

# Cotton Destroyed

## Approximately 20 Bales of Cotton Burned; Blaze Set by Fireworks

Between 25 and 30 bales of cotton, valued at \$2,000, were destroyed by a fire which broke out Sunday night in the Morton gin. The fire was discovered about midnight and an alarm was sounded to the fire department. Firemen brought the fire under control in a short time thus preventing its spread to about 130 other bales stored on the same lot, across the street south of the gin.

Reports of the unlawful shooting of fireworks within the city limits have been made during the past week. Complete estimates of the amount of cotton totally destroyed had not been made late Tuesday.

## Busy Week-end Reported by Sheriff's Office

With about fifty arrests and \$2,000 collected in fines last week-end the Sheriff's department here was kept pretty busy. Seven liquor law violators were arrested; four wet back Mexicans were taken to the border patrol; two persons arrested on charges of check law violations and held for Muleshoe law enforcement officers. The remainder ran the gamut of drunkenness, vagrancy, disturbing the peace and general lawlessness.

Morton's jail is full right now and two Cochran county prisoners are being held in the Hockley county jail and one in the Lubbock jail. The overcrowded condition of Cochran county jail creates a heavy expense for the taxpayer but provides a free ride for the local law enforcement officers with frequent regularity, as they transfer prisoners to other jails with more commodious accommodations.

## Tom Camp, TEC Completes Work in Cochran County

Tom Camp, Texas Employment Commission employee, who has been helping place Latin American cotton boll pullers in Cochran county the past three or four weeks has returned to Lubbock. Tom was headquartered at Hawkins Oldsmobile Agency while here. While here, Tom represented the Texas Employment Commission well, as he placed hands on over 100 farms in Cochran county.

The hands were slow coming in at first, but now the farmers have all the hands needed or they are pulling the cotton with bolls or harvesters. There are many pullers now looking for a job and many Latin Americans have returned to South Texas, advises County Agent Homer E. Thompson.

Thanks to the T. E. C. for seeing fit to give us a capable man as Mr. Camp here in Morton to help us out.

The four gins located in Morton are running 24 hours a day and all are from 100 to 200 loads behind in ginning. Bales of cotton are piled on lots around the gins and trucks loaded with un-ginned cotton are lined up at the gins.

## HAVE YOU PAID YOUR POLL TAX? DEADLINE JAN. 31

Sheriff H. D. Crockett, tax assessor-collector, said Tuesday that many Cochran County citizens who usually pay their poll taxes here, are forgetting to do so this year. He attributes this to the fact that poll taxes are not included on the state and county tax statements.

One of the proposed amendments voted on November 8, which would have abolished the poll tax, was defeated, so if you want to vote and you are between the ages of 21 and 60 you must pay. 1950 is election year for state and county officials, most persons will want to retain their voting privileges. The deadline is January 31 but one safe way is to pay now and forget it rather than forgetting until after January 31.

## Five Whiteface Residents Die in Train-Car Crash

Funeral services were held in Kilgore, Texas Tuesday for five members of the H. H. Kilpatrick family of Whiteface.

H. H. Kilpatrick, 35, his wife and their five children were driving Saturday from their home at Whiteface to Kilgore, their former home. The car and an attaching house trailer crashed broadside into a moving train near Lueders. The car and trailer caught fire.

Kilpatrick and three children—Jerry, 13, Elsie, 10, and Sylvia, 7—died in the burning wreckage. Mrs. Kilpatrick, 33, died Sunday in a Stamford hospital.

Two daughters, Christine, 14, and Joyce, 8, were burned, but doctors said they would recover.

The Kilpatricks were enroute to visit Kilpatrick's mother, Mrs. W. O. Kilpatrick of Laird Hill, near Kilgore, and his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Burnett of Kilgore.

## New Water Pumps, Reservoir Put in Operation Monday

Morton's new water reservoir, pumps and water mains were completed and put into operation Monday.

Twenty five additional fire hydrants were installed during the improvement program. These additional fire plugs are expected to reduce the local fire insurance rates, according to J. S. Harrison, city secretary. A number of houses in Morton with small water pipes will be changed to larger ones thus eliminating the freezing danger and providing more water pressure.

With the addition, recently of a second fire truck the city now has two modern, completely equipped fire trucks.

## Wide Spread Network of Two-Way Shortwave Radio Assured Officers

An efficient and wide-spread network of two-way shortwave radio communication for law enforcement officers throughout the South Plains and adjoining areas was virtually assured with the announcement this past week that the Gaines County Sheriff's Department is to receive two-way shortwave equipment soon.

The installation of this communication equipment will put that office in direct contact with neighboring cities as far north and east as Morton and Lubbock, and as far south as Midland and Odessa.

The equipment will be similar to that installed in the Cochran County Sheriff's Department here several weeks ago.

Two mobile units, one for Seminole and another for Seagraves, in addition to an office unit, are to be put into use in Gaines county. The equipment to be used is manufactured by Motorola.

The mobile units will have a communication range of approximately 30 miles. Yoakum, Terry, Lubbock, Ector, Cochran, and Midland counties already have

## Morton's Fireworks Ordinance to be Strictly Enforced

The shooting of fireworks in the city limits of Morton is prohibited by an ordinance passed here by the City Council several months ago.

Because of the tremendous amount of cotton on the ground all over town; trash and dried weeds creating a further fire-hazard the ordinance will be strictly enforced, city officials said this week.

The fire Sunday night which burned about 30 bales of cotton was thought to have been started by fireworks.

It was pointed out by city officials that all fireworks dealers are subject to pay \$500.00 State Occupation Tax to the state and towns are permitted under state law to assess and collect a tax of half this amount from dealers for the privilege of selling fireworks.

## Applications for Five New Homes in Morton Made

Applications for five new homes to be constructed in the southeast section of Morton have been made, according to A. G. Hemphill, Morton agent for a loan company.

The homes are to range in cost from \$7,500 to \$18,000, Hemphill said. A total of \$45,000 worth of loan applications have been serviced for the five residences he said.

Construction on these new residences is scheduled as soon as possible after final acceptance of loan applications are received. Barring unforeseen circumstances, all five homes should be underway by March, Hemphill said.

The dwellings are to be principally of frame and stucco construction, he said. Actual construction work will be done by whatever contractor each individual home owner may choose.

Hemphill said a number of other inquiries have been made regarding loans for homes, thus indicating a period of continued growth for Morton residential areas.

## Demonstration on Control of Cattle Grub, Lice Friday

A cattle grub and lice control demonstration will be given this Friday at one o'clock at the Jake Wiley farm ten miles southwest of Morton.

Homer E. Thompson, County Agent, Guy Carpenter, district entomologist, Lubbock; and James A. Deere, parasite control supervisor, College Station, Texas, will make the demonstration. They will use a high pressure spray in treating the cattle.

Cattle will be divided, with half being sprayed and the other left unsprayed for checking purposes. Cattle will be weighed before the demonstration and again in the spring; weight gains of the sprayed over the unsprayed will be noted.

This is the time of year to fight grub and lice infestation of cattle. Thompson said, and those persons interested in this demonstration are invited to be at the Wiley place Friday afternoon for the demonstration.

## Visitor in Whiteface Rushed to Okla. For Eye Operation

S. E. McGuffin is in a hospital in Oklahoma City hoping he will be able to see again before Christmas.

McGuffin raced to Oklahoma City from Whiteface, Tuesday for a cornea grafting operation.

Hospital officials gave this account: McGuffin had only enough vision in one eye to distinguish light.

He had been waiting for a long time for a cornea that could be transplanted to his eye in an attempt to give him partial vision in that eye.

While visiting at Whiteface Tuesday, McGuffin was notified at 11 a. m. that the cornea had been made available. For best results, the operation had to be performed within 24 hours.

McGuffin's nephew drove him to Wichita Falls, and his son met him there and took him to Oklahoma City. That same night at 8 o'clock, the operation was performed.

Doctors say it will be three weeks before it will be known whether the operation is successful.

## Local Tax Office Has Not Received Word on '50 Poll Taxes from Austin

To the numbers of Cochran county voters who have inquired about 1950 poll taxes, the Cochran County Tax Assessor-Collector's office might well make the following reply: "Your guess is as good as ours."

The reason? Because no word has thus far been received here from Austin regarding next year's poll taxes, even though the local tax office has made several inquiries.

Probably the principal reason that no 1950 poll taxes have been

delivered in advance is because of the special election three weeks ago in which the poll tax was one of the issues up for consideration. Until then there was no certainty that poll tax receipts would be effective in the coming year.

Apparently there has been a more than average amount of mixups on poll tax payments this year. Numerous voters in Cochran and other counties have gone to the polls this year only to be informed that they did not pay their poll tax for the year and were ineligible to vote.

The primary reason for this confusion is that the State Comptroller received a ruling from the Attorney General last year to the effect that poll taxes could not be charged against real estate and therefore could be collected only when volunteer payments were made.

Little publicity was given to the ruling last year. Hence, many citizens were caught without a poll tax receipt in spite of the fact that they paid their property tax.

The situation simply is this: In order to be eligible to vote in

the 1950 elections, YOU MUST PAY YOUR POLL TAX. This tax is not included in your property statement.

The question of exemptions has not been entirely cleared up. Those who were 60 years of age on or before Dec. 31, 1948 need no poll tax receipt in order to vote in any election.

However, a ruling given last year stipulated that residents of towns of over 10,000 population need annual exemptions. What further ruling might be made this year is still not known.

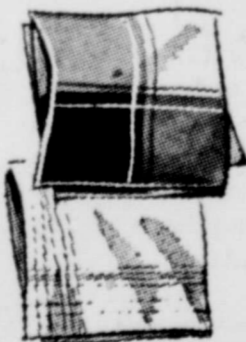

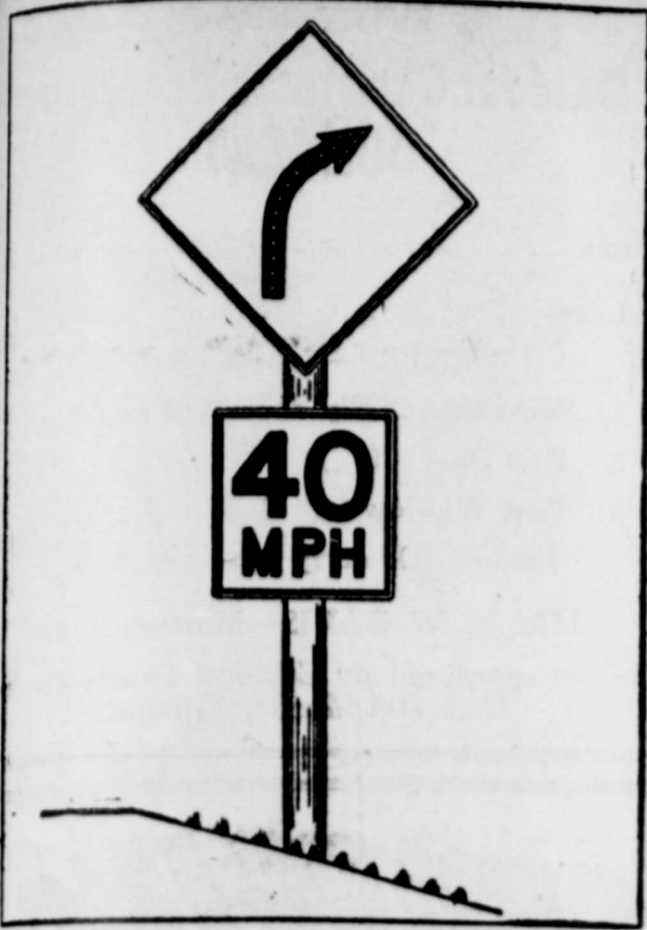

A view like the one pictured has now been in existence on Texas Highways for the past few months. This type of highway sign serves to warn of the maximum safe and comfortable speed for curves and turns. These signs are part of a program of advisory speed zoning by the Texas Highway Department and represent a step recommended by the Governor's Highway Safety Conference.

Motorists who utilize the speed advised on these signs have found that there is no side-thrust in their cars at this speed.

The speed indicated on the sign was determined by a scientific study of each individual curve and turn, and will vary because of the different elements such as degree of turn and the amount of bank on each separate curve.

### Girlstown Given Charter to Safeguard Future as Home for Dependent Girls

A charter has been granted to Girlstown, U. S. A., near Whiteface, Miss. Amelia Anthony, founder and director, said in Lubbock recently.

Incorporators are Miss Anthony, president; Judge A. K. Doss of Abilene, vice-president, and Owen McWhorter of Lubbock, secretary and treasurer.

Purpose of the charter is "to insure and safeguard Girlstown, U. S. A., as a home for homeless and neglected young girls as long as there is a need of our home," said the director.

**Own Funds Used**  
On March 13, 1949, Miss Anthony opened Girlstown at Buffalo Gap, using her own funds.

From the first mental forming and actuality of Girlstown, she has had "an earnest desire to share it with every individual in the United States" and the incorporation is another step in making it possible for Girlstown to be shared with the public, she said.

Assets of Girlstown are estimated in the charter at \$50,000, consisting of 1,425.6 acres of land, buildings, furniture and equipment, livestock, automotive equipment and other assets.

Girlstown was incorporated without capital stock for benevolent, charitable and educational purposes.

**Ranch Given Project**  
The first contributor to Girlstown other than the founder was T. B. Duzgan, sr., of Lubbock, who on June 13 gave a ranch near Whiteface and \$20,000 to Girlstown.

Numerous individuals and organizations have since aided with contributions of money and services.

The figure "13" has been significant for Girlstown since it opened on March 13. The move to Girlstown's new site near Whiteface was made on July 13. Construction of the first residence, which will provide 32 bedrooms for 64 girls, opened on August 13. Dedication is scheduled on December 13.

Girlstown has attracted considerable attention throughout the United States, receiving letters and applications for admission of girls from various parts of the country.

The young director of Girlstown has been asked, "what will happen to Girlstown if you were to die?"

Incorporation of Girlstown is a move to perpetuate it.

### Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum Under Preparation

Cochran County Production and Marketing Administration Committee members are beginning the preparations for the National Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum to be held in every cotton growing community in the United States on Thursday, Dec. 15.

Meanwhile, work is continuing in the county office on data gathered from farmers during the past several months upon which individual farm acreage allotments will be based. Mr. Keith is unable to say at this time what day allotment notices will be ready for mailing, but assures cotton farmers that they will be advised of their allotments before the referendum date.

Marketing quotas for the 1950 cotton crop were proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan on Oct. 13th, when it became apparent that cotton supplies for the current marketing year would exceed the normal supply by a wide margin. To become effective however, quotas must be approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the coming referendum.

The LeBlanc Corp. has purchased a \$250,000 steel and concrete building with 35,000 square feet of floor space in Lafayette, La., and will remodel it at a cost of more than \$50,000 for the national headquarters of Hadaacol, famous B vitamin and mineral preparation.

"The office and manufacturing facilities will be the most modern possible," said Mr. LeBlanc. "The building will be air conditioned and will have many other features. It is just another forward step in the remarkable progress of Hadaacol."

### \$112,000 in Cash Awards to be Offered At 1950 Fort Worth Fat Stock Show

Approximately \$112,000 in cash awards will be offered by the 1950 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, which will open January 27 and extend through February 5.

The scene of the Fort Worth exposition will be the "Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum and the cluster of buildings which give the show a plant unsurpassed in America for beauty and facilities.

In line with the steady, year-by-year progress carried out by the officials and board of directors, a number of improvements will be noted by the visitors. A new feed building and a second judging and auction arena have been constructed. Other structures added in the past few seasons include six livestock buildings extending over a 950-foot frontage and connected by a covered corridor; the horse show building, with space for 600 animals, and the pen and carload lots building, these structures representing an outlay of around \$2,000,000.

Mud has been banished through the paving of walks, roadways and parking areas.

Premiums in the Hereford divisions aggregate \$15,800; Aberdeen-Ansus, \$8,680; Shorthorns, \$3,760; Polled Herefords, \$2,000 and Brahmins, shown competi-

tively for the first time last year, \$2,000.

Winners in the fat steers, open classes, will receive \$5,045.

The horse show awards will approximate \$23,000, apportioned among the gaited horses, walking horses, road horses, Hackney ponies, hunters and jumpers, cutting horses, quarter horses, Palominos and Shetland ponies.

Most daring and skilled of cowboys will compete in the rodeo, always a picturesque and exciting part of the Stock Show. In fact, the Fort Worth exposition originated the indoor rodeo, the first the world had ever seen being in 1917.

Dairy cattle will compete for \$3,958. In the swine department, \$8,720 is offered; sheep, \$3,641; poultry and rabbits, \$2,000. Prizes in boys livestock show are \$7,650.

Premium lists are going out to 5,000 prospective exhibitors. Entries in the cattle, sheep and swine departments must be in the show's general office by Dec. 12. Entries bearing that day's postmark will be accepted. Exhibitors are urged to make their entries as early as possible so they can be shown in the official catalog and so that stalls can be assigned. Entries are free but charges are made for stalls and pens.

- Celery seed, marjoram, or thyme to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 6 medium onions
- 6 medium sweet potatoes or Irish potatoes
- 1 can or package of frozen green beans

**STATISTICS OF SHAME**

The fact that last year nearly 50,000 illegitimate babies were born to girls of high school age will be seized upon by some for the introduction of full sex education in the schools. These people will say, "You see, here is what happens when sex education is not given in the schools. Ignorance leads to tragedy."

Such alleged reasoning is maggoty with fallacy. Not only does it falsely suppose that knowledge and virtue are one and the same, but it also flies right in the face of the fact that, with sex knowledge incomparably more common and detailed among high school students today than it was fifty years ago, the number of illegitimate babies born to high school girls is incomparably greater today than fifty years ago. The statistics of shame have risen with the communication of sex knowledge to the young.

The number of unhappy homes in the United States has increased enormously in recent years and will swiftly become far greater in the near future. The reasons for this may be summed up in one word, secularism. Marriage, the home, the family are less and less centered in God, related to God, ruled and permeated by God. Not only do they lack a religious spirit; they are jerry built on the false assumption that the law of God may be disregarded with impunity. For example, it is ever more generally accepted that divorce is proper and good; civil society proceeds on this notion and makes divorce easier and easier.

To a large extent there has been a divorce of religion and education. In this day of enlightenment, we are saving our children from the dreadful consequences of their getting any smallest scrap of religion in their educational diet, which means that we are saving them from being grounded in morality. Very well, here are the consequences. Here, in the statistics of shame and the instances of vandalism, are the consequences. Let Americans of sense have a hard look at them.

**Mexican Infant Burned to Death In Fire Thursday**

A six-months-old Mexican infant was burned to death in a mid-morning fire Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, which gutted the family's living quarters on the C. R. Woolsey farm about 10 miles northwest of Morton.

The victim was a Guadalupe Seranno, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lucio Seranno, farm laborers on the place.

Funeral services for the child were held at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon in the chapel of Singleton Funeral Home. Interment was in Morton cemetery.

Sheriff Herman Crockett, who investigated, said he was told by the family that the child had been left alone inside the boxcar in which the family was living while the mother went outside to hang some clothing on a clothes line. The boxcar was ablaze when she returned to it.

Cause of the fire was not definitely known. However, it was thought to have started from an exploding stove.

Onlookers had to restrain the mother of the child by force to keep her from going back into the burning dwelling in an effort to rescue the child.

Part of the boxcar was used for grain storage, the Sheriff's Department said, and contained approximately 75,000 pounds of grain at the time of the fire. Extent of damage to the grain was not known, although part of it was saved, observers said.

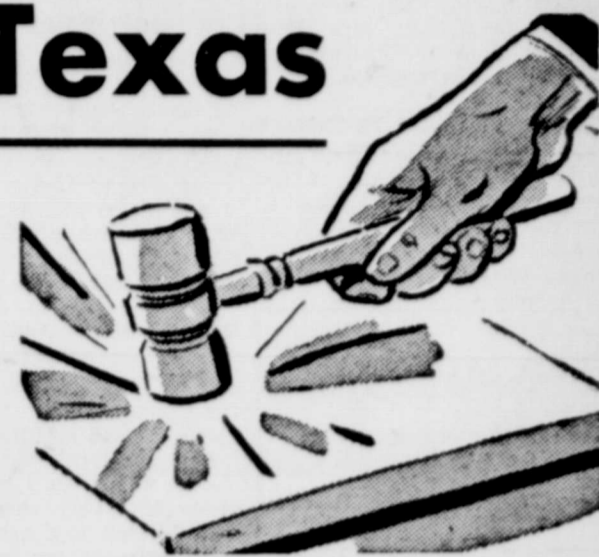
