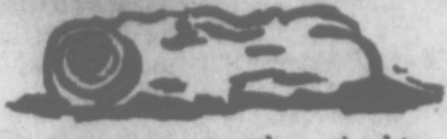

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HORNETTES PLACE IN CAGE TOURNEY

Sudan varsity girls won second honors in the 12th Annual Sudan's varsity girls won second place honors in the 12th Annual Invitational Basketball Tournament held over the past weekend, losing in the finals Saturday night to Pep, 38-32. Sudan trailed up until the final quarter, (6-15, 18-21, and 28-29) and went ahead in the fourth for a short while. Then Pep girls got one point ahead and went into a stall with only a short time left to play. Sudan forwards outscored Pep 12-5 and 10-8 in the second and third quarters, with Sudan guards doing an outstanding job. Sudan had 24 fouls to their 12. Sharon Burton paced Sudan with 14 points; Phyllis Ray had 8, Mary Ann Bellar 6, and Ann Nix and Kay Tamplin 2 each. Mary and Betty Franklin of Pep had 15 each.

Following the final game, members to the all-tournament team were named. Sudan Hornets placed two on the team. They were Phyllis Ray, forward; and Shellye Hargrove, guard.

In other games of the tournament, on Thursday Sudan teams played Christ the King teams. The Sudan girls won their game 35-27 with Sharon Burton again leading Sudan with 10 points. The teams were tied 6-6 at the end of the first quarter and Sudan led from there on. The Hornets had 23 fouls, made seven of 13 free throws and all member saw action. Elaine Halseell scored 21 for the losers, 10 of those in the final quarter; seven points of the 17 free throws by C. K. They had 20 total fouls.

The Sudan Hornets lost to C. K. 77-44, hitting only four points in the second period of play. Leading Sudan were R. Tamplin with 14, D. Williams with 12, and C. Harper 10. For C. K. R. Quintana scored 38 points to surpass the tournament record of 36 set last year by Sudan's Tamplin.

In the double-elimination tournament, the Sudan girls defeated the Spade feds 50-40. Sudan led all the way with the exception of the first quarter when the score was tied 14-14. Phyllis Ray hit the nets for 19, S. Burton for 16; M. Bellar 8, Kay Tamplin 7. V. Thompson scored 30 for Spade. Sudan had 26 fouls to 18 for Spade. The Hornets won their game Friday by defeating Nazareth 72-42 when Tamplin scorched the nets for 43 points breaking Quintana's record of the day before and advancing to the consolation play-offs.

In the consolation game, Sudan tasted defeat at the hands of the host team, Anton, 59-49. Dennis Flowers scored 14 to lead the Hornets.

Quintana again broke the record set by Tamplin by scoring 46, three above Sudan's ace scorer. Littlefield JV defeated the Sudan JV 67-37 in the opening day of the invitational tournament at Amherst over the past weekend with Sudan's Brad Pierce scoring 11, Edgar Tamplin 10 and Jerry Williams 9 to pace Sudan. H. Messamore had 3, and Greg

Harper and L. Simpson, each scored 2.

Amherst defeated the Sudan JV 60-43 Friday to eliminate them from the tourney. Edgar Tamplin scored 14, Brad Pierce 10, Jerry Williams 10; Steve Ritchie, Roy Don Dudgeon and Halton Messamore 3 each.

In the girls game, Sudan won over Abernathy JV 33-17. The score was 6-6 at the end of the first quarter; 19-11 in favor of Sudan at halftime and 27-13, Sudan at the end of the third stanza. Sudan had a big second quarter with 13 points. High scorer for Sudan was Terri Chester with 15. In the second round on Friday, Sudan JV girls lost to Muleshoe 47-26. Muleshoe had a cold first quarter hitting only six points to Sudan's 10. The second quarter was cold for Sudan as they had only one field goal and two points, one in the fourth. They hit for nine at the free throw line. High for Sudan was T. Chester again with 7; Linda Moore and Pam Davison with 6 each; Betty James 5, and Kelli Hargrove 2.

In junior high action Monday night, Sudan teams lost two and won two. The seventh grade girls won 22-5 over Cotton Center. Tracy Hill had 9, Ruth Withrow 8, Tanya Ray 3 and Cindy Powell 2.

Harvest Delayed

The Sudan area's cotton harvest came to a standstill here Tuesday when snow began to fall. The harvest had already slowed due to the number of loaded trailers stacked on gin yards. If the weather had held, the harvest of cotton would probably have been completed this week or early next week.

A report from Farmers Co-op Gin was that they had ginned a total of 1,800 bales for the season, and caught up Tuesday night with what cotton was on trailers on the gin yard.

Central Compress reported that they had received a total of 35,369 ginned bales through Wednesday night, compared to 92,512 at the same time last year.

Claunch Gin at Bula had tagged 925 bales this season and gave an estimate of 1,300 as a possible season total. They ginned some 1,800 bales last year. Beck Gin, some six miles

south of Sudan, has reported 1,536 weighed in bales with 1,345 ginned. They began ginning day and night Monday, Dec. 9, and also expect to catch up due to the snow.
