A READER brought in to the office the following, clipped from somewhere, and entitled "Washday in 1910" We had read it before, (in Ann Landers column?) but it is worth repeating:

Years ago a Kentucky grandmother gave a new bride the following "receipt" for washing clothes. It appears below just as it was written, and despite the spelling has a bit of philosophy.

1. Bill fire in backyard to heat kettle of rain water.
 2. Set tubs so smoke won't blow in eyes if wind is part.
 3. Shave one hold cake like soap in bilin water.
 4. Sort things, make three piles, 1 pile white, 1 pile colored, 1 pile work britches and rags.
 5. Stir flour in cold water to smooth, then thin down with bilin water.
 6. Rub dirty spots on board, scrub hard, then bile. Rub colored don't bile, just rinch in starch.

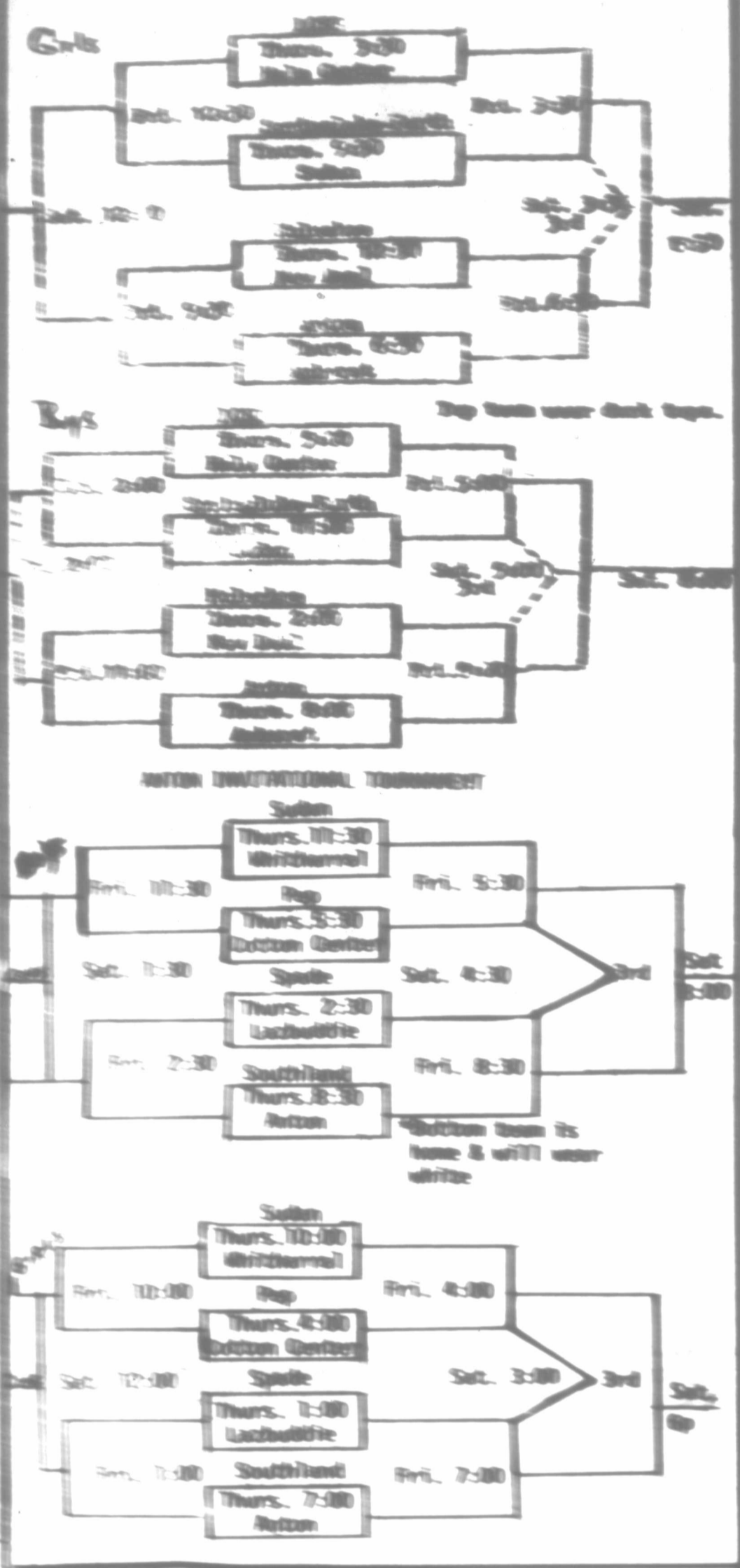

snap of the ball. There is no time to wonder or even think about it. Another, its growth. Each year a player plays, he is expected to be better than he was the preceding year. It only stands to reason that the more we do a particular thing, the better we become at it. If a person is not growing, the coach will say he is not applying himself. Another is loyalty to the team. Each play calls for a particular situation to occur. A "hole" is supposed to open for the running back if everyone does their job properly. Often a running back will see something develop and will go in a different direction than the play calls for and gain substantial yardage. But a running back who constantly tries to "outguess" the opponent and go against the established plays, will end up losing more yardage than he gains, and a coach will find someone who might be not quite as fast, but who sticks with the team plays, and make a better team with him than with the faster player. Yes, all of these things go into making a great team such as the one we had this year, and many more things too. Funny, isn't it, that the same things make a great Christian: Dedication—Romans 12:1-2; Study—2 Timothy 2:15; Growth—1 Peter 2:2 and Hebrews 5:12; Loyalty—Matthew 10:37-39. Have you ever thought that to be successful at anything you must follow a plan that has set forth hundreds of years ago?

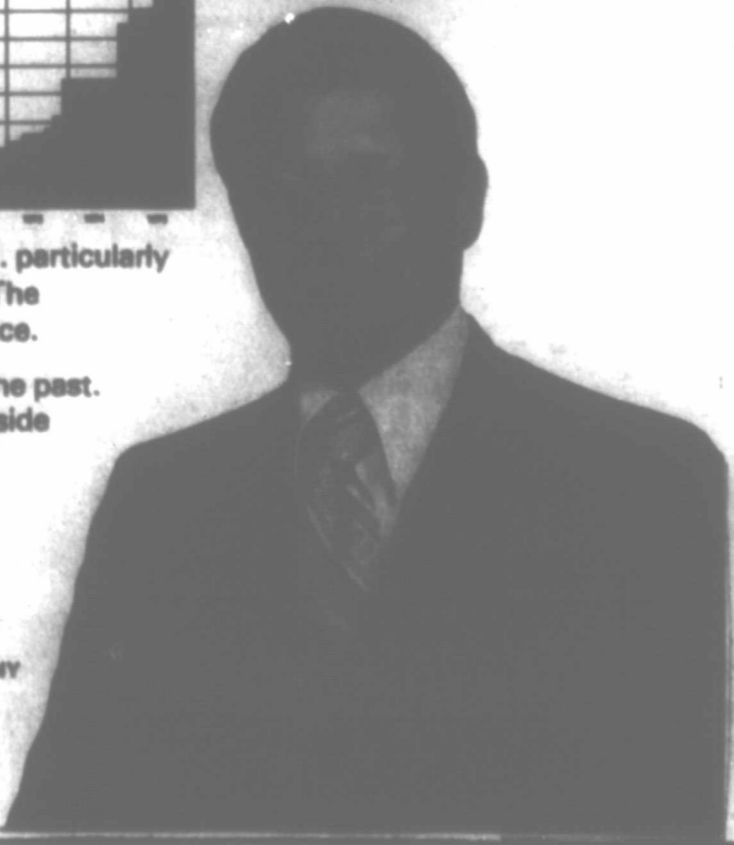
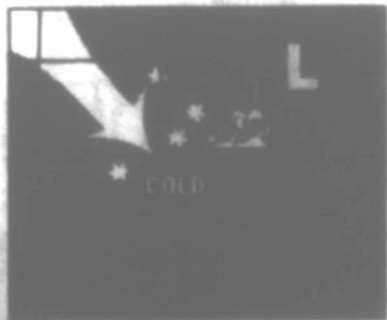
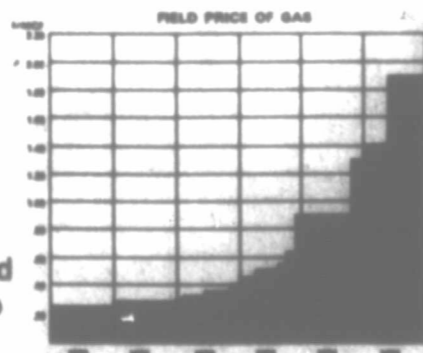
