## American Heritage

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

### The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America.

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has refused for a long time, after repeated Requests, to assent to their Petitions, and to redress their Grievances.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; by obstructing the Trade, and by cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world; by imposing Taxes on us without our Consent.

For supporting in every State, by a mock Trial, men seized on the Pretence of Debt, who had committed no Offence, and for carrying on an Artful System of Oppression, by which our Members of Parliament have been suspended, and our Laws evaded, and our Rights infringed, though under the pretence of carrying on War, in order to raise Money for carrying on the same.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

He has plundered our Seas, and burnt our Towns, and destroyed our Lives.

He has thrown into the Sea our Dead Bodies, and with equal Avarice, slaughtered our Captives.

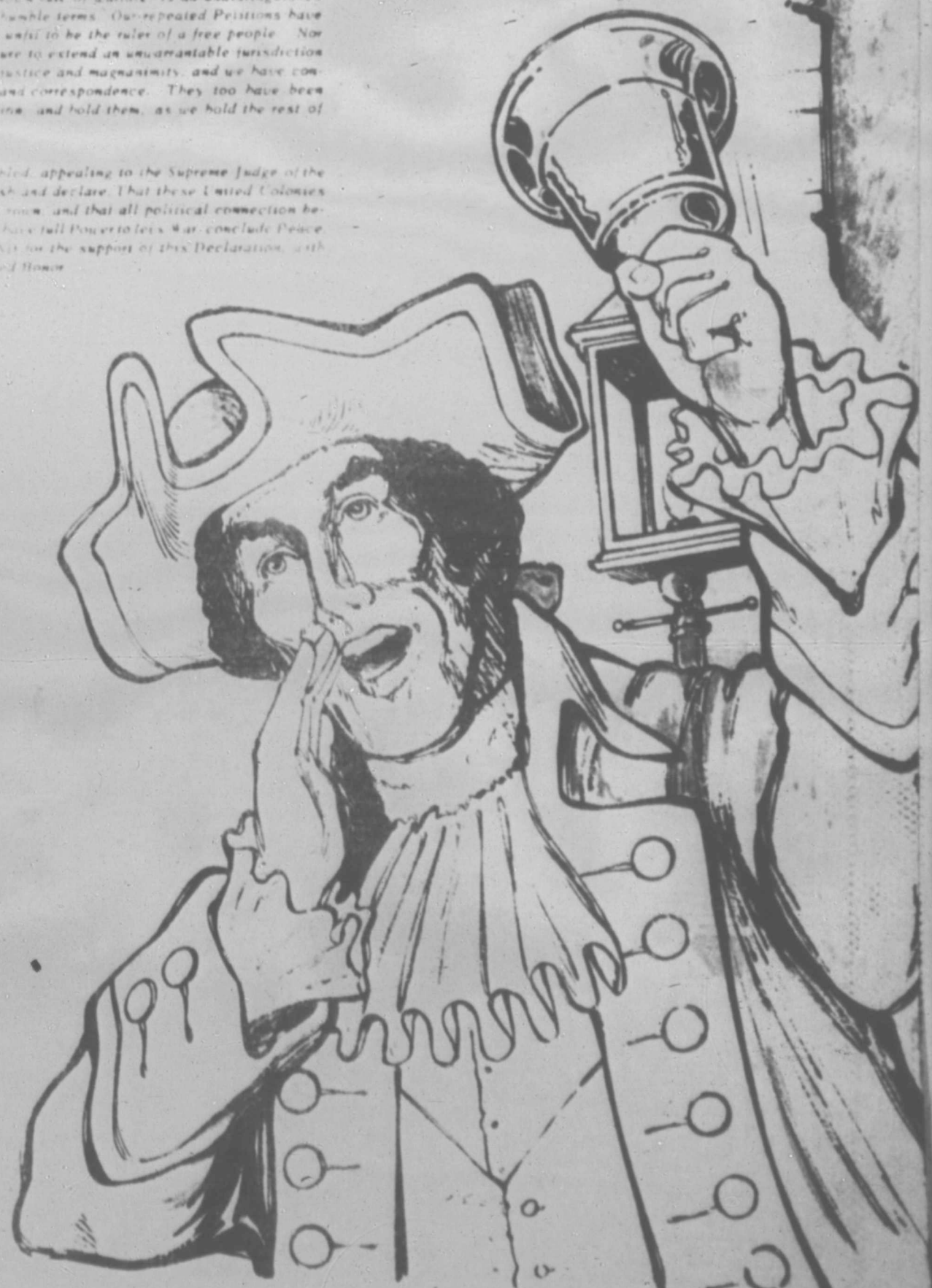
He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the execrable Tools of their Tyranny, and to fall Precipitate by their Hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions we have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms. Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince whose Character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free People. WE, THEREFORE, the Representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good-People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be, FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that as free and independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of Right do. AND in the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

He Makes 17,000 Mistakes A Year



John H. Moore, Jr., national manager of Plymouth's Trouble Shooting Contest, is the automobile industry's only executive who orders parts deliberately manufactured not to work. In Trouble Shooting, a program that encourages high school students to become auto mechanics, various parts of the car are "bugged" to keep them from functioning properly, and the contestants try to find and fix the malfunction. Because installing six to ten identical malfunctions in as many as 50 cars before a contest takes a lot of time, Moore orders parts that look authentic but that just won't work. He substitutes the fake parts for the real ones. He is shown with some 17,000 "bugged" parts that were specially made for the national contest.

## CATTLE RAISERS PRESIDENT SEEKS TAX LIMITATIONS

A constitutional limitation on state and local taxes similar to California's Proposition 13 has been called for by the president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, John Armstrong of Kingsville, Texas, representing one of the larger groups of landowners in Texas.

In a letter to Governor Dolph Briscoe, Armstrong said, "I would like to request that you give serious thought to calling a special session of the Legislature to consider a constitutional limitation on state and local taxes. This would provide the people of our state with the power of initiative and referendum. In this way, the people of Texas will have the same mechanism to influence a state government on this issue as the people of California."

Armstrong referred to the landslide vote for Proposition 13 in California which has caught the attention of public officials and private citizens all over the nation. "We must strike while the sentiment is strong to limit taxation, thus slowing down the over-development of bureaucracy. In six or eight more months, this enthusiasm and concern may well have cooled. Meaningful tax limitations put on by the Legislature depend on the backing of an aroused citizenry." Armstrong added that the upward trend of property taxes must be stemmed.

The Texas Constitution provides for regular sessions of the Legislature only in odd numbered years from January to June. Unless called into a special session by the governor, the Legislature will not meet until January, 1979.

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## Grant For Rural

### Health Care Awarded

The Sid W. Richardson Foundation of Fort Worth has presented a \$25,000 grant to Texas Tech University Health Sciences Centers to assist in the development of a Rural Health Care Delivery System now being established by the School of Medicine (TTUSM).

In notifying the school of the grant, Executive Vice President for the Richardson Foundation Valleau Wilkie, Jr. said the purposes of the Board in approving the grant are:

"We believe that the program can provide a viable model for both rural health care delivery in areas seriously underserved and important training for family practice physicians," Wilkie concluded.

"We greatly appreciate the support of the Sid W. Richardson Foundation in helping us develop a program which we hope can serve as a visible, effective model in dealing with the problems of rural health care," Richard A. Lockwood, M.D., vice president for the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Centers, said in accepting the grant.

"This is concrete evidence of confidence in the concept of cooperation between academic institutions and local communities to solve this most critical problem. Hopefully support by the Sid W. Richardson Foundation will encourage other philanthropic institutions to seriously consider the same or similar projects," Lockwood said.

The first phase of Tech Medical School's Rural Health Care Delivery System began operating last fall at the Crosbyton

Clinic in Crosbyton, Texas. It is a joint project of the medical school and the community.

The project will result in a network of care centers with centers with communications and transportation links that will serve a multi-county area. The area has been selected because a nucleus of care facilities exist which could effectively be augmented by TTUSM efforts.

The Rural Health Care Delivery System will use a graded care method for serving sparsely populated areas.

The comprehensive primary care center is staffed by faculty and resident physicians. Smaller centers can later be established in surrounding communities and supported by physicians from the comprehensive center.

Communication and transportation links will allow these centers to receive secondary and tertiary support, consultation and emergency guidance from the medical school in Lubbock.

When it becomes fully functional, the project will accumulate the data base needed for program modification and adaptation to other rural circumstances and locales.

Centers will provide primary care services for medically underserved populations, and will train undergraduate medical students, resident physicians and other health professionals in the delivery of health care in rural settings.

The plan calls for full involvement of local people in planning and executing their own system of health care.

Texas Tech University School of Medicine was created by the 61st Texas Legislature to address problems of health care delivery in primarily rural West Texas and to develop education programs emphasizing primary health care. The Rural Health Care Delivery System incorporates both of these objectives.

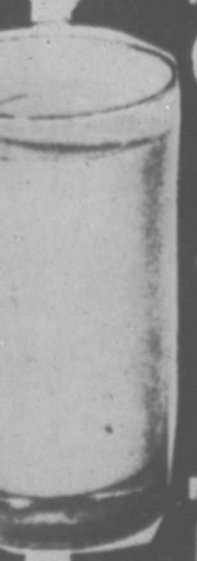
