## HORNETS BUTCHER LONGHORNS, 38-8

The Sudan Hornets mopped up another district win Friday night at Lasbuddie by a score of 38-8, and a perfect conference record of 3-0. The Hornets and Amherst Bulldogs are tied for the lead spot in the north zone of the district at this point in the season. Both teams have three remaining district games in the zone,

one of them with each other at Amherst October 31, in a homecoming event.

Lasbuddie Longhorns kicked off to Sudan at the opening of the game Friday night. Hornet HB Kyle Martin took the pigskin the full 68 yards to the goal line on the opening play for a Hornet TD.

He also converted the PAT and collected an early lead of 7-0.

Sudan kicked off, and held the Longhorns denying them a first down and forcing a punt. The Hornets took over on their 36, earned a first down, and with third and 10 to go from their own 47 QB Craig Pickett found Edgar Templin all alone for a 53 yard pass run and TD. Martin again kicked the extra point and upped the Hornet lead to 14-0 at 7:51 in the game. The TD followed a 64 yard drive in six plays.

At 6:13, Lasbuddie took the ensuing kickoff and moved for their only TD of the night. They moved 69 yards in five plays with the big play being a 42 yard run by the Longhorn quarterback giving Lasbuddie a first down on the Hornet 18 yard line. On second and eight from the 16, Ricky Wall scored on a good run. Wall then ran the two point conversion over, to narrow the lead to 14-8.

The Hornets scored next at 2:02 left in the first period following eight plays. Jerry Williams, HB, fielded the Longhorn kickoff and on a great run, returned the ball from the Hornet 10 yard line to the Longhorn's 43, eluding tacklers all the way. Brian May got the last six yards of the drive and the TD. A running try for two extras was stopped short. The Hornets now led 20-8.

In the second quarter after the ball changed hands two times, the Hornets got on the board again at 7:54. They went 77 yards in eight plays which included a 45 yard pass from Pickett to Martin for the TD. In the drive, the Hornets overcame two 15 yard holding penalties. The Longhorns again held on the try for two extras.

After holding Lasbuddie in their next possession, the Hornets picked up 71 yards in ten plays, overcame two more 15 yard holding penalties, and scored at 4:11 on a 78 pass from Martin to Pickett for 32 yards. Lasbuddie again put up their goal line stance to prevent the scoring try for two more points. The Hornets now led

### TIME TO 'FALLBACK'

Next Sunday the nation "falls back" an hour to standard time and picks up the hour of sleep lost last spring when the clocks were moved forward.

Daylight saving time ends at 2 a.m. Oct. 26, and clocks officially will be set back to 1 a.m. under provisions of the 1966 Uniform Time Act.

Standard time remains in effect until the last Sunday in April, 1976.

### FOR '76-77 SUDAN STAYS IN CLASS B

A letter from the University Interscholastic League of Austin served to inform the Sudan School officials that Sudan has been tentatively assigned to Class B for 1976-77. The classification will be Conference B, District 2.

The classification of Conference B was set at the maximum of 125 average daily attendance, grades 9-12.

### New System Effective Oct. 29

According to E. R. Richardson, customer service manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Littlefield, a new concept in telephone operations will begin in Sudan at 6:00 a.m., October 29.

Effective October 29, all Sudan telephone numbers will change. The new directories, which have been delivered to each customer, reflect the new numbers.

New number stickers for your telephone/s along with appropriate instructions will be mailed prior to October 29.

Party-line customers wanting to call another party on their line will dial only the listed number and hang up momentarily until the party has answered.

You must dial all seven digits on local calls. The office functions at a high speed on all calls, but can complete local calls only when all seven digits are dialed.

Begin dialing immediately after receiving dial tone. Complete dialing without hesitation, otherwise the sensitive equipment will not complete your call and you will have to dial again.

Touch Calling (push button telephones) will also be available to one-party customers on October 29. You can have this service for an additional monthly charge.

If you as a customer need more information regarding this new concept in operations, please call the Business Office by dialing Operations and asking for Enterprise 192, stated Richardson.

### POST OFFICE Clerk, Carrier Exam Announced

Examination for postal clerk & carrier for positions at Sudan Post Office will be held in the near future, announced Joan Ford, officer-in-charge.

A vision test as well as a safe driving record, valid driver's license, physical examination and hearing test will also be required prior to appointment.

The general age requirement is 18 years or 16 years for high school graduates, except for those for whom age limits are waived. In general, there is no maximum age limit.

All applicants must be citizens of the United States of America or have been awarded permanent resident alien status in the United States.

The opening date for applications was October 21, and the closing date November 1, 1975. Exam 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. by members of the public who

...then (well, actually, many times) someone gets upset with us about something or other we have done, or something we have not done, in the paper. We have certain policies which we adhere to, and quite often these come into conflict with someone's idea of what we ought to do.

There are many things we do not print in our newspaper because we have an established policy against them. These include, among other things, locally written poetry, liquor advertising, any form of horoscope or astrology, anything relating to fortune-telling, stories with long lists of names (we try to hold them to a maximum of about 20) of persons attending reunions, winners of stock shows or other events, most third or fourth place pictures of bridegrooms and brides all cuddled up together, and certain details of weddings, such as who played piano at the rehearsal dinner, and names of persons present at routine club meetings, who read the minutes and such as that.

Sometimes we get people quite put out at us for some of these taboos, and they come in asking why we don't do this, that or the other. Usually we try to explain our policies, but sometimes it is pretty hard to do without going into an entire journalism course. When this happens, we frequently just tell them that right or wrong, it's our policy. Like the sign, "There's No Reason for This—It's Just Our Policy."

Anytime anyone comes into the newspaper office and demands that we "run this article just exactly like I have it written down here, and don't change a word of it, and be sure and put it on page one", they're likely to be disappointed. As we have pointed out before, we always reserve the right to edit, rewrite and delete portions of any material which is not paid advertising.

What many people do not seem to realize is that the newspaper is not here to be a personal scrapbook for either individuals or organizations. We do want news, but we want news of things that will be of interest to more than just a few people.

That comment probably will get me a lot of slippings through the mail of things we print which would interest almost nobody. Oh, well. Maybe we can plead insanity.

ASIDE FROM policy matters, we manage to make folks angry with us sometimes by making mistakes, which we do very well. For example, one local family had two weddings in the last year and we made errors on both of them. We regret these and other mistakes, but that doesn't help much, so far as the victims of the errors are concerned.

We do print corrections, as do most newspapers. I noticed that a recent edition of Editor & Publisher (a trade magazine) said most papers run their corrections under a heading "Corrections" or "Sorry" or even "We goofed." And they said one Florida newspaper runs them under a heading of "Dumb Things We Did." We may adopt that
