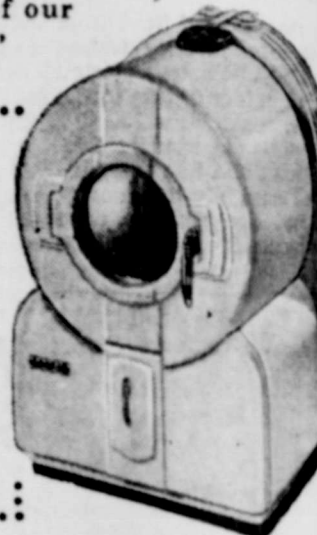

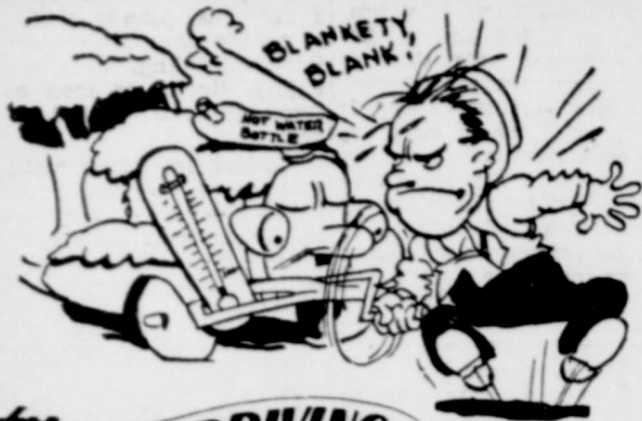

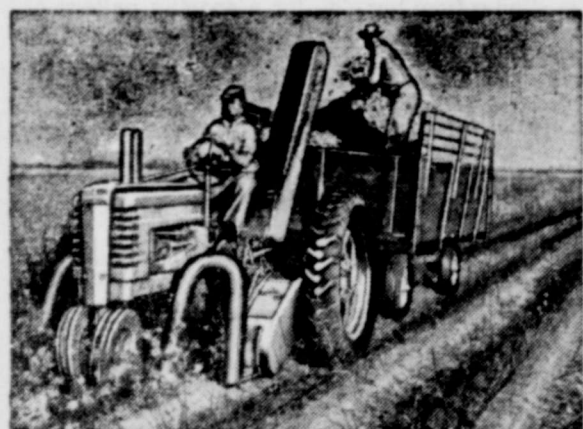

Grazing, Roughage and Protein Can Supply Much of Stock Feed Needs

Full, efficient use of pastures and roughages is cited by livestock specialists as the key to high production of meat and milk in spite of the scarcity of feed grain this season.

Temporary and permanent pastures, supplemented with home-grown roughages and protein concentrates, can supply a large proportion of the feed requirements of livestock. Pastures also aid soil conservation and, in many cases, provide additional feed and income from grain and roughage harvested after the grazing season.

Proper rates of stocking, mowing of unpalatable weeds, use of barnyard manure and fertilizers where adapted, and selection of livestock that can make the most profitable use of grazing are practices that help to make pastures of maximum value.

Grazing animals need dry roughage, obtained from hay, cottonseed hulls, bundle feed, straw or stalk fields. Keeping dry roughage available increases the value of grazing and livestock efficiency. Livestock on good pasture will often eat coarse, unpalatable roughage, thereby saving grazing; but the usefulness of such roughages usually may be increased by grinding or chopping and adding molasses. Silage is most profitably used when good pasture is not available.

"It is deeply regretted that it has become necessary to close the VA contact offices on Saturdays, but under Civil Service regulations our work-week has been limited to 40 hours," Sisson said.

Protein concentrates, such as cottonseed meal or cake, increase value of pasture, and often make it possible to maintain production, growth and desired rates of fattening with a minimum, or no grain feeding. Protein concentrates are especially important in fall and winter, when pastures become short and low in protein.

Satisfactory finish, of the type recommended this season to save grain, may be obtained on good pasture if yearlings and older cattle receive all of the roughage they will eat and 4 to 6 pounds, daily per head, of cottonseed meal or cake.

Creep-feeding of calves is especially desirable this season to save grain while securing rapid, economical gains. Creep-fed calves may receive cottonseed cake in a self-feeder, or be hand-fed 1 to 3 pounds daily, the amount depending on the age of calf, the amount of milk received from the cow, and the condition of available grazing.

Scarce grain should not be fed to the beef breeding herd, which can be carried through the winter economically on grazing, dry roughage or silage, and protein concentrate. Breeding cows need 1 to 5 pounds of cottonseed meal, cake or pellets daily, depending on the amount and quality of grazing; and 10 to 15 pounds of dry roughage. Silage may replace dry roughage at the rate of 3 pounds of silage for 1 pound of dry roughage.

A grain-saving, simple mixture for producing dairy cows on good pasture consists of 100 pounds of cottonseed meal, 100 pounds of ground ear corn or sorghum head chops, and 200 pounds of chopped grass hay, ground bundles or cottonseed hulls. When grazing is short, increase the amount of cottonseed meal in the mixture to 200 pounds. Cottonseed hulls or other non-legume roughage should always be available, free choice.

When grazing is very short, 3 pounds of good green legume hay should be fed to provide vitamin A. The mixtures may be fed at the rate of 1 pound for each 2½ pounds of milk produced by Jerseys or Guernseys, or 1 pound for each 3 pounds of milk produced by Holsteins and other breeds.

Children Should Be Immunized For Diphtheria

AUSTIN—All children should be immunized against diphtheria at a very early age, according to a statement on the subject released this week by the Texas State Department of Health, explaining that toxoid, which can be administered easily and without danger, can safeguard youngsters against this serious and killing disease of childhood.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges all Texas parents to have their children, who are not already protected, immunized at once.

"The administration of toxoid can save a child from serious illness or even death and those who have not been safeguarded against this danger should be inoculated immediately," Dr. Cox said.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who enter school or kindergarten this year without this additional safeguard or without ever having been immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared.

Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

Southwest farm markets maintained generally firm to higher trends last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Grain markets reached new high levels and remained strong throughout the week. Principal strengthening factors included unfavorable condition of the winter wheat crop, short European supplies, and rapidly diminishing domestic feed grains needed for the coming heavy winter feeding season. Texas wheat closed Friday at \$3.27 1/2.

Activity in southwest cotton markets continued brisk during the week. Farmers offered freely in most sections, as prices advanced around \$7.50 per bale.

Eggs and poultry sold steady to firm the past week in good holiday demand. Current receipt eggs brought 47 to 50 cents per

dozen at Dallas and Fort Worth and a little more at Denver and New Orleans. Most markets bought turkeys close to support levels. Heavy hens brought mostly 24 to 26 cents but New Orleans paid 30.

Cattle sold generally steady to 50 cents higher compared to a week earlier, the only notable exception being a net loss of 25 to 50 cents at Denver on steers and yearlings, which continued scarce at all markets. Common and medium cows brought from \$12 to \$15 at Texas markets, and \$14 to \$17 at Oklahoma City. Denver paid \$15 to \$19.50 for common to good kinds. Canners and cutters moved at \$9.50 to \$12.50 at Texas markets and up to \$13.50 at other southwest terminals.

Hogs lost 25 to 50 cents per hundred for the week at most southwest markets, but Oklahoma City netted a little gain.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Rumors that surplus war material will be moved to a central location are unfounded and remaining stocks will be disposed of at present sites by location sales, it was announced by C. B. Rucker, zone administrator for Zone 5, War Assets Administration, which includes Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. It was added that as stocks are disposed of reduction in the number of employees will also be made but not to an extent that sales will suffer nor that any community will be unable to purchase surplus property. Mr. Rucker added that these plans will be completed within the next five months and are in line with War Assets Administration national policy of selling itself out of business.

Approximately \$150,000 worth of general merchandise will go on war surplus sale at the Red River Arsenal near Texarkana December 10, 11 and 12. Location clearance officials of the Grand Prairie War Assets Administration office announced that materials at the arsenal will be lotted up to include a half carload of auto tires, a small quantity of shop tools, clothing items such as guard uniforms, overcoats, skirts, lap robes, raincoats, and pillows, and miscellany such as X-ray development liquid, hardwood snatch blocks, a blitz can, time card rack and paper boxes and cartons. Informal bidding on a non-priority basis will be conducted at WAA's sales warehouse

at the arsenal from 8:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., December 10 and 11, with the awards to be announced at 9 a. m., December 12.

Assorted quantities of safety and recreational equipment, hardware and textiles, located at Killeen, Texarkana and San Antonio, Texas, are for sale on a seal bid basis until December 9 to priority groups and commercial channels through the Customer Service Center of the Grand Prairie War Assets Administration office. Included are box lockers, tackle blocks, sprockets, barracks and duffle bags, saddles, harness, compasses, fire extinguishers, dies, winter flying gloves, shelter half tents, cotton pillows, sun glasses and many other items.

Selling surplus government buildings at the rate of 500 per hour on the last day of a three-day sale at Camp Bowie is a factor toward heading 3,000 acres of land back to agricultural uses. More than 4,000 buildings were sold by War Assets Administration in a successful, whirlwind sales effort at this well known war time army camp. Many of

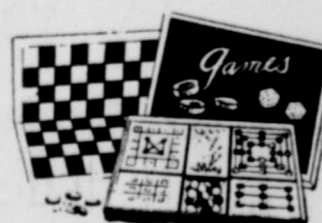

Now Is Time To Start Controlling Cattle Grubs

Clarence Moore, 4-H club boy in Morton community, is contemplating in the near future to get rid of the cattle grub in his 4-H Club Feeder Calves. It is now time for all 4-H boys feeding out beef calves to get those grubs. The grub is a pest caused from heel flies and it works in under the skin on the calves back in its final stages; which makes the beef calf harder to fatten, ruins the hide and cuts down on the milk cows production.

Do this control work at three thirty day intervals before spring whether you spray or dust or dip. On Club calves County Agent Homer E. Thompson recommends the use of a power spray or rub it in with a brush. Spray 3 and 3/4 pounds of 5 percent rotenone to fifty gallons of water. If the dust is used mix one part 5 percent rotenone powder with two parts of Pyrophyllite or tripoli earth. Rub out three or four ounces in each animal's back. Do a thorough job of rubbing. This will be preferable to the spray on a cold day.

If a spray is used, apply it in the morning when the sun is shining. In other words pick a warm day advises the County Agent. You ranchers and farmers may use a power spray when a great many head of cattle are to be handled.

This pest (cattle grub) causes a five million dollar annual loss to Texas Farmers and ranchers. This grub can easily be controlled now before spring and before he comes out and make an adult heel-fly because 5 percent rotenone is available on the market. Just follow the above directions for treating the grub and you will obtain the best results advised the County Agent.
