**Showers Soak Area--
Up To Two Inches**

Wasn't that quite a weekend just past? Any weekend that is consumed by slow, soaking rain this time of year just has to be classified as a success.

Nothing like a good rain to light up the faces you see with big Texas-sized grins. No long faces were in evidence the first of the week -- just happy ones.

Someone commented that the moisture benefit was more than we'd have received if we had gotten as much as a foot of snow. And, to get all the moisture and not have the slick, icy conditions that go with snow-fall is a double treat.

For awhile there Saturday and Sunday, we thought we were back in Northern California. That weather is typical of the winter-time there. It never gets (icy) cold; it just rains (or drizzles) all winter.

And Brenda Hawker, former Friona High School exchange student from Australia, remarked Sunday that "it's just like our winter weather at home."

It is just about three years exactly since we carried a picture of Brenda on our front page, examining a handful of snow, which was a new experience for her.

The Texas political tempo is picking up, and voters who have not registered to take part in the big 1968 vote-fest are rapidly running out of time.

Now, less than a week remains for voters to register, and it appears that there will be interesting races all the way from city and county to the national level, so it behooves residents to become eligible to cast their ballots in 1968.

This area's chance of electing a governor, and have a West Texas resident in the state's highest office may have been hurt last Friday with the announcement by Waggoner Carr that he will be a candidate in the primary.

The second candidate from Lubbock sure won't help lieutenant governor Preston Smith's chances in the already crowded primary race.

Jerry Hall, Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's capital correspondent quoted certain county officials and party chairmen as saying they felt that Carr should have stayed out of the race, that it was "Smith's year."

These demo officials had backed Carr in 1966 in his unsuccessful race against Republican John Tower, and apparently intend to support Smith this time.

So, Smith may have enough of a head start that this unexpected turn of events won't hurt his bid too much, but it's a sure thing that Carr will get a lot of votes that otherwise would have gone to the lieutenant governor.

Hall reports that Carr proposed that the two declare their hometown Lubbock as "off limits" and neither campaign there. Smith reportedly turned a deaf ear to the proposal, though, saying he had already worked hard in Lubbock and felt no obligation to make such a deal.

Apparently he had nothing to gain and everything to lose by such a "truce."

As of this writing, about the only thing the governor's race lacks is a good qualified candidate on the Republican side of the ledger.

And, just as it is shaping up on the national picture, it appears that the GOP just doesn't have the "name" candidate to make a good race.

With all of those announcing on the Democratic ticket, it's surprising that someone hasn't "jumped parties" in an attempt to take advantage of "LBJ backlash" in November.

Rare January showers during the past week gave Friona area farmland its best soaking since late last summer, and gave the area its best January moisture in several years.

Gentle, soaking showers which had residents trying to

remember when they had seen that type of moisture this time of year, fell most of Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

The three-day total as measured by the City of Friona came out to 1.33 inches, although many farmers in the outlying area

apparently got up to two-inches of the beneficial moisture. Most people seemed to have gotten at least 1.5 inches.

The city's official total not only made it the best January total in eight years, but also equalled all of the moisture

measured by the U.S. weather station for last January, February, March, April and May. With a total of 1.35 inches for the month, the total was .07 more than was measured for all of the first five months of 1967.

It's the most January moisture since 1.58 inches were registered in 1960, and 1.43 inches in 1959, both the result of snow-falls.

In spot checking, it appears that up to two inches was received in the Black area, Tom Lewellen reported two inches at his place. In the Hub area, measurements were from 1.25 to 1.50 inches.

In the Rhea Community, measurements were from an inch to an inch and one-half.

The beauty of the moisture was that it rendered as much water content as a 15 to 20-inch snow, but without the mess that accompanies the aftermath of a big snowfall.

If additional blanks are needed, the Star will be happy to furnish them to prospective voters free of charge upon application at their office in Friona.

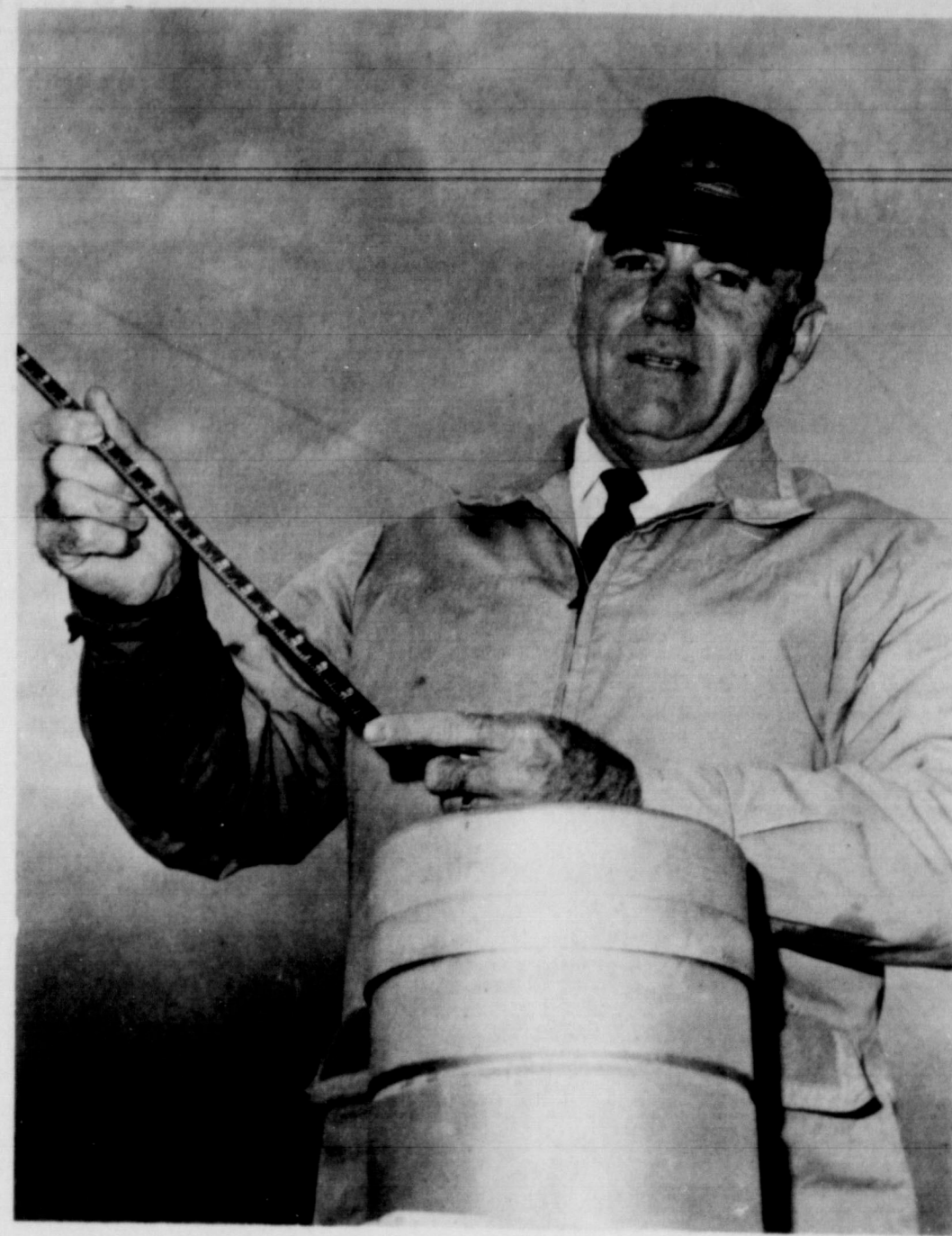
As of Tuesday at 11 a.m., the

assessor-collector's office had issued voting certificates to 2,885 county voters. This was some 38 more than paid poll taxes on the last presidential election year, 1964, when 2,847 were eligible to vote.

However, with the poll tax being dropped, along with a general increase in the county's population, it was anticipated that the increase in voter registration would be even great-

er. For example, in 1966, the last year for the poll tax, a total of 2,885 voters paid their poll taxes in Parmer County. The next year, an off-year as far as elections go, under the free voter registration, a total of 2,689 voters registered.

Those who apply by mail are reminded that the letter will need to be postmarked by January 31.

Postmaster Wright Williams said this week that less than half of the questionnaires concerning city delivery had been returned. He urged those interested in city delivery to return the forms, or stop by the office windows for another form if they have misplaced the original one they received.

Hub Sale

The 12th annual Hub Community Auction Sale will begin at 10 a.m. Thursday at the community center nine miles south of Friona.

Auctioneers are Houston Bartlett and Larry Potts. Lunch will be served by the Hub Community Home Demonstration Club women. Free coffee will be served all day.

An art exhibit and sale also is being held.

Although slowed somewhat by inclement weather during the past week, work continues at a steady pace at Missouri Beef Packers' huge plant near Friona.

A lot of equipment has been installed at the plant since the first of the year, and the work force has been beefed up to 100 in the past week.

Early this week, workmen assembled and tested the beef chain system, which will transport the beefs through the kill floor area and into the cooling room. Some 1,000 feet of the chain system were installed on the kill floor.

Also added during the past week were 24 Recold units, installed in the three cooler rooms. These units aid in the refrigeration process.

Three large water coolers

(condensers) also have been erected, on the outside of the cooler rooms, also as a part of the refrigeration of the building.

Over 30 motors are wired up and are ready for use, according to John Allen, supervisor of the electrical work.

Other equipment which has been added since the first of the year include three giant boilers in the engine room, with a total of 1400 horsepower. The boilers will generate heat for other machines.

Also installed in the engine room have been two large refrigeration motors and several smaller compressors.

Work continues in the other departments of the complex, which is completely closed in, and thus not hampered too much by the inclement weather.

AN EDITORIAL

Friona Plugging For Beef Title

The Friona area is rapidly becoming known as a beef center, especially in light of developments in the industry in the area during the past five years.

Typically Texan, the Frionans don't do things half way. In 1967 they went out and secured a beef packing plant which will have a slaughter capacity second to none in operation -- anywhere.

Missouri Beef Packers began construction on its \$3 million plant in the summer of 1967, and will open in 1968. It will have a slaughter capacity of 250 head per hour -- 10,000 cattle per week or around 500,000 annually.

In addition, a new feedlot, Hi-Plains Feed Yard, Inc. opened late in 1967. The new facility is slated to have an ultimate feeding capacity of from 40,000 to 50,000 --- making it one of the larger feedlots in the state.

As 1968 opened, the two mammoth feedlots in the Friona area (Friona Feed Yards is now in its sixth year of operation) had pen space for roughly 60,000 head of cattle. This means that in a year's time a total of 150,000 head of cattle could be finished out by the two area feedlots. The number is almost certain to top 100,000 in 1968, as the new Hi-Plains facility builds up its "population."

Parmer County has for several years been recognized as the top-maize-producing county in the state and nation, which is now working hand-in-hand with the cattle industry.

Bank deposits at Friona stood at an all-time record at the beginning of 1968 -- giving promise of a new era of prosperity in the area.

Pause And Reflect

Lives of great men all remind us
We can make our lives sublime,
And, departing, leave behind us
Footprints on the sands of time.

(A Psalm of Life - Longfellow)

The value of biographies as an aid to education cannot be denied. How helpless we would be, in studying the complexities prevalent in our modern society, if we could not turn back the pages of time and review the opinions and decisions of the great minds that have preceded us.

Although Longfellow is not the intended subject of this week's column, let us consider him for a moment. Hailed by his contemporaries as a "poet's poet" some modern critics complain that his work lacks lyric power and that his style and subject matter smacks of the commonplace.

Read "The Song of Hiawatha", "A Psalm of Life" or "Evangeline" and compare them with some of today's intellectual drivel. The best answer to Longfellow's critics may be borrowed from Charles Dickens "Bah! Humbug!" Mr. Longfellow kinda slipped in here between paragraphs due to his having written the lines used at the start of this piece, lines that have been a family favorite for many years. He fits in pretty well though because he was born in 1807 the same year that brought us Robert Edward Lee, one of the two "great men" we want to think about for a few minutes.

The other man of destiny whom we wish to discuss briefly was not born until 1824. Both came along in this month of January, Lee on the 19th, Thomas Jonathan, "Stonewall", Jackson on the 21st.

Why these two men of this particular time? Certainly not only because they were born in this month, although this writer feels an ingrained reluctance to let their anniversary go by without some word of praise for them. Part of his Virginia heritage no doubt, but mainly because of the lesson that can be learned from a brief review of their characters.

Both were West Point graduates, both were college professors, and both abandoned any thought of personal gain to fight in the Confederate army.

By no stretch of the imagination could the agricultural south be considered a match for the highly industrialized north. Even so, it took four years to prove the point. Four years during which our country was ripped asunder while brother fought brother.

Our casualties in Vietnam, awful as they are, fade beside the 500,000 lost during this time.

In other words, if every soldier and marine we have in Vietnam were to be killed today, it would just about equal the total fatalities of the American Civil War. How does that grab you?

Why then should two well educated men devote their lives and energies to a war that was almost assuredly lost before it began?

Because of belief in a principle, a way of life, and a refusal to be forced to accept conditions which they thought to be unjust.

Was the theory of "economic feasibility" instrumental in their thinking? No, because at that period of our country's life the dollar mark was not large enough to cast a shadow over the flag.

More than a century has passed since the Virginia hills echoed to gun fire. The screams and sobbing moans of the mortally wounded are no longer heard. Giant trees cast a peaceful shade where once barefoot boys and ragged old men crawled into the underbrush to escape the withering fire of the enemy. Children climb over the long quiet cannon or play hide and seek in the trenches.

From the lower part of town one hears the rumble of road-machinery as twin ribbons of concrete extend the super highway through Lexington, still if you listen closely you may become aware of a faint drum roll or a plaintive bugle call.

In this serene setting these two old friends find their final resting place. They lost a war but they won eternal respect because they were real men and were motivated by their highest principles.

From the ashes of their defeat arose our beloved, still United States.

Lee, Jackson and a host of others must remain alive in our memories for men so loved must not be so soon forgotten. And now the bugle blows no more, Sleep, well, Gentlemen.

Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Floyd and Susan and Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Floyd and Jason attended the services.

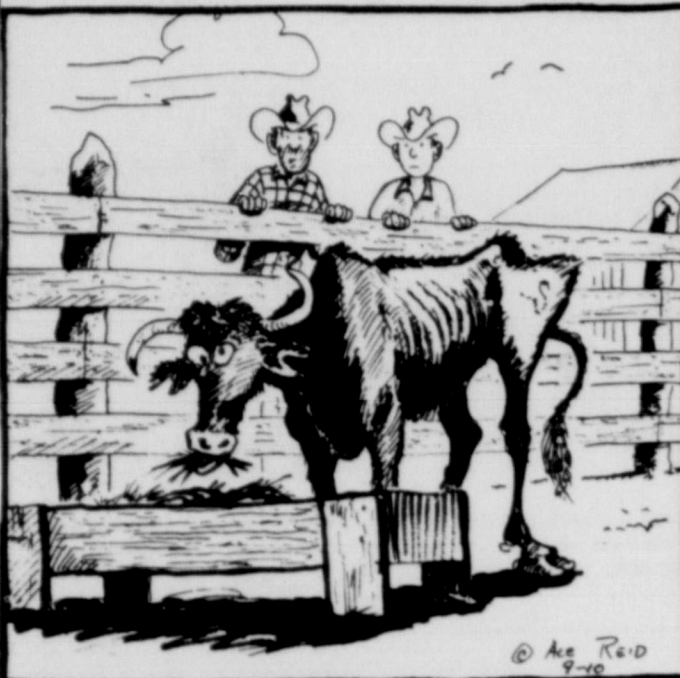
Slagle Services Today, Saturday

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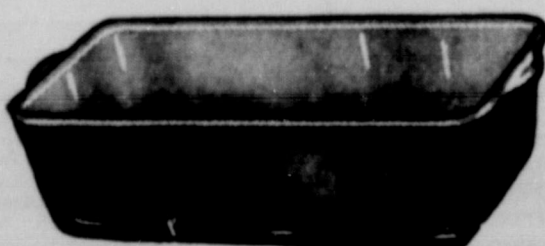
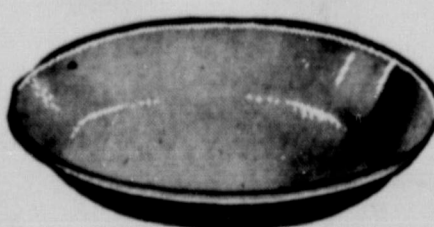

AT HALE CENTER
Hot-Shooting Foes
Costs FHS 2 Games

Both Friona High School basketball teams were sidetracked in their opening round games of the second half of district play last Friday at Hale Center.

Each ran up against a hot-shooting team, and even though they played well enough to win, they fell to a hotter team. The Chieftains were edged, 55-51, and the Squaws, who finished second in district standings for the first half, lost by a 61-51 score.

In the boys' game, Friona made 47 per cent of their field goal attempts, and made it a close game all the way. The score was tied at 36-all going into the final quarter, and Friona was hurt by line violations on free shots which were made in the latter stages of the game.

Scoring was evenly divided among the starters, with Tony Perea and Lowery Harper leading with 13 and 12 points.

The Squaws also shot good enough from the field to win most games -- 54 per cent. But they ran up against a Hale

Center team which hit a fantastic 66 per cent of its field goal attempts, and this turned out to be more than Friona could stand.

Turnovers also hurt Friona. The Squaws' game was also a close one. Hale Center held 16-14, 29-25 and 45-38 quarter leads.

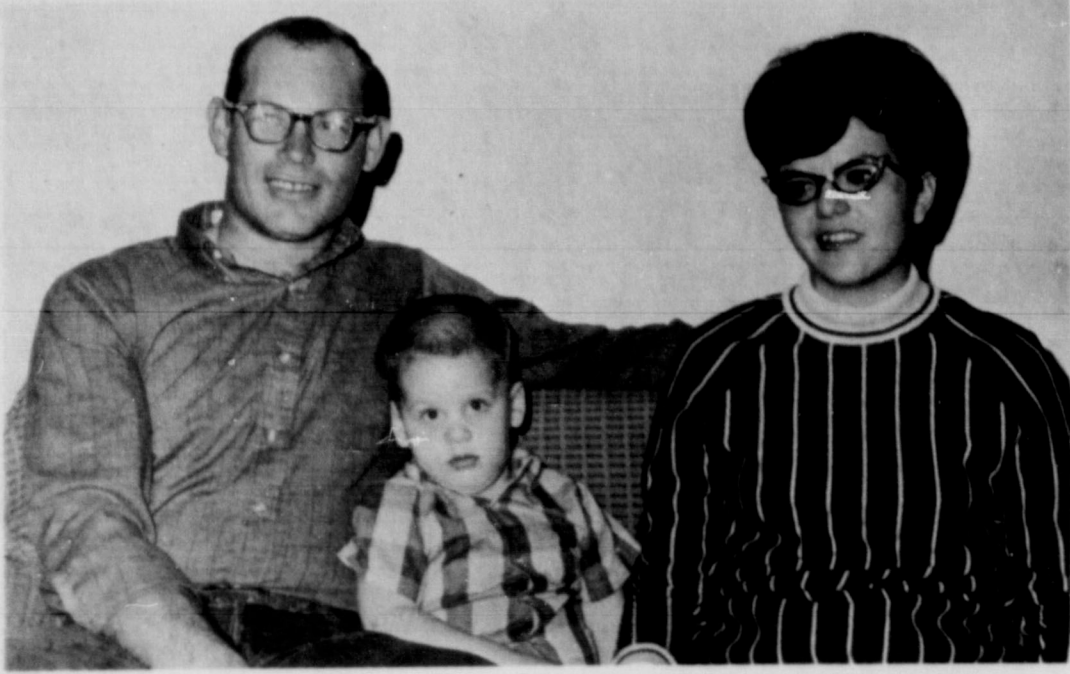

4-H Money Management has a new donor - a Savings & Loan Association. Awards will be \$75

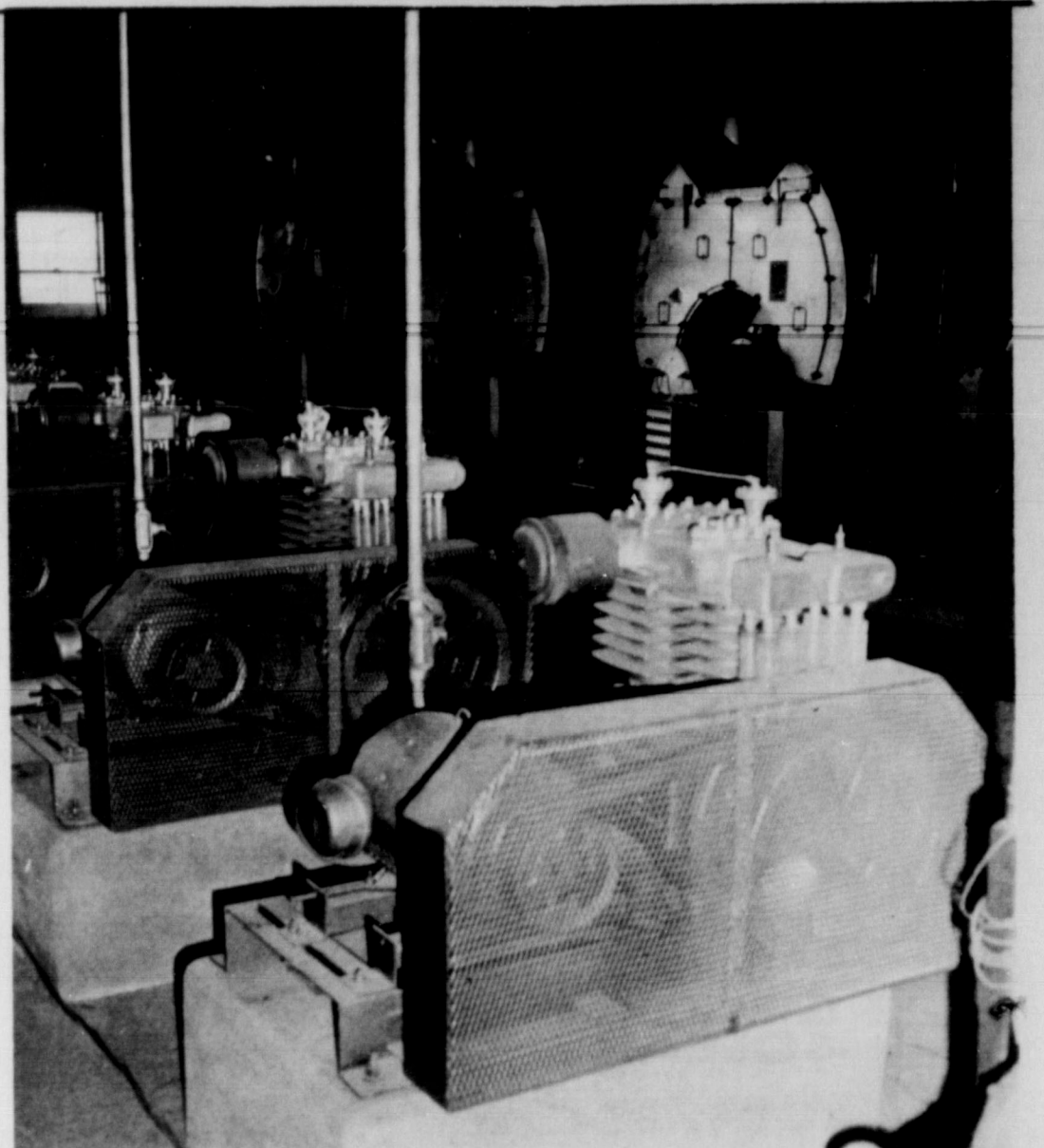

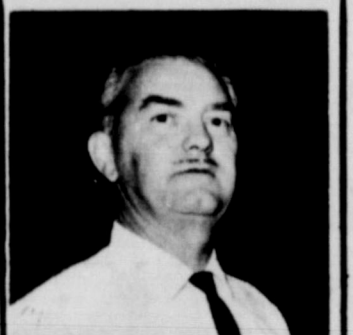
