LAST WEEK we talked about a fearful flower whose emotions registered on a polygraph, according to a report from Lifeline, the H. L. Hunt program. That experiment as reported was interesting, but perhaps unbelievable to some. This week, we're sure Lifeline won't mind if we discuss another experiment the program claims was true. It involves mice and rock music, and I find this result easy to believe, since it confirms our own experiences and reactions to rock music.

According to the Lifeline commentator, Melvin Munn, a teenage boy decided to test the effect of rock music on mice and plants. He took two mice and two plants and put a mouse and plant in each of two separate rooms. One mouse, Ralph, and a potted plant were subjected to music from a radio station which played only soft, gentle melodies. The other plant and mouse, Herky, were subjected to a pure rock station eight hours a day.

After one month, the student made a report. The plant living with Ralph had grown almost an inch and put out new leaves. Ralph was gentle, friendly and would walk up the hand and arm of his student friend. (Admittedly this is friendlier than most of us would want to be with a mouse). Ralph also was tested by running through a maze every day. At first it took him about 35 seconds to run the maze; at the end of the month he could do it in 20 seconds.

Herky was angry and anti-social. He kept getting out of his cage, chewing up billfolds and books, and once bit the student's father when he was picked up. The plant had grown almost none at all. And it took Herky five minutes to go through the maze at the end of the month, as Herky got worse at it every day.

Well, now. Certainly I'm not surprised at the findings. I'm surprised that Herky and the plant lived at all, because if I were locked in a room and forced to listen to rock music 8 hours a day, I seriously doubt I could live a month. And if I did, I'd be a screaming lunatic good only for foaming at the mouth (perhaps by then I could be a rock performer myself).

Munn, of course, was trying to say that teenagers who surround themselves with noise while they're supposed to be studying or driving or whatever they're doing have reason for being anti-social and belligerent, as some of them are. It's a tremendous credit to our teenagers that so many of them still are courteous and composed despite listening to all that stuff (and we're talking about the soul and hard rock, hollering songs, not the softer folk type).

One thing can be said for rock music, though. It'll keep the mice out of the house.

BASKETBALL

The four Sudan High School basketball teams again lost all four games to Farwell teams last Tuesday night in pre-Thanksgiving holiday bouts.

The Farwell Steers defeated the Hornets 72-59. Danny Williams led the Hornets with 17 points. Next was Richard Tamplin with 14. Game statistics were as follows with figures listed as field goals, free throws, fouls, and total points for the game, and standing point average for the game: Craig Pickett 4, 0, 0, 8, and 9; Mark Lane 0, 0, 0, 1 and 0; Kyle Martin 2, 0, 1, 4 and 2.5; Craig Harper 3, 2, 5, 8 and 3.25; Tracy Bowling 0, 0, 0, 0; Richard Tamplin 6, 2, 5, 14 and 16.5; Luther Robinson 4, 0, 4, 8 and 9; Dennis Flowers 0, 0, 0, 0, and .5; Jerry Williams 0, 0, 0, 0, and 4.5; Danny Williams 8, 1, 1, 17, and 12.25; Larry Bellar 0, 0, 0, 0.

In the Farwell game, the Hornets committed a total of 15 fouls, nine bad passes, walked twice, double dribbled one time, and had one lane violation. Coach O'Rear stated, "On the plus side of the book, we had three steals, tied the ball up eight times, caused eight mistakes, had four offensive rebounds, and 16 defensive rebounds. If you were grading on the scale of minus one for all errors and a plus

one for all the good things we did, we played with a grade of +11. Our opponents are averaging 65 points a game while we are averaging 57 a game. Offensively and defensively, we are starting to 'put it together' slowly and should have it all together by the time we get to district! A lot of players are starting to get their basketball legs under them and away from some of their football habits. Basically any team who hits 47% of their field goal attempts usually win."

Coach Alvin Scott's varsity girls of Sudan were edged by Farwell 40-37 playing catch-up throughout the game and were almost successful due to outscoring the Steeretter 9-4 in the final quarter to tie the game at the end of regulation play, 36-36. Scoring by quarters was 6-10, 24-18, and 32-27, Farwell all the way. Mary Ann Bellar netted 19 points for the Hornets; Phyllis Ray had 9, Sharon Burton 4 and Kay Tamplin 5. Sharon and Kathy Booth each had 18 points, and Kathy White and Sheryl Woods two each for Farwell. The Hornets have been in foul trouble in previous games but against Farwell, any one player did not have more than three fouls. They had a total of 17 for the game, and Farwell had 15.

Coach Scott's girls have allowed an average of 39 points per game during the season.

The JV boys lost to Farwell 46-34. However, they are starting to put it together also according to Coach O'Rear. The score of this game does not indicate the closeness of the game. We still have a lot to learn and the bench has to give the starters more help than they are now doing. I thought they did just that against Farwell Tuesday night, and as we get farther into the season, it will be hard to tell the difference between the starting five and the substitutes.

Edgar Tamplin paced the locals with 18 points. Greg Harper, Rick Hill and Joel Williams each had 2 points, Haldon Messamore 3, and Brad Pierce 7.

The JV girls lost 47-20 to Farwell. Pam Davison led the Hornets with 6, Terri Chester 5, Rita Robinson 4, Betty James 3, and Kelli Hargrove 2.

Both Sudan girls' teams won their games with Anton there Tuesday night and both boys' teams lost.

The Hornets lost 71 to 41 and their scoring equalled their fouls. Kyle Martin scored 11 to lead Sudan and Richard Tamplin had 10.

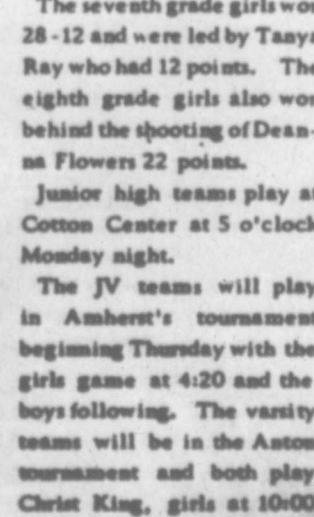

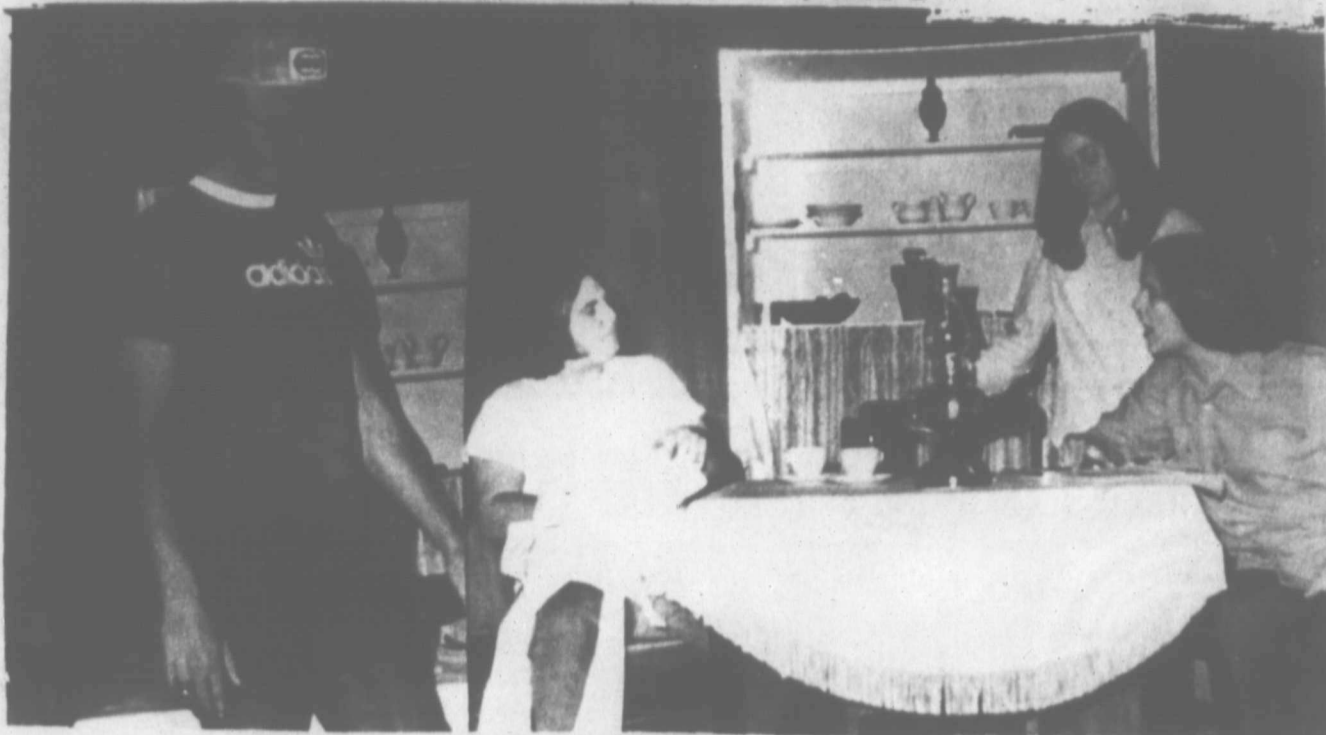

Kamp Joins A&M Sea Grant Staff

Dr. Dan Kamp has been named project manager for marine education and advisory services with the Texas A&M University Sea Grant Program.

Kamp, an associate professor of recreation and parks, assumed his new position Oct. 15. He formerly was a Texas Agricultural Extension Service project leader with the Department of Recreation and Parks.

An essential part of the Texas A&M Sea Grant Program, advisory services brings the expertise of Texas A&M specialists in marketing, management, seafood quality, fisheries and environmental quality to bear on the problems of the wide spectrum of marine-related businesses and industries in the state.

"The scope of our marine advisory services activities is quite broad," Dr. John C. Calhoun, vice president for academic affairs and director of the A&M Sea Grant Program, said. "We actually have in operation the mechanism by which we can draw on the resources of virtually every element of the institution. Advisory services is an overall institutional undertaking."

Through advisory people located "in the field" in key areas of the Texas coastal zone, University research is translated into practical applications in the everyday concerns of the marine community, he said.

"We are fortunate to have someone like Dr. Kamp who already is familiar with the state, who has been with the University and who has experience with people and problem-oriented activities such as advisory services," Calhoun said.

Kamp views the marine education and advisory services efforts as "a pipeline of information." Advisory services activities make the findings of ongoing research available to industry, and industry responds with additional ideas and problems, he said.

Although Kamp will perform administrative duties—determining funding and direction of projects—the individual project leader will still determine how a project's objectives are accomplished, he noted.

"My job," Kamp said, "will be to make sure that all our efforts are channeled toward a common goal—"

service to marine-related industries and individuals concerned with the resources of the Texas Gulf coast."

In addition to his duties with the Center for Marine Resources Kamp will teach in the Department of Recreation and Parks.

He received the Ph.D. from Texas A&M in 1973 in recreation and resources development, a master's degree in 1966 from Texas Tech University (park administration) and a bachelor's degree in 1957, also from Texas Tech (park management).

Prior to coming to Texas A&M in 1968, Kamp was a conservation planner for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Superintendent of Parks in Lubbock, Texas, and assistant director of the Fairfax County Park Authority, Fairfax County, Virginia.

He is a member of numerous national, regional and state professional organizations, including Phi Kappa Phi, National Recreation and Park Association Evaluation Committee, National Geographic Society, Board of Directors of the Southwest Park and Recreation Training Institute, Texas Community Development Committee and Texas Task Force on Recreation, Forestry and Wildlife. He is executive secretary of the Texas Recreation and Park Society. ■
