"We have a very important meeting and I hope everyone comes out to participate in the election of two new black representatives on the Community Action Board Committee," stated Mrs. Henderson.



Texas Secretary of State Mark White today announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1975 and ends June 1, 1977, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1975 and May 15, 1975,

Secretary White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1975, should apply to the County Clerk before April 30, 1975. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State as the law specifically provides that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of






