

the district title. Sudan and Motley County were just about equal in yards rushing when Sudan had 326 and Motley 314. Sudan had a total of 411 to Motley's 439, which was a "lot" of yardage in any one game, for any one team. Sudan racked up 24 first downs to 18 for Motley County. The Hornets trailall the way but never gave up, and time after time, frustrated the Matadors with continuous grinding yardage on the ground.


In the fourth quarter, the

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


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
