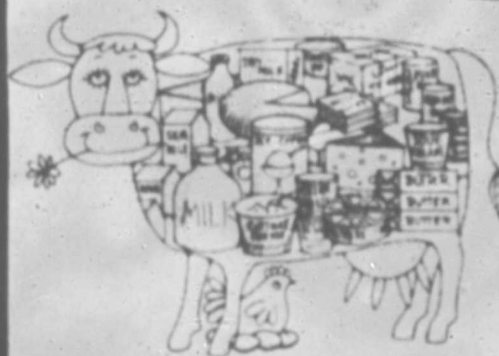

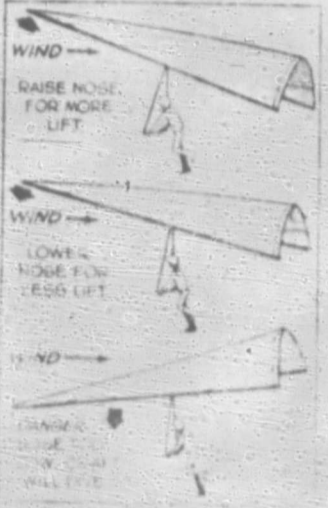

Nasal Drip Is Annoying



One of the annoyances of the summer months is the nasal drip. It is caused by the inflammation of the nasal mucous membrane. The nasal mucous membrane is the lining of the nose and it is made of a soft, moist tissue. When it becomes inflamed, it produces a thick, yellowish discharge that drips down the back of the nose and into the throat.

To prevent a recurrence of the nasal drip, it is important to keep the nasal mucous membrane healthy. This can be done by using a saline solution to irrigate the nose. The saline solution can be made by mixing one teaspoon of salt with one quart of water. It can be used several times a day.

Modern drugs can relieve the nasal drip, but they are not a cure. The nasal drip will return if the underlying cause is not removed. The underlying cause of the nasal drip is usually an infection of the nasal mucous membrane. This infection is caused by a virus or a bacterium. The infection can be treated with antibiotics.

Some times, coughing leads to the accumulation of mucus in the throat. This mucus can be made easier to swallow by using a lozenge. Lozenges are small, round tablets that dissolve in the mouth. They can be used to soothe the throat and to break up the mucus.

Tommye Suzette Burton, 86, died of cancer on July 11, 1978, at Alexandria Hospital, Alexandria, Va. She was a long-time resident at 1404 St. Clair Dr., Alexandria, Va.

She was born Tommye Suzette Walker July 11, 1914, in the Littlefield community. She lived in Littlefield until her early childhood when she moved to Manassas. She went to the first grade through the school there, then to Virginia in 1928, where she resided until her death.

Mrs. Burton was a member of the Potomac Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Manassas, Va. She was chairman of the Prince William County Historical Commission until she became ill. She wrote and took photographs for a county historical guide for the commission and worked on it together a time before she was to be buried at the old Brentsville church for the Bicentennial in 1976. She also worked on the Prince William County Bicentennial Day

celebration at the fairgrounds.

She was a member of the Gainesville-Haymarket Extension Homemakers Club, and a past president of the Lakeview Civic Assoc. She formerly worked for the Journal Messenger of Manassas. Prior to that, as a free-lance writer, she contributed articles on various subjects to the Virginia Cardinal, a northern Va. magazine, and the Virginia Cavalcade, published by the State Library at Richmond.

In addition, she was published in other historical publications throughout the state and her reign on the Historical Commission helped to produce roadside markers at many spots along Prince William roadways.

She won several awards from the Virginia Press Association, the last one after the onset of her illness.

She used her position as a reporter to espouse a number of causes in behalf of ecology and justice for the less fortunate. She

was instrumental, through the news media, in securing housing for the elderly when they were evicted. She helped many others with various problems, by publicizing their plight.

She is survived by her husband, William J. Burton and four sons, Shawn, Derek, Brett, and Brandon, all of the home.

She also is survived by a sister, Mrs. Jean White of Centerville, Va.; a brother, David Walker of Woodbridge, Va.; her parents, Olen and Susie Walker of Fairfax, Va., her maternal grandmother, Mrs. W.N. Jones of Sudan.

Funeral arrangements were handled by the Baker Funeral Home of Manassas. Services were held at 1 p.m. June 9 at the Haymarket Baptist Church. Burial was in the Oakwood Cemetery in Falls Church, Va.

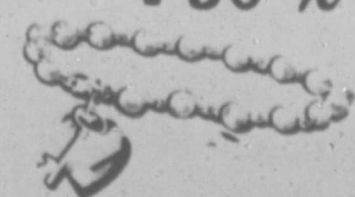

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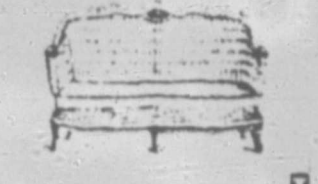
