RIDE WEDNESDAY AT LUBBOCK

Posse Rider, Wife, Child Escape As Horse Trailer Overtakes Last Week

A member of the Cochran County Sheriff Posse, his wife and child escaped injury and two horses miraculously escaped serious injury as the horse trailer behind his pickup truck broke loose last Thursday and overturned while they were enroute to a riding appearance.

Roy Gentry, manager of the Forrest Lumber Co, his wife and son were riding in the pickup truck between Friona and Muleshoe on their way to Hereford. As they reached the bottom of a draw, the horse trailer began to lurch and Gentry tried to slow down. The trailer scraped from side to side, finally scraped the hubs and snapped the trailer hitch overturning the trailer on the opposite side of the pavement and sending the pickup truck plummeting into the bar ditch. The pickup did not overturn and none of the occupants were injured at all.

The trailer, belonging to Olen Ray, sustained an estimated \$75-\$100 damages, but the two palomino ponies were only scratched a little. One belonged to Gentry and one to Roy Gentry was taking the horses to Hereford where he was to ride one and a friend was to ride the other.

The trio continued on to Hereford where the Cochran Posse

finished fourth, out of the trophy class, with 12 riders. Plainview took first place; Amarillo, second and XIT Ranch, third.

It was the third riding appearance of the Cochran Posse this season. At the present time, two more appearances have been accepted. They will ride next Wednesday at Lubbock, at the Boy's Club Rodeo parade and will ride in Lamesa, June 24th.

Pedro Salazar, entered a guilty plea to driving while intoxicated, Monday, of this week and received a fine of \$50 and costs, a six month suspension of his driver's license and a three day jail sentence.

Twelve Men With Various Charges Booked In County Court Recently

Two more guilty pleas have been entered in DWI cases in Cochran County and two "not guilty" pleas have drawn \$300 bonds.

Sam Lucy and Jess Gunn have entered not guilty pleas during the past twenty days as has Hardin Andrews Douglas, Muleshoe. The docket shows \$500 bonds posted in the cases of Lucy and Douglas but only Gunn's name is entered in the record at the Clerk's office.

Douglas was arrested by Deputy Slick Nichols. The 68-year-old man charged was Bailey County's first sheriff.

Meanwhile, the other two who paid fines, both received suspended three day jail sentences. Bernard Dale Garrett of Odessa was fined the customary \$50 and costs and his 3-day jail sentence was probated for 30 days. R. D. Burnett, with a \$50 and cost fine was also placed on 30 day probation. Each lost their driver's license for six months as is mandatory with the law.

A host of other felonies and charges have been brought in the past two weeks.

Major James Levelland Negro was charged with illegal possession of untaxed liquor when arrested May 24 driving a 1953, '38 Oldsmobile. He posted \$500 bond.

Alfonso Haywood Hogan, driving while license was already under suspension drew a \$25 fine and an additional one-year suspension of his driver's license.

Delbert Glen Jackson, driving with a fictitious license drew two fines totaling \$101 last week. Jackson, when arrested, offered an expired license belonging to Delbert Wayne Carter of Levelland. The arresting officer happened to know Carter so he immediately checked and Jackson had picked up Carter's discarded license. The fine for carrying the fictitious license was \$25.

A crowd of approximately 250 persons gathered at the County Agricultural Barn Sunday afternoon to watch 120 terrapins battle for their sponsors in a series of five races sponsored by the Legion Color Guard and the Cochran County Sheriff Posse.

"Gulf Pride", a terrapin entered by Mrs. Herb Hillman, winner of the fourth heat in the preliminaries, romped to victory in the final race over 11 other competitors and won for Mrs. Hillman the \$100 purse.

Others which qualified for the race by placing second or third in the four preliminary heats were: Ballerina, Mrs. John Freed, Muleshoe and Old Money Bags, Odell Smith in the first heat; Willie Wire Hand, Bailey County Electric Coop and the Cox-Silvers entry, second heat; Also Ran, Sel Greener and Yellowstone, Earl Crum third heat; and Little Lem, Lem Chesler, Jr., and Little Jewel, Mills Motor Co., fourth heat.

A group of six judges stood by, just outside the perimeter of the big circle as the starter dropped a match to a gasoline soaked rag, in the middle of the terrapins to start each race. In many instances the leading terrapin would see someone moving or would suddenly change his mind, turn around and go back just before crossing the outside line to victory. Each race took about one minute.

200 Enjoy Opening Of Park Pool

Season tickets went on sale at the Cochran County Swimming Pool this week as the pool reopened for the season, beginning its second year of operation.

Under the management of L. S. Salsler of Whiteface, Athletic Director at that school, the pool will be open each day from 2 p. m. except on Wednesdays and Sundays when the pool will close at 6 p. m. in deference to prayer meetings. Swimming classes will get underway June 14th, three divisions of classes, held every other day and lasting for a period of about 14 lessons each.

Approximately 200 swimmers braved windy, sandy weather Sunday to welcome the pools reopening.

Season tickets will sell for the same as last year: \$2.50 for children up to 12 years of age; \$5 for those from 13-18; and \$9 for adults.

The wading pool is also open, free of charge to all of the youngsters but must be accompanied by parents to take charge of them while they are in the wading pool.

Salsler asked all prospective members of the swimming classes to either appear at the pool to sign up, between now and the 14th or to phone the pool at 5741 to register.

Classes for the youngest group, from 6 to 10 years olds, will be held from 11 a. m. until noon. They will be under the instruction of a lady who recently completed a Red Cross Instructor's Course at Texas Tech. The next age group for classes will be the 10-14 year olds. They will be taught from 10 a. m. until 11 a. m. The others will be in class from 9 a. m. until 10 a. m.

Salsler said the idea of having classes every other day instead of each day was to give the new swimmers a little more rest between lessons. He theorized that sometimes would be swimmers get discouraged if they are forced to work at it too hard at one time.

Salsler expects to be able to hold three complete sessions of classes during the summer. If you don't sign up for the first session, about four weeks later another course will begin.

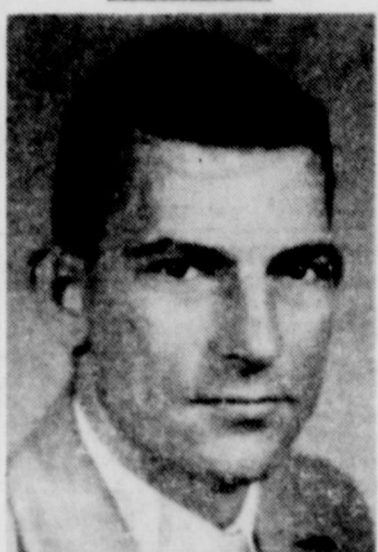

THE SAVED BELIEVER



That a person is saved by faith, I have never denied. Salvation is promised to the believer and not to the unbeliever. In John 3:16 we read: "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life." As we have pointed out in previous articles this passage does not teach faith ONLY, yet it is quoted to try and prove that theory. But, notice: "He that believeth on the Son hath eternal life; but he that obeyeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him." (John 3:36) The first passage given is used in connection with others that mention faith, in an effort to try and last passage shows that it is the obedient believer that has salvation promised to him.

Salvation is always promised to the obedient believer, but an obedient believer is a baptized believer. There is not one single exception to that rule, given in the word of God since the will of Christ went into effect. The unsaved believer is the disobedient believer. In John 12:42, we read: "Nevertheless even of the rulers many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess him." They did not confess Christ. They did not love God. Hence they were condemned on at least three different charges in spite of their belief.

According to faith only teachers a man is saved at the point of faith. Are the churches for which they preach in essence the kingdom of God? If not then of whose kingdom are they? There are only two kingdoms, spiritually speaking. Just two!!! I know of no faith only teacher who will allow church membership, and church fellowship, before baptism, or at least their idea of baptism. Baptist churches are especially strict along this line.

I raise the question. If the Baptist church is any sense the kingdom of God, and a man is saved before baptism and is not in the church until he is baptized, then you have a saved, born again, justified child of God who is still in the kingdom of the devil, and has to stay there until a Baptist preacher can call a church conference, get them voted on and then baptize them. You talk about putting dependence on a man -- giving him power over the soul -- a part in salvation -- that makes God helpless to claim one of his children and make him a citizen of his kingdom, and get him out of the kingdom of the devil, unless a Baptist preacher can be found and the Baptist church is willing.

SEEMS THE motion picture industry is still having plenty of troubles, even after the recent Congressional action which revised the Federal Tax Admission to movies, etc.

you don't...
GENERALLY realize, outside of the industry and on a small town local level, how important such a step is. Then too, usually you won't hear about the various conflicts within the industry itself.

WHICH CAME ACROSS the local theatre manager's desk the other day points out producer-distributors are getting the relief instead of the local exhibitors.

IS PLAINLY disturbed. And well they can be. Box office receipts have declined, much of it due to the popularity of TV. But the production trend has not declined in proportion. Instead, there is a shortage of good box office pictures, prices on the mediocre pictures have gone up, and the small theatre owner is paying more, getting less. In many cases even his concessions won't pay the bill.

the film market...
IS A SELLERS market and something will have to be done if the small theatre owners aren't to be forced completely out of business and the whole industry collapses.

AND DRASTIC step to take within the industry. The fight that must ensue. But the Allied picture men are pretty well of the belief that it must be done to save the industry.

WE MISSED the Lions Club program last Wednesday. Evidently, by forgetting it was time for Lions meeting, we missed an interesting speaker. From our point of view, right or wrong, he must have been something we've long needed here, an optimist.

THE VISITING geologist expressed the view that we aren't exactly sure of our facts on the water problem here in Texas, that we are slowly dropping the water level but that the rate is not too alarming, and that someday in the not too far future we will be able to create low pressure areas and with our present knowledge of making rain, will be able to get water when we need it.

REALIZE THAT many people would get hopping mad over such ideas. And we're not endorsing the ideas at all. But we do occasionally like to hear someone with optimistic ideas. It's a blame cinch we're not going to get anything done with a world full of pessimists.

DIDN'T REGISTER too well to local men because as he admitted, irrigation is so new to Cochran County, they haven't even prepared complete charts on how our water level is doing. Naturally, facts about Lubbock County, or Hockley County or any other County won't be nearly as convincing as would facts about Cochran County.

YOU HAVEN'T noticed the influx of activity here, and somehow a great many people just don't seem to notice those things unless they are brought to their attention. We've gotten a lot of activity from the construction on the new refinery just south of Lehman.

PEOPLE WHO own rent property here, if you don't believe their are more people in town. Now's the time we should be do-

ing all we can to insure good relations with the workers and the Tellepsen Construction Co. out of Houston. They'll be working on the plant until at least sometime in December, maybe even longer.

HAD SEVERAL JOBLESS Mortons hired by the company so business is better already.

ALONG WITH the building of the new gas gathering plant, while maybe not tied in must certainly have some effect on it, we've had more oilfield activity. Just this week another shallow wildcat venture for the future has been planned and staked, by Ralph Abbey and others, No. 1 Starnes-Reed, located 16 miles southeast of Bledsoe. Projected depth is set at 5,000 feet.

WITH THE RENEWED activity here, the Chamber of Commerce is missing a good bet, not carrying through their proposed plan of listing all rentable and saleable property, in some public place, where these people can readily see it, and find a place to stay. Seem's a shame to have them turning elsewhere, just because they can't find a place to stay in Morton.

THIS WEEK, the Chamber of Commerce paid another bill, small as it was, that added some more good will toward the 4-H activities. They furnished \$20 worth to 4-H girls who won recent contests and fed the judges in the contest, a meal.

THE TOTAL C. of C. expenditure for the Fat Stock Show and 4-H activities, about \$250. That's a gift, to area 4-H activities, not from one or two men but from all merchants who belong to the Chamber. A gift which is seldom appreciated enough to make special recognition of it.

WHO PAY THEIR annual dues to the C of C have a right to know that their money is being put to good use, helping to build better feelings between Morton and the residents of the trade area.

SOME ONE asks what the Chamber is worth, point out the several hundred dollars each year that they use to sponsor projects which would put an even heavier load on a few merchants, if there were no Chamber. In fact, the Chamber is one of the few ways a little merchant can help contribute to many different projects,

without having to put out so much money that he impairs his business standing.

OF NEWS FROM the State Department of Public Safety this week concerns the number of accidents which occurred. If you were stopped by a Texas highway patrolman you had company, 34,686 strong during last month alone. If you didn't get a ticket, you escaped the fate of 17,000. If you had an accident, take courage in the fact that 13,495 others also did. A total of 6,840 were injured. You weren't, much to your good luck, one of the really unlucky 168 who died.

THESE ARE TEXAS statistics for just one month out of a year.

THE ONLY UNHAPPY thing about the whole race was that if they cut the number of competing terrapins in half, each one would get a better start, plus the fact that no matter how you sliced it, at least 114 persons were bound to lose and it could have been 116 losers.

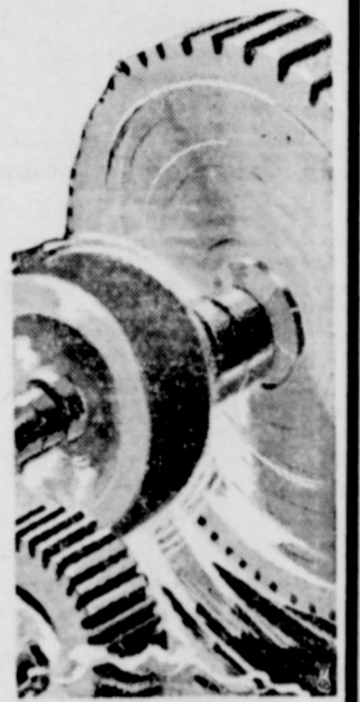

All farmers of Cochran County who may be interested this fall in Latin American labor for harvesting cotton are invited Thursday evening, 8:00 p.m. June 3, County Auditorium, Morton, Texas. Some new agreements have been made between this country and Mexico that all farmers should know about. Setting up a local disaffiliation station for laborers this fall will be discussed. Mr. B. T. O'Connell from Lubbock, Texas will be here to explain all the agreements and changes. This is information you need to make future plans in your labor situation this year.

SOYBEANS — Ogdan Variety
To those farmers who wish to plant certified "Ogdan variety"

soybeans this year, now is the time to get them. Ogdan Variety is a shatter proof type which can be easily combined. The certified seed can be purchased from Plains Oil Mill, Lubbock, Texas at cost. The price is \$5.25 per bu. One bushel plants two acres. Seed weighs 60 lbs. per bu., so plant 30 lbs. per acre. Under irrigation the yield is twenty-five to thirty bushels per acre at Lubbock Agricultural Experiment Station. The market price now is about \$4.00 per bu.

If you have further questions on non-shatter ogdan soybeans regarding the planting, etc., see your county agent. About June 1st is the optimum planting date, or about the same or little later than cotton. Grain Sorghum Farm Storage.

If you intend to build farm storage for grain for complying with the loan this year, advise you make your application through ASC office; so county committee can get them approved.

The county agent's office has new plans for grain storage structures. These will help you expedite your loan to give the specific information about your planned building or structure. For blue print order number and description. Ask your county agent for the plan that fits your needs.

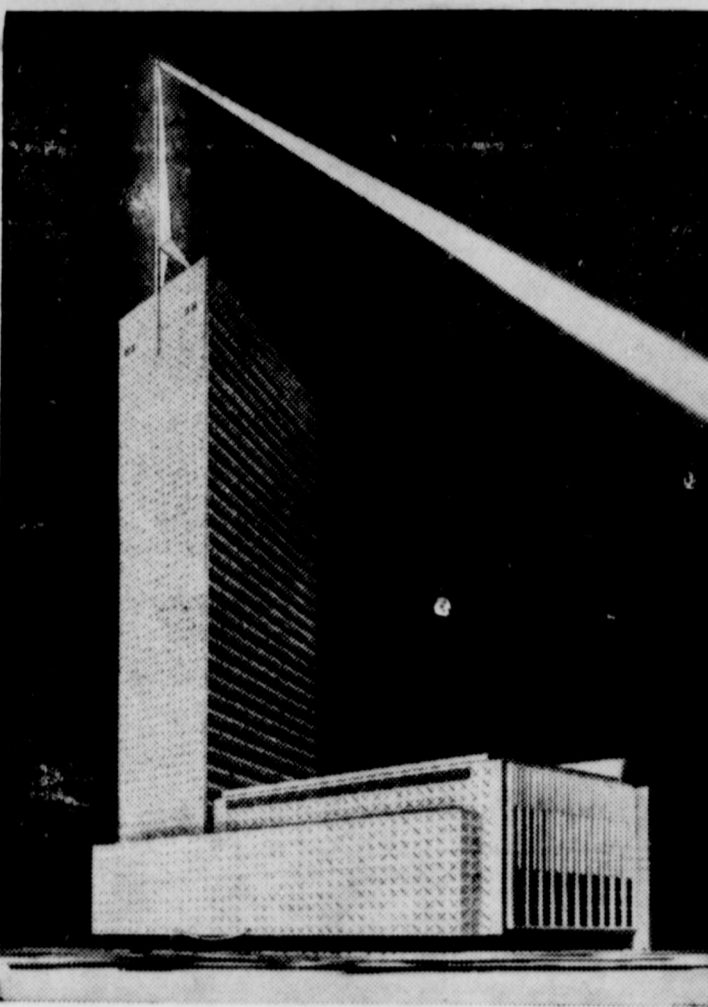
Other plans are available for the asking.

The storage facilities should be cleaned and rid of all sources of weevil, rodent or bird infestation. Progressive farmers attend to this before the new crop is harvested. Even a hand full of grain left over from last year may harbor enough weevils to spread quickly into a serious infestation. New and old effective residual insecticides as buildings should be sprayed with DDT, methoxychlor, Pyrethron or TDE.

Spray or brush pyrethron, carbon disulfide, ethylene dichloride or carbon tetrachloride in bins old or new.

BANK ON THE BEAM

This is an artist's conception of a half-billion candlepower beacon light which will top a 150-foot tower on the Republic National Bank Building nearing completion in downtown Dallas. The beam will be visible 120 miles, and will rotate 12 times a minute. The beacon tower will give the building a total height of 593 feet. Basic lighting for the tower itself will be accomplished with more than two miles of red, white and blue "Lumenarc" tubing, a newly-developed, super-brilliant lighting tube.

Safety — Safety — on the farm or on the road 28 per cent of the drivers in fatal accidents were violating the speed law in 1952—17 per cent were exceeding state speed limits—11 per cent were exceeding safe speeds although traveling less than the speed limit.

Cotton Burrs
This is about cotton burrs. Ginners and farmers should know this to take advantage of being able to apply cotton burrs on the land to increase cotton yields. Five tons of burrs on cotton land near Floydada, Texas increased the yield about 54 per cent over same land with no cotton burrs. On April 9th, 1964 the U.S.D.A.-ARS Pink boll worm project issued an approval on the use of Dual Fans operated

ton application. These burrs increase the organic matter, water holding capacity, and moisture penetration for additional dividends. The five tons of burrs showed a \$33.00 per acre increase. Not bad; so lets save these burrs if a farmer is too busy to double his net income in the fall by hauling burrs, then he might be too busy to farm. Think this one over then get the burrs.

Poultry
Ray Tucker, 4-H Club boy, entered the Chicken-of-tomorrow Contest. When the broilers were 9 weeks old he sent 15 of his 100 broilers to Center, Texas. They averaged three pounds each, were judged alive and dressed. Ray received a white ribbon, and market price for the entry. Indian River chicks were his selected breed. This is a challenge to all of us poultry growers; if you want meat production get broiler chicks and have them weighing three pounds each at nine weeks of age.

Daniel Says...

Washington, D. C. — In response to hundreds of letters and telegrams from Panhandle and West Texas farmers, Senator Price Daniel has asked the Senate Finance Committee to include a provision in the new Income Tax Revision bill to permit farmers to deduct for installation of underground concrete pipe as a current farm operating expense.

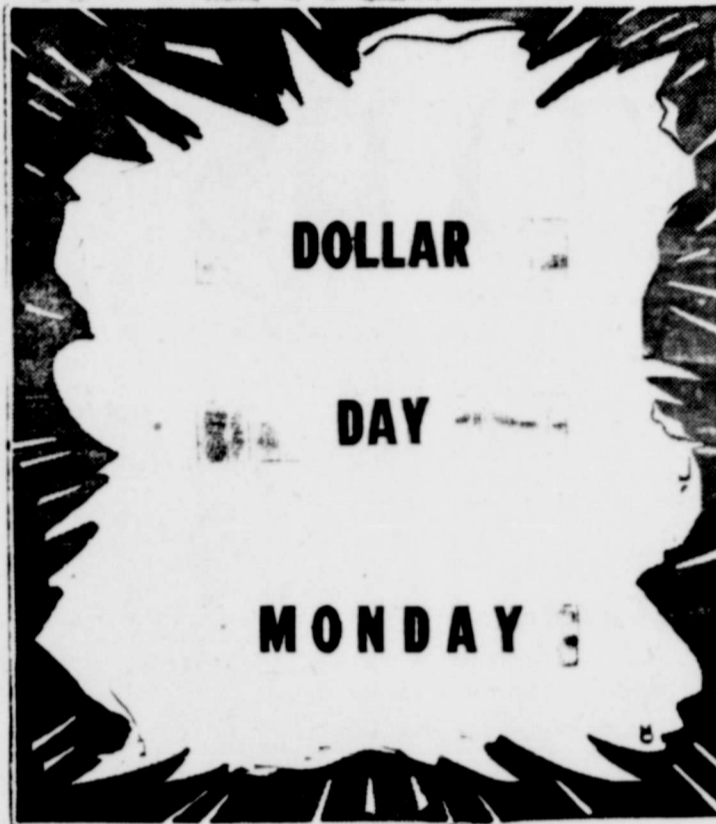
"The wise use and conservation of irrigation water is of supreme importance in the drought areas of our Country," Senator Daniel told the Committee. Such a provision would assist materially in the conservation of this valuable resource."

Under present law, expenditures made by farmers to improve their land are required to be capitalized rather than deducted as a current expense. As passed by the House of Representatives, the new bill would allow the farmer to deduct the cost of soil and water conservation improvements

as a current expense, up to a maximum of 25 percent of the gross income derived from farming in any one year.

Senator Daniel's proposal would extend this provision to include the installation of underground irrigation pipe, which is now specifically excluded from the bill. "As far as it goes, the new section is certainly a step in the right direction to encourage sound conservation practices on our farms," the Senator observed. "However, I believe the Committee would do well to give this additional assistance to the irrigation areas of the Country."

Daniel said he was receiving hundreds of letters daily from West Texas farmers in support of this proposal.

your senator reports . . .

Lyndon Johnson

GRAVE CONCERN. The shipment of communist arms to Guatemala is a question of grave concern to every American.

The actual amount of weapons landed in that Central American country may not have been very large. But the implication is far-reaching. It means that we must devote some cool, careful thought to our whole foreign policy.

This is the first communist military penetration of the Western Hemisphere that we know about. In the past, communist agents have remained in the shadows. They have confined themselves to agitation, propaganda, espionage and sabotage.

Now, they apparently feel that they are ready to arm groups of

men and form them into military organizations. We do not know what they will do with these arms. Maybe they will be used for guerrilla fighting. Maybe they will be used for border sniping.

Whatever the use, it means the cold war has entered a new stage!

It has been brought into our own backyard. Fortunately, we have some real friends among the South American nations. We also have machinery through which we can act.

The American states can act speedily to isolate Guatemala. Economic sanctions can be invoked. Joint action is possible to prevent the shipment of any communist arms into the Western Hemisphere.

STATES RIGHTS. Senate rejection of the Constitutional Amendment to lower the voting age to 18 is one of the most important blows that have been struck for States Rights in recent years.

The issue was clear. At present, every State has the Constitutional right to determine the minimum age of its voters. Had the Amendment been approved by Congress

and three-fourths of the states, this right would have been lost.

The Senate decision to reject the Amendment did not reflect opposition to 18-year olds voting. This point was made clear by the fact that Senator Richard B. Russell, of Georgia, led the opposition to the proposal.

Senator Russell's native state permits 18-year olds to vote. He took the position that other states should have the same right of choice.

I agreed strongly with this position! I think that Texans are fully capable of deciding for themselves the proper level of the voting age. I do not think that we should be forced by Congress and the other states to set any arbitrary limit.

Had the amendment been approved, we Texans would have lost our right of choice! I think it was quite properly rejected.

IMPORTANT TO TEXAS: Debate on this Constitutional Amendment was only one of many major Congressional activities during the week

Of major importance to Texas was the Senate Appropriations Committee report on the Rivers and Harbors bill.

This is the measure which decides each year the dams and reservoirs that will be built and those which will be postponed to a later date. An authorization for dam or a reservoir is only the first step! It must be followed by an appropriation which supplies the actual cash.

One project of particular interest involves \$1,000,000 for the Ferrell's Bridge Dam and Reservoir in East Texas. This project -- authorized in 1946 -- is an essential part of the Red River flood control and levee improvement plan.

According to top experts completion of this plan would eliminate 90 per cent of the floods which originate in the headwaters of the Red River.

The Red River basin drains a highly important farming area. It is also a region of important industrial plants -- including the Lone Star Steel plant.

OTHER PROJECTS: The committee also approved funds to continue work on other major projects which have been started or approved in the past. They include Belton Reservoir; the Dallas Floodway; the Fort Worth Floodway; the Garza-Little Elm Reservoir; the Guadalupe River Channel to Victoria; the Houston Ship Channel; the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi Waterway; the Texarkana Reservoir.

This means action -- action on an important phase of the Texas water problem. There is nothing more vital to our state.

WATER FACILITIES: The Senate passed a bill making the benefits of the Water Facilities Act available to the whole country instead of just to arid and semi-arid arid areas.

I was a co-sponsor of this measure and was extremely interested in its passage. It provides for financial and other aid in the construction and maintenance of water storage facilities. The new

measure would also increase the limit on the amount of aid available.

This measure is a recognition of the fact that water is becoming a national problem. Our population is increasing rapidly -- at a rate of 2,000,000 a year. The time is not too far distant when it will take all of our skill and ingenuity to produce enough food and fiber to feed and clothe our people.

In the past, water has been serious concern only to the dry regions of our country. National thinking must change. We must realize that all Americans are affected.

A NOTE OF THANKS: I want to thank all my Texas friends who made my recent trip to Texas so enjoyable. On May 28, I participated in the dedication of Belton Dam. On that same evening, I spoke before the San Antonio Junior Chamber of Commerce -- a live wire group.

The following day, I had the privilege of speaking in Dallas

when that great Texan Robert B. Anderson received the A. Harris Company Texas award. I want to say a few personal words about Bob Anderson. There is no more able official in any executive branch of our government than Bob Anderson. He is a great statesman, a great public official, a great human.

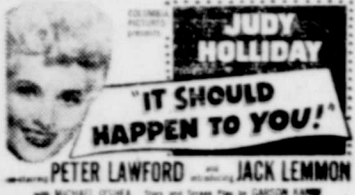

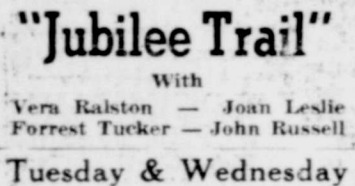

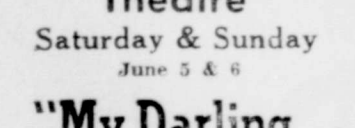

THE POET'S ENIGMA

New Program Originated Recently To Fight "Refrigerator" Menace

A new program has been inaugurated to fight the menace of young children being suffocated in discarded refrigerators, freezers, and other airtight cabinets. The number of children dying in this manner is not as great as that compared to other accidental deaths that children suffer -- but it is absolutely needless that a single child should die because of discarded airtight cabinets.
Only recently the Morton Jaycees conducted a program to eliminate old refrigerators.
The solution is simple. Every discarded refrigerator and freezer must be rendered harmless. This can be done by:
1. Removing the entire door by removing the hinges;
2. Removing the latch or latch-stop with a screwdriver and ripping the rubber gasket from the door;
3. If used as a general storage cabinet, by drilling holes through the body of the refrigerator and removing gasket, so that anyone caught inside can breathe.
4. If the box is temporarily stored in the basement or garage, it should be turned so that the door faces the wall and can't be opened by children--or the door can be tied shut with stout wire or rope.
Education is an important element in this program -- to make people conscious that when a freezer, refrigerator or airtight cabinet is abandoned permanently, or is to be used as storage space, it should be rendered harmless.
It has been estimated that more than 3 million airtight cabinets are being discarded every year. And there are over 50 million of these cabinets in use today -- usually larger in size than in former days -- so that over the next 20 years the problem will be a constantly growing one.
To help solve it, the DISCARDED REFRIGERATOR AND FREEZER SAFETY DRIVE is being spearheaded the week of

June 6-12, 1964. This date was chosen because summer is the most inviting time for children to get into trouble and lose their lives, because of leisure time.
The drive is being supported by the Household Refrigerator and Farm & Home Freezer Sections of NEMA (National Electrical Manufacturers Association), NEMA, through the sales and field organizations of its member manufacturers, is distributing the material which has been prepared. This Association is also continuously alerting its members to the need for constant vigilance and cooperation.

The National Safety Council is lending important cooperation to this program. Radio and TV announcements and releases are being sent to hundreds of stations and to daily and weekly newspapers all over the country. The Council's publication -- SAFETY EDUCATION -- has made a full-page announcement to 8,000 leaders in school safety programs throughout the country. Local Safety Councils have been alerted. Boy Scout, Girl Scout and Cub Scout organizations, through their own facilities, are putting this program in motion. The 4-H Club organization, nation-wide, has already alerted its members to cooperate.

The National Safety Council is distributing more than 26,000 posters on this subject, and more than 200,000 data sheets which go to school safety officials on a nationwide basis, covering 1,100 school systems.

In addition, through NEMA, the cooperation of industries and organizations is being enlisted -- including safety engineers, casualty insurance companies and their agents, local service and fraternal club, and others. Any help that any organization -- local, regional or national -- can lend, whether or not it is directly connected with the industry, can aid in eliminating this menace and thereby perform a worthwhile community service.
