## Farmers Smile as Judge Stockdale Rain, Snowfall Usher In 1951

An early Wednesday check of the moisture at the USDA office in Morton added .15 of an inch of precipitation between Tuesday night at 5 p.m. and Wednesday morning at 8 a.m. It brought the total amount of moisture in snow and rain to about .33 of an inch or an average of about 4 inches of snow in Morton

A belated Christmas present to Cochran County which arrived just in time to be a New Year's gift to the farmers, arrived January 1st as more than 1/2 inch of combined dew, rain, and snow, the first in three months, fell in the county.

Starting early in the morning on New Year's Day, the precipitation came at first in the form of a heavy dew and fog. In the early evening rain began to fall in a steady drizzle and continued at intermittent stages throughout the night. It was estimated at about .02 of an inch by Tuesday morning when it really began in earnest and then changed to snow by noon.

The official measurement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture at 5 p.m. Tuesday evening was .18 inches with snow still falling and skies heavily over-

Agriculturalists in the area showed great enthusiasm in the snow which if continued for a day or two, would have gone a year's crop a big sendoff. Last winter virtually no water fell in the county

Much heavier snowfall was re ported south of town. Ken Coffman who farms in the Lehman area reported "almost a foot of snow" had fallen late Tuesday afternoon on his farm.

Unofficial reports late Tuesday gave Morton approximately two inches of snow.

Ed's. Note: Since Snooky has so many friends in and around Morton we feel Tribune readers will be interested in a letter he sent his mother, Mrs. N. J. Russell. We appreciate very much Morrow. Mrs. Carl England Mrs. Russell's kindness in giving the Tribune permission to publish the letter. Snooky is with the Marine Corps in Korea.

> December 16, 1950 Dear Mother:

I hardly know how to start out but I will try to make an attempt at it. First of all I am safe and haven't got a scratch on me. Some of the men in our outfit (about 25%) were not so lucky as I was. We only lost about two or three men; but lots of them were wounded,

I imagine you know more about the situation than I do because all we could find out was that we were sur-rounded and had to fight our way out. I had some fairly close calls but the Good Lord brought me through. I will try to give you a small account of where we were.

As you know we landed at Wonsan and then went North to Hamhung. From there went to Hagarue and sat by the reservoir. About two days later we went North of the reservoir in the valley where the gooks surrounded us, We had to fight our way

all the way back to Hamhung which was almost 50 miles back from our farthest position north. After we got back to Hamhung we boarded ship and came down to Pusan. We stayed there over night and then they brought us up here to Maysan, I don't know what they plan for us but from my own opinion I don't think the division can go into combat until it gets new equipment and a lot of replacements.

Mother, I hate to make this a short note but I can't think of anything else to say. I will try to write again tomorrow so until then don't worry because I am in good shape and still in one piece.

On top of all these \$50 and \$100 fines assessed in Cochran County during his term, Judge Thompson pointed out that each person paid court costs of \$21.50. There would seem to be no two sides to this question. Drunken drivers must be arrested, if not as a protection to themselves, as a protection to others.



Of the 30,395 animals taken last year, 27,176 were coyotes. An important part of this catch included a total of 1,105 coyote pups which were taken from dens, mostly in the Lubbock area. A new record was set in taking out of the way, it remains a total of 2.829 bobcats in Texas last year. Since very few bobcats are caught accidentally while trapping coyotes, the number taken was primarily the result of a special effort toward bobcat control with steel traps.

Widespread action in wolf country resulted in a total of 356 red wolves being taken last year, an increase of 50 per cent over the number taken in 1948-49. Although no specific full-time proj. ects are directed toward mountain lion control, 18 of these animals were caught by the hunters taining." 



Other advantages of the prac tice which he lists are: it furnishes a complete record for artificial breeding association members; bulls can be proved at a younger age; and it permits the safe breeding of large bulls to oung heifers.

However, Burleson points out hat artificial breeding has its imitations. It is not a cure-all for breeding troubles. Bulls must be selected with caution, because great harm can result from the se of the wrong kind of bulls. A well trained breeding technician is essential to the success of

## **New Standards** In Beef Carcass Grades Made

standards for steer, heifer, and cow carcasses have been approved and became effective on December 29, says the Production and Marketing Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The changes are in line with a USDA proposal made FOR RENT-Furnished garage on May 12, 1950.

Under the new standards, the Bedwell, of beef will be combined under a Prime. The present Choice grade will be known as Good and a new Good grade will consist of beef from the higher quality cattle now graded Commercial.

These changes are being made in an effort to make the grades more closely identify the different kinds of beef produced and preferred by the housewife, says Roy W. Snyder, meats specialist for the Texas A. & M. College

Extension Service. Snyder points out that the high quality young beef in the present Commercial grade is popular with many housewives. Its identification as a separate grade will be beneficial to both the pro-

ducers and consumers. He says that less than one-half of one percent of the total U.S. beef production qualifies for the present Prime grade, but with the combining of the present Prime and Choice grades, the new Prime grade will become an important factor in meat grad-

Snyder says that these changes in beef grade names should have no effect on price. Beef prices are determined by the demand of rtain grades. Grades are a uniform guide for use in trading in
