Below are listed the critical comments that were made by the concert competition judges:

(1) Joe Rogers - New Braunfels High School.

"March - Nice Tempo. Would like more space between notes. Too legato (smooth) for good definition. Overall - good sound!"

Balladair - Flutes tend to flat (drop in pitch). Clarinets, flutes, saxes - tuning a problem overall. Nice use of dynamics. A definite attempt at being musical. (He later expounded on this saying that he liked the different dynamic and tempo contrasts the band had used in interpreting this selection.)

Allegro, Adagio, and Allura - 1. Please don't "blat" cornets and saxes. Dotted quarter note was too short in measures 22-24. 2. Tuning poor in cornets and flutes. Some cornets tend to over attack. Flutes were very flat ending. 3. Same as one and two.

The last selection got you. Too many flats and tuning problems for the top rating, I feel. You have some fine teaching and learning going on and play musically and

(a) In election precincts numbered Sudan Ind. School District at Community Center Building, in Sudan, Texas, in said School District, with Margaret Smith as Presiding Judge and Louise Parrish, Elsie Cate and Virginia Rone, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a. m. to 7:00 o'clock p. m.

4. Lucy Kent is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Pat Brown and Kenneth Noles are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at School Administrative Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preced-

ing the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and 4:00 P. M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and Margaret Smith, as Presiding Judge, Louise Parrish, Elsie Cate and Virginia Rone, as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

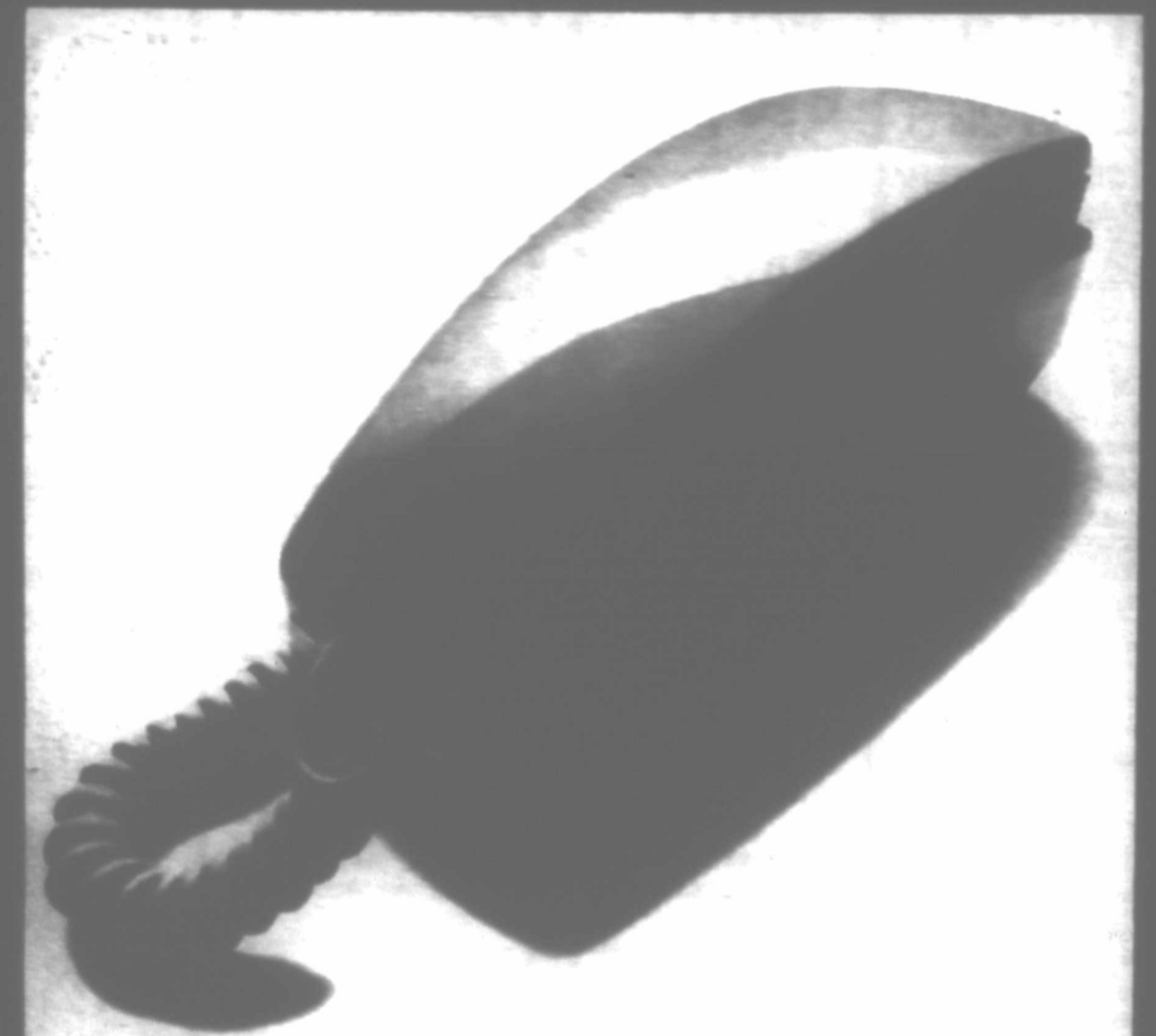

Below are the critical remarks from the Sightreading judge, Richard Crain from Belton High School: "A fine looking group — good instructions by director. Tempo a bit fast at beginning. It seemed to bother the group as you progressed. I would suggest you take tempo a bit slower than indicated.

Lots of accidentals missed — just not being careful. Also, key of F concert was not observed well. Wrong notes marred performance. You handled the tempo fairly well and did pretty well on your counting and rhythms. You "hung" in there pretty well. Work on fundamentals. Keep up the good work—My Congratulations." **Rating—DIVISION I.**
