Information on Filing Income Tax for Farmers

From County Agents Office As we very well know that Income tax paying time is just around that corner. Any adult or child who had as much as \$600 income in 1949 must file, according to County Agent Homer E. Thompson.

Form 1040 may be used either as a short form or a long form. Married persons may make a must use long form 1040. In such case you may take a standard deduction, or itemize and claim your actual deductions. If your actual deduction exceed your standard deductions, you will want to itemize them.

The county agent's office has calculating their income. When operation. this work sheet is completed, you can readily transfer the figures that pays. Close culling of the to form 1040F which is also a laying flock will save feed and vailable at the county agents labor. office and which is used by farmers in making their itemized report. Then the use of form 1040 will complete your income tax report-forms 1040F and 1040 are necessary forms to file your return. The work sheets available at the county agent's office will save you a lot of time in making out your 1040F and 1040 forms. They are yours for the asking.

All farmers must file a declaration by January 15, 1950. If they cannot render a complete report by January 31, 1950. By filing a declaration, they have until March 15 to complete final return. It is not necessary to file a declaration by January 15, if you file a complete return by January 31, 1950.


