OUR COMPLIMENTS to Radio Station KFYO, Lubbock, and to sponsors of the three hours of Christmas nostalgia many of us enjoyed on Monday and Tuesday nights before Christmas, when that station re-broadcast six of the oldtime radio programs which we all listened to so faithfully when we were kids and there was no television in most homes.

We chuckled anew at the programs, and it was fun sitting around the room listening to radio for a change. And we had forgotten how little of the programming time was taken up by advertising. In those days, a 30-minute program had a plug for the sponsor at each end, and one in the midway break point, and these were brief.

Programs we listened to were Christmas programs put on around 1950, and included Jack Benny, Duffy's Tavern, Fibber McGee and Molly, Amos 'n Andy, Gildersleeve and Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy. My wife said when she was a kid they always had to get their homework done before 7 o'clock on Tuesdays, so they could listen to the best programs.

Even our teenagers, listened to some of the re-broadcasts and emboyed them, although they'd never heard of any of the performers other than Benny, a top entertainer for years who died of cancer at the age of 80, just two days after Christmas.

The fact that the programs were funny impressed the younger folks, and we all agreed that television has almost no really funny programs. They don't have the clean comedy material that appeals to most of us, and they son't have the performers to present the material in really amusing ways.

The bigbrains in TV obviously think comedy is something off-color and abrasive and occasionally vulgar, like Archie Bunker and Johnny Carson. Of course, there are exceptions, even now. But some of the funniest television programs now can be seen only in daytime re-runs, like Our Miss Brooks, Leave It To Beaver, Hazel, Beverly Hillbillies, and so forth Radio is missing a tremendous market, I think. A lot of folks would turn off the TV if radio would re-broadcast all of the good comedy programs of the 40s and early 50s, regularly. Of course, the best comedy writers were in radio then, as were the best performers, and a lot of the appeal lies in nostalgia, but what's wrong with that?
