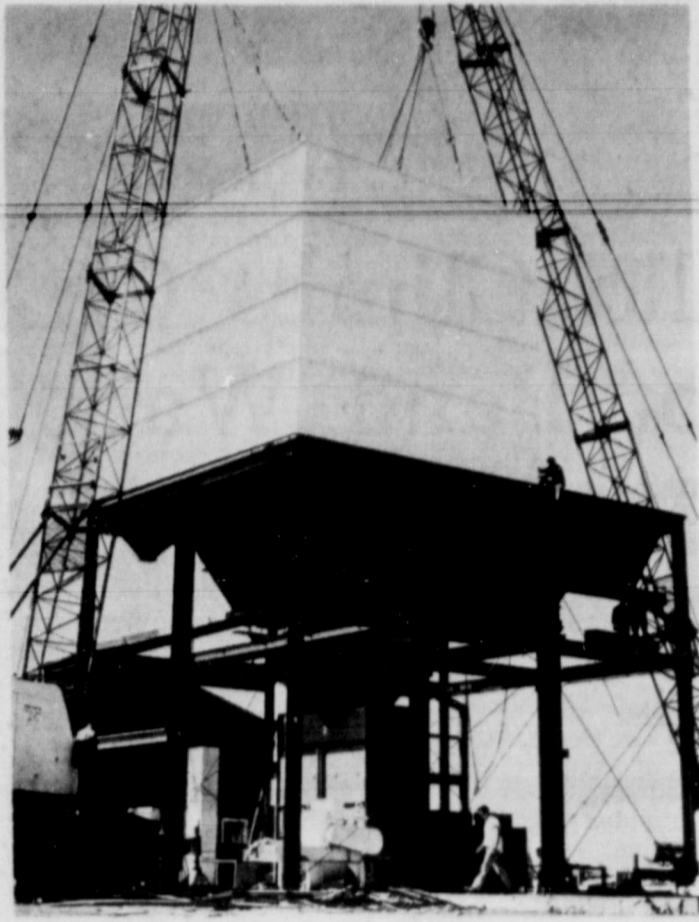
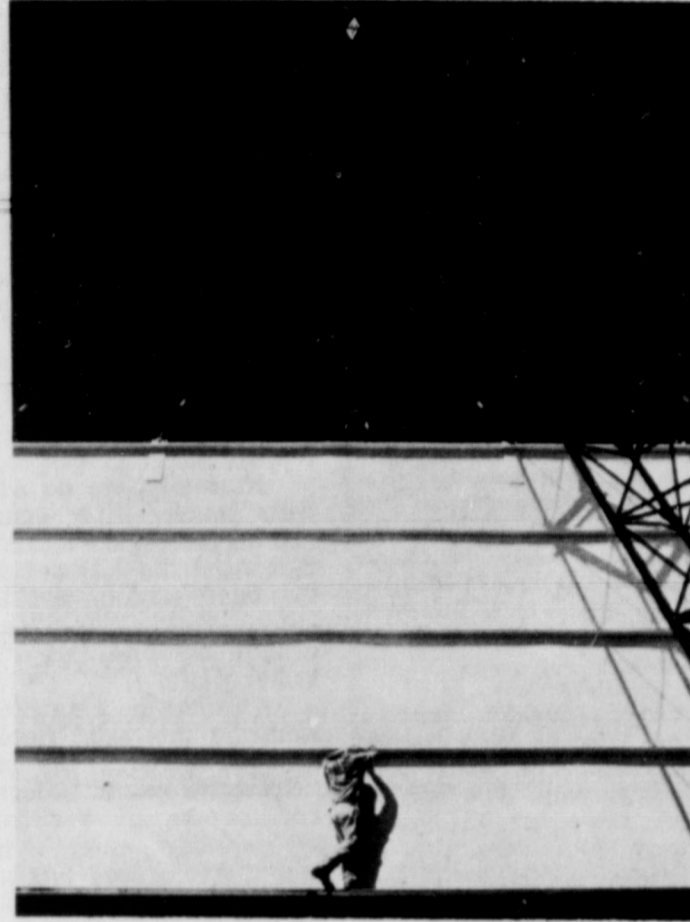




EQUIPMENT INSTALLED . . . Pictures above show the installation on Monday of a 70-ton feed bin at Hi-Plains Feed

Is there contradiction between the Bible and modern science?

This is one of the questions which will be discussed on the television film series, "Journey to Eternity," which begins next Monday night on KGNC-TV, Amarillo.

The non-denominational Biblical film series is being sponsored by a group of Frionians. The series runs five nights, in color from 9 to 10 p.m.

The film series covers the Bible in a manner that makes it simple to understand.

It gained immediate reception by Channel 4, hence the station's decision to give the film a prime night time slot for its showing.

"Journey to Eternity" is a new approach to Bible study. It is an ambitious undertaking, to be aired at commercial television rates. Area television viewers should gain an inspiration from the film series. It's something that people won't have to leave home to see - that is, unless they don't own a television set. Most of us in Friona have this commodity, however.

Last Wednesday, the 100,000th patron saw the musical drama "TEXAS," by Paul Green, which plays nightly in Palo Duro Canyon (except on Tuesdays) during the summer. The 100,000th guest, a Wellington woman, was recognized at the show's intermission, and was presented with gifts, consisting of the show's script and songs.

More than 61,000 people attended performances during the first summer's run of "TEXAS" in 1966. The other 39,000 have seen the show during the 1967 year. Attendance for the current year can still top last year's figures, although weather has cut the attendance somewhat. The production runs through Labor Day.

Texas motorists will find higher standards will be required in automotive safety inspections starting August 28. Quickest to catch the eye of the Texas motorist will be the new seat belt regulations. Another new provision is the inspection fee itself, raised to a \$1.75 from the previous rate of \$1.00.

The state legislature has ruled that front seat belts must be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Captain Johnson points out that seat belt anchorages are threaded holes in the vehicle structure suitable for receiving seat belt fittings. "And seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on all American made passenger cars beginning with 1962 models," the captain explained.

Chamber Calls Public Meeting Friday Night

The Friona Chamber of Commerce will present its development program for Friona to the public Friday, August 25, at 8:30 p.m. in the Friona High School Auditorium. It is the plan of the local chamber to put into effect an outline for industrial, agricultural, and municipal growth over the next few years.

The board of directors of the chamber feels that the efforts put forth within the next two years in particular will for the most part determine the extent to which the city will progress in business and population growth in the future. The board also feels that this proposed program justifies presentation to the general public, chamber members, and other interested citizens at this meeting.

A brief summary of the chamber's goals are as follows: The prime goal will be to take advantage of the packing industry's bi-products to develop other industries in the near future. Secondary steps will be toward the expansion of related industries and acquisition of other non-related businesses.

City planning and downtown business development will be built into the overall development plan. Another large objective of this program will be to find solutions to the prob-

5. "CONVERSIONS TO CHRISTIANITY" -- What did the people of the New Testament age do to become Christians? Has there been any change? Is it possible to reproduce 1st Century Christianity today?

The film series is being sponsored through the auspices of a group of Friona area church leaders. They urge all area residents to take the five-night journey through the Bible, and see the land where Biblical history was made.

Work Progresses On Three Plants

Construction is progressing well at Hi-Plains Feed Yards, Missouri Beef Packers, and Hi-Pro Feeds, Inc. (feed manufacturing plant) all near Friona.

A 70 ton feed bin, which is a major part of the feed mill at Hi-Plains Feed Yard was installed on Monday. Nearing completion is the feed yard's two-story office building. Under construction are two enormous ensilage pits. Pens for a good capacity have already been completed.

The feed yard, with eventual capacity slated to be 50,000 head of cattle, is scheduled to open for custom feeding business in October.

Missouri Beef Packers' \$3 million plant, under construction southwest of Friona, now has a work crew of 62, according to Rufus Davis, a plant engineer.

ly running a 10-hour work shift, from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Davis said plans still called for a double shift, which probably will begin late in September or early October.

Davis said the plant's building proper should be up and enclosed by the last of September. The section currently under construction at the plant will measure 360 feet by 205 feet. A further extension to the southwest will eventually bring the length to 620 feet.

Most of the plant's heavy equipment will be here by the second week in September. Some of the plant's electrical equipment was approved for shipment this week.

Paving of the road and parking area is to begin within a couple of weeks, Davis says. Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. is shooting for a completion date of April 1, 1968.

The office building for Hi-Pro Feeds, Inc. is rapidly nearing completion. This building is under construction by Lewellen Contractors and Matlock Builders. Contract for the mill portion of the company had not been awarded as of the first of the week, according to Ron Davenport, manager.

Hi-Pro Feeds will be similar to Farr Better Feeds of Hereford upon completion. Yet to be constructed are the mill and warehouse facilities.

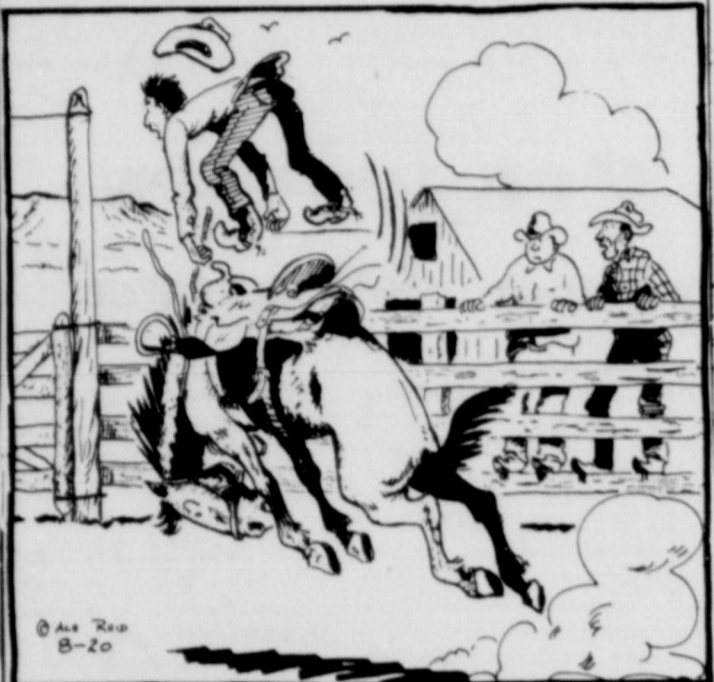

Production Up

The state's broomcorn production for 1967 is estimated by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service at 1,500 tons, only 39 per cent of the 1966 production and 32 per cent of the average for 1961-65 period. Only 14,000 acres were harvested. Production and acreage both were the lowest since 1933. Dry weather throughout the growing season was the contributing factor.

Amarillo Climbs On Feed Lot Band Wagon

Normally, we do not like to argue with people — especially when they are bigger than we are. However, now that Amarillo has decided to jump on the band wagon, and take full credit for promoting this area as a feed lot center, we find things a bit difficult to reconcile.

Thanks to Amarillo people and Amarillo interests, Hereford has been dragged through the mire at least twice as a result of local feed lots. In addition, we are even now branded as the pollution center of the nation. The fact that our feed lots are meeting all state requirements seems to make little difference and many area citizens feel that we have been victimized without regard to fairness, truth or equity.

In view of Amarillo's attitude toward feed lots in general, we could not help but smile to ourselves when their illustrious mayor appeared on television Sunday evening and took great pains to pat our Big Brother city on the back for its leadership and success in locating feed lots over the territory. His Honor even predicted that Amarillo would become the cattle feeding center of the nation, which he felt to be a wonderful thing for Amarillo, and he was happy that Amarillo had been able to help so many neighboring smaller towns.

So far as we know, Hereford and Friona actually pioneered the movement, which was advocated as far back as 40 years ago by G. W. Brumley, pioneer cattleman of Hereford. In fact, about the only help we have noticed from Amarillo in this direction was the announced removal of the PGC feed plant from Hereford to their own city; plus, of course, their pollution smears from time to time.

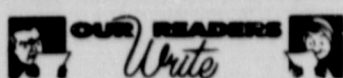
We do agree with the mayor, however, that the feed lot is destined to change the so-called Golden Spread more than any other single development during the present century. Without doubt, Amarillo will benefit tremendously, and we are happy about the whole thing.

But, please, Mr. Mayor, save that "hokem" exclusively for the voters at home. The only kind of "help" Amarillo has even given us in the feed lot business is the kind we can most easily do without. What's more, so far as we can tell, the same is true of the entire feed lot industry in West Texas and Oklahoma.

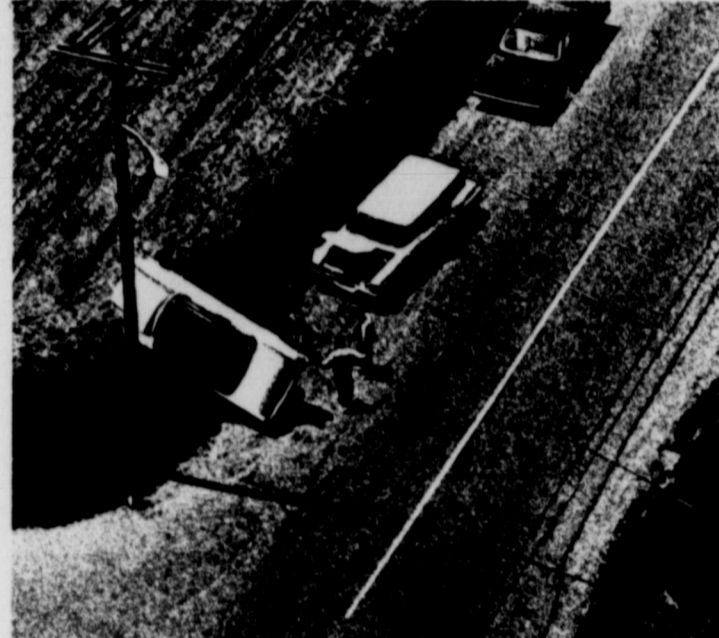

Land Preparation

Farmers should not neglect preparations for fall seeded crops, including soil tests, despite the continuing dry weather. Dr. C.D. Welch, Extension soil chemist, says the laboratories can handle samples in the minimum of time at this season. By testing now samples will dry, information will be available for fertilizing planned small grain plantings and carryover in the soil of unused fertilizer due to the dry 1967 weather will be reflected in the test analysis, Welch said.

Pause And Reflect

A recent news item tells of a forest ranger cautioning tourists not to feed the wild animals in the park. It seems they become dependent on the handouts and are no longer able to obtain food in a natural manner.

When the tourists are absent the animals become ill-tempered and fight among themselves and are faced with starvation.

Someone drew an analogy between these wild creatures and the human animal who loses the ability and the desire to shift for themselves after two generations of federal relief programs.

Thinking of analogies, one is reminded of a book published in England in 1926 under the title "Travels into Several Remote Nations of the World." We know it best as "Gulliver's Travels" and it has become a favorite, akin to fairy tales, with children of many lands.

The writer, Jonathan Swift, intended it to be a satire on the political actions of his day (1667-1745). He achieved his purpose, almost to his undoing!

Gulliver in his travels is, on one occasion, found to be lashed to the ground and completely at the mercy of a nation of miniature people he refers to as Lilliputians.

Gulliver could have snapped a dozen of the tiny bonds had he been awake and aware of what was going on, but alas, he had been tied down hard and fast without realizing it.

Suppose we update the story to 1967 and see how much, if anything, we have learned in the insuring 241 years.

The citizens of these United States could be a sleeping giant, mightily in spirit, mind and body. A giant of finance, the newest hope of the world's poor and downtrodden.

The "new world" in every sense, yet this giant finds that fetters have been attached, one by one, until he is faced with the direction of his choice.

What chains hold this giant immobile? One of the strongest is the disrespect toward God and fellow man. Another is a multitude of civil laws, "guidelines," bureaucratic regulations, and the maze of do's and don'ts that for over thirty years have invaded every segment of public and private life.

Let's not forget "temporary measures" that are now over twenty years old, nor can we ignore court decisions and interpretations that shake our constitution to its foundations.

What will it take to awaken this giant? There is no single, simple answer.

Each man must find his own answer and break his own chains. Not until then will there be personal or national freedom. Not until then will the American dream come true.

Wayland Registration Set To Start Sept. 4

Dr. Roy McClung, president of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, announced today that registration for the fall term will begin on September 4th, and the term itself will start on September 7th. There are a limited number of openings still available.

Dr. McClung pointed out three vital factors which make Wayland Baptist College appealing to students.

"The private nature of Wayland Baptist College emphasizes the free enterprise segment of higher education. The place of the private school is well established and the need for a good balance in the United States between public and private education has been recognized by Congress as well as business and industry. Strong private institutions are a further guarantee to the development of independent, free enterprise initiative on the part of budding young leaders."

Dr. McClung added: "Wayland Baptist College is small enough to provide education tailored to each individual's needs through personal counseling and individual attention. Expert teachers, including PH.D.'s, deal with both freshman and sophomores as well as advanced groups. Because of its smallness, Wayland can provide a flexibility in its educational program not possible at larger institutions."

"An evidence of this flexibility is the innovation in the 1967-68 academic year. The fall semester at Wayland which begins on September 7th will close on December 22nd. The second semester will begin on February 1st and close May 24th. During the month of January, an interim term is being used for the first time to give

an opportunity for students to receive three hours credit in three weeks in a very personalized classroom experience. Each professor will teach one course and each pupil will take one course, allowing classes to move "where the action is" during this three weeks period. During this interim term, new and challenging methods of instruction will be utilized."

The third feature of Wayland Baptist College which Dr. McClung feels is important is that it provides church related educational development.

"Wayland fits into that tradition of developing character and leadership qualities; because with the campus life structure, along with the academic program, the possibilities for constructive experience toward effective leadership are extremely strong. The spiritual atmosphere of the campus is informal and relaxed with an honest and mature approach to the settlement of each individual of a philosophy of life springing out of the Great Christian Tradition."

Wayland Baptist College will be operating this fall in recently improved facilities with the classroom space in Gates Hall completely modernized and each of the dormitories has been remodeled to give higher levels of comfort and pleasant group living. Thirty per cent of the faculty this academic year hold doctor's degrees.

Dr. McClung's final statement is worthy of direct quotation: "The end product of Wayland's educational process is an intelligent, cultured, socially involved, highly motivated, capable leader ready for maximum participation in the movements of late twentieth century society."

591 County Residents Enrolled For Medicare

A total of 591 Parmer County residents aged 65 and over were signed up for hospital insurance under Medicare during the past year.

Medicare enrollment figures were released by John Troop, Social Security Representative for this area.

Entitlement to hospital insurance was at no cost to the beneficiary, but 553 or 94 per cent of those eligible in this county, also voluntarily enrolled for supplementary medical insurance benefits.

Under the medical insurance part of Medicare, beneficiaries agree to pay a \$3 monthly premium, matched by the federal government. Medical insurance is available to persons aged 65 and over to help pay for doctor bills. All persons who will soon be 65 are urged by Troop to

get in touch with the Social Security Administration during the three months before they are age 65 so that their Medicare coverage can begin promptly.

Those persons who are over age 65 who failed to enroll will have another opportunity between October 1 and December 31.

Anyone desiring Medicare information should see a representative of the Social Security Administration office, Room 211, Federal Building, in Clovis.





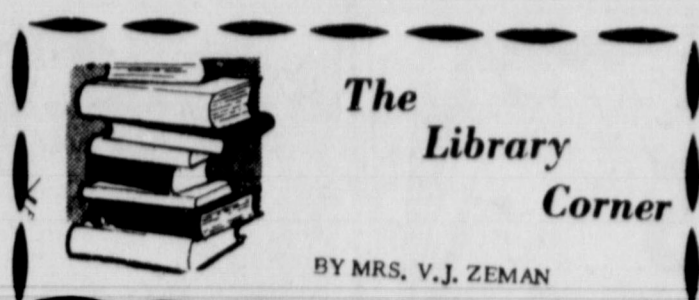
Recent legislation passed, gives the lender the legal right to charge higher rates of interest. This makes it imperative that borrowers know the law and how to compare rates from different sources.

The ability to live within an income—even an ample one, will be a highly prized skill. Competence as a consumer begins with recognition of individual and family values. The need for a stronger sense of direction for families today is indicated.

Knowing and using principles of planning for spending, determining income; estimating living expenses, planning for big, infrequent expenditures is an important tool to have. But even more important for the family is the growth in ability to recognize their values, set goals and work together to reach the goals.

A little pocket-size Consumer's Credit Guide, written in both English and Spanish is available in the Extension Office, on the second floor of the Courthouse in Farwell.

This is free, and is an excellent guide for comparing Credit Costs.

Mrs. Rosalyne T. Shamblin of Amarillo, the Texas State Library Field Consultant for this area of the State has recommended the placement of a collection of reference books on permanent loan to the Friona Public Library from Field Services Division, Texas State Library.

This collection of forty seven titles has been assembled to provide a basic nucleus of materials to answer questions on a wide variety of subjects of interest to Friona residents. Due to the nature and anticipated use of these books, they may not be checked out of the library but will be available to everyone at all times the library is open.

The Friona Public Library has been selected to receive this collection due to several factors. These factors point to the fact that local support of and interest in the library has been growing; the library has been designated as a department of the city; an appropriated library budget has been included in the overall city budget; interim funds have been provided for library operation until the regular city budget is allocated; the librarian and a board member have attended the Amarillo Major Resource Center Workshop and, plans have been made to house the library in a well-located downtown building.

The Texas State Library, charged with the responsibility of promoting improved library service and development throughout the State, is proud of this evidence of interest in improving the Friona Public Library. The State Library wishes to recognize these ac-

complishments and to encourage further interest by placing one of these \$300-\$400 collection in a growing, healthy library.

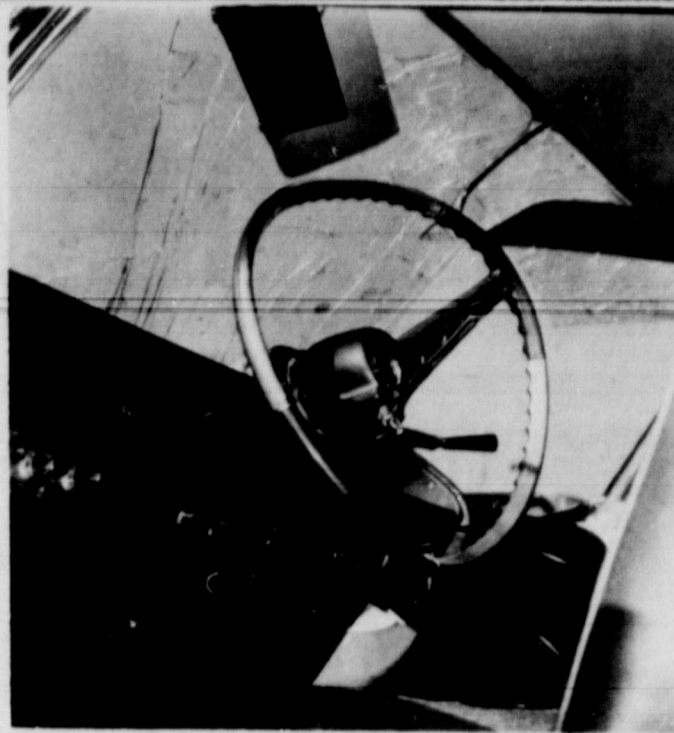
Mrs. Shamblin received the privilege of placing two reference collections in her service area of the state by contributing an outstanding effort to the Texas State Library program for recruitment to the library profession.

Injury Results In Monday Collision

A car-pickup collision Monday night on highway 86, three miles west of Hub injured four persons, one of them critical.

Mittie Mann, 17 year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Mann of Hub was rushed to Northwest Texas Hospital by emergency ambulance suffering from a broken neck. Patrolman Wayne Pierce who investigated the accident said the 1963 Chevrolet Miss Mann was driving struck the rear of a pick-up truck, driven by Dias Gibson of Texico, N.M.

Pierce said he had not yet determined whether or not the Gibson vehicle was sta-

Two other girls were also riding in the Mann car, but were not injured. They have not been identified.

Both vehicles were a total loss. Pierce said the accident was reported around 8 p.m. Monday evening.

Friona has been the scene lately of a rash of accidents, resulting in well over \$2000 in damage and injuring two persons.

Chief of Police Kenneth McDermitt noted that this was a "pretty high rate of accidents" and urged citizens to drive safely, particularly with the opening of school coming up in the very near future.

Taken to Parmer County Hospital by Claburn ambulance were Agnes Mayhew of Gruver, who suffered several bruises and abrasions, and Mrs. G.W. Chambers of Portales N.M., also suffering from cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Chambers was held for observation, and released Monday. Police Chief McDermitt expressed hopes that with the starting of school, drivers would be extra careful, and be especially on the watch for youngsters going to and from school.

Herbert L. Day of Friona, driving a 1965 Pontiac collided with a car driven by Patsy Martin also of Friona. Damage from the collision was slight according to the investigating officer. Day was making a left turn on to Euclid when the accident occurred. No citations have been issued so far in the accident.

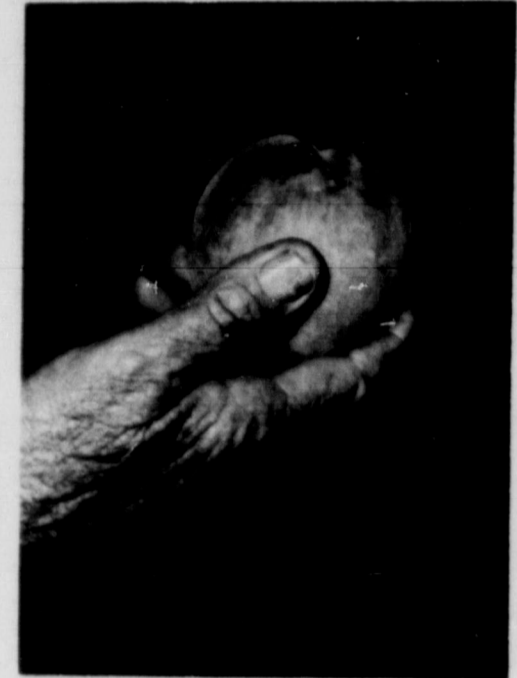

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas, in order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price thereof, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion (or any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds; or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by the individual purchasers thereof. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

irement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Adult leaders are needed in 4-H programs. Give our office a call, 481-3619 if you are willing to help and need more information.

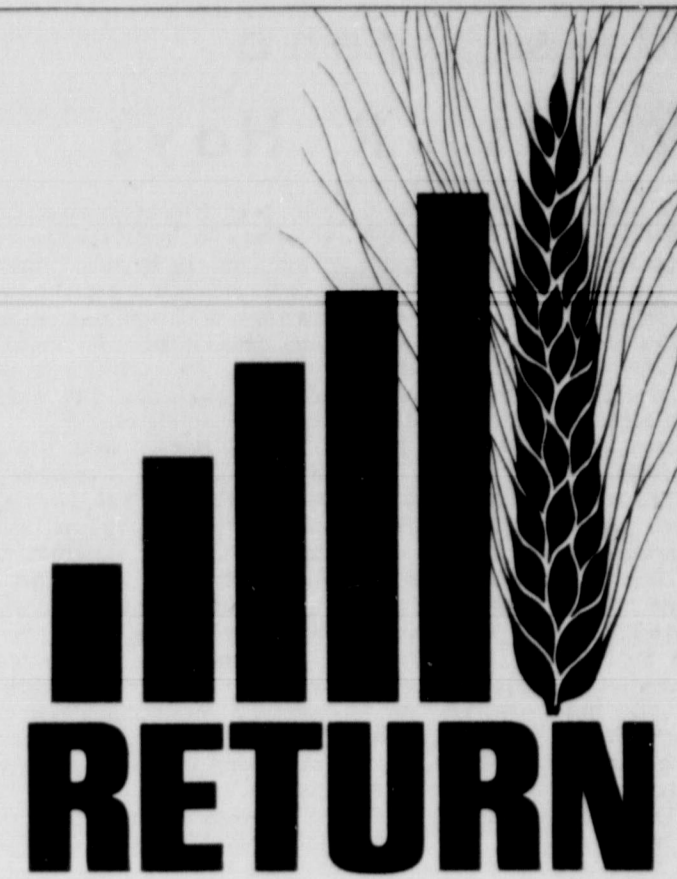

CHLORINE is put in the bleaches in a stable form. When it is mixed with other chemicals causes a dangerous gas.

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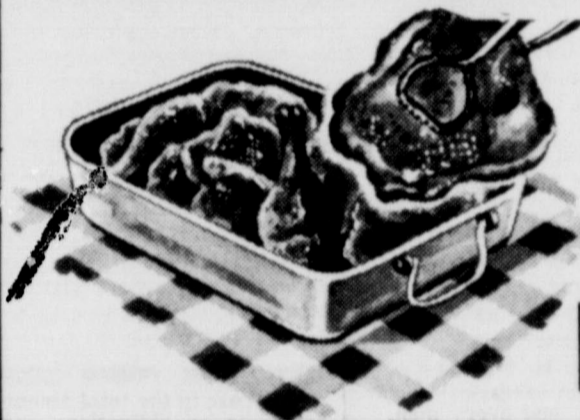

Groups or clubs desiring a program on social security should get in touch with a representative of the Social Security Administration office, Room 217, Federal Building, in Friona. The office is open 8:30 to 5 Monday through Friday.
