SEATON WINS AGAIN

Lazbuddie Exhibitors Lead Stock Show Honors

Lazbuddie and Farwell exhibitors ran off with the top prizes in the 12th annual Farmer County Junior Livestock Show last Friday and Saturday, but winners from all four county communities were liberally sprinkled among the top placings in the show.

Mark Haseloff, only one of four non-Friona finalists in the steer division, gave Farwell 4-H the steer championship for the second straight year with his 932-pound heavyweight Hereford steer.

an 858-pound Hereford. Gary Phipps and Randy Campbell exhibited first-place light and medium heavyweight steers.

Twelve-year-old Rick Seaton exhibited the grand champion barrow for the third straight year, and also for three years running, it was a cross-bred barrow. Seaton's win was the eighth straight grand champion barrow for Lazbuddie entrants in the Friona show.

Lazbuddie showmen also dominated the top spots in the sheep division. In fact, Monte Barnes had the first-place lamb in both the Southdown and Medium Wool divisions. Lazbuddie's Pablo Mendoza had the champion fine wool entry.

Western "66" of Muleshoe bought the grand champion barrow for 90 cents per pound. Farmers Union Insurance of Lazbuddie was high bidder on the reserve champion.

Champion sheep were bought by Sherley Grain of Lazbuddie, Muleshoe State Bank and Foster Fertilizer, Lazbuddie.

Good premiums were paid for the animals. A total of \$22,831.48 was paid in prize money. Dale Hallows of Hereford was floor bidder on the sheep, while Clovis Hog Company bought the barrows and Friona Feed Yards bought the steers.

MISSOURI OFFICIALS HERE

Work Force Hiked At Mo. Beef Site

Twenty department heads from Missouri Beef Packers' Rock Port plant have been in Friona the past 10 days, giving assistance to the "finishing stages" of the corresponding departments in the Friona plant.

"We'll open between April 1 and April 15 -- and I think it will be closer to the first," said a company spokesman this week.

Missouri Beef's Rock Port plant has been crippled by a strike for the past three weeks, which was a major factor in enabling the 20 supervisors (about two thirds of the supervisors in the Missouri plant) to make the Friona trip.

A company spokesman said the differences in the Missouri strike had about been ironed out, but work had not resumed as of Tuesday.

Hereford Meeting To Air Beet Growing

Three men from the Extension Service of Texas A&M University will speak on subjects relating to growing sugar beets at the Hereford Community Center Thursday at 7:30 p.m. The Community Center is on Park Avenue in Hereford.

Dr. Robert Berry, extension plant pathologist, Lubbock, will speak on "Diseases and their control in sugar beets." Lyndon Almond, extension entomologist, Lubbock, will speak on "Sugar beet insects and their control -- and Beet leafhopper survey."

Dr. Arthur Onken, agronomist with the South Plains Research and extension center, Lubbock, will speak on "Fertilizer Research on Sugar Beets."

The three gentlemen will form a panel and answer questions at the conclusion of the program, which should be over by 9:30 p.m.

James W. Witherspoon, executive secretary of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association, Inc., and Justin McBride, agricultural agent of Deaf Smith County, urges all beet growers to attend the meeting.

The city council and Friona Independent School district elections will be held on the same day and at the same polling place this year, it was announced this week by school and city officials.

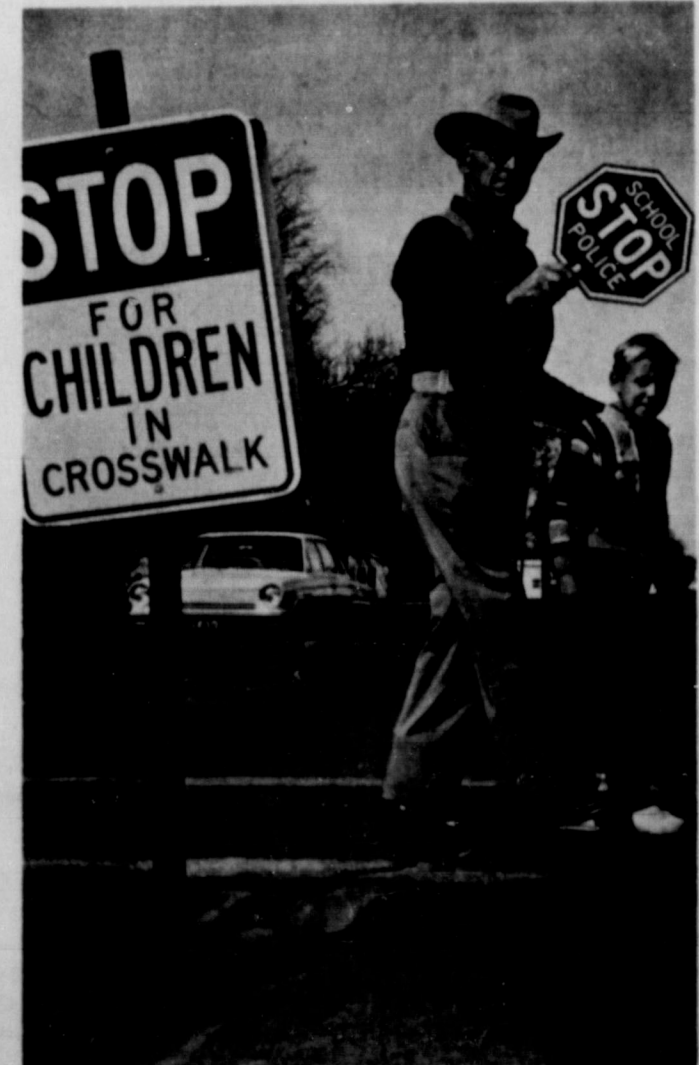
Thanks to a new law passed by the Texas Legislature, the two elections have been combined to make it more convenient for local voters.

Love will be one of 15 members of Boy Scout Troop 56 who will be honored in the court, receiving advancements all the way from Tenderfoot on up to the Eagle Scout level.

We think we've figured out what's wrong with our country today: We no longer have the 15-chapter movie serials.

We recalled this lost bit of Americana while readying for church Sunday morning. Our children were enjoying the cartoons on television, and when a full-length feature came on, we recognized it as one of the old serials, put together as a movie. I don't recall the name of the production when it appeared in serial form, but it centered around the "Purple Monster," an early-day invader from Mars who killed a scientist and took over his body.

Some 20 years earlier we recalled following the story from one episode to another -- hardly being able to wait from one Saturday afternoon to another to see how the hero was going to get out of the big trouble in which he was left at the end of the current chapter.

We thrilled through several of the serials at the old Valley Theatre in Muleshoe. It was the sort of thing that would make you not want to have to go on a weekend trip, because you'd miss the current week's serial episode.

And there were some good ones -- such as Batman (not to be confused with his modern jazzed-up counterpart on TV), Wild Bill Hickcock and the various jungle-based stories.

Wonder what happened to the serial makers? Suppose they, like the movie industry as a whole, were affected by television. In our opinion, American youth are poorer for not having the opportunity of following a serial through to its conclusion.

Just one of those things which progress killed, we suppose.

Next week's issue of the Friona Star will be a real collector's item, so for those of you who like to collect rare things, you might put one away.

It will, as far as we can tell, be the first paper the Star has published to be dated on February 29, -- at least since the paper has been published on Thursday.

This year being leap year, and February 1 falling on Thursday allows the Star to publish five papers during the month of February, and this doesn't happen often.

According to a fellow journalist who figured it up, this has only happened four times in the last 152 years. February 29 fell on a Thursday in 1816, 1844, 1872 and 1940. However, in 1940, the Star was published on Friday, so it missed that opportunity for the historic dateline.

And, after Thursday, it will be another long spell before the calendar makes the cycle. The situation will not present itself again until 1996.

Next Monday the Friona City Council will host a public hearing on the proposed one per cent city sales tax.

Two weeks ago at the city council meeting, City Manager Jake Outland outlined some eleven areas of needed city improvements, anticipating the city's growth, and indicated that in order to provide all of the improvements, either the sales tax or an increase in property tax revenue would have to result.

Included on the list of improvements were: an adequate water supply, extension of water-sewer utilities commensurate with city growth; additional police protection; 24-hour per day police dispatch and fire watch; additional employees.

Also, an incinerator and trash disposal system; extension to city hall building; a community center; library site and permanent building; extension of paved streets and new equipment, such as a street sweeper, a trash truck, a new backhoe, snow plow and water control system.

It will be to the advantage of all city taxpayers to attend the meeting next Monday, so as to get further information on the proposed tax, so they will better know how to cast their ballots on April 6.

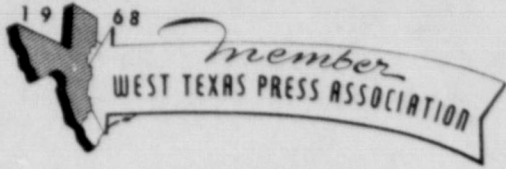

Pause And Reflect

"Criticism comes easier than craftsmanship" -- Zeuxis - 400 B.C.

Several years ago a famous writer saw fit to use some controversial material in a biography of George Washington. Publishing snide remarks concerning a person over a hundred years after his death when he is not around to defend himself, seems to this writer to be a foul blow.

Which one of us cannot find in his own life thoughts and actions of which he is not proud? With this in mind let us look at a few well established facts that bear remembering and thereby present a small bouquet to the Father of our Country on this 236th anniversary of his birth.

He earned a surveyor's licenses when he was 16 years of age. He laid out the route of the Kawana canal that connected Richmond and the western part of Virginia. Mules, walking along the bank, pulled barges loaded with merchandise to the back country stores. The barges floated back down the streams bringing the mules and much needed farm products to the cities.

Surveyors were scarce and their wages high. By the time young George was 21 years old he owned several large tracts of land.

Washington's compassion for others is demonstrated by his having accompanied his half brother Lawrence, who was ill, to the Barbadoes in the West Indies. The trip was in vain as Lawrence died of tuberculosis shortly thereafter.

After his marriage to Martha Dandridge Custis, a wealthy young widow with two children, Washington became known as a devoted parent.

In later years he helped rear and educate no fewer than 22 young relatives.

As a farmer, Washington's shrewdness in matters of soil conservation and crop rotation allowed him to become a millionaire while his neighbors were going broke.

During his correspondence with Thomas Jefferson, the question arose concerning the number of seeds in a bushel of popular grain crops. Washington settled the matter by having weighed bushels of various grains brought and poured on his study table. He then counted the seeds one by one as they were returned to the hamper.

When heavy rains washed Mt. Vernon's topsoil down hill he sent men with teams and wagons to haul it back to the fields. At the start of the Revolutionary War, after peace talks, treaties, and co-existence had failed, he personally hired and equipped 1000 soldiers for battle.

He would take no pay as either general or president. Thirty years ago this month I walked thru Valley Forge Pa., Snow lay over the area just as it had during that fateful winter of 1777-1778 when our Colonial army was held together by the prayers and will power of one great American. The snow I saw was clean and white, the bleeding feet of half starved patriots had long since marched into history.

Twenty five years ago I stood for the first time in his pew in Bruton Parrish Church at Williamsburg, Virginia. Last summer I was privileged to return and thrilled at the sight of my young daughter appreciating a similar experience.

A visit to Mt. Vernon should be a Mecca for every American. Halfway from the Manor to the river there is a small forest of enormous trees, and it is under this canopy that George and Martha Washington await eternity. Here quiet prevails. A bird calls from high above, a breeze ruffles the ivy clinging to the mellow red brick.

None but the most hardened of heart and calloused of soul could fail to be awed by the surroundings.

The tomb faces the river and as the broad Potomac rolls forever on to join the waters of the seven seas, so does our Nation advance to take its place among the peoples of the earth.

May it's position be one of honor as it was designed to be by this silent watcher and his contemporaries.

George Washington's personal life, his political and military careers are a matter of public record. A record that will stand as a shining example of patriotism and statesmanship long after the scornful words of his critics have moldered and returned to the dust of forgetfulness.

Draft Boards Asked For High March Draft Quota

State draft boards are being called upon in March to furnish the largest monthly quota of men for the armed forces in nearly two years, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service Director, said Thursday.

Local board quotas for March are set up to provide 1,948 men. The quota for local board number 18 in Hereford is 24 for examinations and 14 for induction.

Four men were inducted into

the Army by Local Board #18 during February. They were Mario A. Espinoza, Bovina; Raul A. Barraza, Farwell; Antonio Rodriguez, Dimmit and Cecil D. Ward, Hart.

The March quota is the largest monthly quota for the state since November of 1966, when the call was for 2,012 men. During the period of 17 months between these quotas, the low point was a call for 674 in February of 1967.

FPC Approval For Pipeline Service

News has just been received that approval has been received from the Federal Power Commission allowing 178 farmers to purchase gas from a new source.

Expansion of the Federal Power Commission authority for Plains Gas Farmers' Co-operative Society and Tri County Gas Inc., to purchase gas from Transwestern Pipeline Company for 26.5¢ per mcf and from El Paso Pipeline Company for 22.4¢ per mcf, was made final February 16, 1968, when Pioneer Natural Gas Company chose not to file an appeal to the Circuit Court of Appeals from the order issued December 14, 1967.

D.L. Carmichael, President of Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association states, "This is a major breakthrough for farmers in securing cheaper agricultural gas."

Castro and Parmer County farmers are in the process of ordering metering equipment to get approximately 174 wells tied on to 9 additional taps gained from Transwestern Pipeline Company. Approximately 150 wells in Lamb County are being prepared for connection to two taps onto El Paso Pipeline Company.

Four major pipelines cross the Panhandle and South Plains offer new sources of gas. In addition to Transwestern and El Paso, Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America crosses Castro, Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties with a 24" pipeline and Northern Natural Gas Pipeline Company crosses Lubbock, Hale, Swisher and Armstrong

Counties. "This assures eventual competition in securing natural gas for irrigation," pointed out Carmichael.

The original order of the Federal Power Commission granting Plains Gas Farmers the authority to purchase gas from Transwestern was issued February 16, 1965, and service was connected June 15, 1965, to four group lines serving 87 wells.

The expansion order makes possible 178 West Texas farmers to purchase irrigation gas at reduced prices, and fixes a precedent for other farmers to secure gas from competing sources.

The Parmer County Gas Users Assn. will discuss this development at a meeting at Hub Thursday Feb. 29, 8 p.m.

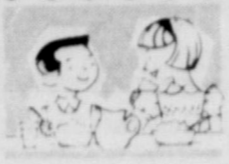

FHA Loans Hit \$522, 330 In Parmer County

Emergency loans totaling \$522,330, have been made by the Parmer County Office of the Farmers Home Administration since July 1, 1967, to help local farmers and ranchers recover from natural disasters, Billy R. Boling County Supervisor reported today.

Boling said Parmer County was designated by Secretary of Agriculture Freeman as an area in which emergency loans could be made by the Farmers Home Administration to eligible farmers and ranchers because of the freeze damage, hail, and drought.

One hundred and ninety-three counties have been designated by Secretary Freeman as areas needing an emergency credit source. As of December 31, 1967, over 2,300 emergency loans for nearly \$14.25 million have been made in Texas.

In fiscal year 1967 over 4,100 emergency loans for around \$27 million were made in Texas.

The program provides a standby source of credit for farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain emergency credit elsewhere. Repayment schedules vary according to purposes for which funds were advanced.

Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

For the adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session,

Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called and shall be given; (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within the said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election, and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in elec-

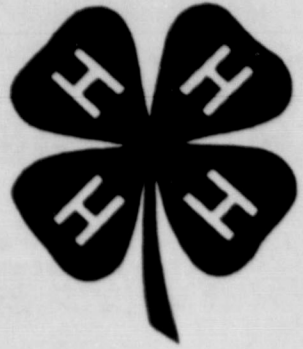

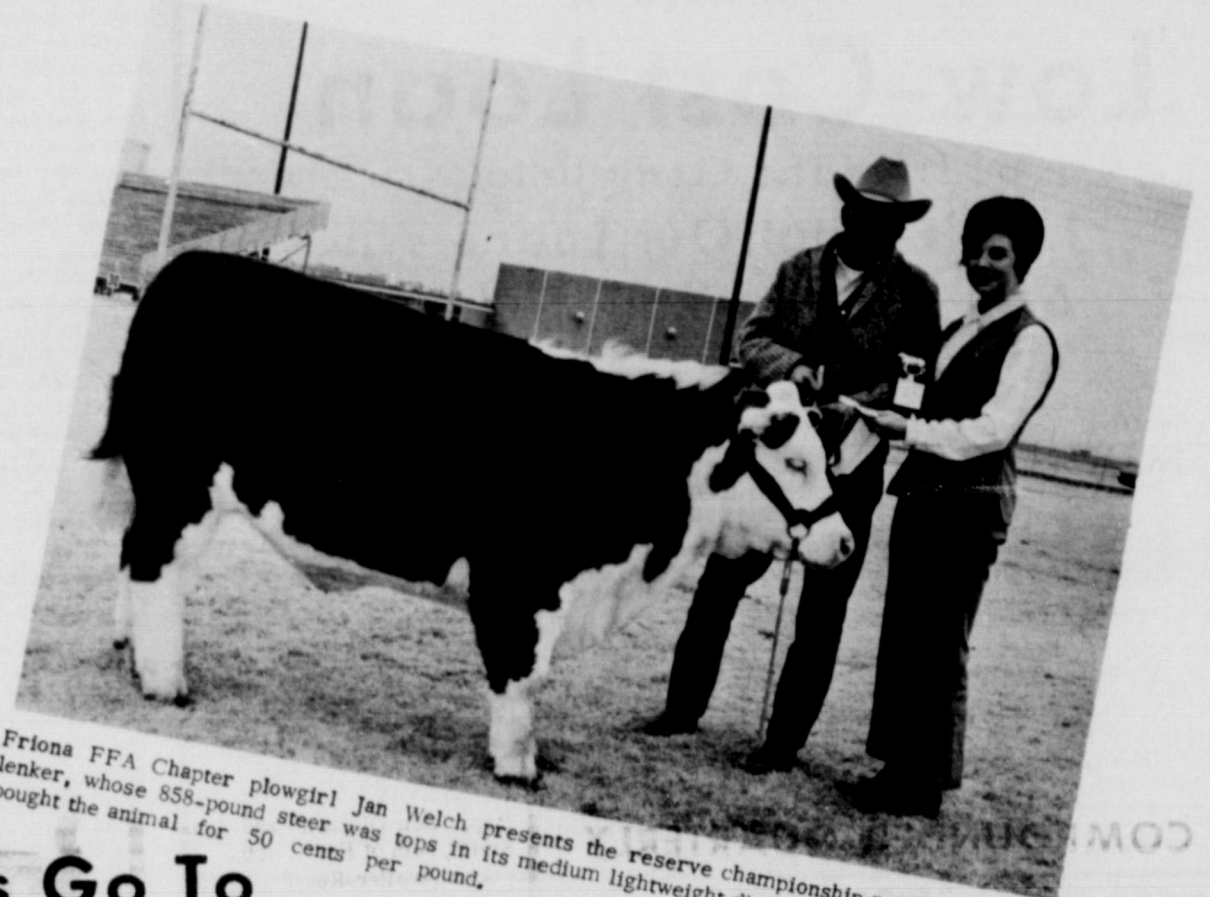

New Connections On Increase

Eight new water taps were made by the City of Friona during the month of January, bringing the number of active services at the end of the month to 1081, it was revealed this week.

In his monthly summary of city records, City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland reported that a total of 9,152,000 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 295,242 gallons per day. This was down for the third consecutive month.

Moisture recorded during the month amounted to 1.37 inches, with most of this coming in the form of a good soaking rain January 20-24.

Nine new sewer taps were made during the month, bringing this total to 1023. Sixteen stoppages were cleared from service lines and mains during the month.

The city's consulting engineer visited the plant during the month, checked operations during the drawing of sludge, and reported it to be in excellent operating conditions.

Only two fire alarms were sounded during the month - resulting in estimated damage of \$100 to West Frion Grain and \$25 at Missouri Beef Packers.

Police Department records showed that there were 20 arrests during January; 11 for traffic violations, four for traffic warrants, two on drunkenness, one each for liquor violation, check violation and vagrancy.

Eight automobile accidents were investigated with no injuries, five disturbances were investigated, three thefts and one prowler.

Regularly-scheduled sanitation runs were made by both trash trucks during the month. Mud in alleys hampered efforts the third week.

The remainder of the library furniture arrived and was installed January 10. Openhouse at the library was held Saturday, January 27. Sixty-seven guests were registered, and many expressed appreciation of the newly-established facility.

Patrol Investigates 8 Wrecks During January

Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, 10 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,815,000.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months, approximately 2,000,000 or 35 percent of the approximately 5,750,000 registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This

leaves 3,750,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months.

The Sergeant reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law there will be additional inspection this year including: steering, wheels and rims, and front seat belts where the anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period may find that they will need to install seat belts. With the last minute rush, there may not be enough seat belts kits to take care of the demand.

Care Urged In Preparing Forms

"When will I get my refund?" This is one of the questions most frequently asked by North Texas taxpayers, District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., observed today.

He said that thousands of refund checks are returned to Internal Revenue every year because the postman cannot deliver them.

Illegible names or addresses cause many refund checks to be returned undelivered. This can be avoided by carefully PRINTING or TYPING your name, address and zip code in the proper place on the return, and entering your correct social security number in the space provided, Mr. Campbell said.

If you move after you file your return, leave your forwarding address with the Post Office. It is also a good idea to send your new address to the Internal Revenue Service.

General Telephone Co. Tells Expansion Plans

General Telephone of the Southwest in 1968 expects to spend \$45,400,000 for construction to improve and expand its telephone facilities located in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, it has been announced by E.H. Danner, president of the company which merged in January with Southwestern States Telephone Company.

This budgeted amount will include expenditures for replacing central offices which provide local telephone facilities; additions to present central office facilities to take care of anticipated growth; providing Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) service to 15 exchanges; construction of microwave facilities; projects to provide additional facilities between exchanges permitting expanded calling scopes for local dialing or long distance dialing; projects to permit improvements in rural service areas; and projects placing underground cable.

Danner said that the 1968 construction budget compares with just under \$42,000,000 actual gross expenditures on construction by General Telephone and Southwestern States during 1967.

It is anticipated that the 1968 construction program, along with 1968 advertising and sales efforts, will bring about a net gain of 42,900 telephones during 1968. This compares with an actual net gain during 1967 of 34,800.

Other plans for 1968 designed to improve operations and thus give better customer service include establishment of a central ticket investigating (CTI) bureau in the general offices in San Angelo which will provide the company and customers with the latest in techniques for investigating questioned long distance charges. The program, begun in January, will be phased into operation during the next 18 months.

Another highlight of 1968 operations will be the introduc-

tion of Touch Calling service in four exchanges. Touch Calling enables customers to "dial" other telephones and to access computers by pushing numbered buttons on a telephone instead of using the more traditional telephone with dial.

However 1967, was not without milestones, Danner commented. Great strides were made in 1967 toward reorganizing the company from a division/district set up to an area/division organization and toward total legal merging into one operation General Telephone Company of the Southwest and Southwestern States Telephone Company.

The new area reorganization, which was completed on January 1, 1968, gives us five area offices. These offices are headed by area managers, John E. Robbins, Jr. at Brownwood; Harry B. Elam at Texarkana; W.A. Leigon at Brownfield; and D.H. (Speck) Dunaway whose offices are in Irving until a new area office building is ready for occupancy at Lewisville; and R.E. Shirey whose offices are in Robstown until location of a Southern area office is announced.

The legal merger of the two companies became effective Jan. 10, 1968, and added more than 242,000 telephones to the more than 466,000 already served by General Telephone and gave the surviving company, General of the Southwest, more than 708,600 in the five state area of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Other highlights of 1967 involved providing DDD networks in the San Angelo, Denton, and Broken Arrow areas and expanding the calling scope of the Baytown area to include the Houston Central Zone.

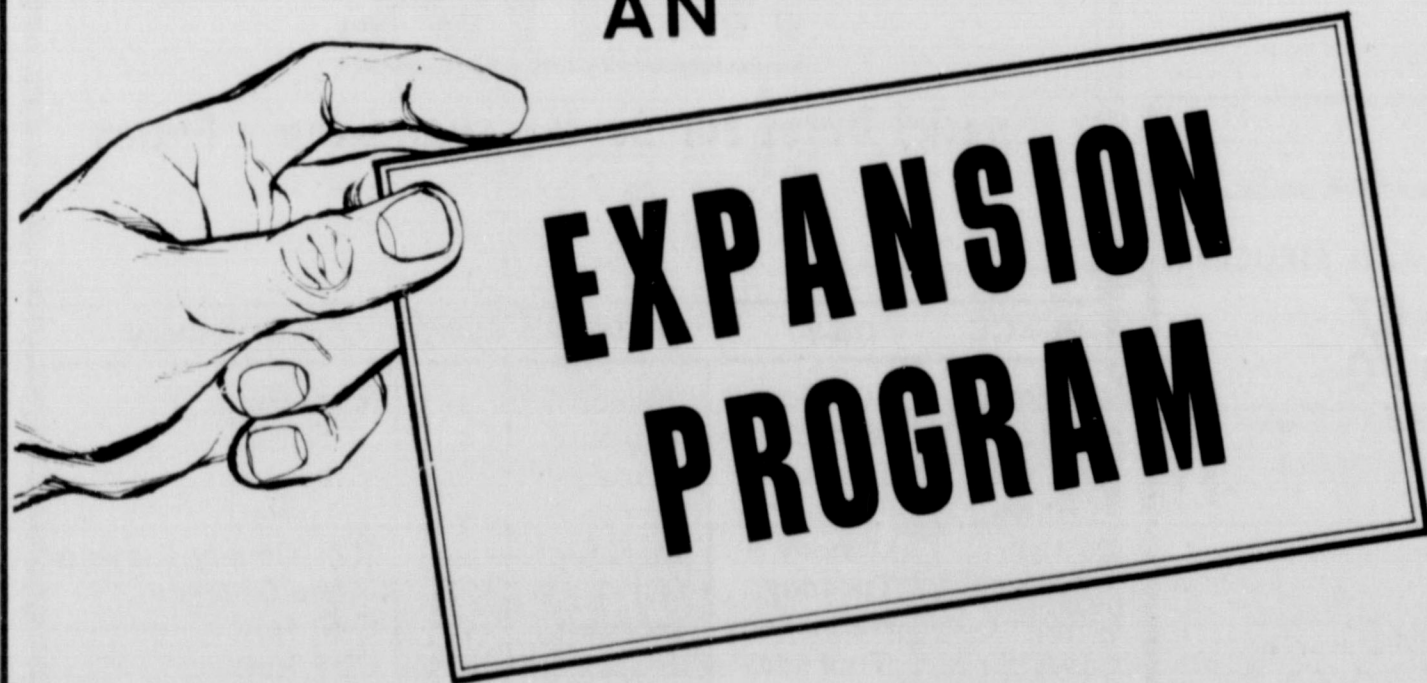

Cotton Planting Should Increase For This Year

A spot check of five county offices at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service shows that the first 1050 producers to sign up for the 1968 cotton program will plant an average of 72 per cent of their cotton allotments.

Office managers of the five counties however, were quick

to point out to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., who ran the survey, that this probably cannot be taken as an indication of final planting percentages. First, they note that this small number constitutes only about 10 per cent of the farmers in these counties.

They also theorize that producers who plan to divert the maximum 35 per cent of allotments are the ones most likely to sign up first.

Farmers can get half their acreage diversion payments in advance if they so request at sign up time, and these advance payments will be larger for those who elect the highest diversion percentage.

Mandatory diversion in the 1968 program is only 5 per cent of allotments, therefore producers who choose that route are eligible for very small advance payments.

For this reason most are expecting that the farmers signing up in the latter part of the period, which extends to March 15, will show a higher percentage who intend to plant the maximum allowable acreage.

The counties checked were Lubbock, Lamb, Floyd, Hockley and Lynn. Included were only those farmers who had completed signing up through February 7.

With producers in 1968 given the option to plant anywhere from 65 to 95 per cent of the cotton allotments, cotton observers have estimated that between 75 and 85 per cent of the cotton acreage on the Plains will be planted.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Results were recently received from a nitrogen fertilizer time of application study on milo conducted in 1967 by Bushland Experiment Station. The study is being conducted on the John Christian farm located three miles east of Farwell on an Amarillo Fine Sandy Loam soil. This study is a three-year trial which was started in 1966.

Purpose of this trial is to demonstrate the effect on milo yields of different rates and time of application of nitrogen.

The 1967 results are similar to the 1966 results. The later the nitrogen was applied, the higher the yield. The split application (1/2 nitrogen after bedding and 1/2 side-dressed) was not as good as the treatment receiving all the nitrogen side-dress. There is some advantage to side-dressing over applying the nitrogen just prior to planting. The split application treatment was about the same as the preplant application.

Results indicate that it would be more economical to fertilize as a side-dress only; thus, eliminating a trip over to split the application. In 1967 it is doubtful that it paid to apply more than 80 to 100 pounds of nitrogen for this particular year and soil.

The check plot in 1967 on this trial yielded 3780 pounds while the highest yields were received on the side-dress application. Side-dress yields ranged from 7197, 7272 and 7543 lbs. from the following amount of nitrogen, 80, 120, and 160 lbs. per acre.

FERTILIZER LONG TIME STUDY TRIAL

Keith Brock, who farms 3 north and 3 west of Friona, has cooperated with the Bushland Experiment Stations the past two years to determine rates of N, P, and K that will give best yields on milo. Also broadcast versus band application and micronutrient responses are also being studied.

Results from the 1967 trials have just recently been completed. Results show that nitrogen alone gave an increase of approximately 1,000 pounds of grain. 160 pounds of nitrogen in combination with 80 pounds of phosphate gave an increase of approximately 4,200 pounds of grain over the check. Increasing rates of nitrogen alone didn't do much toward increasing yields. In 1967, 40 pounds of phosphate was sufficient when applied with 40 to 80 pounds of nitrogen, but with 120 and 160 pounds of nitrogen, 80 pounds of phosphate was necessary for maximum yields. It appears that the most profitable level was the 160-80-0 rate treatment.

Potash did not increase yields and apparently decreased yields in some treatments at the 80 pound level. Banding nitrogen compared to broadcast made no difference. Sulfur or iron did not increase yields this year.

Keep in mind that this trial was conducted on a Pullman Clay Loam soil.

Skip-Row Water Helps Cotton

Lint year was increased 27 pounds per acre (760 pounds to 787 pounds) and micronutrients increased from 3.1 to 3.5 when cotton was irrigated every other row as compared to solid irrigated cotton. Based on loan price, this meant an increase in return of \$9.60 per acre, but when calculated using the January 8, 1968 market price, returns were increased \$23.95 per acre.

Additional benefits of the every other row irrigation were reduced irrigation requirements and reduced pumping costs. However, the most significant result of this study was that the 3.5 micronutrient cotton produced by the every other

row irrigation was more marketable.

Detailed procedures and results of this study may be seen in the 1967 Annual Report of the Foundation.

The first sewing class to complete the sewing course is Farwell. Bovina group will have its last class next week. Fitting problems seem to be high on the list as the most needed learning experience. A well-fitted dress is really the key to smartness. The fitting points that mark the difference between one that fits the individual and one that does not are emphasized and corrected for each on a basic pattern. Smooth fit, without wrinkles, and distortion of design yet comfortable is the objective.

NEW BULLETINS

Several new bulletins have been received and are now available (free) to the public in the Extension office for those interested in gardening. Two are: "Indoor Gardens for Decorative Plants," and another "Spring Flowering Bulbs." Just looking at these can start "spring fever," with me; want to start digging in the yard. Another interesting bulletin is on "Flowering Crabapples."

TIPS FOR HOME FREEZING Do not overcook foods that are to be frozen. Foods to

be reheated before serving are best if only partially cooked. Use as little fat as possible in gravies and sauces. Fats have a tendency to separate. Fried foods may become rancid after 1-2 months of storage. Pepper gets stronger during storage, so use seasonings sparingly. Remember, the nutritive value of properly frozen food is nearly equal to that of fresh food. A storage table for high quality home-frozen meats and poultry at 0 degrees F:

Pork, fresh	3-8 months

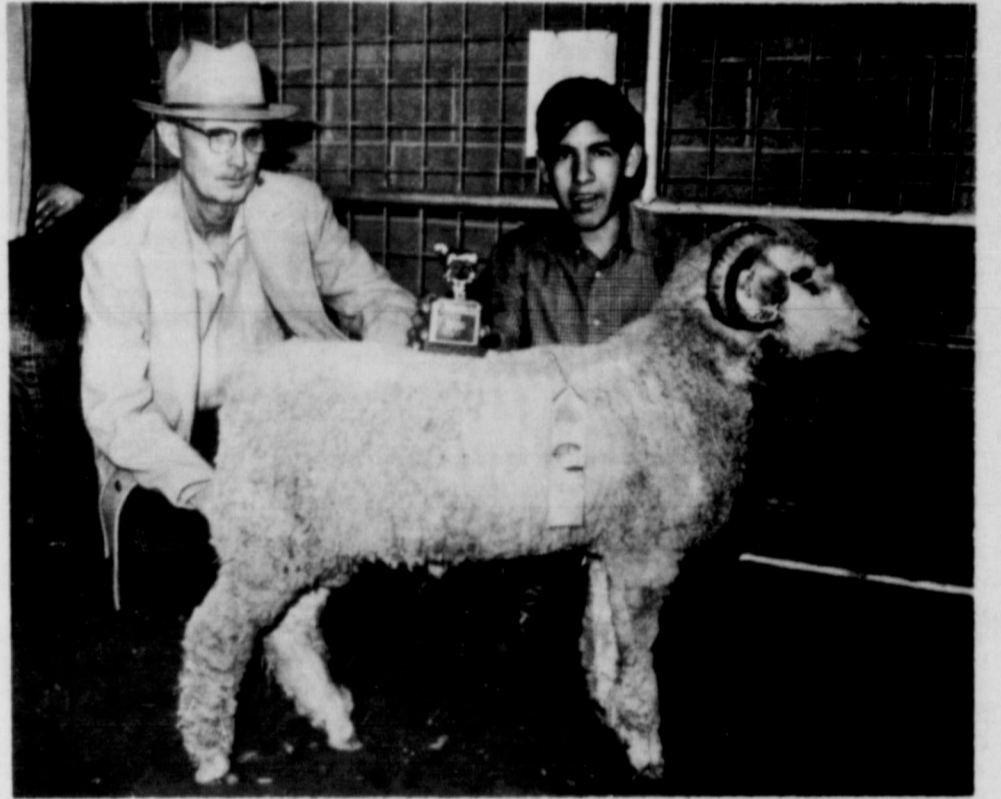

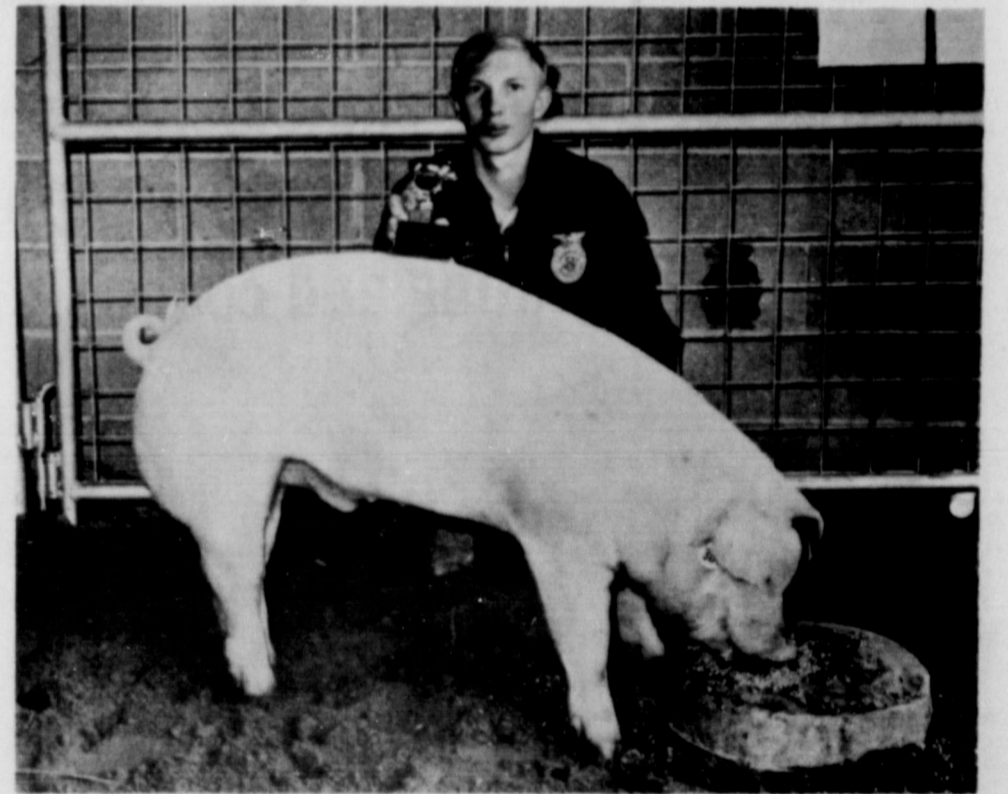
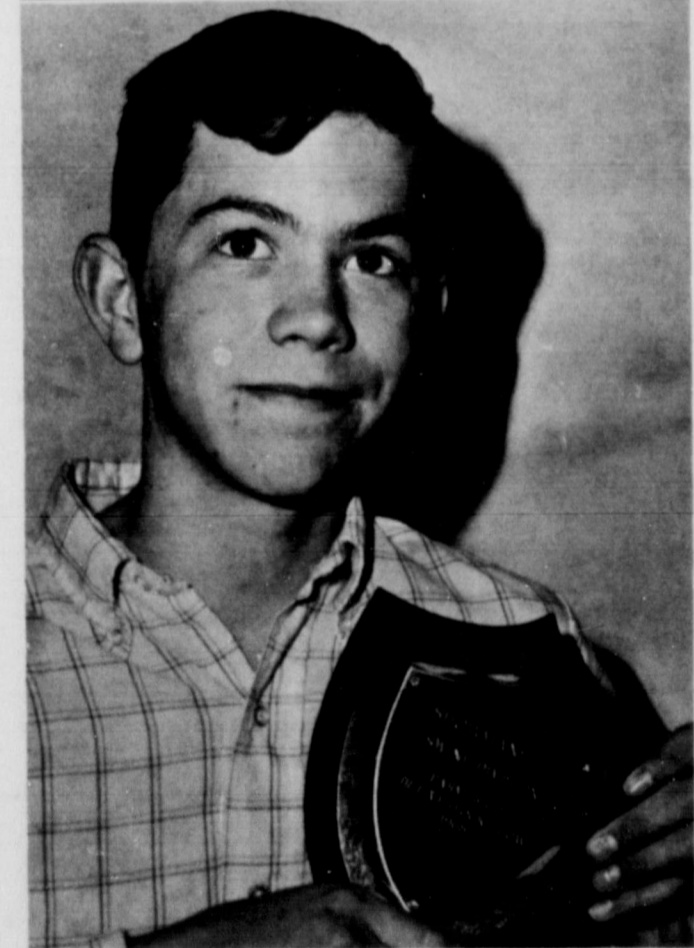

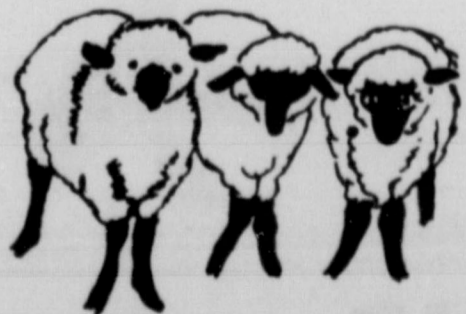

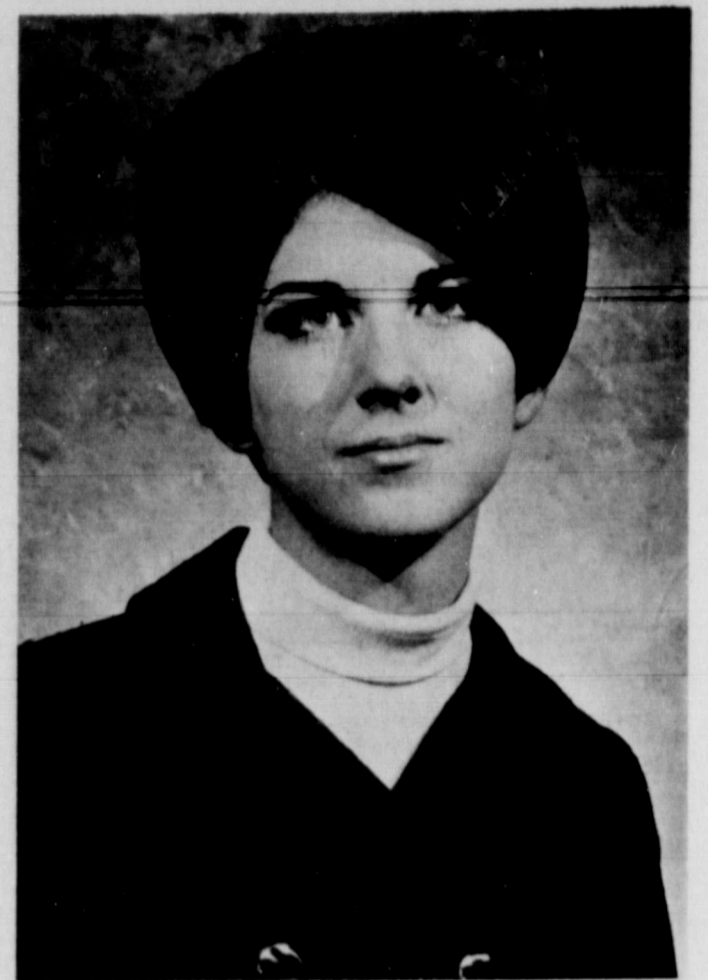
For travel Mrs. Muse chose an ivory knit costume suit and orchid accessories.

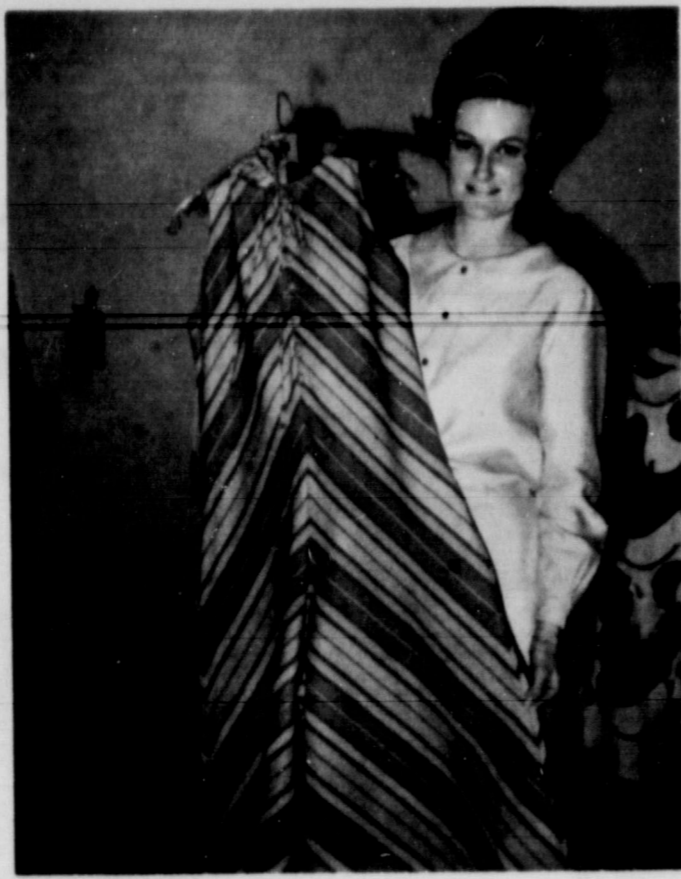

A bar of mild soap; paper drinking cups; flashlight (with working batteries); syrup of ipecac to induce vomiting; essential personal prescriptions; first aid guide book.
