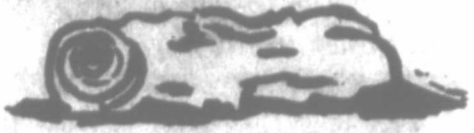

## HORNETS OVER BULLDOGS, 31-14

The Sudan Hornets upset Amherst Bulldog's homecoming Friday night when they won 31-14. Sudan won the toss and elected to kick with the

strong east wind. Amherst took the ball and moved from their 22 to their 44 before the Hornet defense held, and forced a punt. Sudan took over on their own 26 following the punt.

The Hornets made one first down, but a holding penalty was too much to overcome, and the Hornets were forced to punt. Donald Johnson returned the punt to the Amherst 43. The Bulldogs received a holding penalty on first down. QB Richard Holley then hit End Dwain Tucker with a pass that carried the Bulldogs to the Hornet 27 yard line. From that point, the Bulldogs moved five yards in three running plays. Facing fourth and five, the Bulldogs tried a halfback pass. Interference was called on the play and the Bulldogs had new life at the Hornet eight yard line.

After two unsuccessful running plays, QB Holley made a good fake to his back, then bootlegged the ball around his left end for the TD with 1:13 left in the first quarter. Curtis Ivey then kicked the extra point. The play capped a 72 yard-nine play drive.

The Hornets mishandled the kickoff and the Bulldogs recovered on the Hornet 46 yard line. The Hornet de-

fense held and took over on their own 37 yard line.

The Hornets began to put it all together and moved the ball the 63 yards in nine plays. The Hornet line began to pick up their blocks against the Bulldog defense, and the backs began to make yardage. Danny Williams got the TD on a three yard run with 8:50 left in the second quarter. The Hornets trailing 7-6 went for two points. Danny got the two, behind good blocking by Haldon Messamore, Terry Swart, James Graves and Kyle Martin.

The Bulldogs returned the kickoff to their 43 yard line. They failed to make a first down and were forced to punt. The ball went into the endzone and the Hornets took over on their own 20.

The Hornets kept up the fine blocking and running, and moved the ball 80 yards in 14 plays for the TD on a run by Danny a yard out with 3:06 left in the second quarter. Danny then ran for the two points behind fine blocking by the center of the Hornet line. The Hornets now had the lead, 16-7.

The Bulldogs returned the kick to their 32 yard line. On first down QB Holley tried to hit End James Ivey on a pass. Craig Pickett had him covered and knocked the ball in the air. Joel Williams kept it in the air, and Kyle Martin picked it off for the interception. Martin returned the ball to the Bulldog 40 yard line.

Dub Crain, Dumas High School: "Fanfare—good sound, but watch releases. Playing gets ragged at times. Good entrance line up. Precisions of feet not good with music. Stride appears uniform. Diagonals not always good due to not marching straight down the field. Lack of precise direction movement bothers me—clarity of formation missing. Band has some good qualities, but performance got weaker in both marching and playing as show progressed. Rating: Division II.

Ratings for Class B schools were as follows: Wilson I, Smyer III, Sundown I, Whiteface IV, Whitehall II, Sudan I, Loop II, Anton II, Ropesville I, Newarth III.

The twirlers of the Hornet Band also performed in the twirling division of the UIL contest before different judges. Cindy Moss and Bernadette May each received a "Rating I", Shelby Hargrove received a "Rating II", and Paula Ellison received a "Rating III".

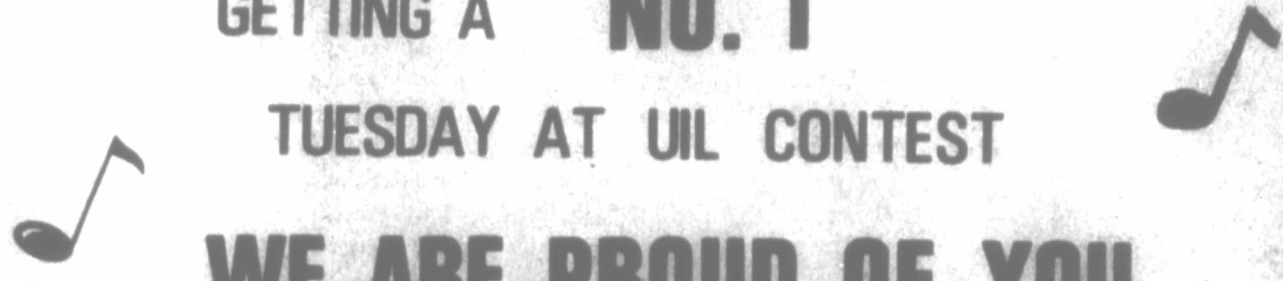

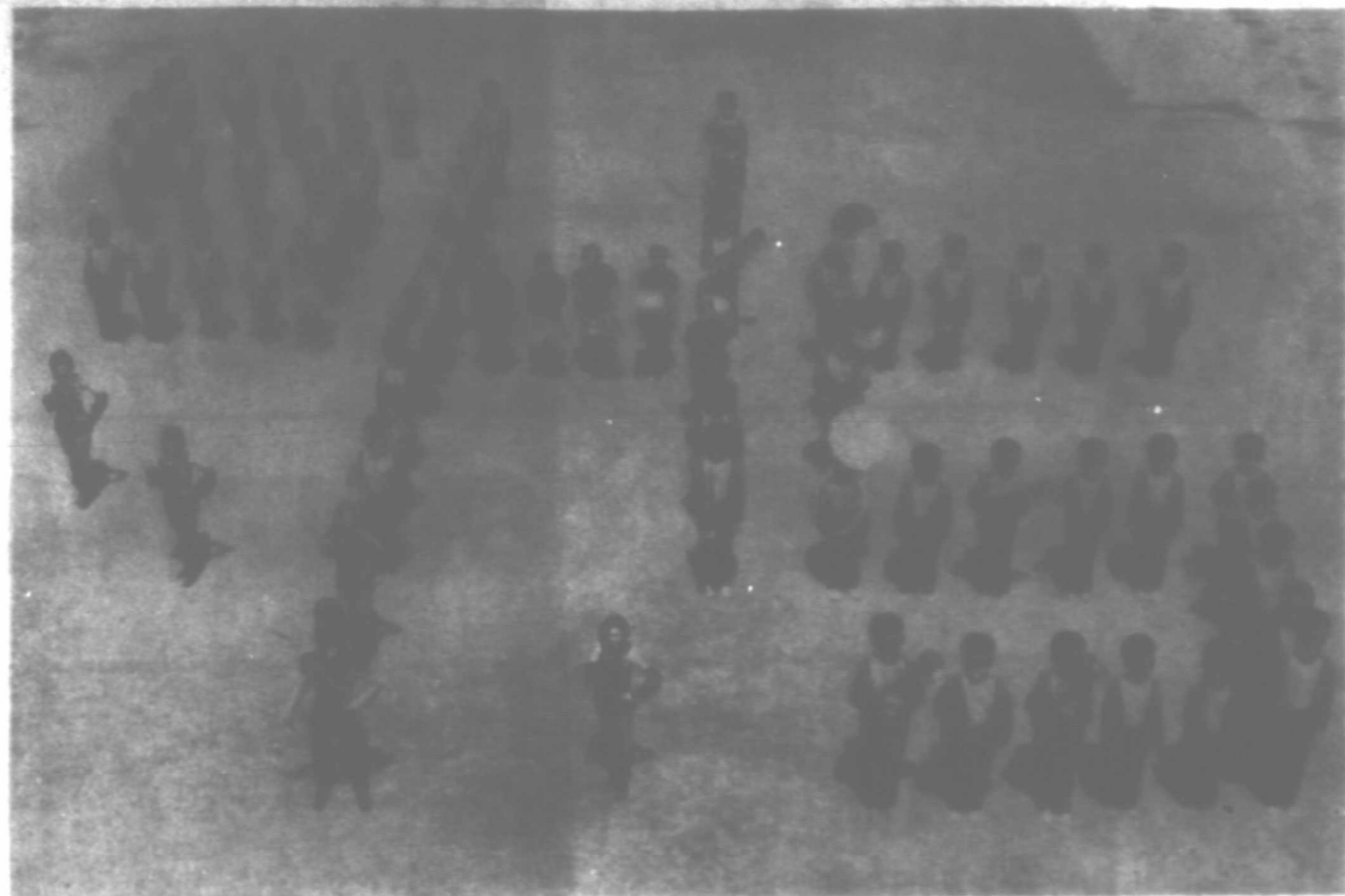

condition because of "inherited" sin. This is referred to as "Total Depravity". This says that Adam has been injured in his totality, (soul, mind, body) so that now he is completely unable to believe in the gospel unto salvation without the prior life-giving work of God, the Holy Spirit. (Five Points of Calvinism, John Calvin and others). There is one rule I believe that is essential to a good understanding of the Holy Scriptures. If you do not agree, I would welcome your comments. It is the intention of this column to set forth the "truth of the gospel" and only that. I hope it is being done in a spirit of love; for this is my earnest prayer. I am not mad at anyone, nor do I have an ax to grind with any particular group, however, it does bother me considerably when I see truth, which is the only thing that will set us free from sin, (John 8:32) changed for manmade doctrines. The one rule I spoke of earlier is this: When a passage of scripture seems to deal with a particular subject, BUT IS NOT QUITE CLEAR, (as in the case of Psalms 51) we must find other passages which we KNOW deal with the same subject and are definitely clear in their teaching, and then apply the more difficult passage in the light of the clear one. For example, in Ezekiel 18: 19-20, it is quite clear what God has to say about inherited sin: "When the son hath done that which is lawful and right, and hath kept all my statutes, and hath done them, he shall surely live. THE SOUL THAT SINNETH IT SHALL DIE! the son shall NOT bear the iniquity of the father, neither shall the father bear the iniquity of the son; the righteousness of the righteous shall be upon him, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon him." If God would have wanted to tell us that the son shall not bear the sin of his father, but shall bear his own sin, how would he have said it? Most likely he would have said, "...The soul that sinneth IT SHALL DIE, the son shall not bear the iniquity of the father..." (To be continued)
