WOODWORK Cancer Drive Completed

WE NOTE that the federal government is expected soon to put a ban on melting pennies to make a profit from the copper content. According to government officials, people are hoarding pennies with the idea of making a bunch of money on the copper one of these days. But one government official said "I think the country is crazy."

In regard to the penny situation, it was pointed out that one would have to melt 240,000 pennies to make \$100 profit at current copper prices, and this profit does not take into account the cost of the melting.

A lot of folks save "wheat pennies," the older ones with the wheat design on them, instead of the picture of Brier-croft Savings. But I doubt that the wheat coins are worth any more than the others (even though I have a few stashed away). And the longer you hold a penny, the less it is going to buy, so even if they appreciate a little, the increased value probably will be offset by inflation.

So far as the comment that "the country is crazy" is concerned, this probably is a fairly accurate assessment of the mental balance of most of us, so far as shortages and hoarding items are concerned. Someone said that Johnny Carson temporarily created a toilet paper shortage all by himself, setting off a panic buying spree with a joke. (We don't watch Johnny, but we did go out and buy three cases.)

And — although I didn't think so at first — I now have come around to the view that most people held from the first: that the gasoline shortage was artificial, and the big producers just wanted to get the price jacked up. Because now there appears to be plenty of gasoline, if you have enough money to pay for it.

WE WATCHED part of a program the other night about fat people in America, and what can be done about it. To my glee, I heard an indication that fat folks are sharper mentally than normal or skinny ones. But they are more easily distracted, too, one bigbrain said, and I can see that. If I'm doing some serious thinking about a situation or problem and someone waves a piece of chocolate pie under my nose, I immediately lose all interest in everything else.

The program said what we all knew already — that we need to eat less and exercise regularly. Just watching the show made me hungry.

Tickets will be sold in advance for \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for students. Tickets will also be sold at the door.

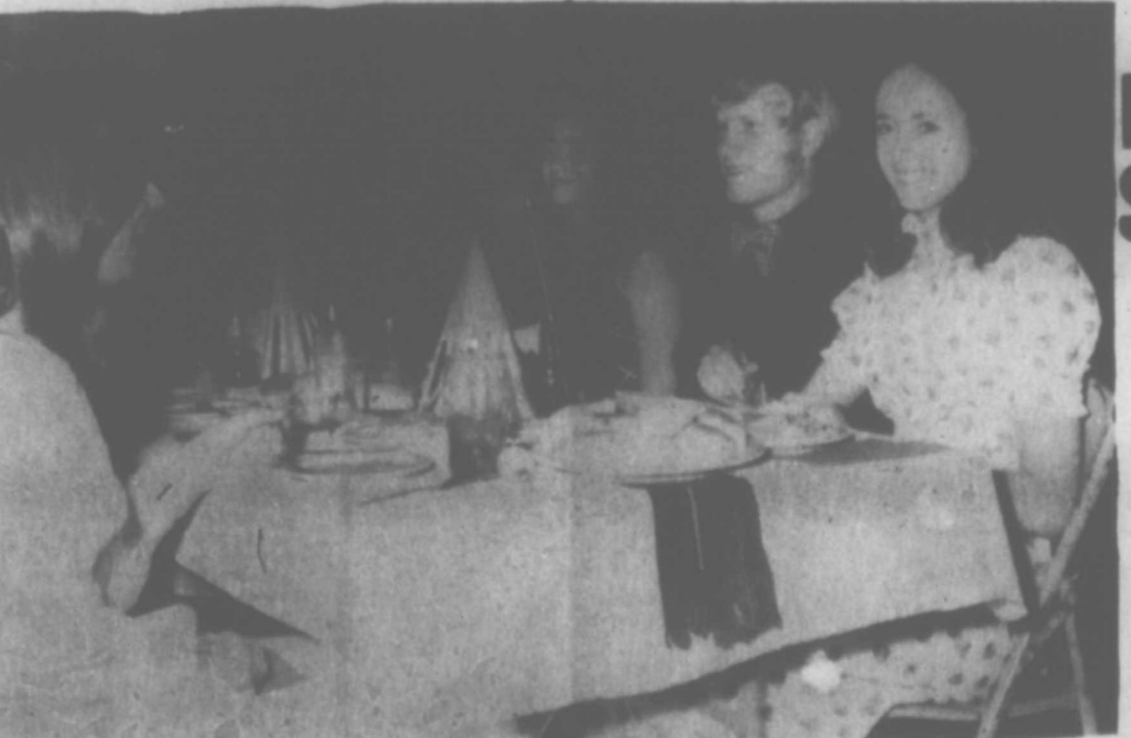
Rain!

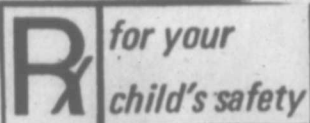
Tops Club

Needless childhood tragedies could be prevented if parents are conscientious in the handling and storage of firearms, says Dr. Albert H. Domm, child safety specialist and medical director of the Prudential Insurance Company.

According to Dr. Domm, youngsters under 15 years of age represent one third of all firearms deaths.



"The strongest recommendation I can make," he emphasizes, "is that parents keep all guns and ammunition under lock and key. In addition, guns should be unloaded before they are brought into the house."

Dr. Domm also advises at least partial disassembly of any hunting rifles to prevent the child from loading the gun him-self.

He suggests that parents teach

their children proper respect for firearms. "Many children don't realize how dangerous guns can be in their hands and how easily they can accidentally discharge," he cautioned.

Dr. Domm warns of the tremen-dous mental suffering neg-lectful parents must undergo if their children are injured.

"Sometimes the anguished parents never recover from the shock, guilt and self-incrimina-tion that follow," Dr. Domm says.

Tornado Alert: What To Do

When spring blows into Texas, so does the threat of the tornado, one of nature's most violent storms. With the peak tornado period upon us, the Texas Safety Association advises a review of the life-saving precautions that should be taken when a tornado is sighted.

Seek inside shelter, preferably in a storm cellar. Other safe bets are caves, basements or underground structures such as parking facilities. The interior hallways of modern, steel-reinforced office buildings also often offer adequate protection. But wherever you are, stay away from windows.

In homes with no basement take cover under heavy furniture in the central part of the house. Covering yourself with a rug will provide added protection against flying glass and debris.

If there is time before the storm hits, open doors and windows on the side of the house away from the storm. This will help to equalize pressure inside and outside the house.

In schools go to an interior hallway on the lower floor. Avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums or other structures with wide, free-span rooms.

"At a shopping center, stay clear of large windows and parked automobiles.

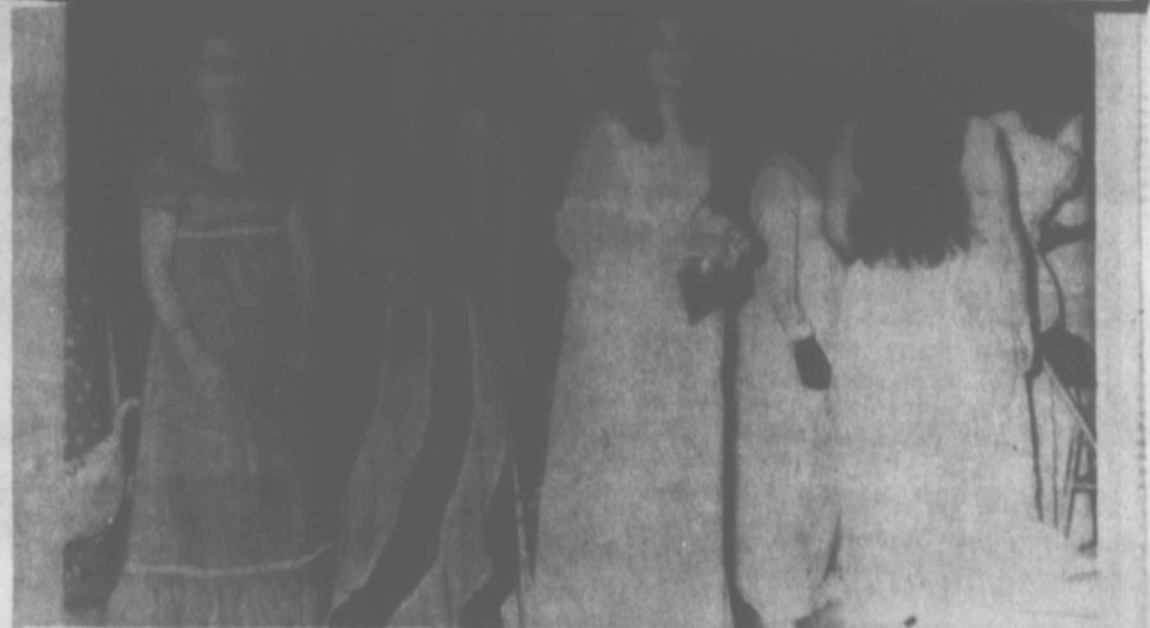
