



Friona's Chamber of Commerce is attempting to be the type of organization which the town needs at this vital stage of its development -- but it has a problem, one which will hinder, if not completely kill -- its efforts.

The Chamber's dues structure simply is not high enough to carry on a program of work including a full-time manager. Townspeople indicated their desire a couple of years ago to go the manager route -- but the dues situation has remained unchanged.

The Chamber needs roughly \$12,000 to carry on its yearly program, and manager Ted Weaver says that the Chamber can expect only about \$7,500 in dues this year, which will come up woefully short of the budget needs.

Weaver says that he has been encouraged by the way local residents have responded to Chamber of Commerce projects. The citizens have been more than willing to donate their time and energy, he says.

It isn't that people haven't paid their dues -- on the contrary. The chamber presently has 132 members -- an all-time high. However, Weaver points out that if the organization sined up 100 per cent of its prospects, it would still be in the red, due to the dues structure.

The local chamber has attempted to change its minimum dues from \$25 to 36 for businesses, and \$25 for individuals, including farmers. However, many businesses apparently still pay a \$25 minimum.

When the Chamber hired a full-time manager a couple of years ago, we at the Star voluntarily raised our dues to \$100. We don't say this to be bragging -- but merely to suggest that apparently many others have not followed our lead. It stands to reason that if the Chamber needed a \$25 minimum to carry on its duties without a manager -- it needs considerably more in order to pay a qualified full-time manager.

Apparently some of the trouble lies in the fact that the big majority of businesses pay the MINIMUM -- and nothing more. This minimum is actually set up for the very smallest businesses, with larger businesses expected to pay more, as their business volume dictates.

A check with neighboring towns reveals that Hereford's chamber has a minimum business dues of \$72 per year, with many times as many members as the Friona Chamber has. At Muleshoe, the minimum is \$50 per year. The Muleshoe chamber will accept less than the \$50, but those donors are not considered full-fledged voting members of the chamber.

Weaver points out that a monthly arrangement is one way businesses might expand their dues, and spread them out over a full year. The Chamber will also work out a draft system through the bank.

Another possibility, it would seem to us, would be for businessmen to pay individual dues, in addition to those paid by their companies. This is what we plan to do personally, in addition to again raising our dues.

We wonder if the responsible, civic-minded businessmen -- and individuals -- won't join us? Before a Chamber of Commerce can succeed, it must have adequate financing. Friona seems to be on the borderline as far as its Chamber program is concerned. If it is to have a full-time manager, then we must raise our dues.

When you buy something, you want your money's worth. Our chamber manager has expected efforts in locating newcomers to become permanent residents; talking with representatives of possible new businesses, helping to work out details of their coming, etc.

I think we're getting our money's worth at the present time.

Last year our community raised \$100,000 for a new industry. Surely we can raise at least ten per cent of that amount each year to see that the town gains full benefit from that industry.

How about it?

Wilson Announces Hereford Plant

Wilson and Company Tuesday officially announced plans to build a meat-packing plant in Hereford.

The company broke a lengthy silence by saying it would award contracts for its plant sometime late in August. The plant will have a capacity to slaughter some 6,000 cattle per week, according to officials. While it will be a sizeable economic boost, this is still only half the capacity of Friona's Missouri Beef Packers.

Wilson officials plan to go into breaking operations, as has the Friona plant, expecting to process some 2,500 cattle in this manner each week.

Three combinations of colors are available in the decorative boxes. They are: gold lid on a black box; black lid on a black box or gold lid on a white box. Sample boxes are on display at Nunn Lumber Co.

Friona's Indians took a pair of games from visiting Hereford teams in their last two outings, but the games were quite a bit different as far as scoring went.

On Memorial Day, Friona blasted Hereford's Knights of Columbus, 40-1 in a game shortened to six innings. Then this past Sunday, the Indians edged Hereford's Rebels, 3-1.

Guy Welch Anything Except A Quitter

Don't call Guy Welch a quitter!

The tag causes his dark brown eyes to smoulder, and he gets madder than an old wet hen.

In short, Welch is no quitter. He's a battler, especially when the going gets tough.

Welch, 26-year-old son of Houston Mayor and Mrs. Louis Welch, quit a profitable profession in real estate 17 months ago to pursue his ambition of becoming a veterinarian. His dream was realized this week at Texas A&M when he was officially admitted to the College of Veterinary Medicine.

"It was one of the happiest days of my life when I opened that letter from Dean (Alvin A.) Price," Welch grinned. "I

know I've got three years of hard work staring me in the face, but I'm ready to get after it."

Why would a man give up his own real estate business to go into a profession which is not likely to be as remunerative financially?

"I hated what I was doing," Welch fired back. "No doubt about it. I just wasn't suited for what I was doing. So I talked with my wife, Robbie (the former Robbie Hoggess of Friona), and she agreed that we needed to do something else."

Mrs. Welch is a fifth grade teacher at A&M Consolidated. The Welches have two children, Lisa, 4, and Mitchell, 2.

"I'd been thinking about being a vet for almost two years," the Dallas native recalled.

"And I'd been fooling around with horses in Houston for a long time. Finally, I realized that as a vet I could make a good living and do something I'd like to do at the same time."

Welch wound up work for a bachelor's degree in business administration last June at A&M, but chose to pick up his sheepskin at Abilene Christian College, where he played two years at halfback and fullback for the Wildcats.

Tactfully, he asked that he not be built up as a gridiron hero.

"I've never felt scientifically inclined, but I've always loved animals," Welch said. "Too, I dreaded the prospect of taking chemistry and physics. Let's face it, I was lazy. But, eventually, I faced the fact that I'd have to hit those books and keep hitting em if I expected to get into vet school."

Apparently, the stockily-built Houstonian has come ahead in his warfare with chemistry and physics. Registrar's records reflect a 2.7 grade point ratio for his work at Aggie land. A 3.0 is a straight "A."

"Veterinary medicine is an exciting and changing profession," Welch commented. "In the future, a person will have to have an acute awareness in technical advances in prevention and cure of animal diseases for the good of the animal world and the human population alike."

"One big thing has impressed me about A&M," Welch disclosed. "That's the open-door policy by most of the profes-

Building Permits Top Those For All Of 1967

Seven building permits were issued by the City of Friona during May, for construction estimated to cost \$97,500.

For the first five months of the year, permits have been issued totalling \$552,800, which tops the figure for all of 1967. Permits issued during the calendar year of 1967 came out to a total of \$505,810 in new construction.

The yearly total also is approaching that for calendar year 1965, which saw construction worth \$599,100, and beats the total for 1966 (\$339,330). Construction is proceeding at a rate which could set a new all-time record. The record was

set in 1964, when a total of \$1,149,040 in new construction was begun, exclusive of the million-dollar high school complex.

Of the seven permits issued during May, four were for new residences, accounting for \$79,000 of the total. Two more were for additions to residences to cost \$12,500 and another

was a move-in residence for \$6,500.

April has been the big month so far this year, when 10 permits totalling \$200,600 were issued. January's permits included 13 for construction worth \$158,700. February saw five permits issued for \$91,200 in building and March had four permits at \$27,800.

Water Connections, Use Show Increase

Four new water taps were installed and one old tap reactivated to bring the total number of active taps to 1108 as of the end of May, it was reported by the city manager's office this week.

Records also showed that 22,428,000 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 747,000 gallons per day. This is up appreciably from the previous month.

A total of 548 feet of six-inch main was laid in the 700-800 blocks of East 12th street to serve the new mobile homes park during the first two weeks of the month. Another 138 feet were laid to Mobil Oil Company's new installation in the Staley Addition during the third week.

Four new sewer taps were made, to bring the number of active taps to 1044.

A loan of old sewer rodding equipment was given to Missouri Beef Packers May 22.

Council Annexes Land

The Friona City Council adopted ordinance 409, annexing the new Mobil Oil Company site into the city limits during its regular meeting on Monday.

In other business, the council passed ordinance 410, establishing Eleventh Street (Highway 60) as a thoroughfare, with no parking allowed on the street. This will take effect about July 1.

In connection with the Eleventh Street project, expenditures were authorized for the purchase of the necessary "no parking" signs for posting the street. Regular monthly reports were presented.

Jaycees Set Roping Event

The Friona Jaycees will sponsor a heading and heeling contest and a jackpot roping contest Sunday at the Jaycee arena southwest of Friona. The competition starts at 1:30 p.m.

Some of the top ropers in this part of the country are expected to take part in the contest.

A concession stand will be provided by members of the Jaycees-ettes.

Frionans Honored

Names of several Frionans have appeared recently in national and state publications. Bill Ellis, editor of the Friona Star, has been selected to appear in the 1968 edition of Community Leaders of America. Other recipients of this honor include governors, senators, congressmen of various states and many leading citizens.

A recently released issue of Who's Who in Texas includes the names of Wm. Doyle Elliott, local attorney; Dr. Loyd A. Shackelford, local dentist; Dr. Lee Spring, local medical doctor; and Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor, who lives in Farwell.

Houlette Injured

Dale Houlette, manager of Friona's Mobil Oil Wholesale company, was injured Monday afternoon while on a farm delivery.

Houlette sustained a broken ankle and a lacerated forehead, when a diesel tank he was erecting fell on him. Houlette was treated at Farmer County Community Hospital, and then transferred on Tuesday to Amarillo, where surgery was to be done on his ankle.

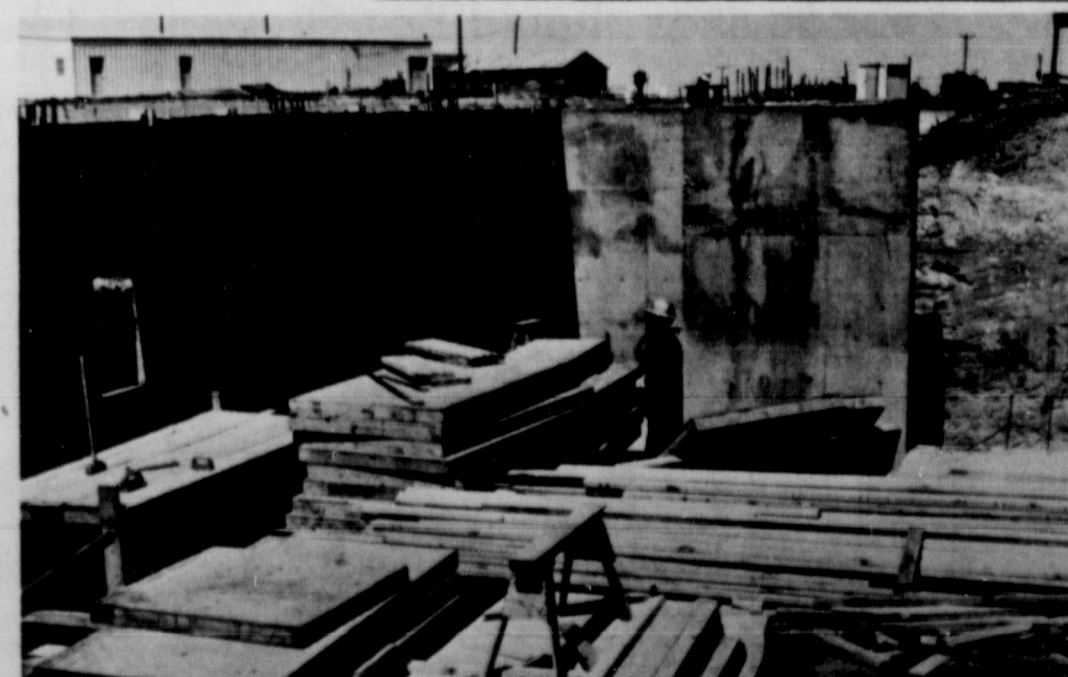
Mrs. Kirby

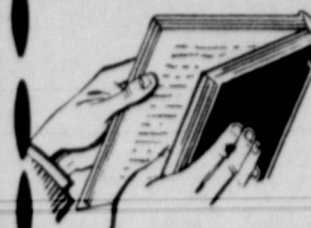
Then on Saturday, the mobile library stops in Friona from 1-4 p.m., according to bookmobile librarian, Lorene Sooter.

At Home In Parmer County

With the summer months ahead, which means many outdoor activities that sometimes bring about "Hap-hazard" type of eating patterns some concern might be focused on health.

There is no doubt that there is a relationship between nutrition and health. Lack of funds for food is certainly not the only reason for lack of adequate diets. Poor choice of foods of an affluent society is in evidence all about this land of plenty.

As a reminder to parents, June is designated as the Dairy Month - and special thought might be given by homemakers as to how they might supply the needed calcium found in dairy products to meet the diet needs of their families. This is important.

Liberal use of cheese for snacks, main dishes, cheese omelets and salads can help add calcium. Sometimes children dislike cheese dishes because of the tough quality which can result from too high temperatures. All cheese dishes should be baked at low to moderate temperatures. To prevent cheese toppings from toughening or hardening during baking, cover with bread crumbs or add cheese just a few minutes before removing the food from the oven.

It takes thought and planning on the part of Mrs. Homemaker to see that her family gets adequate dairy products during these summer months.

A visit to the Extension office here in Parmer County Courthouse could help your situation. We have many good bulletins full of recipes and suggestions for use of dairy products. Don't just say: "My family doesn't like milk," and let it go at that. Their health needs are your responsibility. Another reminder too - homemakers diets (nation wide) are "Poor" in calcium requirements too.

Try this sauce with ice cream on a brownie, hot or cold. It can add "umph," to a snack. Peppermint Fudge Sauce:

Yield: 1-1/4 cups
One package (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
3/4 cup evaporated milk
1/2 teaspoon peppermint extract

In a small saucepan melt chocolate in evaporated milk over low heat, stirring constantly, until smoothly blended. Stir in extract.

Cotton Losses Need To Be Reported

Prentice Mills, office manager of the Parmer County ASCS office, advised county cotton farmers this week to file a request in writing for acreage credit if they have lost cotton due to adverse weather.

It is necessary that farmers file their requests before they do anything with the cotton acreage. Farmers must not plant the acreage to another crop until after their request for acreage credit is approved by the county committee.

The acreage needs to be considered as planted for program payment and allotment history purposes, Mills points out.

Mills also reminded farmers to file their annual acreage report if they have all crops planted. Final deadline is August 15, but the ASCS office manager said he would like to have the reports by July 1, in order that government payments be made as early as possible.

Nix Acreage Sales

Parmer County cotton producers voted against the transfer of their cotton outside the county by sale or lease.

The vote was 288 for and 269 against. Two-thirds majority favoring the transfer was for the referendum to have carried.

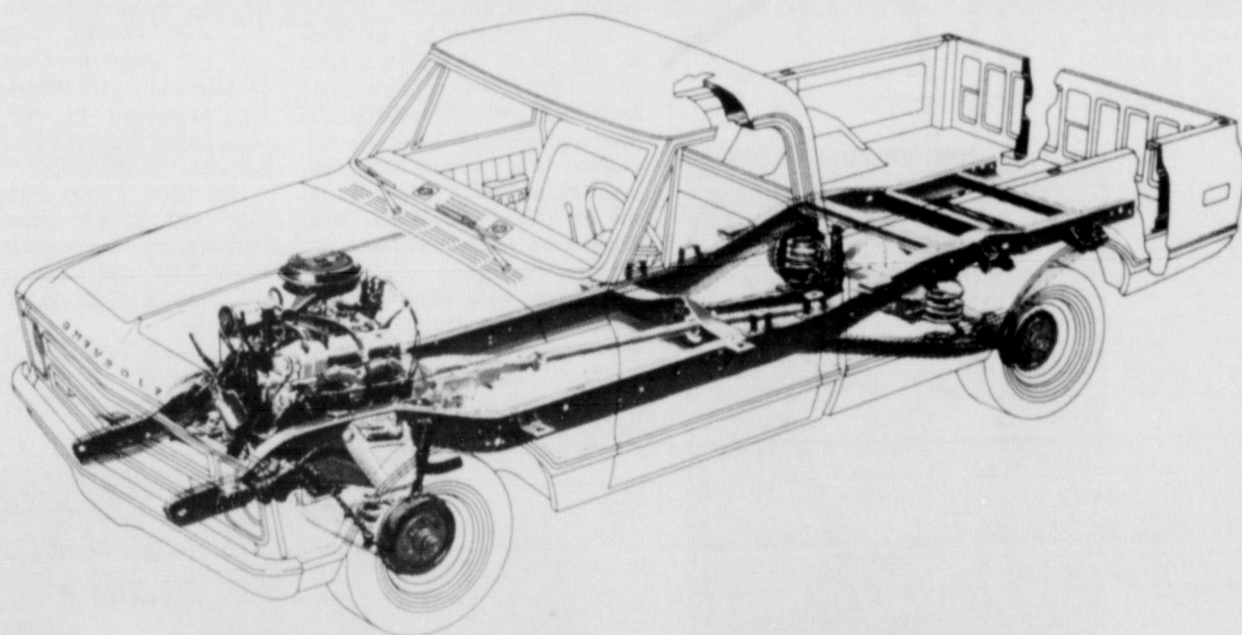

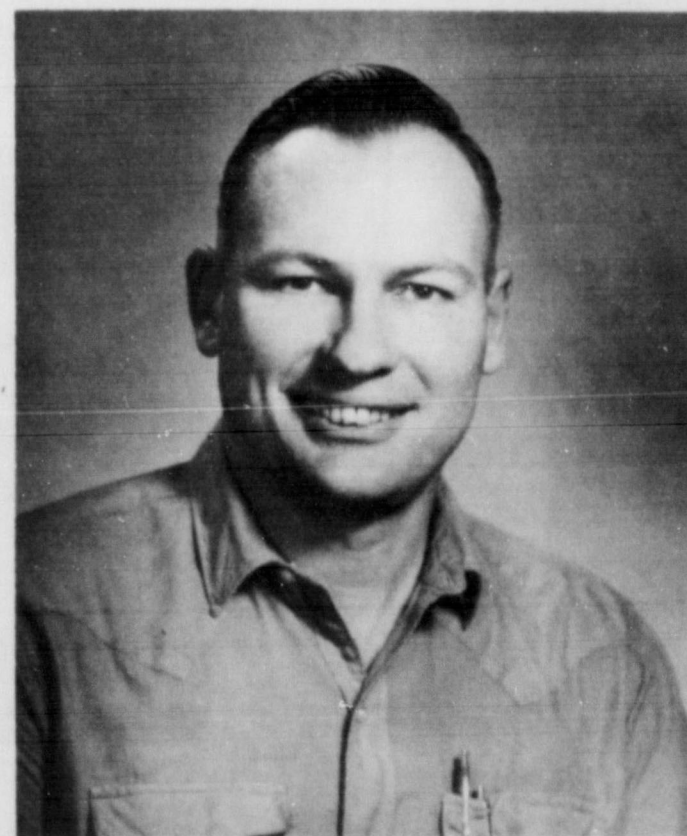

Barksdale-Phipps Vows Repeated In Church

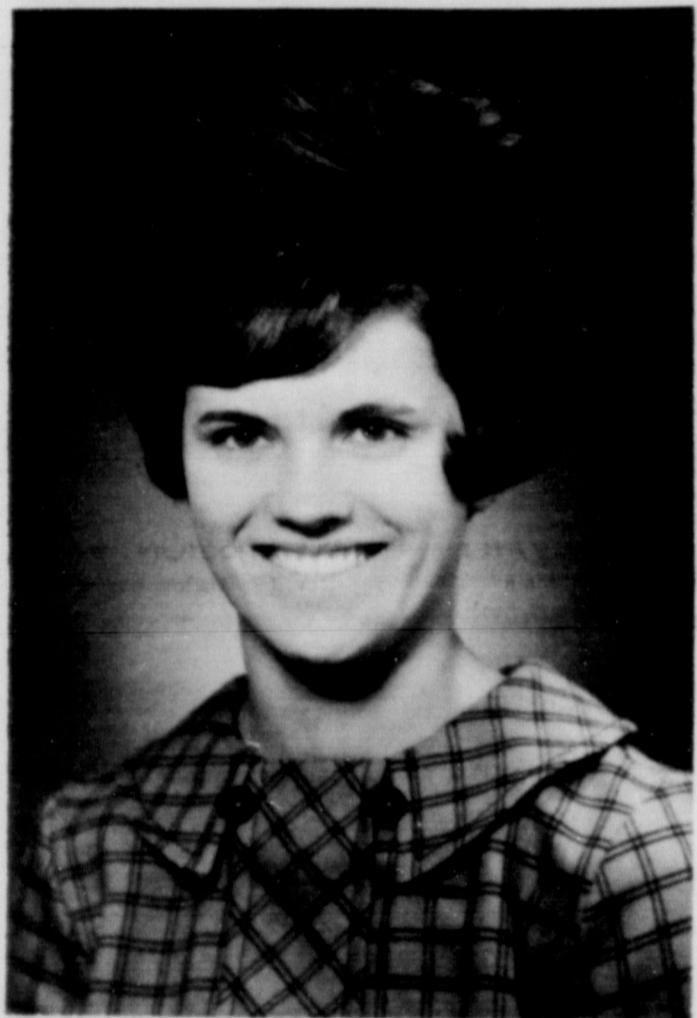
