton Incorporated study shows that the U. S. cotton producer does respond to marketplace demands, Wooters said, and he cautioned growers not to be misled by fluctuations in day-to-day spot price quotations here in early spring.

"We intend to keep growers posted on marketplace conditions as they affect their decisions," he said. "Today our reports are optimistic. If they change next week the farmer will be the first to know."

**TDS REPORT**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of March, 1974, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1974 shows a total of 28 accidents resulting in one person killed and 12 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1974, shows a total of 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured as compared to March, 1973, with 468 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured. This was 73 less accidents, four more killed, and 91 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1974, occurred in the following counties: five in Lubbock; four in Hale; two each in Parker and Wichita; and one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Gray, Hutchinson, Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Palo Pinto, Terry, and Young counties.

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
