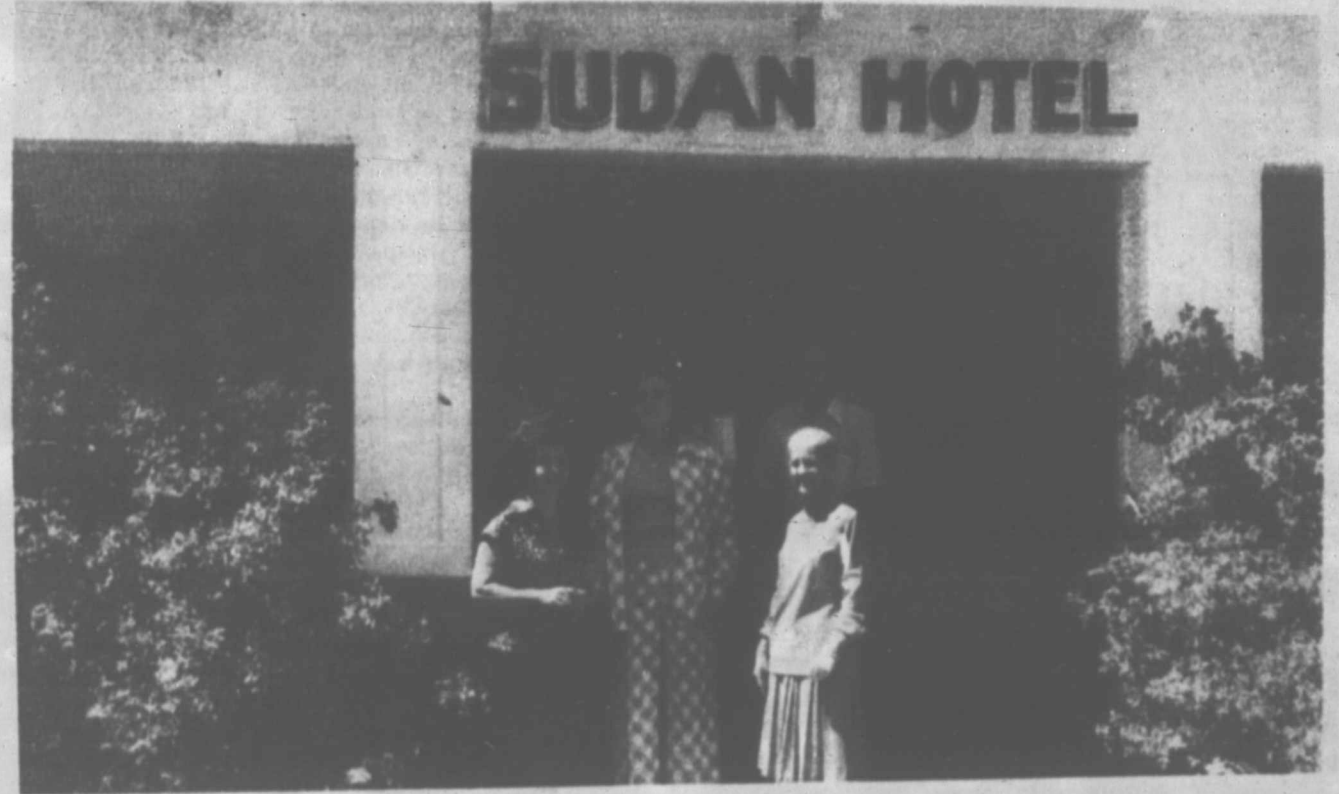

Community Effort A Matter Of Pride For Sudan

There is a cash prize of \$300 on the line this week in the regional judging of the Texas Community Improvement Program. But for the 976 citizens of this Lamb County community, what's at stake is really a matter of pride.

Sudan already has reaped \$100 as the top entry among 20 counties at the district level. And it advanced to the regional competition to select the four small communities in Texas which have shown the most civic improvement during the 12 months which ended March 31.

But the real prize has been the resurgence of civic spirit throughout the town. Hoyt Robertson, chairman of the Sudan Civic Improvement Association, quickly declares.

"The real benefit of the TCIP has been getting all our people involved," Robertson said. "Not only the young people have wholeheartedly backed the program, but the adults too, he stressed.

"And this will continue long after the contest is over," he added.

The city boasts a proud heritage, from its beginning in 1917 as a railroad way station and farming community carved out of the old 77 Ranch. In the 1940's it gained worldwide attention with its Fall Festival and United Nations pageant, the envy of even large cities. The 1950 census recorded 1,330 residents and the town grew to 1,700.

But like many small towns, Sudan went into a dormant stage during the 1950's and '60's. Young families moved away. Business growth levelled off. Then as the '70's began, the trend started to change.

The nation's bicentennial and a newly organized Lions Club stimulated a reawakening community pride. Under the Lions' leadership, many projects were initiated and Sudan qualified as a Bicentennial Community.

Then last November, County Extension Agents John Farris and Mrs. Dorothy Powell explained the TCIP

program to community leaders. The Sudan Community Improvement Association was organized, officers were elected, and four committees were established. In addition to Robertson, officers are: Cletis Holloman, vice chairman; Sara M. Woods, secretary-treasurer; and Billye Doty, reporter.

The organization and planning, especially the utilization of existing organizations, is one of the things which impressed judges in the district competition.

"And the overall enthusiasm of all the people who attended the program (for the judging committee), not just those on the committees," said Mrs. Debra Salley, Hockley County Extension agent and one of the judges.

Every organization in Sudan, including the schools, all the churches and each civic, youth and ethnic group, has rallied behind the project.

"We really didn't realize we had so many organizations until we started this effort," said Jo Ann Chester who serves on the festivities and the records

committees of the improvement association.

All the groups are represented in the association, which has set up short and long range goals and coordinated a wide range of projects.

The TCIP started more than 20 years ago when the investor-owned utility companies of Texas and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service joined forces to stimulate community improvement through organizational efforts.

The contest is a measurement of accomplishment which communities of 1,000 or less population make toward specific goals during the year, explained Mrs. Powell.

At the end of the year, a team of judges visits each community, and the citizens are limited to two hours in which to explain and exhibit their achievements. In the district judging, Sudan edged out Whiteface, of Cochran County, and West Camp, in Bailey County, for a chance at becoming one of the four state champions.

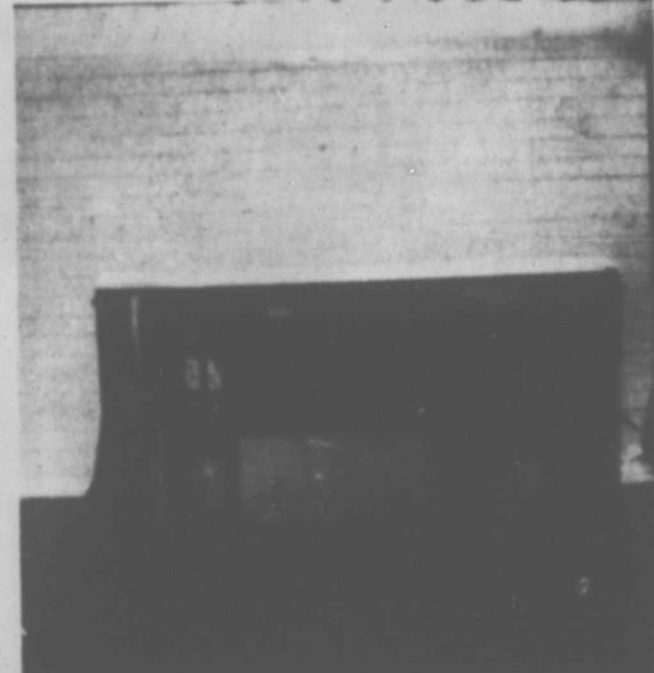

One business man has lost over \$2,000 in the past few months. He was thoughtful enough to put a coke machine out in front of his business so that people could get cokes after store hours. The third machine has been destroyed now and we will no longer have the convenience of getting cold drinks when we want them. Is this fair to the community?

Mayor Nolan Parrish stated that if this destruction and vandalism persists, an early curfew will have to be placed on the young people of Sudan. Perhaps that's what it will take to make people realize what freedom we have had and what it will mean when this freedom is taken away. Perhaps it will take a curfew to make parents realize young people should not be out on the streets so late at night so that vandalism can be a temptation. Perhaps it has not been a temptation to your child, but someone is doing the damage to personal property. Are you sure it is not your child? Do you really care??

Monday, May 22, a different team of judges began a four day round of visits to the four district winners in the northwestern region. They began at Imperial, in Pecos County. At 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 23, they arrived in Sudan, remaining until noon. Wednesday, May 24, they judged Wildorado, in Oldham County, and the following day wound up at Truscott, in Knox County.

In addition to the \$300 and designation as "State Winner, Region I," the regional champion will receive a letter of commendation from Gov. Dolph Briscoe and an invitation to the Governor's Luncheon with the other three regional winners. The three runners up in Region I each will receive \$100.

The improvements boasted by Sudan's citizens are many. The Sudan Hotel, the oldest in the county, is being restored as the Lamb County Museum and has been designated a historical landmark. Vacant lots have been cleaned and many dilapidated buildings have been torn down. Other buildings and homes have been renovated and remodeled. Each church has implemented a renovation program during the year. Trees and shrubs have been planted and a new park created.

Empty storefronts no longer glare depressingly at passersby. Organizations such as the Sudan 4-H Club, Lions Club and Sudan Booster Club each took responsibility for a vacant structure, cleaning them, painting them and decorating the windows with colorful and imaginative art work.

No longer is trash burned in alleys: A new refuse collection system utilizing mechanical dumpsters has been started.

A Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has been organized and is active. Six new businesses have opened in the city this year. A new post office is under construction. The city has annexed seven acres and land has been purchased for school expansion. New homes and a trailer park have been erected.

The Civic Improvement Association led the successful campaign for passage of a \$300,000 bond issue to improve the city's sewer and water system.

The Volunteer Fire Department is implementing a free ambulance service and planning a new fire station and acquisition of additional equipment. The airport runway was repaved.

New community activities for all ages have been started. A monthly music festival provides a variety of family entertainment. An art fair exhibited local arts and crafts. An art contest for youth was sponsored. Suppers for seniors were sponsored by the churches. And after high school ball games, the churches sponsor programs of entertainment and snacks for the youths. The Fourth of July celebration has been expanded and the entire town turned out at Christmas for the first Community Caroling and visit from Santa.

Youngsters may not have a movie house, but they enjoy plenty of activities, including organized leagues in baseball and basketball. There is an active 4-H program and a unique group known as "LOTWS" provides youngsters of all ethnic backgrounds a busy program of recreation, worship and community service.

It is hard to cram into a two hour summary for the judges all of the activity and civic cooperation in Sudan, said Sara Woods.

The people of Sudan have been so busy "they just didn't realize how much they have done," she said.

"We were really surprised at the things that have happened in such a short time," agreed Mickey Stephens, a member of the Association's hotel-museum and records committees.

If leaders of the association are anxious for the regional judging to be completed, they indicate it's for a good reason. They want to get on with their long range goals for a better Sudan.

"We really have so much to do," Robertson said.
