

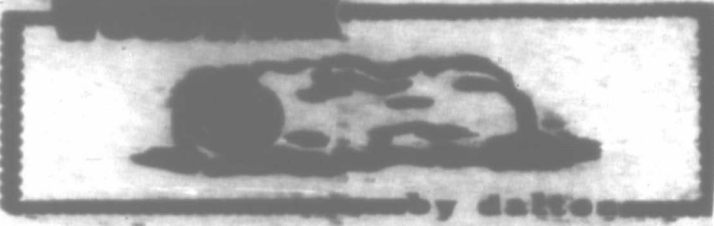

**WHEAT HARVEST** — The wheat harvest is in full swing in the Sudan-Amherst area with the largest and best crop for the grain since 1947. The yield has been reported as from 25 to 30 bushels per acre with the price of \$3.00 per bushel. Feeder's Grain at Sudan has reported that they had received 60 carloads of the yellow grain as of late Tuesday afternoon and Sudan Elevator reported 42 carloads at the same time. The scene above is of harvesting operations at the Dick Getwood farm some seven miles southwest of Sudan.

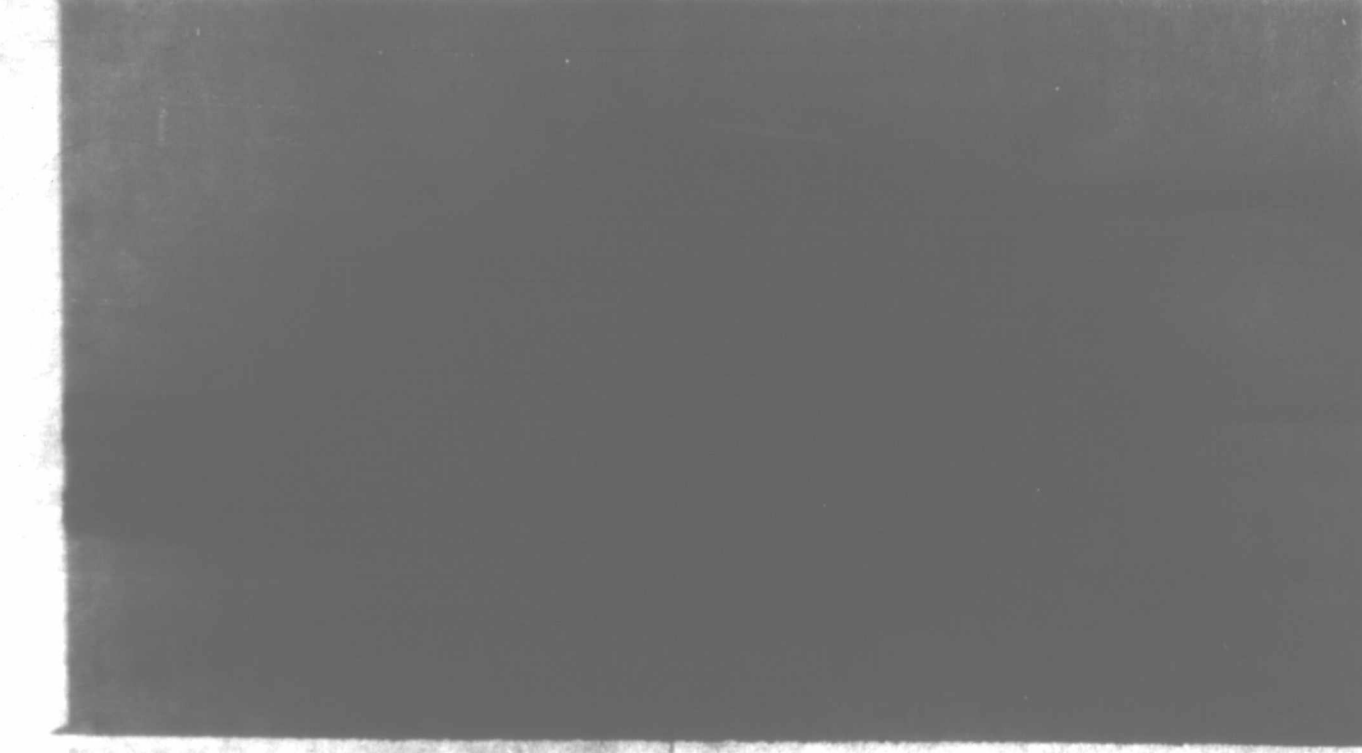

## THIRPS ON COTTON

The recent large influx of thrips into seedling cotton has caused concern on the part of growers. Thrips are encountered every year but only occasionally are they a problem. Good winter and spring moisture and large acreages of wheat mean heavier thrips pressure than usual. However, the 1975 situation is somewhat different from normal years, Buddy C. Logsdon, County Extension Agent, says.

"The main difference is that a large portion of our cotton is currently in the seedling stage. Generally, by June 6, most of our cotton is in the four to six-leaf stage. Since we haven't had any real cotton growing weather till the last few days, the cotton has just been sitting there while the wheat has gone on maturing. With the wheat maturing, the thrips are looking for a new host. Cotton is now in its most susceptible stage with all factors in favor of the pest," Logsdon explains.

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Most entomologists on the High Plains say that thrip infestation sufficient to cause yield reductions is a rare event. This year may be the exception.

## The Bible Says



## PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 156

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF ANY PROVIDED FOR U. S. 84 BETWEEN THE WEST CITY LIMIT AND THE EAST CITY LIMIT, ALL WITHIN THE CITY OF SUDAN, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Sudan, Texas, has determined that by prohibiting the parking of vehicles within the rights of way provided for U. S. 84 from the point of intersection with the West City Limit line easterly to the point of intersection with the East City Limit line, the movements of traffic on this roadway may be facilitated and the danger of both vehicle to vehicle conflict and vehicle to pedestrian conflict may be reduced.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SUDAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: From and after the effective date of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle within the rights of way provided for U. S. 84 from the point of intersection with the West City Limit line to the point of intersection with the East City Limit line.

SECTION 2: Standard signs, bearing the legend stating, "No Parking Any Time", shall be erected on both sides of U. S. 84 from the intersection with the West City Limit to the intersection with the East City Limit, accordingly spaced that the public may be adequately informed that the privilege of parking has been removed.

SECTION 3: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance or shall fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to pay a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

SECTION 4: Because of recorded difficulty and conflict for traffic along this roadway, and because of the increasing potential of difficulty and conflict for traffic along this roadway, and to permit the realignment of traffic lanes to provide a more uniform movement and a more safe movement along this roadway, this action is necessary for the protection of persons and property of the citizens of Sudan, Texas; therefore, this Ordinance is prepared as an emergency measure, the aforementioned conditions making it necessary to suspend the rules regarding publication, reading, and final passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5: There being the required number of the City Council present, this Ordinance shall be immediately in force and effect.

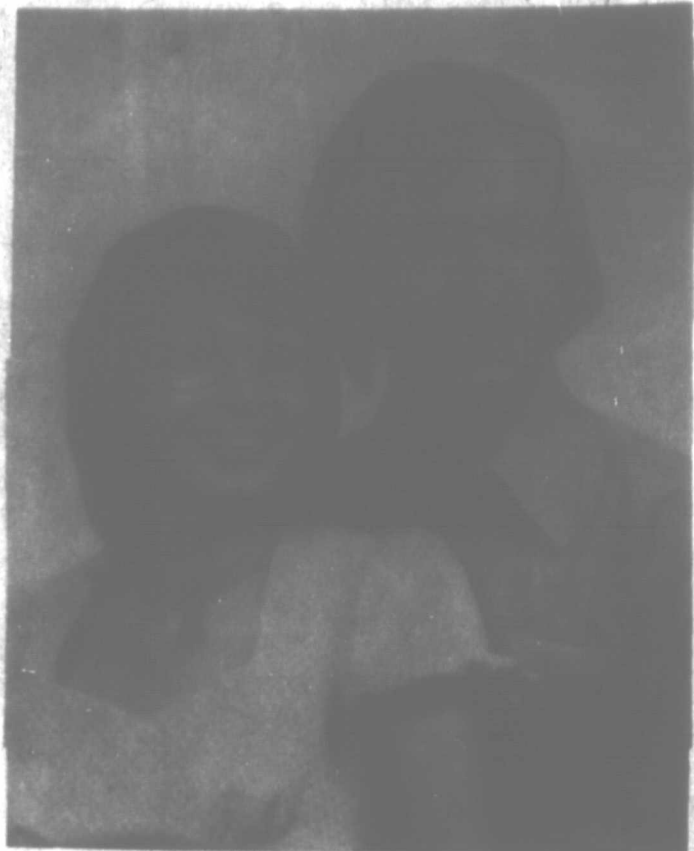
## Billy D. Carter Named President Of OBU Class
