Shackelford Honored As Friona's Man Of Year

Dr. Loyd A. Shackelford was honored Monday as Friona's "Man of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Dr. Shackelford, who originated and spearheaded the drive which resulted in Missouri Beef Packers' decision to locate in

Friona, was one of five persons honored at the banquet.

Also honored were Mrs. T.J. Presley and Mrs. Emma Elmore, who were presented dual awards as "Woman of the Year." Sam Williams, who was named "Most Courteous Employee," and Mrs. Benny

Pryor, who was chosen "Teacher of the Year."

Charles Allen was installed as new Chamber of Commerce president, replacing Richard Collard, who served during 1967.

Four new directors were also installed. They were Wesley Barnett, John Bingham, D.C. Herring and Paul Fortenberry. Holdover directors are Allen, Collard, Robert Neelley, Dr. Robert Alexander and Paul Fortenberry.

Bingham is the organization's new vice president. Fortenberry is secretary. Retiring directors are A.L. Black, W. S. (Dub) Ingram, Wesley Foster and Bill Wooley.

Dr. Shackelford, 48, is a Navy veteran of World War II, serving in the Pacific theatre. He is a lecturer on success through positive thinking.

Mrs. Presley and Mrs. Elmore were cited for their work on behalf of Girlstown. The two ladies organized community efforts on behalf of Girlstown, and have made numerous trips with food and clothing for the girls.

Williams, a native of Friona and Hub, has had his business

experience with Friona Wheat Growers and Friona Consumers. Mrs. Pryor, whose husband won the same award in 1965, was cited for her teaching of subject matter.

Williams, an employee of Friona Consumers, is active in church work -- he is an usher at First Baptist Church. He also is active in the American Legion, Oddfellows, and has been a Little League manager in the past.

Featured speaker Leonard Passmore was unable to make it to Friona because of the snow and slick roads. Hereford attorney Ernest Langley filled in, and issued a challenge to Frionans to join hands with their neighbors to make the "Golden Triangle" the best area in the world.

Dick Brown of Hartley, candidate for U.S. Representative, was present and was given the opportunity to make a few remarks. "Whenever we forget that Agriculture is our number one industry, we're in trouble", Brown said. He added that if elected, he would probably be the congressman from the smallest town in the U.S. Hartley has a population of about 250.

Exchange Student Interest Expressed

Friona's American Field Service (exchange student) committee is being reorganized with the idea of securing an exchange student for the 1968-69 school year. Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr announced this week.

A committee of 12 people, consisting of lay people, school personnel, and high school students is required by the AFS. Friona organizations have been invited to send representatives to a meeting on Thursday, February 22, at the Superintendent's office at 1:30 p.m.

Superintendent Farr commented "It has been two years now since we have had a stu-

dent and we believe our school and community would like to continue the program, more especially since Anni Jensen and Brenda Hawker have returned lately to visit their American parents."

"To me, this gesture proves the value of the exchange program and the families who have kept exchange students are to be highly commended," Farr added.

Organization papers by the committee are to be mailed to the American Field Service Headquarters by March 1. Groups and organizations are asked to call Superintendent Farr with their representative's name as soon as possible.

COUNTY RACES

No Opposition In Democratic Primary

No county office-seekers have opposition on the May 4 Democratic primary, according to County Democratic chairman, Nelson Welch.

Incumbent Charlie Lovelace, sheriff; Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector, and Hurshel Harding, county attorney, will run unopposed.

In precinct one, Tom Lewellen is unopposed in the Democratic primary for commissioner. He will, however, have an opponent in the general election, since Thomas Parson has announced on the Republican side of the ledger.

Guy Cox of precinct three, the incumbent commissioner, has an opponent in Democrat Niel Stewart. In addition, R.L. (Bob) Jones is a candidate on the Republican ticket, and will face the winner in November.

Friona Hit With Three-Inch Snow

Through Wednesday morning Friona had measured three inches of snow, and local driving has been a bit slippery the past two days.

A total of two inches fell Monday night, but only .02 inches of moisture was registered in the city's official gauge, due to wind blowing the snow as it fell. On Tuesday night, another inch fell, and this time the moisture melted to a more practical .12 inches.

The snowfall has probably yielded at least .3 inches of moisture through Wednesday morning. This added to the good January moisture (1.37 official in Friona---up to two inches in the area) gives farmland its best winter moisture in years.

Temperatures have also been on the chilly side. On Tuesday, for example, the high was 22 and the low was 15.

AT SCHOOL CROSSINGS

Attendants Begin Work On Friday

The City of Friona this week announced the employment of two crossing attendants for duty at school crossings twice each day at crossings on two busy highways.

The two attendants are William O. Brown and Herman L. Brown. The crossings to be patrolled are at 11th and Euclid (north of the Junior High School) and Ninth and Main (Tasty Cream-City Hall corner).

Hours of duty will be from 8:15 to 8:45 a.m. and 2:30 to 4 p.m. The guards will act in the capacity of deputized law enforcement officers of the City of Friona. They will be dressed in semi-official uniforms, with a badge of authority so that they may be readily identified by motorists.

The duties of the attendants will include but not be necessarily restricted to the following:

- (1) To act as the eyes, ears and judgment for children crossing the street through the official painted school crosswalks.
- (2) To stop the children from crossing while it is unsafe to do so, requiring the children to wait until traffic conditions are safe for them to make the crossing.
- (3) When traffic is heavy and

Livestock Show Here Friday, Saturday

The 12th annual Farmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Friona this weekend at the school bus barn.

An increase in the number of animals from last year is expected by show officials.

Judging begins Friday morning for sheep and swine. Steer judging will be Saturday morning. A sale of all prize animals will be held Saturday afternoon.

Judge for the sheep and swine divisions will be Bobby Lee, vocational agriculture instructor at Wilson, Jack Goodlow, assistant county agent in Roosevelt County (Portales), New Mexico, will be the judge for the steer division.

Jerry Adams, vocational agriculture instructor at Abernathy, will be in charge of pre-judging (sifting) sheep and swine.

All sheep and swine are to be in place beginning at 1 p.m. Thursday, when they will be weighed in. Pre-judging will be held Thursday afternoon.

Steers will be weighed in Saturday morning prior to 8 a.m. Judging will follow shortly afterwards.

All prospective buyers are urged to attend the sale, starting about 1 p.m. Saturday. Larry Potts, Houston Bartlett and Joe Tarter will be auctioneers. Friona Lions Club is sponsor of the annual show. Members of the Young Farmers and Jaycees will assist. W.L. (Preach) Edelman is general chairman of the 1968 show.

A recent newspaper headline informed the citizens of South Vietnam that a "frontier spirit is the key to civilian survival."

Sounds familiar doesn't it? Without a frontier spirit there would be no Friona, no Texas, probably not even an America.

We modern inhabitants of the great plains have only to look about us to realize the value of a frontier spirit. Our grandfathers took the Great American desert and turned it into the Golden Spread.

Today's pioneers follow through by establishing huge feed lots, meat packing plants, and an agricultural empire that surpasses anything of its kind in the history of the world.

Suppose a native Vietnamese were to ask us to define the term "frontier spirit." How would we go about it?

We could launch into a lengthy discussion of religious freedom, politics, and economics, or we could state very simply that the answers can be found in one short word: L-O-V-E.

*Love of freedom that sent men over uncharted seas to discover new worlds.

*Love of independence that refused to knuckle under to tyrants.

*Love of families and homes inspired men to clear away forests and build towns.

*Love built log cabins, and soddies and dugouts. Into these humble abodes women brought love and a shack became a home.

*Love fostered pride, ambition and determination and from these came the frontier spirit that was in reality "the gun that won the West."

Perhaps we should remind the Vietnamese that they are not the only people searching for the secret of survival. Nations, both great and small, are being forced to re-examine their policies, domestic and foreign.

We have poured thousands of American lives and billions of American dollars into the battle for freedom in southeast Asia. We can give them both butter and guns but we can not give them the spirit to win.

There are still a few things that cannot be handled by "government funds."

The frontier spirit is one of these.

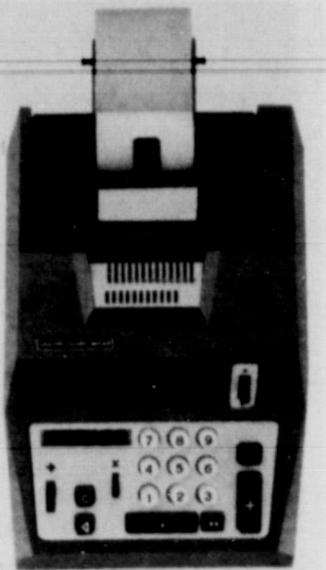
Check Return Closely: IRS

Here's a word of advice from the Internal Revenue Service; After you prepare your 1967 Federal income tax return, it is a good idea to set it aside for a day or so and then give it a thorough review before you mail it.

District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., said that North Texas taxpayers who heed this advice often find omitted income or deductions, or errors in arithmetic. A review of the return may disclose that the taxpayers failed to provide his address and zip code, omitted his social security number or listed it incorrectly, did not attach all copies of Form W-2, or forgot to sign the return.

This review will be time well spent as it may prevent delays in processing the return and will speed up any refund due, Mr. Campbell said.

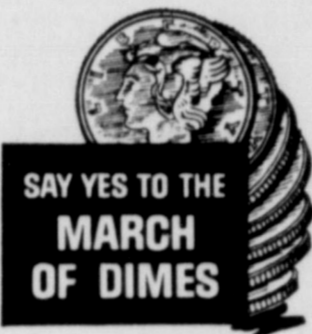
At Home In Parmer County

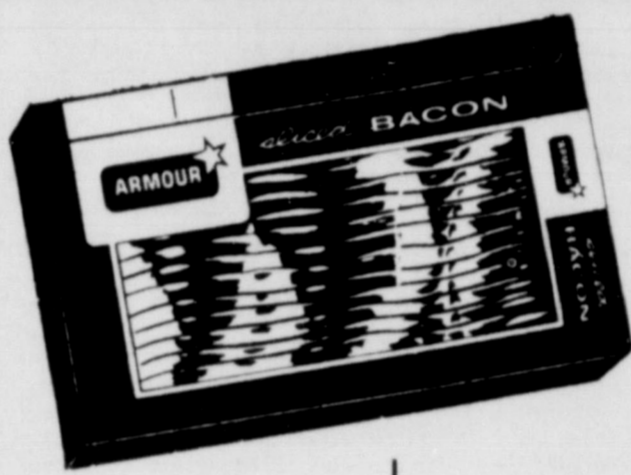

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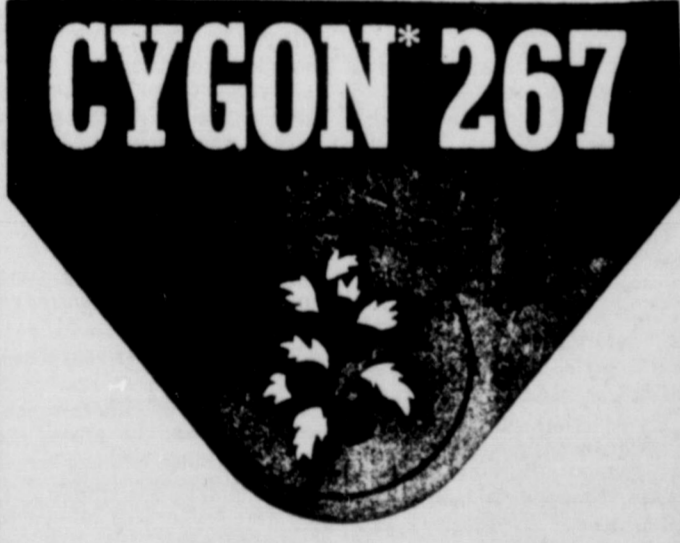

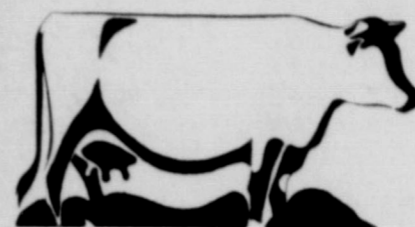

Cage Teams Satisfy Coaches With Record

Friona High School's basketball teams compiled enviable records for the 1967-68 season which ended last Friday, considering that it was a "rebuilding" year for both teams.

The Squaws, with only one starter back from last year's team which won 25 and lost seven games and won the first half district championship, posted a 22-8 season mark this year, and finished second in both halves of the district race.

The Chieftains, with about the same rebuilding problem, got off to a slow start, but rallied to finish second during the second half of district play, winning five of their last six

games to post a 14-13 season record.

Standing 9-12 for the season and 0-1 in district, the Chiefs were bolstered at mid-term by the addition of Troy Robinson, who averaged 12 points per game for the last six games and paced the Chieftain comeback.

The Squaws' strong showing in Coach F.G. Crofford's first season at the helm allowed the team to claim a 20-win season for the eleventh time in the past 12 years.

Exactly half of the Friona girls' losses were to the same team--Dimmitt. Squaws went into the final game of the first round unbeaten, and led Dimmitt into the last quarter before dropping a 67-58 decision and the first half championship.

Hale Center was the only team to outpoint the Squaws in the second half, as Friona again was 6-1. This left the Squaws at 12-2 considering both halves, the same as Hale Center, which meets Dimmitt for the district title Friday in Plainview.

"I'm real pleased with the record the team has accomplished this year. The young players developed real well, and with a year's experience, we should be better next season," said Coach Crofford this week. Coach Maddox echoed Crofford's evaluation of the season.

The Bobcats were not to be denied the district trophy, although a loss to Friona would not have cost them the title even though both teams would have been 6-1 for the second half.

Dimmitt jumped out to a 23-9 first quarter lead, and had a 40-30 lead at halftime.

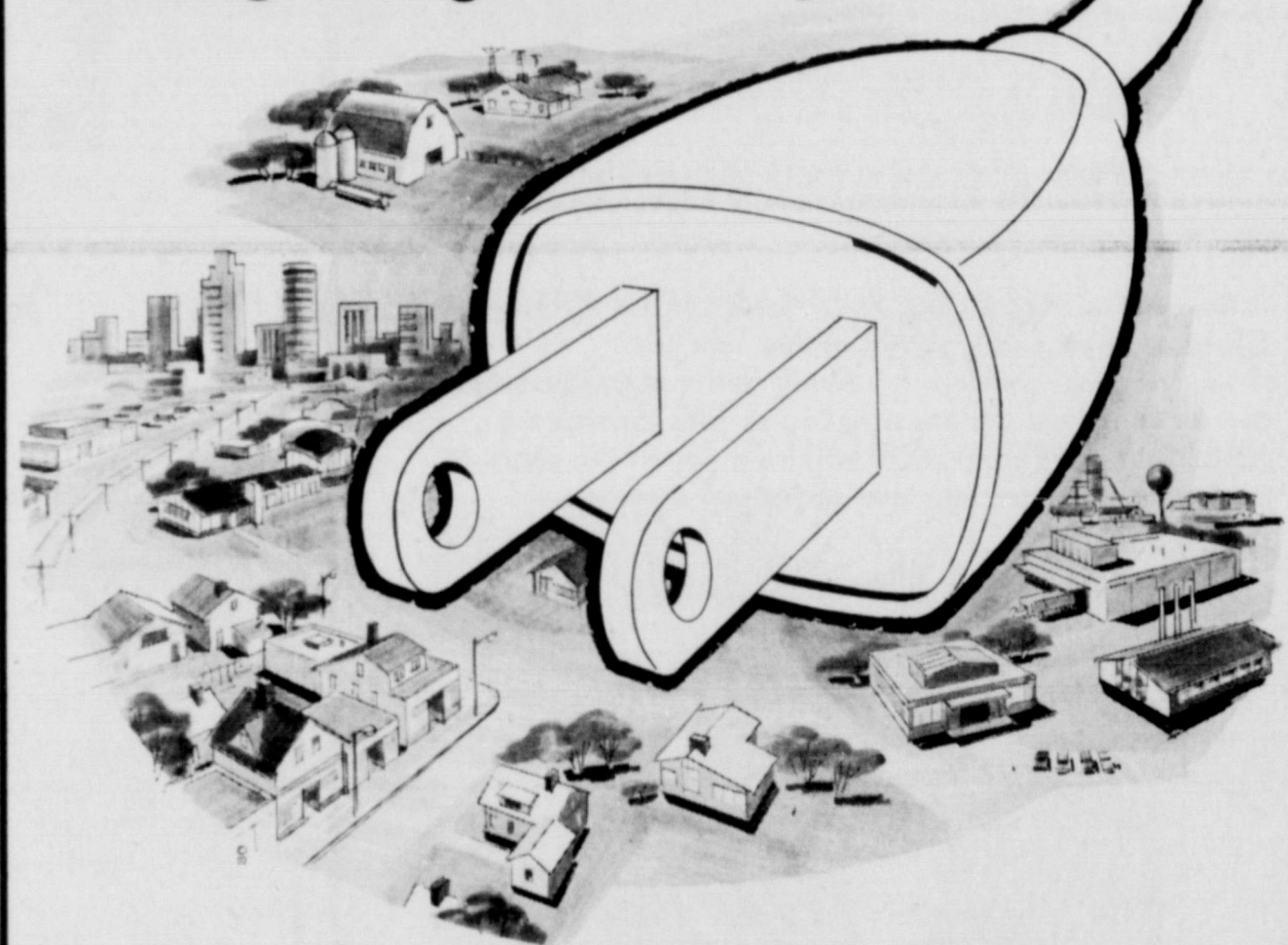
Boys Win At El Paso Contests

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Cool Season Grasses Grow Well In Area

Cool season grasses are becoming popular in Parmer County. Mr. W.R. Broadhurst five miles south and 4 miles east of Hub planted 29 acres Tall Fescue K-31 in the fall of 1966 on Olton loam soil at the edge of a Playa lake. Mr. Broadhurst said it is out doing Midland Bermuda 2 to 1 and making twice the money of farming crops on this type of land. He is now in the process of preparing seedbed for 37 more acres of Tall Fescue.

A cool season grass is one that will become green and stay green during the cold months of the year. Grazing should begin about the middle of September and continue until the first of June. During the other months the grasses should not be grazed.

Cool season grasses are Western Wheat, Tall Fescue, and Smooth Brome. These grasses should be planted around September 1st or March 15th. They should not be grazed on full growing season so as to get the grass well established. They may be planted by either drilling or broadcast.

Western Wheat grass should reach a height of at least 8 inches and should be grazed un-

til it is about 4 inches.

Tall Fescue grass should reach a height of at least 8 inches and should be grazed until it is about 5 inches.

Smooth Brome grass should reach a height of at least 8 inches and should be grazed until it is about 5 inches.

Weed control can be performed by shredding or mowing. This can be done by shredding or mowing one inch above average height of growing grasses.

Chemicals such as 2,4-D can be used on weeds such as ragweed, bitterweed, sneezeweed, pigweed, dandelion and curled dock. 2,4-D-T may be used for woody plants such as Wild gastic, wild onion and curled dock.

Apply 2,4-D at 1/2 to 1 pound per acre of amine or ester in late spring on grass pasture.

This should be applied when the wind velocity is less than 8 m.p.h. for aerial application and less than 15 m.p.h. for ground application. Spray at moderate humidity if possible and at temperature from 70 degrees to 80 degrees F. Dairy animals being milked should not graze sprayed foliage. They can graze regrowth.

Fertilizer may be left up to soil analysis.
