School Board

The Sudan School Board held their regular meeting Monday night, April 10.

The invocation was given by Richard Black.

There were two groups that met with the School Board: Mrs. Nell Ingle, Mrs. Jo Ann Ellison, Mrs. Ann Carson, representatives from the Sudan Young Homemakers Organization, requesting the Board approve sharing the cost of carpeting the living room-dining room area of the home economics cottage. This request was approved by the Board.

The Sudan Baseball Association was represented by Edward Fisher and Malcolm Martin in regard to repairs to the baseball lighting. It was the board decision to replace the light poles that were becoming hazardous and install a new breaker box.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read as was the Superintendent's financial report for the month of April. The Tax Collector's report was presented and accepted.

The School Board Election returns were canvassed and the results were declared as were previously reported. New Board members Connie Hill and James Withrow were sworn in and the 1978-79 Board was organized. The officers are President James Withrow; Vice President Halbert Harvey; Secretary Guy Walden; and Treasurer James Arnold.

A discussion followed as to attendance at the School Board Workshop to be held on the Texas Tech campus with members planning to attend.

The Equalization Board for 1978 of Pete Lance, Nolan Parrish, and Calvin Wiseman was approved.

The approval of contract services with the Education Service Center, Region XVII for 1978-79 Title I Program was approved.

The school cafeteria purchase of meat grinder and food chopper attachments were approved.

The purchase of a printer for school purposes was tabled until a later date.

Mr. Max Hyatt, Vocational Ag Teacher, was re-elected for 1978-79 school year.

The re-assignment of Mrs. Peggy Lowrance to the second grade level for 1978-79 was approved; with the hiring of Mrs. Tana Stephens as Special Education teacher for the following year.

The following school trips were approved:

- a. Student Council to summer workshop-San Angelo
- b. Cheerleaders, twirlers, drum majorette to summer camps

The decision was reached after some discussion for the school to pay entry fees for the band to participate in the Carlsbad Band Festival and \$500.00 toward expenses of the trip.

A discussion followed as to again entering into a co-op counselor with Amherst Schools and the Sudan's decision was to go into this for the 1978-79 school year.

A short discussion followed as to student absences to activities and the ten day limit with the decision to leave the policy as it is.

The stage band's need for an amplifier and bass guitar was discussed and the purchase was approved.

It was reported that Marion Williams Ford will furnish the Driver Education car for the summer program.

Salaries were set for the 1978-79 school year with the teaching bonus being increased from \$400.00 to \$500.00. The coaching and administrative salaries were set for 1978-79.

A discussion followed as to implementing a computer mathematics course for 1978-79 school year with much interest shown.

The Board accepted the resignation of Max Hyatt, the Vocational Ag Instructor.

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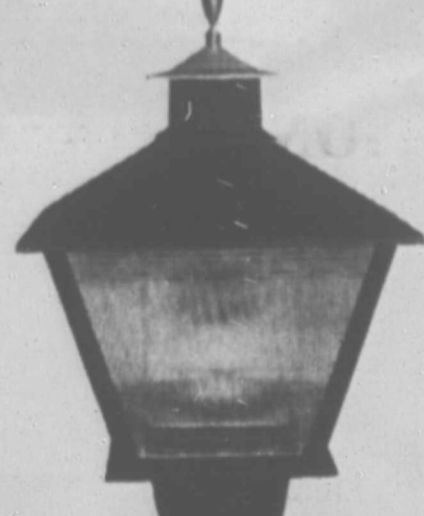

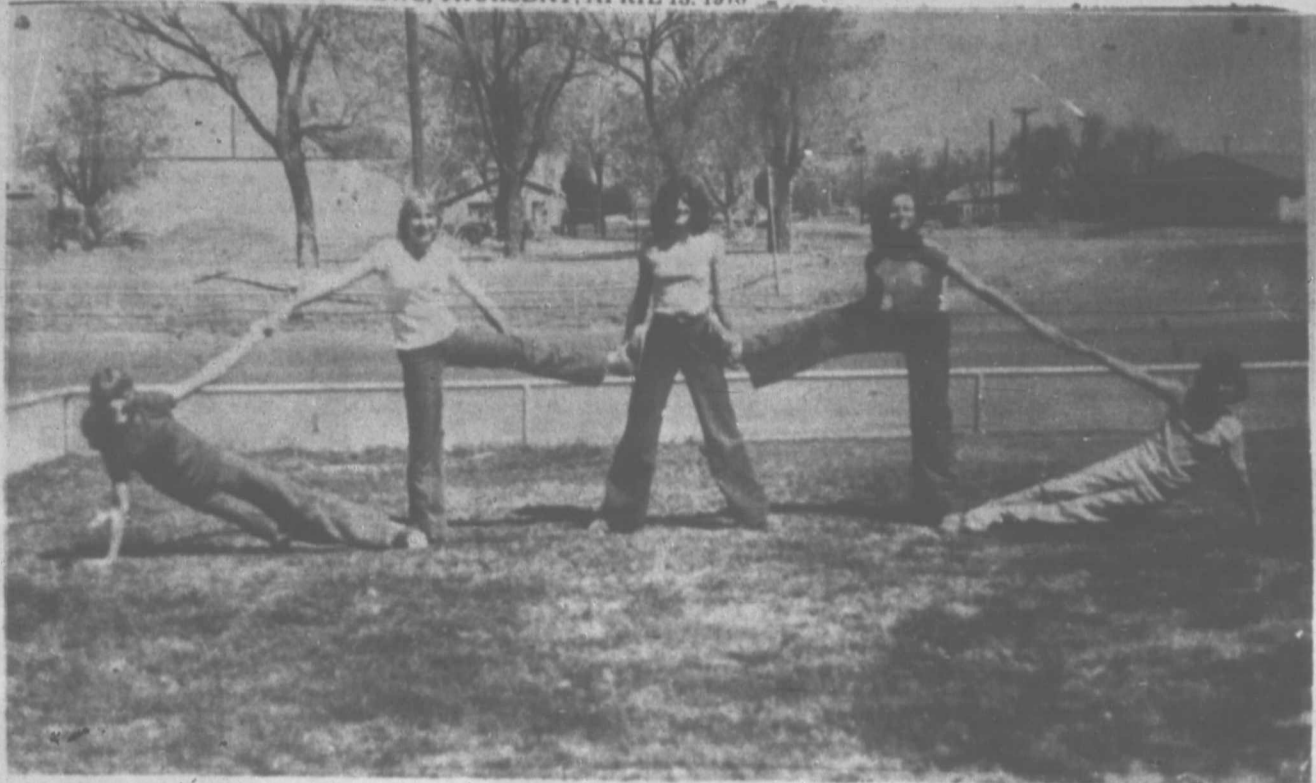
