

VETERANS AND

LOST DOCUMENTS Eligible persons should not let a lost birth certificate or marriage license discourage them from applying for veterans benefits, Jack Coker, Veterass Administration Regional Office Director, advised today.

Coker pointed out that for some time now, less formal proof of marriage or birth has been acceptable when this information is required to establish claims for higher benefits.

For example, a veteran's or widow's (or widower's) certified statement of marriage is sufficient for applications for compensation and education benefits for veterans, widows (widowers) and orphan children--provided neither veteran or spouse has been married before, and VA has no contradictory information

Formerly, the agency required all statements of marriages and births to be supported by formalised documentary evidence.

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
