Clayton Announces For Re-election

State Rep. Bill Clayton is again seeking election as the District 74 representative to the Texas House of Representatives. In announcing for re-election, Clayton said:

"I wish to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of the 74th District for the privilege of serving as their State Representative.

"Without the full support of the District's voters throughout the years, I would never have been able to assume the responsibility of Speaker of the House and a leadership role in the State.

"Having had two terms in this leadership position and in the process of running for a third Speakership term, I believe I have been better able to serve the District.

Texas Industrial Week

Greetings
By resolution of the Texas Legislature in 1961, the week of April 1-7 is observed each year as Texas Industrial Week.

It is especially fitting at this time to honor Texas business and industry because of their contributions to both the state and local economies have made Texas' business climate number one in the Nation.

Over the past 10 years, the number of corporation headquarters in Texas has increased 79 percent. While the number of corporate headquarters increased less than 10 percent nationwide, the number of corporations was up 118 percent in Houston, 78 percent in Fort Worth, 67 percent in Dallas and 59 percent in San Antonio.

In 1977, plans were made for more than 177 new and 196 expanding manufacturing firms in Texas.

Easter Seal Society

The first sheet of the 1978 Easter Seals has been presented to Governor Dolph Briscoe in Austin by the 1978 Texas Easter Seal Child, Jeanette Alvarado, of San Antonio.

Jeanette is the daughter of Mrs. Helen Alvarado of San Antonio. She is 6 years old, and a victim of spina bifida. Jeanette has been served by the Easter Seal program in San Antonio since October of 1973. She is in Early Childhood Program at Jose Cardenas.

Presenting the seals on behalf of the 13,166 handicapped children and adults served statewide by Easter Seals, Jeanette represents the needs of the year-round program of direct patient services, information, referral and follow-up; community and professional education; and transportation.

The campaign, which began March 1 will continue through April 2 with the Seventh Annual Easter Seal Telethon, is led by Kent McIlyar, Jr., of Dallas, Senior Vice President of the First National Bank of Dallas, and the 1978 Texas Easter Seal Appeal Chairman, who joins 234 local Easter Seal volunteer Presidents, Chairmen, and Representatives in leading 32,000 volunteers statewide. The services of the Society, offered in Texas since 1929, are available to the handicapped regardless of disability.

In addition to medically authorized orthopedic equipment purchase, including wheelchairs, braces and crutches, the campaign permits the Society and its affiliates to provide appropriate therapies, medical, psychological and audiological evaluations, and transportation.

The campaign also helps fund the "Easter Seal Action Line", the toll-free number 1-800-492-5555 which permits potential patients or their families, or handicapped persons in need of information about the appropriate agency for their needs to call 24 hours per day to receive assistance and/or information.

During his spare time he enjoys listening to music or doing something to do besides trouble. He especially likes soul music.

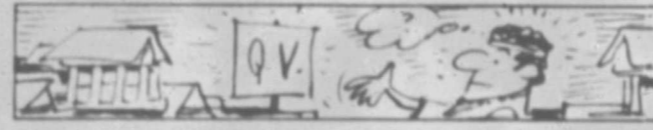
