A report from Kenneth Noles, Sudan School Superintendent, states that as of Tuesday, August 26, 270 students had enrolled in Kindergarten through seventh grades, and 165 from eighth through twelfth grades, for a total of 435 students at the local schools for the new

Noles also stated that several new employees have been hired by school trustees of the district. They are:

The new counselor, H. L. Hand, who will serve both Sudan and Amherst schools. He comes to Sudan from Santa Fe, N. M.

Kay Morton, Home Economics. This is her first teaching assignment after graduating from Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Three aides were also hired. They are Mrs. Celia Garra, migrant aide; Mrs. Cheryl Kinnie, Compensatory Education Math teaching aide; and Mrs. Ruby Underwood, Special Education aide.

The 1975 Hornet Annuals were issued to students upon registration for school last Tuesday. Senior pictures were made on Wednesday.



Davis's influence on the agri-business world stemmed from a farm background. A Lubbock High School graduate, he went on to attend Texas A&M, where he graduated in 1927. He went directly into service as a county agent, serving in Terry and Gaines counties

until 1930 and in Hale County until 1932.

He managed the Plains Cooperative creamery in Plainview until 1938, and was with the Houston Bank for Cooperatives until 1943, when he became general manager of the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill in Lubbock. He retired from that post in He served on the U.S. De

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partment of Agriculture's Cotton and Cottonseed Research and Marketing Advisory Committee during the late 1940s and early 1950s and he was a member of the Research Export Expansion Council under appointment by Secretary of Commerce A.B. Trowbridge. Closer to home, Davis was a director of the Farm Credit Administration, Texas District, from 1951 to 1959. In Lubbock he was a member of the First Baptist Church, the Lubbock Consistory, the Khiva Shrine Temple, the West Texas Museum Associa tion, the Lubbock Club and the Lubbock Country Club.

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
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
