One of the area and state-wide industries which bids to benefit to a large extent from the location of Missouri Beef Packers in Friona is Santa Fe Railway.

Friona's freight business via Santa Fe has the potential to be tripled, according to an estimate from J.C. Beck, local Santa Fe agent.

Santa Fe is currently building a spur from its main line southwest of Friona to service the new Friona industry.

Beck sees the coming of the packing plant, along with the additional feed yards, as signaling a new era in the railroad's freight business.

"We will see our grain shipments dwindle to only a fraction of what they have been in the past," Beck predicted.

He based his prediction on the fact that more and more grain sorghum will be utilized locally for the cattle-feeding industry. Also, Beck pointed out that less and less government grain is being stored in elevators.

"We used to do a lot of shipping of government grain. However, the government has practically gotten out of the grain business," Beck says.

So, in a year or so, it is predicted that rather than having large shipments of grain out of the Friona area, these shipments will be replaced by shipments of dressed beef.

The grain cars will be replaced by refrigeration cars, or the piggy-back cars which will transport the beef in refrigerated trucks.

Santa Fe is just one of the examples of the big benefits which will be paid upon completion of the gigantic beef plant near Friona.

TWO CRITICAL

Boys Injured In Auto Crash

Two Friona boys remained in critical condition in Amarillo as a result of a near head-on automobile collision Sunday afternoon near Lockney.

Gary Murphree, 17, and Johnny Mars, 19, were in the intensive care unit of Northwest Texas Hospital at press time, Murphree had not fully re-

gained consciousness since the wreck, and Mars was under heavy sedation because of extensive injuries.

Charles Bishop, another occupant of the car, was transferred to Parmer County Community Hospital after spending Sunday night in Lockney General Hospital.

Two other boys, Eddie Barker and Mike Riethmayer, were treated at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulla and released.

The boys were returning from Childress on Sunday after watching the Greenbelt Bowl game on Saturday night, in which Friona's Mike Wooley played.

The ironic part of the story is the fact that the boys spent the night in Childress rather than drive back to Friona late Saturday night after the game, and risk an accident.

Mars sustained a broken arm, plus leg injuries, as well as cuts and abrasions. The extent of Murphree's injuries were not certain at press time, since he had not been moved for X-Rays.

Murphree is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Murphree, Mars is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Mars. Bishop's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Bishop. Barker's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Judge Barker and Riethmayer's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Bob Riethmayer.

Murphree was driving the 1966 Plymouth, travelling west on U.S. Highway 86 when the car was in collision with a car driven by Louis Griffin of Lubbock. Griffin was travelling east on the highway, and swung in front of the Murphree vehicle, attempting to turn left onto State Highway 256.

Griffin and his mother-in-law were in satisfactory condition following the wreck. His young daughter was not injured.

Registration Schedule Given For Students

The procedure for registration of students in Friona schools was announced this week by Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr and principals of the various Friona schools.

The first day of school will be on Tuesday, September 5 -- somewhat later than school has started in Friona in recent years.

Registration for students in high school and junior high school will be held on Friday, September 1. Students in grades one through five register during the first regular day of school.

Students who are new in Friona school system in grades five through 12 are asked to come by the junior high school or high school office for special pre-registration procedures, anytime after August 21.

Students who will be in grades one through four and are new to Friona are requested to report to principal J.T. Gee's office in the primary (east) building during the week of August 28. High school students are to report to the high school for

registration and issuance of books on Friday, September 1. Those who cannot for some reason report on that date may register on Tuesday, September 5, the first day of school.

Grades seven and eight are to register at the Junior High School Auditorium at 9 a.m. September 1. Students in grade six are to register at 10:30 that morning, also at the auditorium.

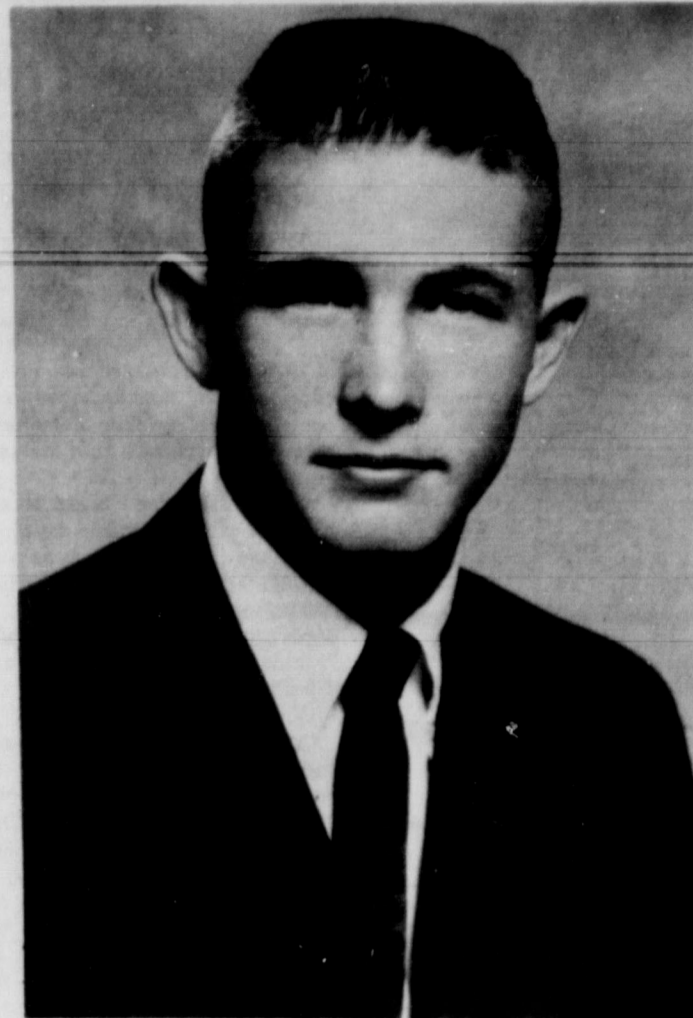
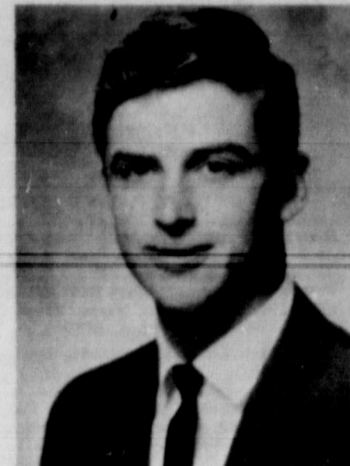
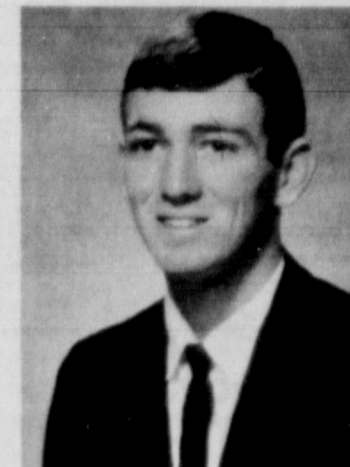
For Queen Entries

Football Practice Starts For 45 FHS Candidates

A total of 45 prospects for the 1967 Friona Chieftain varsity and B-team had reported for workouts as of Tuesday morning.

The total was reduced at least by three by the automobile accident near Silverton last Sunday, in which Gary Murphree, Charles Bishop and Eddie Barker, all football prospects, were injured.

Murphree, who quarterbacked the B-team last fall, would be a candidate for the varsity spot this year.

Among those reporting for football are 12 seniors, 17 juniors and 16 sophomores. The Chiefs have 10 returning lettermen from last year's team which finished 4-5-1 for the season.

"We've had real spirited workouts so far this week," Chieftain Coach Don Light said Tuesday. Outside of the possible loss of personnel for indefinite lengths of time, Light didn't pinpoint any other problems he saw in the immediate future.

Besides Murphree and the other boys who have been injured, Eddie Wood, another quarterback candidate, has decided to complete graduation requirements early and skip his senior year.

The team will scrimmage Boys Ranch on Friday, Aug. 25, time and place to be announced later.

Five Youngsters Get FFA Awards

Five Friona youngsters received honors at the recent 39th annual State Future Farmers of America convention in Dallas.

Phillip Johnson received the "American Farmer" award, the FFA's highest award, and

four other boys received "state farmer" degrees.

Gaining state farmer degrees were Joe Murphree, Mike Riethmayer, James Sides and Jay Potts. All except Potts graduated from Friona High School last spring as seniors. Potts will be a senior this fall.

Johnson's American Farmer award is the first for FHS in the FFA's recent history. The four state farmer degrees are the most for the local vocational agriculture chapter in recent years. Last year Johnson

was the only member from Friona to gain the award.

Johnson was one of only five FFA members throughout the state to receive the American Farmer award. Every applicant in Area I received their state farmer degrees, a total of 119 boys.

The boys will get the awards through Friona High School's academic awards system.

Accompanying the boys to Dallas was Benny Pryor, FHS vocational agriculture instructor.

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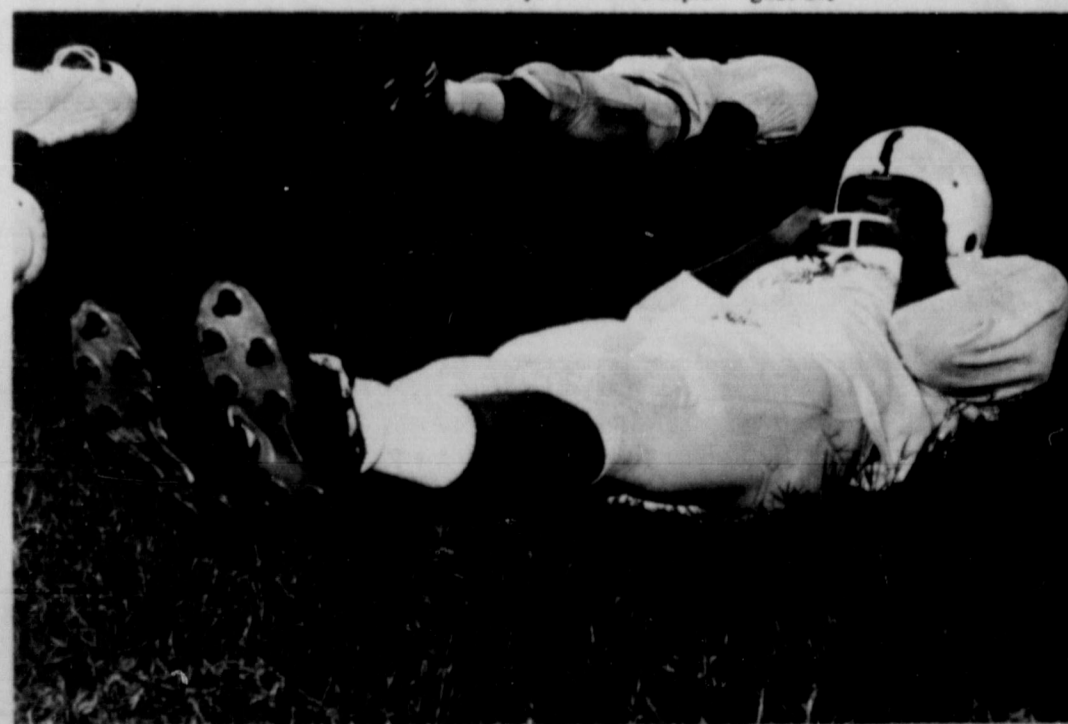

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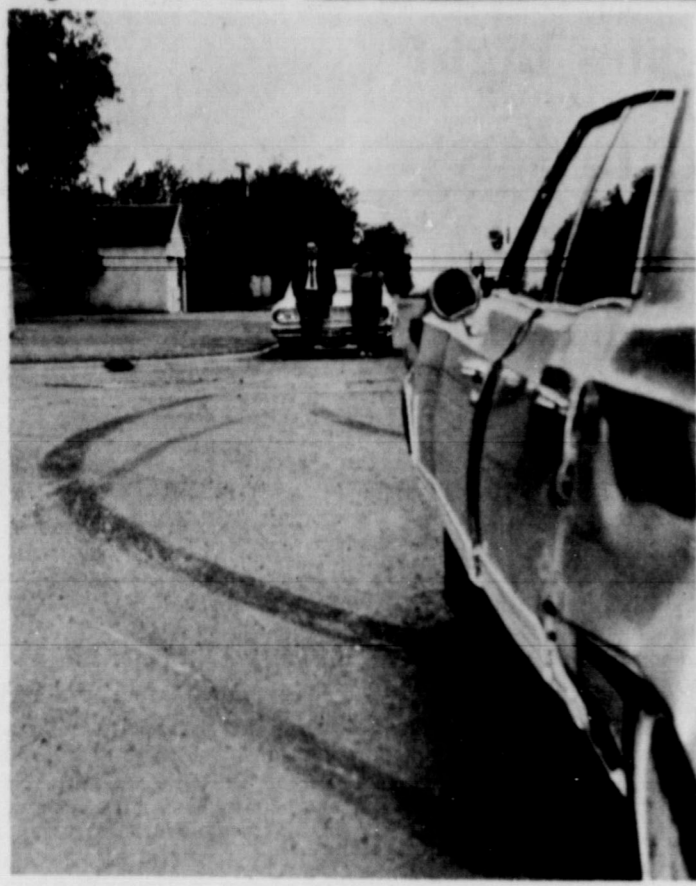

Chiefs, Light Hold Edge On Opponents

The Friona Chieftains hold a series advantage over just three of their 1967 opponents, but head coach Don Light holds personal edges over all but two of the teams since he has been coach of the Chiefs.

Friona holds a 6-3 lifetime edge over Bovina, a 5-3 advantage over Lockney and a 2-1 record over Abernathy. Of these, the latter two advantages have been gained since Light became coach at FHS in 1963.

Of the ten teams on the 1967 schedule, only Floydada and Hale Center hold rivalry advantages over Coach Light in the past four years, and both of these are scant 2-1 margins, each achieved by means of victories over the Chieftains in 1966.

Lockney held a 3-2 edge over Friona when Coach Light's team in 1964 met the Longhorns. Thanks to three straight wins the Chiefs now have the upper hand.

The 3-0 record against Lockney is Coach Light's best against any of the current opponents. He is 3-1 against rival Dimmitt, and 2-0 against Bovina, and 2-2 against Farwell. Dimmitt has the biggest lifetime advantage over Friona,

despite Coach Light's 3-1 personal mark. The Bobcats are 22-7-1 over Friona in games played since 1930.

Farwell holds a 19-12-1 advantage in games since 1928, counting two early games against the old Texico-Farwell consolidation, which they won.

Thanks to Friona's 12-8 win at Morton last season, the Chiefs cut the Indians' series lead to 6-4. Olton, which held a 4-0 record against Friona four years ago, now is within striking distance, with a 5-3 margin over Friona.

The box score is as follows, with the team's lifetime mark listed in the first column, followed by Coach Light's personal record against the team. The first figure listed in each case represents Friona wins, the second is opponents wins.

Patrol Investigates Eight County Wrecks In July

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Farmer County during the month of July, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,755.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1967 shows a total of 60 accidents resulting in three persons killed, 24 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$42,316.00. The Kind You Buy Is Never As Good - Teeth that is. More common, than all the most prevalent chrome diseases in tooth decay. It is neither dramatic nor fatal - it is a disease that does affect 95 per cent of our children in the nation, according to Department of Public Health.

WHAT CAUSES TOOTH DECAY? - 1. The susceptible individual - different people have degrees of susceptibility. These may be caused by heredity or result from nutritional influences during tooth development.

2. The oral bacteria - bacteria which exist in "tartar" on teeth - which produce acid strong enough to eat enamel and cause cavities.

3. The Diet-Food - particularly carbohydrates (starches and sugars) must accumulate in the mouth in order for tooth decay bacteria to grow. Frequency of eating sweets especially between meals, is an important factor.

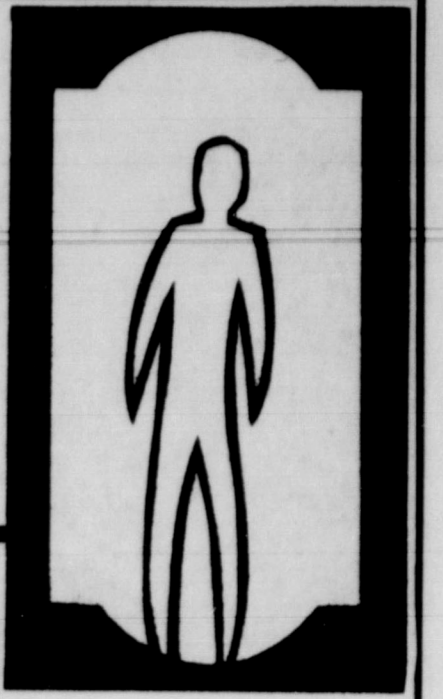
Edelmon Slates Lubbock Meet

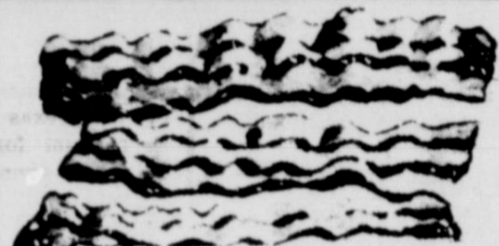

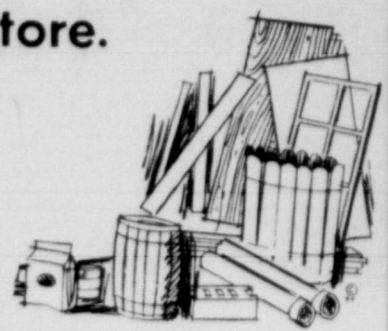

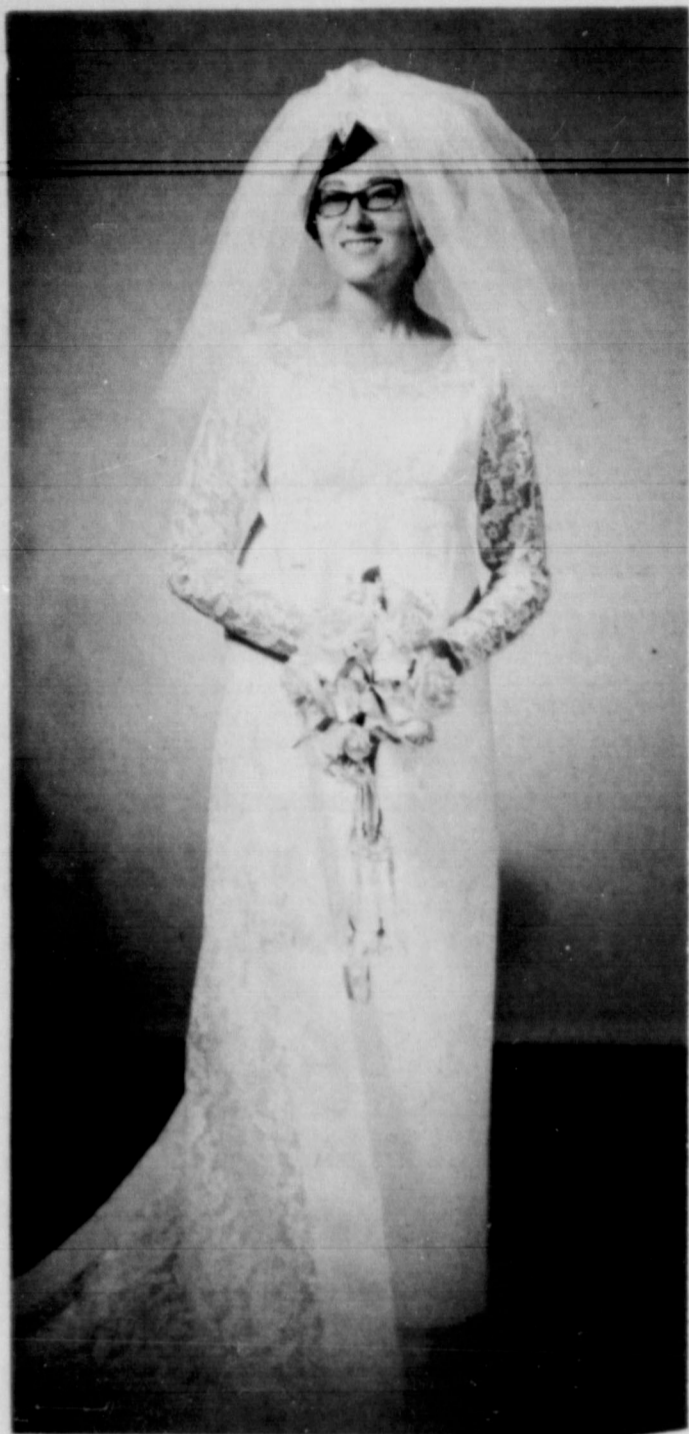

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchaser, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Farmer or University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price thereof, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, at such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above named and who at the time of this or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recording fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

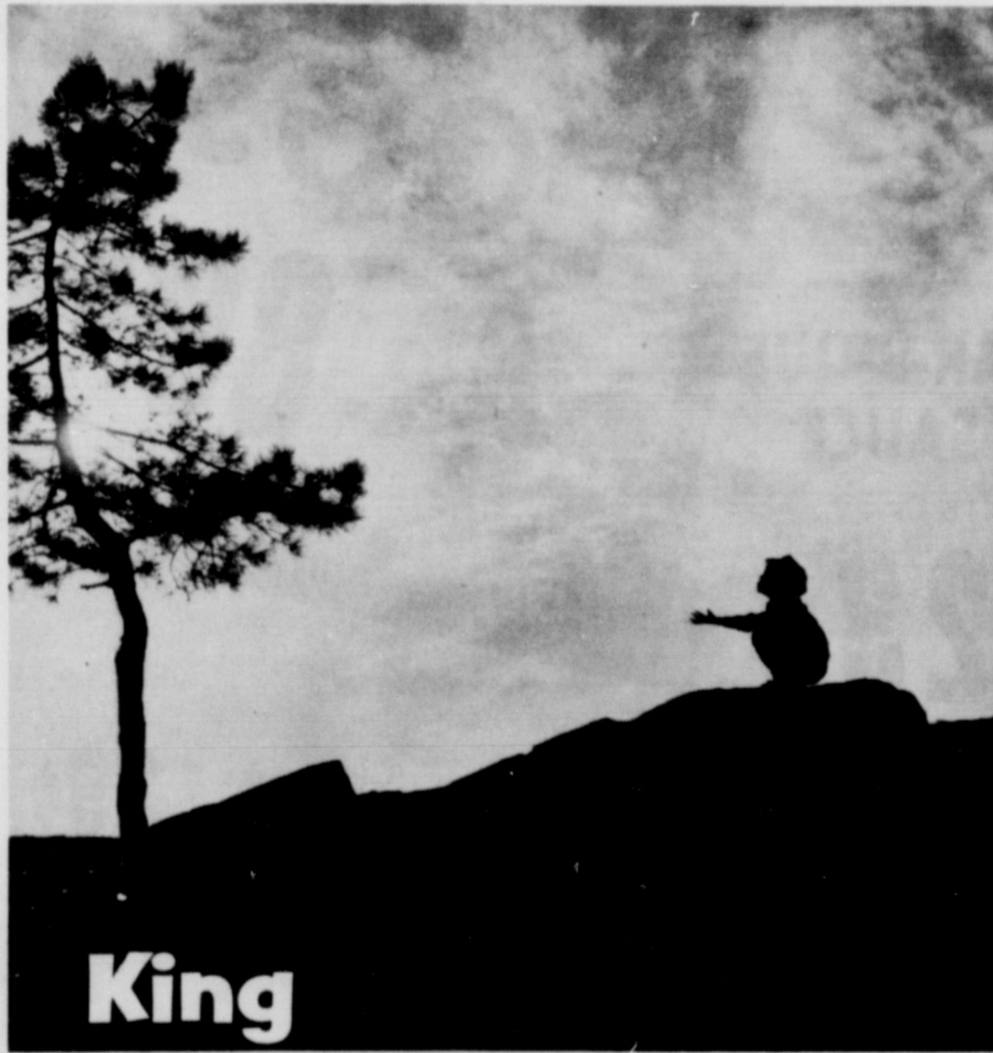

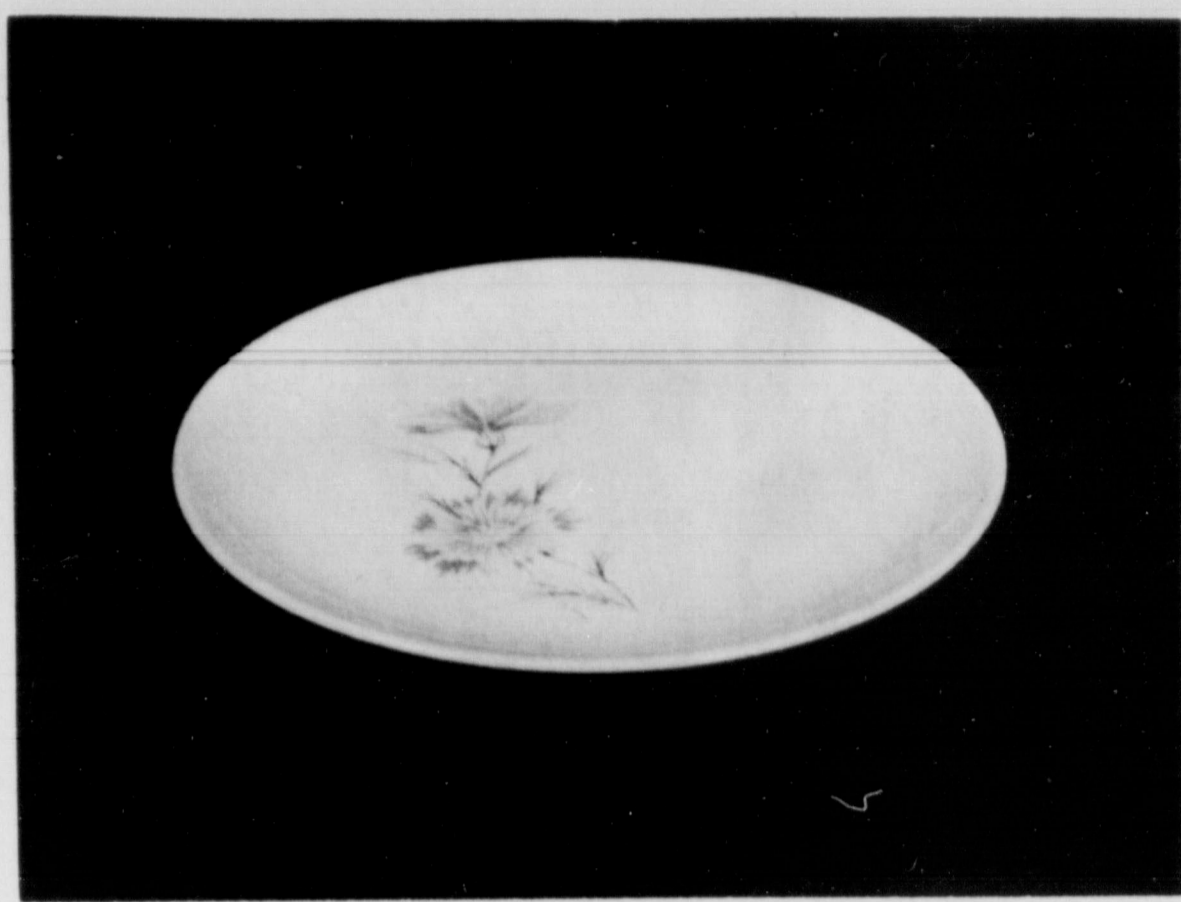

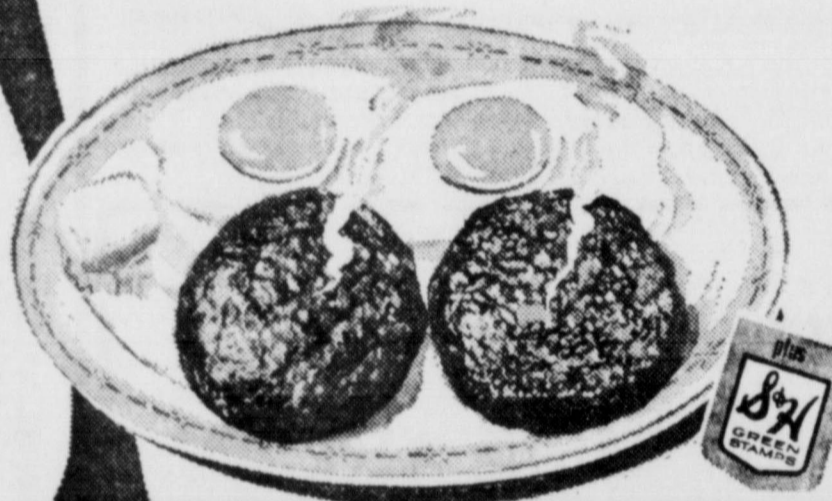
