PIONEER PREXY APPEARS

Council Again Delays Action On Gas Request

We've all heard of the Lincoln-Douglas debates; and more recently, the Kennedy-Nixon television debates.

Here in Friona this past Monday night we had a good one that should have rivaled any of those mentioned. The main participants were Friona Mayor W.L. (Preach) Edelman and C.L. (Stoney) Wall, president of Pioneer Natural Gas.

The pith of the matter was that the populace of Friona could not have heard the debate, least of all that it was not broadcast.

In this writer's humble opinion, both parties did themselves justice.

(In case you don't know what the debate concerned -- it was the proposed rate increase on gas customers by Pioneer Natural Gas.)

Most of us, knowing Preach Edelman's oratorical prowess, probably would immediately feel sorry for the president of Pioneer Gas. However, the gas company official did a commendable job, we thought, in handling all of the questions hurled his way by Mayor Edelman.

It was an interesting session, friendly and not exactly heated. The president of Pioneer Gas showed a cool business head, personality and much patience in sparring for the better part of two hours with the head of Friona's city government.

Mr. Wall was not, as some representatives of our area news media have pictured him, an arbitrary, threat-hurling tyrant.

He was very cordial throughout the session, and indicated that he was not in the habit of threatening city governing bodies.

"I have often been mis-quoted by the newspapers in the area as hurling threats. I've never threatened anyone," Wall told the Friona city commission.

When told that the council would probably postpone action on the rate increase pending action by the Lubbock council, which has instigated a study of the rate proposal, Wall was receptive.

"Take as long as you like. We're not out to rush anyone on the matter," he said.

The "sparring" by Edelman and Wall is actually not a new event. Edelman has crossed swords with Pioneer representatives on other occasions, as a former representative of Farmer County and Plains Gas Users associations.

So, both parties had prior knowledge of the other before Monday's city council session.

Mayor Edelman had a long list of prepared questions for the Pioneer Gas president. We thought he had "studied his lesson" well for the event.

Most members of the city council, as well as others attending the Monday session, felt as though they had learned a little more about the gas business as a result of the meeting.

As we said previously, it was just a shame that more people didn't hear the debate. It was quite a show.

The Friona City Council once again postponed action on the request by Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for an upward adjustment in municipal gas rates at its regular meeting Monday night. (See additional comments in "Star Lites" column).

After a two-hour discussion between mayor W.L. Edelman and C.L. Wall, president of the gas company serving 55 West Texas cities, the council decided to postpone action pending the outcome of the question in other cities, principally Lubbock, which is making a thorough study of Pioneer's rate request.

The gas company is requesting rate increases on domestic and business gas amounting to roughly 11.5 per cent.

In other business, the council voted to install four new street lights in Block 2 of the Western Addition.

The group also voted to deposit \$25,000 of the city's future improvement funds in a savings account at Friona State Bank, to draw interest until it is needed for municipal use.

The council also gave preliminary approval to the city budget for the fiscal year 1968. The budget amounts to an estimated \$304,284.

The city manager was instructed to secure bids from local automobile dealers on a new patrol car for the police department.

In his monthly summary of activities to the City Council, City Manager Jake Outland reported that there were nine changes of ownership in city properties reported by the county clerk's office during the month.

Sixty-eight Board of Equalization meeting notices were mailed July 17. The board held

its annual session at 9 a.m. July 25. No taxpayers were present for the hearing.

There were only four building permits issued during the month. One was for a new residence, valued at an estimated \$19,000. Three additions and/or alterations brought the total for the month up to \$22,800.

Water department records show that 23,094,300 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 769,810 gallons per day. The total is comparable to the month of June, although less than normal, due to a total of 3.17 inches of rainfall recorded over 11 days during the month.

Ten new water taps were made and one service reactivated to bring the total number of active services to 1062. A four-inch water main separated at the intersection of 11th and Main Streets July 5. Repair

was made after a nominal cut was made in the street.

A total of 350 feet of two and one-quarter inch main was laid west of Block 30, O.T., July 12-13, and 1995 feet of six-inch asbestos cement main was installed by the contractor in Blocks 2 and 3 of Western Addition.

A total of 5,383,812 gallons of sewage was pumped during July, an average of 173,671 gallons per day. A total of 1780 feet of six-inch sewer mains and eight manholes were put down by the contractor in Blocks 2 and 3, Western Addition.

Nine new sewer taps were made, to bring the total number to 994 as of the end of the month.

Fire department records show six fire calls during the month; four were outside the city limits, with Eric Rushing's barn being the greatest loss at an estimate of \$1,500. Of the two inside the city, the gasoline pump at Friona Consumers was estimated at \$550.

Fire Chief Shirley, assistant Glenn E. Reeve Jr., and two other firemen attended the week long session at Texas A&M July 16-22. Chief Shirley taught in the advanced ladder course. Attendance at the school contributes materially to the reduction of insurance rates for Friona.

Twenty nine arrests were reported by the police department. Eleven were for traffic violations; six for drunkenness; four for vandalism, two each for minors in possession of alcoholic beverages and one each for disturbance, aggravated assault, rape and theft.

Forty-two complaints were investigated, 12 for thefts, seven for vandalism, five each for domestic disturbances and delivery of messages, four dog complaints, three on child neglect and two gunshot wounds.

Three traffic accidents were investigated with property damage estimated at \$1,800.

Approximately 30 yards of gravel were applied to newly sealcoated streets after the tar bleeding began due to high temperature.

The Library Board reported that 2160 patrons had used the library during the month of June, an average of 72 per day. An average for the past six months was 95 visitors per day.

There were 146 books donated during June, and 80 books were given to the library as memorials.

USES COTTON BURS

Feed Mfg. Plant Slated At Hub

A cattle feed manufacturing plant which will make use of cotton burs will be built south of Hub, it has been announced by a group of Friona businessmen.

The group has secured contracts with all Friona gins to pick up their burs at ginning season. Arrangements also have been made with gins at Bovina and Lazbuddie, and others are being negotiated with gins throughout the area.

In all, the plant will use burs from approximately 12 gins in the area.

The plant will manufacture a pellet containing eight percent protein and four percent fats. This is more food value than is contained in cotton seed hulls, long used as a source of cattle food, it was pointed out.

The feed plant can add molasses to the mix to increase the amount of fat in the pellet. The plant will be located

three miles south and one-half mile west of Hub.

In addition, the plant will install dehydrating equipment to process alfalfa hay, haygrazer etc. The burs will be a winter project for the plant, with the other crops being utilized in the summer.

The plant will employ seven or eight people during peak production, according to A.L. Black a spokesman for the concern. A group of Friona businessmen are financing the venture. A manager is to be named in the near future.

The group is shooting for November of this year as completion date for the plant, so as to utilize burs from this year's cotton crop.

Alfalfa Seen As Cash Crop

Alfalfa hay is being viewed as a good cash crop for the Friona area in view of increased cattle industries, it was pointed out this week by farm leaders.

Some feedlots use alfalfa in their feeding program, and the new feed manufacturing plant to be built south of Friona will include a dehydrating plant, so as to make use of the crop.

Hay to be cut next year needs to be planted this year, and one observer said he would estimate that there would be a market for 4,000 to 5,000 acres of alfalfa in the local area.

Alfalfa hay as a cash crop add to the already impressive list of diversification of Farmer County agricultural crops and related industries.

Vasek Denies Club Tie-In

Adolph Eugene Vasek of Route 3, Friona, notified the Star this week that he is in no way connected with Charles Joseph Lance of Hereford, nor with the proposed private club for Friona.

"I have no money in the deal, and do not wish to be associated with the project in any way," Vasek told the Star.

Vasek farms southwest of Friona, and says he does not know how his name became connected with the proposed club.

Young Farmers To Hold Farm Tour

The Friona Young Farmers Association announced this week that the group will sponsor a farm tour on Tuesday of Friona's Maize Days celebration -- September 12.

Details on the tour are being worked out. Some of the stops which will be on the tour will be the Hi Plains Feed Yards, nearing completion west of town, and Missouri Beef Packers, under construction southwest of Friona.

Selected farms will also be visited. A "practice run" is to be made by members of the club, Thursday, August 10, to get an idea of what farms might be visited by the tour.

Anyone with crops or other farming installations which they would want the group to see is invited to contact a member of the club.

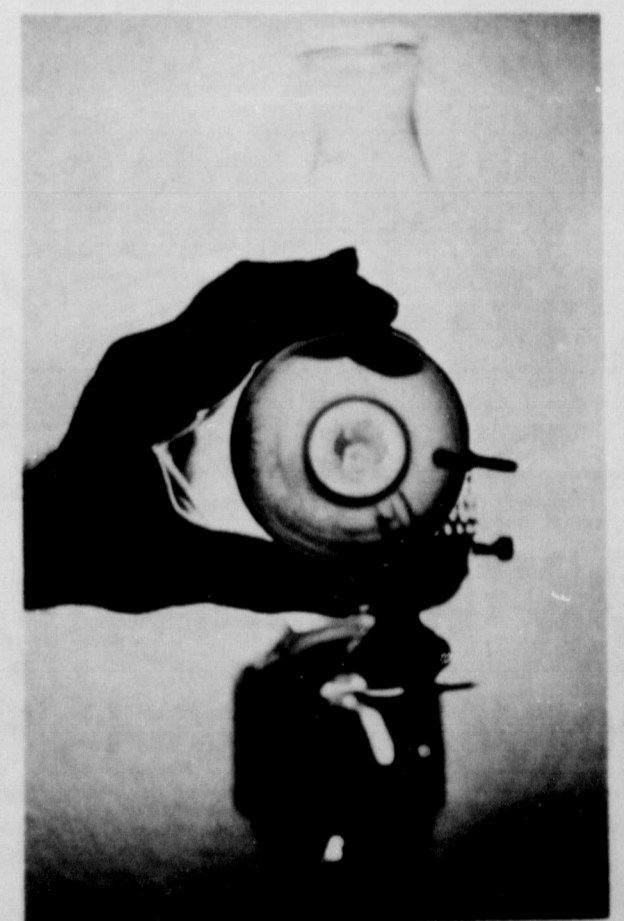
Workouts To Begin

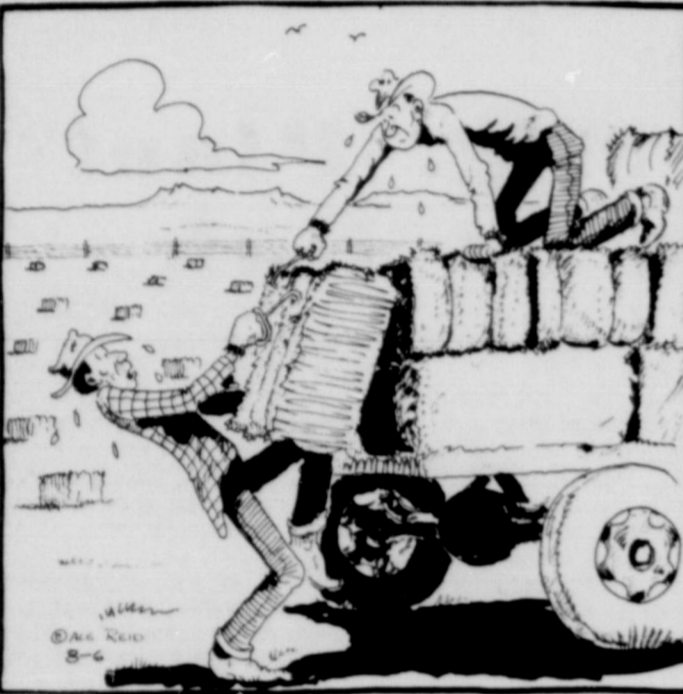

In the year 443 B.C. two Roman citizens were elected to hold what was considered the most powerful office in the entire Empire. These two magistrates were responsible only to each other and had the authority to establish tax rates, fill vacancies in the senate, and even strip a person of citizenship. Their terms of office only ran eighteen months (plenty long for a smart politician with unlimited power). These 'censors' as they were called lasted for four hundred and twelve years then fell with the Republic.

Webster defines a censor as "an official authorized to prohibit the publication, dissemination, or exhibition of anything considered detrimental to public safety or morality."

Our word, censorship, stems from this early source and unfortunately is largely misunderstood, misapplied and has become a battle cry of a segment of our population who could not care less about moral safety.

As far as adults are concerned perhaps they have a point - just maybe. Censorship applied to a state or Nation could result in "managed news," and in the death of the freedom of speech. Censorship in time of war is a vital necessity, but any unbridled power can become a two edged sword.

We are told that over half of our population is less than twenty-five years of age. Think of how many millions are still in public schools and colleges!

These young people are everybody's business. They belong to a world of tomorrow that most of us cannot begin to envision. There is the awesome responsibility of reshaping the destinies of millions of people.

What preparation do they require to fulfill this mountainous assignment?

Can we allow them to be taught by avowed subversives? Should we permit their association with groups of radicals?

Reason and common sense say "NO"! Are we then guilty of the bug-a-boo of censorship? Again NO, there is a big difference in censorship and some control of development.

Several states, and many cities, have a board to review motion pictures before they may be shown to the public. Is that important? Read the movie ads in a large city paper, then if you want your teenagers to park in a dark lot and see the show -- well they are your kids!

Do you know why you will not find an off-color book on our library shelves? Because a group of ladies and gentlemen read them first. If that means censorship, then thank goodness we have it!

Our school books are read, studied, reviewed and discussed by everyone from the State level to the local classroom teacher, so, Mr. and Mrs. Parent, you have nothing to fear from that quarter.

No, we do not want censorship in the popular sense of the much maligned word, but we do need some control of development.

The best source is at "home, sweet home" and in the example we set for our youngsters.

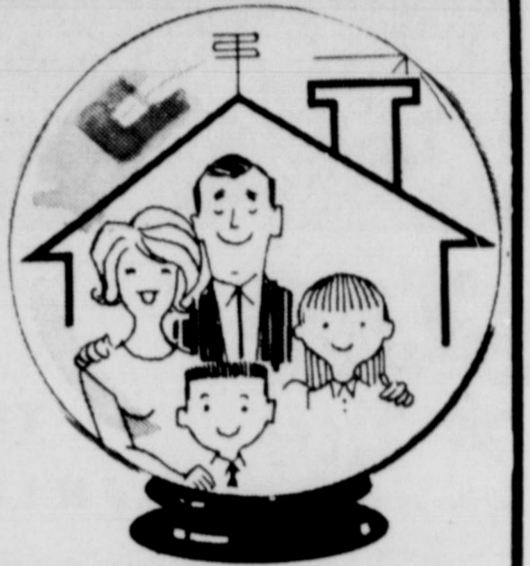

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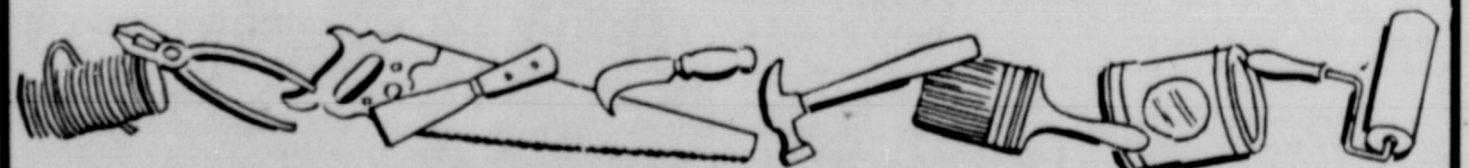

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Coach Light Is Now "Winningest" At FHS

Coach Don Light, by coaching the 1966 Friona High School Chieftains to a 4-5-1 season record became the winningest coach in the school's football record book.

Light, through four seasons starting in the fall of 1963, has coached 26 wins, four more than former head coach Raymond Cook's team posted while he was coach of the Chieftains (1949-1954).

Coach Light now has a 26-14-1 record as a Friona coach, a winning percentage of .646. He set a record by having winning seasons in his first three years at Friona. No other FHS head coach had that many winning seasons; in fact, the school had never had three straight winning football seasons.

In starting his fifth season as Chieftain coach, Light will, at the close of the 1967 season, be just one season behind Cook, whose six seasons are the most for any single coach at FHS.

When Coach Light began his first season at FHS in 1963, the Chieftains were in the throes of a 27-game losing string, and had posted a dismal 1-29 record for the previous three years. Four years later, the team's record during the 1960s now stands at 27-43-1, a .380 winning percentage compared to the .033 of the first three years of the decade.

Coach Light has stressed defense since taking the reins of the team in 1963. Aided by line coach Bob Owen, the FHS mentors reversed a trend which had seen Friona become almost a "patsy" on defense.

In 1960, the Chiefs had given up 367 points, and 428 in 1961, followed by 352 in 1962. In four years under coaches Light and Owen, the Chieftains have given up only 546 points.

The team has averaged 17.4 points per game the past four years, compared to 11.7 points the four years previous. On defense, the team has allowed 13.7 points per game, as opposed to 35 points average for the four years prior to Light and Owen taking over.

Raymond Cook's 1951 Chiefs established marks for future teams to shoot at. The team, although runnerup in district, to Happy with a 7-2 season slate, scored more points than any other team in FHS history (273-30,3 per game), and allowed the least (53-5,9 per game).

Besides dropping a 14-7 game to Happy, the 1951 team's only other loss was a 9-6 decision to Hereford.

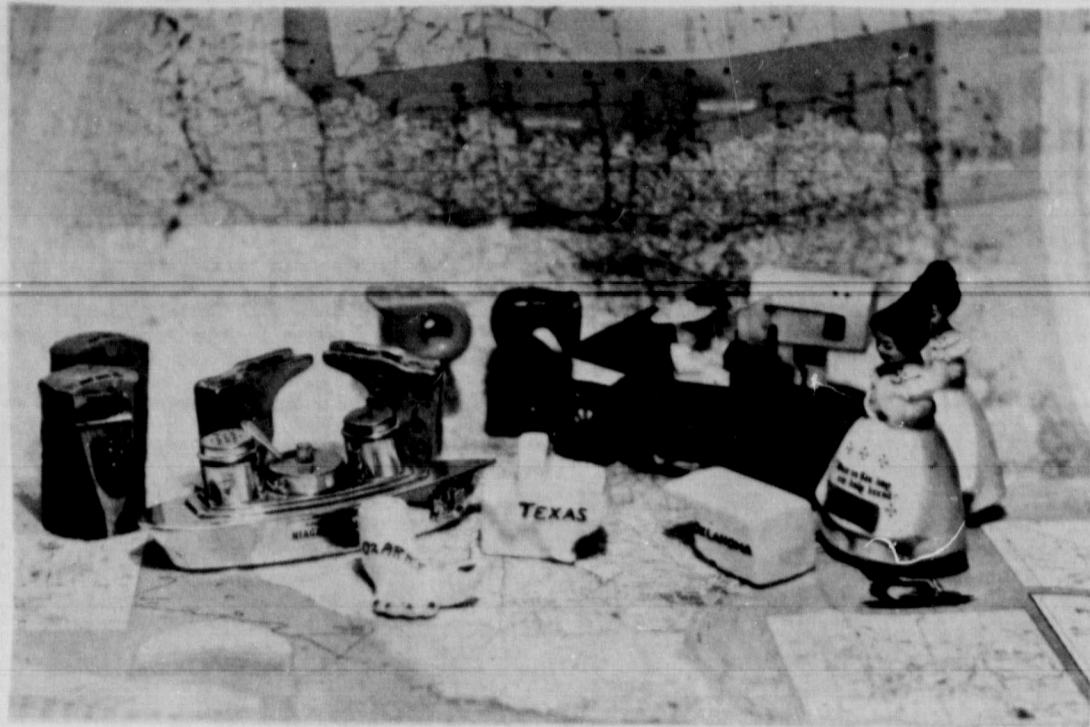

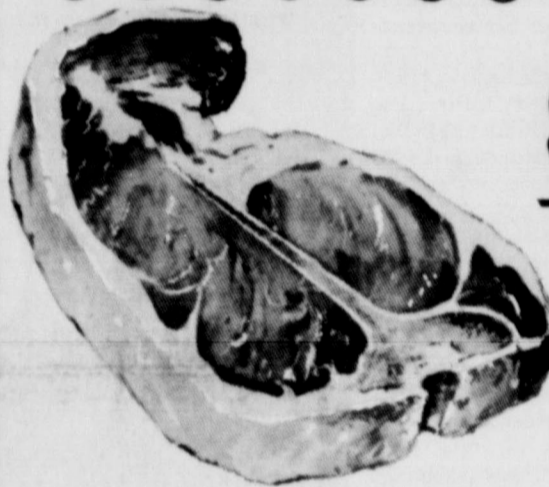

On The Farm In Parmer County

RONNIE MCNUTT

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall.

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test. By sampling, early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can obtain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis.

Insufficient phosphorus can also limit wheat production, the agent points out. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be replaced in the soil where it will be with-

in reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, preplant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus when they are young.

All wheat growers are urged to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the county Extension office.

SOURGHUM MIDGE REPORT
According to area entomologist, midge emergence from Johnsongrass head sampling has decreased significantly in the Panhandle area. Grain sorghum is now being checked for adult midge emergence. Midge populations appear to be widely distributed over the entire Panhandle area but populations to date are lighter than at this time last year.

Sorghum midge emergence has increased considerably over the South Plains area. Majority of the midge population is coming from grain sorghum. Grain sorghum is required as a host by the midge, before large numbers of midge can develop.

Sorghum midge emergence has increased quite drastically in Floyd and Hale Counties. Grain Sorghum which has not yet passed the blooming stage should be closely watched for midge activity.

BRUCELLOSIS VACCINATION CHANGES MADE

The minimum age for calf vaccination against brucellosis has been lowered from four months to three months, according to a United States Department of Agriculture announcement.

Research has indicated that acceptable resistance is induced with the strain 19 vaccine on three months old calves. This early age vaccination also reduces the possibility of calves producing reactors that can

New Era Predicted For Stocker Cattle

The success of a few fore-runners in the feedlot industry, coupled with a competitive advantage over lots in other sections of the country, has created a recent popularity of feedlots in the local area. The large number of feeder cattle required to fill these lots have also created an increasing demand for local stocker cattle.

The feeding industry is quite promising locally because of available feed, climate, geographical location, transportation, and local processing in the near future. However, one basic characteristic of the industry is that it usually requires a large outlay of capital and depends heavily on a constant source of both long and short term credit.

Consequently, the availability of credit will be the limiting factor in any feeder operation. There has been some controversy as to the ability of our area's financing institutions to properly finance the large volume of cattle on feed in the High Plains area.

The local money lender has found himself in the position of servicing normal agricultural production loans, loans for equipment, and a large volume of feeder cattle loans in addition to the commercial loans.

The early age vaccination is also expected to help the cattle producer because it will often fit better with his regular management practices.

The amended regulation defines "an official vaccinee as a female bovine animal vaccinated against brucellosis at the age of three through eight months." If the heifer calf is a beef breed on a range of semi-range area, she may be vaccinated from three to eleven months.

The vaccination of heifers calves past the age of eight months is discouraged by the USDA because of the possibility of persistent reactors.

which he is generally expected to make. With tight money gradually creeping up again the question arises as to the lender's ability to continue to service this wide range of credit.

Contrary to the normal agricultural undertaking, the feeding of cattle is not limited to the rancher and farmer in today's large custom feedlots. Professional feeders, farmers and ranchers, on the farm feeders, combination stocker/feeder operators and increasing number of business and professional men are requesting financing help on feeder cattle. Again the question arises - is the money available?

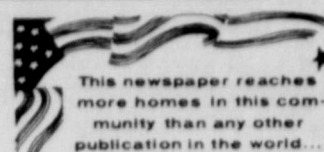
Regardless of access to ready funds, the lender will base the issuance of credit on several principles. Some of the prime criteria for credit issuance to customers will be: (1) experience, (2) financial strength, (3) security, (4) proper buying and selling (5) proper feeding, and (6) repayment plan.

As to availability of funds, no problems are anticipated under current lending standards according to Robert Neelley, local Production Credit Assn. representative. He states "We are currently accepting a number of feeder loans which exhibit the normal financial soundness which we would require on any type loan. Our intention is to service the area to the best of our ability despite the capital involved and are experiencing no problems at this time in handling feeder loans regardless of the volume required."

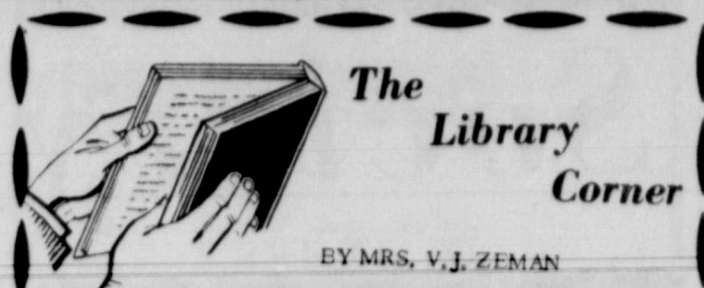

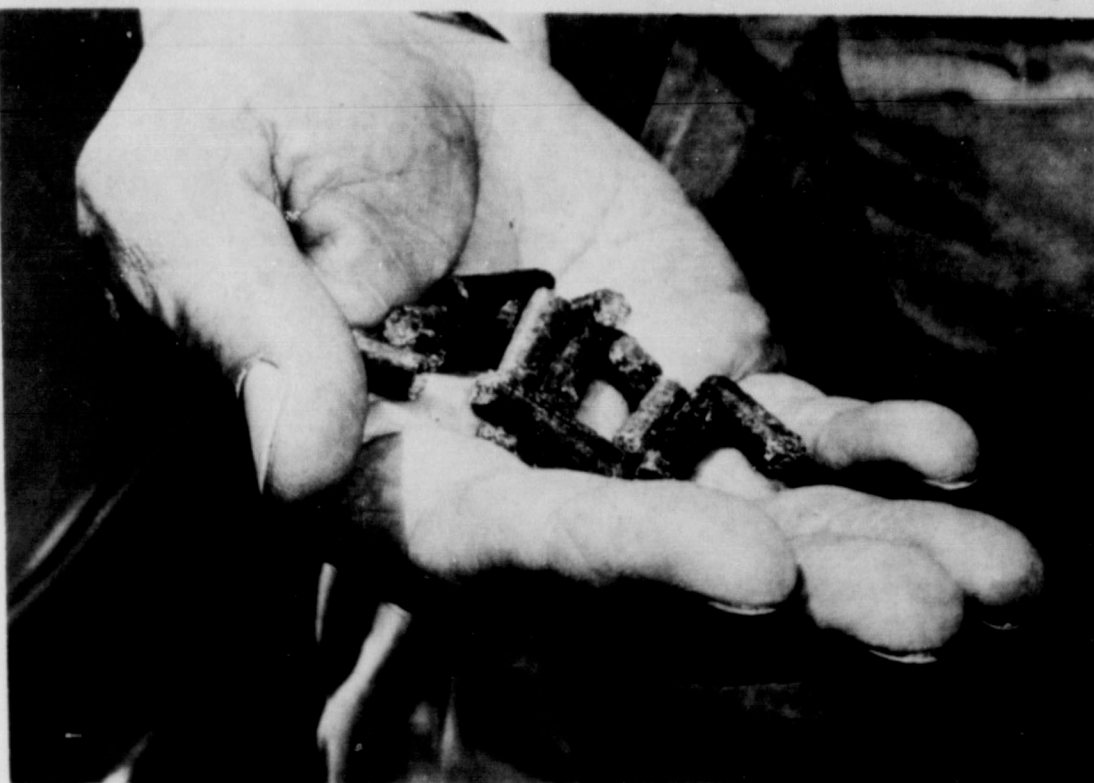

A story hour program for the fall will begin an eight-week run on Thursday, Sept. 21. Of course, the library will continue to be open during this interval and books may be checked out.

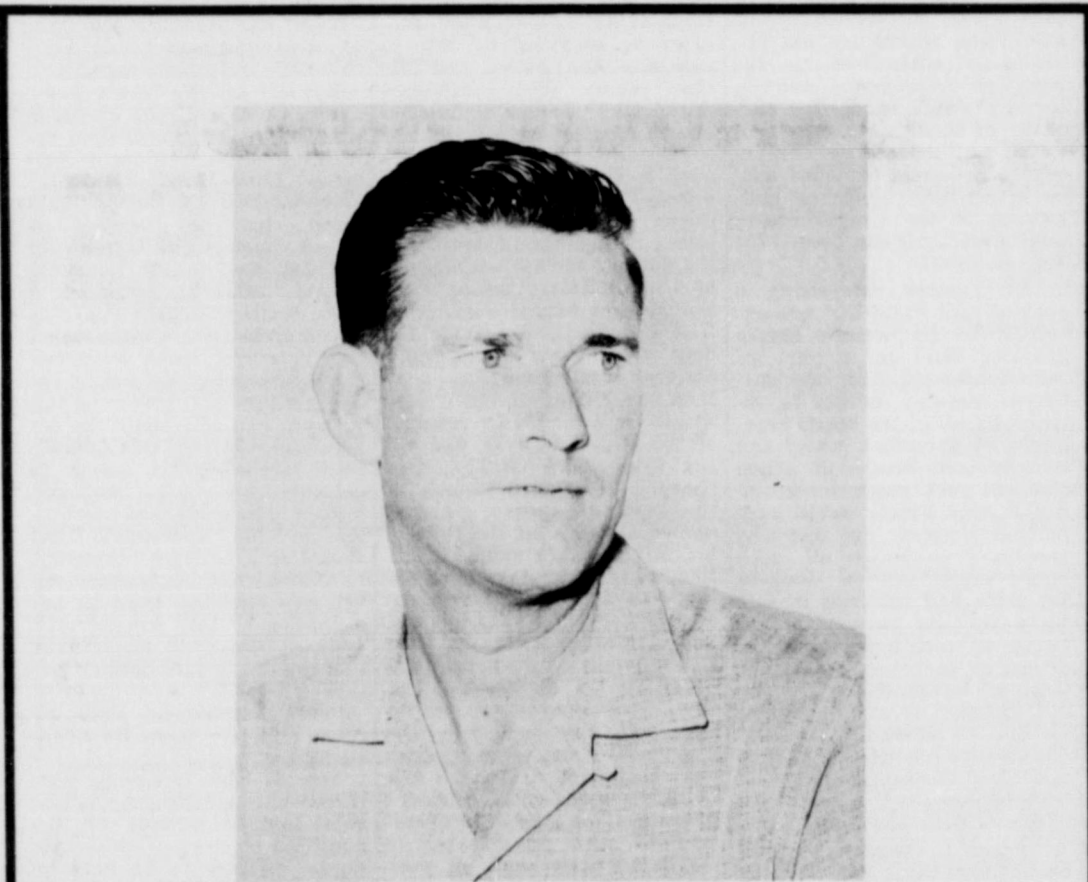

retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any lands for the purchase of any bonds comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising, and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to a series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-
