TSTA RALLY TO BE HELD APRIL 26

A giant-size rally of public school supporters is scheduled for Saturday, April 26, in Austin under the sponsorship of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Callie W. Smith, executive secretary of TSTA, said, "We hope to have the largest group of teachers and other education supporters ever assembled in Austin."

Location for the rally has not been determined, but will be announced soon.

Laymen, state officials,

and teachers will speak at the rally, scheduled to start at 2 p.m. Teachers, parents, and other citizens will be on hand.

"We see this as an orderly expression of deep concern by citizens for education's needs," Smith emphasized.

The Texas Legislature now is considering several bills dealing with reform of school financing as well as program improvements.

The Austin Association of Teachers, local TSTA affiliate, is coordinating local plans under leadership of AAT Pres. Betty Medlock. Groups from all parts of the state already have chartered buses to bring supporters to Austin.

A number of legislators have indicated that they will keep their offices open on April 26—despite their usual weekend recess—so that they may visit with constituents attending the rally.

Sudan High School will have three teams participating in the Vocational Agriculture Judging Contest at Texas Tech University Saturday, April 19. They will be among the more than 1600 West Texas high school students expected for the 48th annual event.

The students will compete as three-member teams in 11 separate judging events including livestock, dairy cattle, milk and dairy foods, poultry, meats and agricultural mechanics.

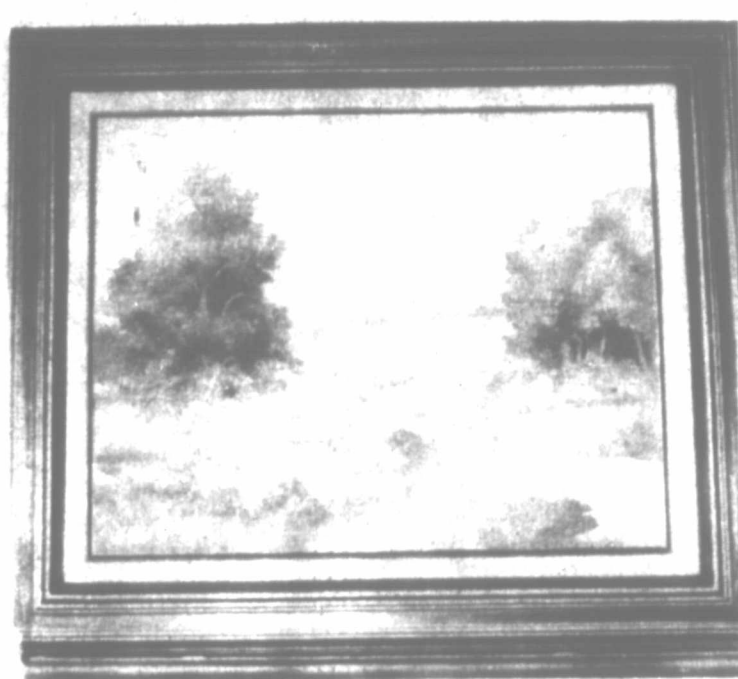
The Sudan FFA chapter recently elected committees to make preparations for the upcoming FFA Banquet. It will be held April 28 at the school cafeteria.

Notaries Public Must File

Texas Secretary of State Mark White today announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1975 and ends June 1, 1977, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1975 and May 15, 1975, inclusive.

Secretary White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1975, should apply to the County Clerk before April 30, 1975. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State as the law specifically provides that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

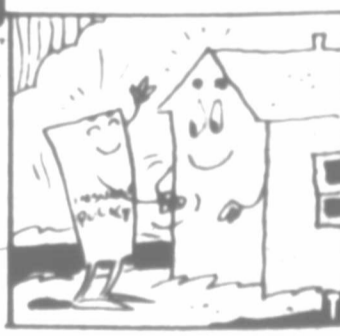

THE BIBLE SAYS

In Matthew chapter 16 and verse 13, Jesus asks the question, "Who do men say that the Son of man is?" (ASV)

The answer came back from His disciples that some said John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or one of the prophets. Then Jesus asked his disciples, (all of them) "But who say ye that I am?"

Peter spoke up and answered for them, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Notice, the question is not "Who is Peter, but who is Christ?" Then Jesus pronounced a blessing upon Peter and said, ". . . flesh and blood hath not revealed it. . . but my Father who is in heaven." Notice, the subject is still Jesus, the Father revealed the Sonship of Jesus unto them.

Then Jesus said, ". . . thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my church. . ." It is here that we are asked many times to believe that the subject changed from Jesus and became Peter. Two full length movies recently shown on television depicted the life of Christ and when they came to this part read it, "Thou art Peter and upon you (Peter) I will build my church." It seems a shame to go to such great expense to bring to the screen the most beautiful story ever told and fail to take the precaution to assure the viewer of an accurate account.

As was mentioned last week in this article, Jesus spoke in the Aramaic language. The word "rock" in the Aramaic is CEPHA. But when Matthew wrote the account in the Greek language, he chose to use two different Greek words. Matthew wrote, ". . . thou art Peter, (petros, a stone) and upon this rock, (petra, a huge rock out of which a tomb is hewn) I will build my church." Why did Matthew choose to use two different words for rock? It was possibly to head off just such a misunderstanding. However, Paul makes the foundation of the church crystal clear in 1 Corinthians 3:10-11: "As a Wise masterbuilder I laid a foundation and another buildeth thereon. . . . Other foundation can no man lay than that which is laid, WHICH IS JESUS CHRIST." Paul preached Jesus Christ and Him crucified, and laid the foundation of the church at Corinth. Jesus did not build His church on Peter. He built it on the fact of Peter's confession of His Sonship.


