Commissioners visit Washington D.C.

Commissioners Hubert Dykes of Precinct 4 and Jack Peol of Precinct 3 from Lamb County visited in Washington, D. C. Monday, Nov. 17. They were among the 240 delegation from Texas and 1200 from the nation there hoping to influence Congress to continue the revenue sharing program which is scheduled to end next year. It was reported that this was the largest delegation ever to represent the state of Texas on any issue.

The revenue sharing program was established to run from 1974 until 1976 and was designed to help local governing bodies with their finances. Members of Congress will be voting on the issue prior to January, 1976, the expiration date. It is expected that there is a possibility that taxes could be raised if the measure fails.

Representatives arrived in Washington Monday and were greeted with a reception. During the discussion session, they heard Senator

SUDAN VS. GROOM AT HEREFORD

Bi-District Game Nov. 21
Coaches and superintendents from Sudan and Groom Schools met Saturday in Hereford to name a place for their upcoming Bi-District match Friday night, Nov. 21. The game will be played at the Hereford High School football stadium at 7:30 P.M. Admission will be \$1.50 students, and \$3.00 for adults.

Sudan received the honor of being the "home" team and will be seated on the west side of the stadium and preside during opening ceremonies of the game which will include the National Anthem by the Sudan Hornet Band.

The Chamber of Commerce of Hereford will present the Bi-District Champions with the winner's trophy. Concession stands will be open throughout the game.

Sudan won the right to represent Class 2-B in this contest by defeating the Sundown Roughnecks here Friday night by a score of 13-12. The Hornets were losers to Sundown in their first game of the 1975 season 36-26. The Hornets have a perfect district record and now an 8-3 season record.

The Groom Tigers defeated the Hornets 31-12.

The Sudan Hornets won another big one Friday night, the one that has counted the most so far this year, when they edged Sundown 13-12.

The Hornets knew this was the game for the Class 2-B district title and put out every effort to win. They now will represent the district at Hereford Friday night for the bi-district championship game at 7:30 P.M.

The Roughnecks put up a strong fight in the district clash Friday night and had Sudan fans on the edge of their seats in the third quarter, when their running try for two extras failed following their second TD.

Sundown won the toss Friday night and elected to receive. A good run back by the Roughnecks put the ball on their 49 yard line. Unable to move the ball, the Roughnecks punted to the Hornet nine yard line.

The Hornets moved the football for a first down. Then the Roughnecks held and forced the Hornets to punt. The Roughnecks took over on their 29 following a clipping penalty.

The Hornets again held preventing the Roughnecks from moving the ball. Following the punt, Sudan took over on their 48 yard line. They were forced to punt, and a 20 yard return by the Roughnecks, moved the ball to their 28 yard line. Then the biggest break of the first half took place for the Hornets. Facing second and nine from the 29, Roughneck QB Phillip Smith dropped back to pass. Finding his brother, Steve Smith, in the right flat for a completion, Hornet defensive Back Joel Williams knocked the ball loose and Kyle Martin recovered on the Roughnecks 31 yard line.

Not to be denied this time, the Hornets drove the ball the 31 yards to pay dirt in six plays. Martin scored the TD with 9:47 left in the first quarter. Martin also kicked the point after to give the Hornets a 7-0 lead.

The second quarter saw both teams move the ball on one series, but each time they were stopped. Following the Hornet kickoff, the Roughnecks moved from their 22 to the Hornet 26. At that point the Hornet defense toughened and stopped the Roughnecks on a fourth and 10 at the 23.

The Hornets then began a drive that carried to the Sun-

down 31, but two penalties stopped the drive at that point. Neither team was able to move the ball for the remainder of the half.

The Hornets received the second half kickoff. Joel Williams returned the football out to the Hornet 37. Sudan then began a time consuming drive which ended with Danny Williams scoring a touchdown from two yards out with 3:39 left in the quarter. The extra point attempt was missed. The 63 yards took 20 plays. The drive was a combination of good blocking and hard-running by the Hornets.

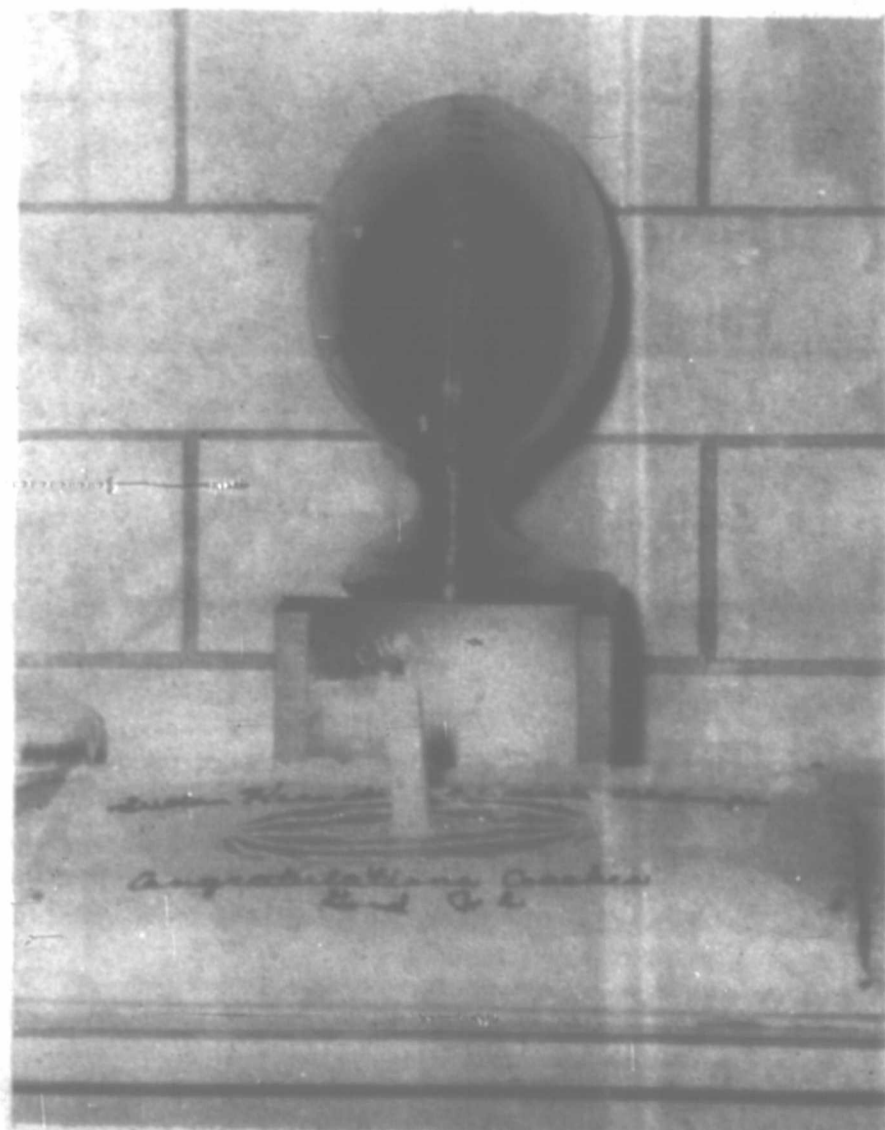
The touchdown seemed to awaken the Roughnecks as they returned the kickoff to the Hornet 37 yard line. From that point it took the Roughnecks only three plays to score. The big play was a 31 yard run to the Hornet one yard line. On the next play, Randy Wood scored the TD for the Roughnecks. Sundown elected to go for two points. QB Phillip Smith called a power play to the Roughnecks left side. Mark Lane was the first Hornet to hit Randy Wood, and was joined by Kyle Martin, Danny Williams, and Jerry Williams to stop the play short. The TD run came with 2:38 left in the third quarter and cut the Hornet lead to 13-6.

Following the kickoff the Hornets began to move from their 35 yard line. They were successful on picking up one first down. Then the only turnover of the night by the Hornets gave the Roughnecks the ball on the Hornet 46 yard line.

The Roughnecks then moved the 46 yards in nine plays with Randy Wood again getting the TD which was a one yard run with 1:11 left in the game. The Roughnecks trailing 13-12, and behind in first downs 16-10, had to try for two points. The play turned out to be the "biggest" of the night for the Hornets. QB Smith dialed his own number on a sweep to his right side. Hornet defensive end, Haldon Messmore, hit him on the five and slowed him down enough for help to arrive. Danny Williams was the help and Smith was stopped inches short of the goal.

Following the kickoff the Hornets moved from their 30 to the Roughnecks 38, but at that point they received a costly penalty that killed the drive. Craig Pickett then hit a good punt that carried to the Roughneck 12 yard line. The Roughnecks, still not to be denied, began a drive that looked like trouble for the Hornets. The Roughnecks moved the ball to the Hornet 28 yard line in nine plays. Having a first down

TDS REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of October 1975, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and no one injured.

There were 98 accidents resulting in five persons killed and 68 persons injured in the county during the first ten months of 1975 according to the rural traffic accident summary.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department

of Public Safety Region for October, 1975, shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured, as compared to October 1974, with 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured. This was 41 more accidents, one less killed, and 68 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths (18) for the month of October, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Five in Parker; two each in Stonewall, Castro and Randall; and one each in Baylor, Crosby, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Wise, Armstrong and Motley.

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THE BIBLE SAYS

By Art Lynch

In the last two articles, we have been studying "Inherited sin", or as it is named by some, "Total Depravity". Basically this says that we are all born into this world sinners because of the sin of our fathers, beginning from Adam's sin. Remember the rule: When a passage of scripture is in any way unclear on what it is teaching, find a passage on the same subject which is unmistakable in its teaching and apply the more difficult passage in the light of the clear one; let us continue. It is clear from Ezekiel 18:19-20 that we do not inherit sin from our father, but our own sin is what kills us (separates us from God). Now, back to Psalms 51. Here David says, "Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." Notice that the Psalm is a contrite sinner's prayer for pardon. Notice also the heading: "A Psalm of David" when Nathan the prophet came unto him, after he had gone in to Bathsheba. This is recorded in 2 Samuel 11, 12. It is of great help in understanding the Psalm to read these two chapters beforehand. As you read, notice the mood of David and his attitude as Nathan speaks to him. Remember it was after this confrontation that the Psalm was written. Psalm 51 begins, "Have mercy on me, O God, according to thy loving kindness (mercy)". He is asking for forgiveness for committing some sin (i.e. his adultery with Bathsheba). Then in verse 2-3-4 notice he says, "wash me...from my sin" and "my sin is ever before me" and "Against thee...have I sinned (not inherited sin)...and done that which is evil". In order to stay in the context of the prayer, we need to remember David's condition (penitent sinner) and his attitude (sorry, and begging for mercy) as we read verses 5 and 6. As David prays, he begins to see just how terrible his sin is. As he thinks back on how God has blessed him and then realizes that, as Nathan had told him, God would have given him anything he wanted just for the asking! and yet he turned his back on God for one brief moment of pleasure! His

attitude becomes one of hatred for himself and for his willingness to reach a loving God. David rebuked himself before God. (Remember he is talking to God, not men.) He is in effect saying, I am the lowest of low, I am the bottom of the barrel! I am so terrible I must have come out of my mother's stinking! Have not all of us who realize the great sacrifice of Jesus on the cross felt like this at one time or another. When we look at the purity of the man, Jesus, and how he allowed himself to be abused for us, and then think back through our selfish lives at some of the things we have done that we are now ashamed of, can we not truly say with David in his prayer for mercy, O God I was conceived in sinning!

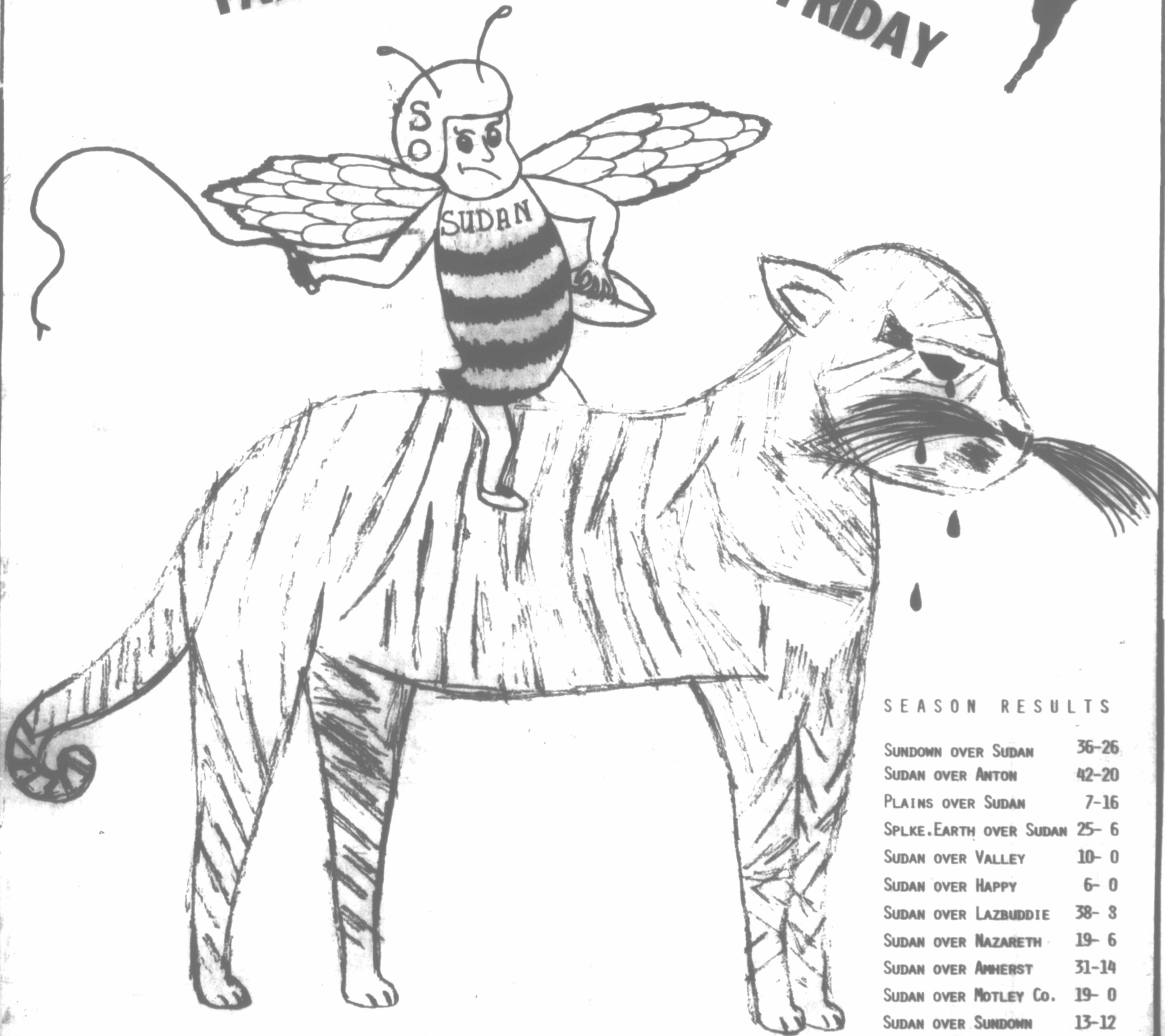
