

Treating Cotton Seed for Better Production

Nobody can guarantee that farmers can have a good cotton crop. But chemical treated cotton seed is good insurance. Chemical treated cotton seed increases the Williamson, L. W. Ray, Dona chances of a good stand and a good yield because chemicals kill seed-borne germs. Unprotected seed can easily rot in the ground before it has time to germinate, especially if the ground is too old for it to germinate quickly.

Our country is increasing with angular leaf spot, soreshin and bacterial boll rot. One of our orse cotton diseases that is howing up in Cochran County is angular leaf spot. It often doesn't show up until you see it on young leaves. It often destroys oung buds, and it prevents growth of early fruiting. Brown pots or cankers on the lower or slightly below on a stem is a good sign of soreshin.

Experiments show that seed treatment greatly reduces these troubles and helps to promote vigorous seedlings.

Chemicals which have proved successful are ceresan M, common ceresan (2 percent), new improved ceresan (5 percent), Dow 9B and spergon.

This applies to delinted as well as the fuzzy seeds. Directions on containers should be closely followed.



D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer

This Hospital was founded by a Legislative act in 1941, to the advent of radioactive isotopes; hence no provision was for their use. The act did provide for a statewide facility for er research and education, and a hospital unit for developing latest advances in cancer treatment. To date, while still in porary quarters, the Hospital has cared for patients from 166 ies in the State of Texas.

Nater Level Declines on High Plains

WASHINGTON-Pumping of ground water for irrigation southern High Plains of Texas is still increasing rapidly and levels are declining in the areas of heaviest withdrawal.

This information is given in a report prepared by the Texas of Water Engineers and the U.S. Geological Survey, W.E. er, director of the survey, said.

It is estimated that 10,000 wells were used during 1948 to te more than 1,000,000 acres of cropland. The rate of pumping eeds the rate of recharge that the withdrawal may be cond as coming essentially from storage, the report said.

If present trends in pumpage and decline in water level nue, the report warned, some localities may be seriously affectfrom five to 10 years. In other larger areas where wells are ly spaced the declines of water levels to date are small, the added, stating that the life expectancy of large-scale withals in these areas will be much greater, so long as the present

of pumping are not increased. The report is the seventh of a series of progress reports on ound-water resources of the southern High Plains. It presents on the rate of ground-water development and the effect on the rground storage of water. Copies of the report are available for ection in Washington and in Austin. The Texas Board of Water eers plans to publish copies.


