## MALOUF'S HIT

# Two In Custody Following Second Friona Robbery

Two men are in custody at the Parmer County Jail in Farwell, charged with the burglary at Malouf's Dry Goods Store in Friona last Thursday night.

They have been bound over to the action of the Parmer County Grand Jury.

Mario Castillo of Friona and Rololfo Cardenas of Murton

were arraigned following a break-in at Malouf's in which hundreds of dollars worth of merchandise was removed from Malouf's store.

Castillo was arraigned on charges of burglary and wife-child desertion, with bond set at \$1,000 each. Cardenas was arraigned on a burglary charge and bond set at \$1,000. Both are felony charges.

The two men were apprehended early Friday morning of last week by night patrolman Billy Lucas, who saw the car pulling out from the Malouf store.

When the car sped down sixth street with its lights off, Lucas gave chase. Trying to elude the officer, the pair turned into a driveway in the 1000 block of West Sixth, but Lucas was close behind, and made the arrest.

The car was loaded down with scores of dresses, suits, pants, shirts and other merchandise from the dry goods store. Two radios taken were not immediately recovered, but were later found where they had been hidden by a roadside in a patch of weeds.

Also recovered was a box of merchandise taken from a pickup belonging to Ralph Roden, which was parked in the rear of BI-Wize Drug.

Entrance to the dry goods store had been gained by breaking a large plate glass window on the Sixth Street side of the store. Malouf's is located at Sixth and Main.

After gaining entrance, the pair allegedly stuffed their car, working through the large hole

in the window on the south side of the store. The arrested pair was driving a 1957 two-door Ford car.

"You wouldn't believe all of the stuff they had taken, just to have used a car," said John Malouf, store owner. Most of the retrieved merchandise was found in good shape, although some items were damaged.

A large human-shaped hole in the window was in evidence as the store opened for business on Friday. Malouf said there was quite a mess to clean up, including broken glass, and clothes strewn in the store aisles.

The burglary was the second for a downtown Friona store in less than a month. On the night of September 9, Hurst's Department Store was hit by burglars who took an estimated \$15,000 in merchandise. Area peace officers are still checking out leads in this robbery.

Officers placed the time of the robbery as between 12 midnight and 1 a.m. The arrest was made at 1:05 a.m.

# State Water Hearing Was Well-Attended

A large delegation from the Friona area was in attendance at the hearing conducted by the House of Representatives' water import hearing at Hereford last Saturday at the Bull Barn.

Five members of the Texas House of Representatives heard four and one-half hours of testimony from people throughout the region, telling of the need for a water import program, and pledging their support to the program.

Two residents of the Friona area were among those giving testimony. They were Bruce Parr and Jim Roy Daniel, and both represented the Parmer County Water Users Association.

Among the organizations

which testified were Water, Inc. and three or four water districts within the state. Also testifying were commodity groups, such as the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Assn., Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Plains Cotton Growers.

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake is chairman of the committee, and conducted the hearing. Other members of the House Interim Water Study committee are Menton Murray, Harlingen, Neal Solomon, Mt. Vernon, Bill Fink, San Antonio and Bill Swanson, Houston.

Prior to the hearing, the committee toured spots of interest in the area, including

Texas Tech's semi-arid studies, Missouri Beef Packers and the Holly Sugar Corp. Testimony brought out that the economic benefits of imported water would more than justify the cost to the West Texas area.

The committee had asked "If water could be delivered to West Texas at approximately \$20.00 per acre foot, plus a 10 per cent increase in all property taxes, would farmers be willing to contract for water at that price and pay the additional tax?"

Testimony was unanimous in the fact that the \$20.00 per acre foot of water plus the increased taxes would be a bargain, to keep the economy of

the area at a high level. Many farmers who keep accurate records feel as though they are already paying \$20.00 per acre foot for the water they pump.

It was brought out that an educational program would be needed to convince city residents to approve the proposed 10 per cent increase in property taxes, but most who testified thought that with the alternative of going back to a dry-land area, this could be done.

The hearing was one of a series which has been held over the state, and afforded some of the committee members their first close-up look at the West Texas area, and they seemed favorably impressed.

Two changes in the managerial structure of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. have been announced in recent days by Robert E. Frye, president, and J.C. Walker, executive vice-president.

Dale Millard has joined Missouri Beef as plant superintendent of the Friona division. Millard was formerly with Raskin Packing Company, Sioux City, Iowa, and Iowa Beef Packers, Dakota City, Neb.

Also G.A. McGlumphy has retired from active management as senior vice president of the company, and will continue to serve as a member of the board of directors.

"We greatly appreciate the valuable contributions made by Mr. McGlumphy to the company and we are pleased that he will continue to make his expertise in the fields of live cattle procurement and sale of dressed beef available to the company," Frye said.

## Chiefs Try To Regain Form At Hale Center

Friona's Chieftains will attempt to get back in the District 3-AA running Friday night at Hale Center, when they test the Owls.

The Chiefs will be out to revenge an upset which Hale Center pinned on Friona last season, when the team was scrapping to get back into the thick of district play.

Friona owes the Owls more than one beating. Hale Center is the only team which defeated teams coached by former Coach Don Light as many as three defeats, and their 36-4 win at Hale Center in 1965 was the worst defeat a team of Light's suffered. In six series games, Hale Center has beaten Friona five times.

The Chiefs will be out to make amends for their 46-7 loss to Dimmitt last week.

Hale Center has a 3-1 identical record to Friona's. The Owls' only loss was to Tahoka in the third game of the season. They came back to upend previously undefeated Floydada, 16-0 last week at the Whirlwind's homecoming.

The Chiefs came out of the Dimmitt game without an injury. "Except to our pride," said Coach Bob Owen. Guard Ramey Beene received a badly bruised arm in Tuesday's workout, and coaches at first thought he had a broken arm, but examinations proved it wasn't broken.

## Water Meter Population Growing

One new water meter was added by the city of Friona during September, bringing the total number of active accounts at the end of the month to 1127.

Records showed that 21,628,800 gallons of water were pumped during the month, an average of 720,960 gallons per day. This is down almost 50 per cent from the previous month's high, which was an all-time high production.

Rainfall during September amounted to 1.59 inches, most coming the evening of September 23, when 1.48 was recorded.

Three new sewer taps were made, bringing the total number of active taps to 1066. An estimated 3,000 feet of mains were rodded in the Steley and West Loop additions after a stoppage occurred behind the Fulgham residence on September 21.

Only two fire alarms were sounded during September, and both were automobile fires. Flake Barber had one occur on West Seventh Street on September 6, and Ray Carlisle had \$200 damage on a highway west of Missouri Beef Packers.

The police department reported 29 arrests during the month. Twenty-six were for traffic violations, and three for drunkenness. Twenty-four warning tickets were issued for transients parking on Highway 60.

Four auto accidents were investigated with no resultant injuries.

### On The Farm In Parmer County

"Where the action is," seems to be utmost in the minds of many of our young people today, according to Jack Selbert, Editor of the National 4-H News magazine. They must have the feeling of belonging, of being wanted, of being "where the action is." And being a part of that action is important, too.

With their vast supply of almost unlimited energy, many times it is difficult -- and in some instances impossible -- to keep their energies and interests channeled in the right direction.

Too often, newspapers carry front page stories of youth who have expended their energies just for the right direction.

"Look at me, please, I just want to be noticed," is what they seem to be saying. But, by the time they are on the front pages, it may be too late. Already they have lost their self-respect -- the respect of others in their own age group -- the respect of adults -- the respect of their communities. They've lost sight of the true value of responsibility toward themselves; toward others. And, they have lost respect for the rights of others.

"The answer is 4-H Action," says Selbert. Action by belonging to a 4-H Club -- action by being wanted to join an organized club -- action by participating in its leadership and by sharing in its responsibilities.

Beginning in September 4-H members between the ages of 9 and 19 began enrolling for a new 4-H year. If any prospective 4-H members want to join 4-H they are encouraged to make the next local 4-H meeting in their community. The meeting time and place for each club is as follows:

Lazbuddie -- meets fourth Monday night of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the Lazbuddie School Cafeteria; Bovina -- meets the first Tuesday night of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the Bovina School Cafeteria; Fri-

ona-meets the second Monday of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the Friona Methodist Church; Farwell-meets the third Tuesday of the month at 4:00 p.m. in the Farwell City Hall; Oklahoma Lane -- meets the second Monday of the month in the Oklahoma Lane Community Center.

4-H'ers do varied projects in science, agriculture, home economics, personal development, community service, leadership and citizenship.

The key to a successful 4-H program is interested and active adult leaders and parents. Adult leaders give leadership and training to 4-H'ers in the various project areas. More leaders are needed to provide training in the various project areas.

Parents are the most important link in the 4-H chain, except for the 4-H member. Parents provide support to 4-H by showing interest and participating in the various 4-H activities. Parents many times serve as subject matter leaders.

This combination of 4-H'er parent, adult leader in addition to local businessmen support equals a successful future generation of people.

 AN ORDINANCE DEFINING THE VARIOUS KINDS OF WASTE-REFUSE-GARBAGE; REGULATING THE KINDS AND SIZE OF RECEPTACLES IN WHICH TO PLACE THE SAME; THE MANNER OF ITS PREPARATION AND WHERE IT MUST BE PLACED TO BE COLLECTED BY THE CITY SANITATION DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR COLLECTING SAME AND PROHIBITING THE PLACING OF GARBAGE OR ANY ARTICLE OR MATERIAL IN THE STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS PROVIDING FOR SERVICE CHARGES; PROHIBITING THE MEDDLING, SCATTERING OF CONTENTS, PILFERING OR JUNKING WITH GARBAGE CANS, TRASH OR RUBBISH RECEPTACLES, PROHIBITING JUNKING OR CARRYING OFF THE PREMISES OF THE DUMP GROUND ANY ARTICLE OF JUNK; PROHIBITING THE COLLECTION OF GARBAGE, TRASH OR RUBBISH BY OTHERS THAN CITY FORCES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; ESTABLISHING ADDITIONAL RATES FOR SERVICES OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS; AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY IN ANY SUM NOT TO EXCEED \$200.00.  
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

Section 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where "kitchen garbage" accumulates to provide a portable garbage can constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, with two handles and a tight fitting cover of a capacity not less than ten (10) gallons nor over thirty (30) gallons and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in this garbage can.  
 It shall also be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place all trash, rubbish and refuse from said premises in boxes, sacks, trash cans or other receptacles provided that the gross weight does not exceed fifty (50) pounds or the size exceed the dimensions of 2'x2'x4'. Garbage cans, boxes, sacks or cans of trash and rubbish and tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding four (4) feet, and shall be placed inside the property line at the edge of the alley, where there is no fence; where there is a back fence with alley gate, garbage cans, boxes, sacks or cans of trash, rubbish and tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding four feet) shall be placed against inside of fence at side of alley gate; if there is no alley gate, there shall be built a platform against inside of fence below top of fence so that garbage collecting vehicle can drive close up to fence and lift the garbage, trash and rubbish over the fence; and where there is no alley, kitchen garbage shall be placed in a portable garbage can.

Section 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "waste-refuse-garbage" ordinance of the City of Friona. The word "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theatres, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist courts, apartments, sanatoriums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots and all other places within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, where garbage, waste, refuse, trash or rubbish accumulates in ordinary quantities.  
 The various kinds of waste-

bage, trash and rubbish shall be placed inside curb line of street, to be collected by the city garbage vehicles.

Section 3. The places of wholesale accumulations, such as killing and dressing plants for fowl, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses, storage and other places where the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, are not included in the service furnished by the city sanitation department and such places are required to remove the same to the city incinerator at their own expense, in the manner and by the method directed by the city manager and the governing body of the city.

Section 4. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses and mules shall be delivered to the city incinerator at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge in the manner and by the method directed by the city manager.

Section 5. Accumulations of brick, broken concrete, lumber, ashes, clinkers, cinders, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials, shall be disposed of at the expense of owner or person controlling the same under the direction of the city manager.

Section 6. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and waste oils from garages or filling stations shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for same under the direction of the city manager.

Section 7. The city sanitation department will not make collection of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish or tree limbs where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

Section 8. The placing of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish or any article, thing, or material, in any street or alley within the city limits is prohibited.

Section 9. The disposal of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish and that designated under sections 4, 5, and 6 of this ordinance or any kind of rubbish in any place within the city limits except at the city incinerator, is prohibited.

Section 10. The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

Section 11. Employees of and city officers directing operation of the city sanitation department and authorized per-

sons delivering garbage or other rubbish to the city incinerator are allowed on the incinerator grounds, all other persons are prohibited.

Section 12. All junk and other material of the dump ground at the incinerator is the property of the City of Friona, and no person is allowed to separate and collect, carry off or dispose of same except under the direction of the city manager.

Section 13. The collection of garbage, trash and rubbish or of any kind of junk within the city limits is prohibited except as provided for in Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6 of this ordinance.

Section 14. The lids or covers of all garbage cans shall at all times be kept secure and fastened so that flies and other insects may not have access to the contents thereof and said lids or covers shall only be removed while said garbage cans are being filled or emptied as the case may be. Chemicals and sprays must be used at places where receptacles for garbage, trash or rubbish, are located to keep down odors and flies. The contents of all receptacles shall be so protected so that the wind cannot blow or scatter the same on the streets and premises of the city.

Section 15. In the business district and from hotels, restaurants, cafes, cafeterias, boarding houses, sanitariums, and tourist courts, daily collections will be made. In the residential districts kitchen

garbage shall be prepared for collection to be made two times per week, or as often as may be necessary to comply with sanitary regulations of the city. Trash, rubbish and other refuse shall be prepared for one collection per week, at the time and manner of collections to be announced by the city manager.

Section 16. There shall be charges, assessed and collected, from each person, firm or corporation within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas, for each and every water meter or meters, listed or registered in his, her or its name, and through which water is purchased or used or obtained from the City of Friona, and said charges shall be listed as a separate item on each bill and shall be due and payable as and when the bill charged against any water consumer for water used is paid, said sum of money derived therefrom shall be used for the purpose of aiding and assisting the maintenance and operation of the Sanitation Department of the City of Friona, subject to the following rates or schedules, to wit:

Corporate City Limits, the above rates shall be increased fifty (50%) per cent. It shall be unlawful for any owner, occupant or lessee using or occupying a building, house, structure or apartment as a separate unit, to utilize the garbage containers or receptacles of another owner, occupant, tenant or lessee, for the disposal of his own refuse or garbage for the purpose of avoiding payment of the fees levied by this ordinance.

Section 17. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not more than \$200.00 and each day violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 18. This ordinance rescinds and supersedes ordinances No. 88 and 370, current series, City of Friona. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances or regulations of the City of Friona unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in which case the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effective after its passage and shall be reflected in the 20th October 1968 billings.

# Dimmitt-Friona Game Resembled 1962 Contest

If fans watching the Friona-Dimmitt game last Friday had the feeling that they had "seen all of that somewhere before," it might be because of the uncanny resemblance the game had to another game between the two schools in October of 1962.

Here are some of the coincidences between the two games:

\*Dimmitt won last Friday's game, 46-7. The Bobcats had won the 1962 game, 48-6. Last week's game was the worst defeat and most points scored against a Friona team since the other game under discussion.

\*Last week's game was Friona's homecoming game. The 1962 defeat was also at homecoming.

\*Friona scored first last week for a 7-0 lead, then saw Dimmitt score 46 straight points. Friona score first in the 1962 game, and Dimmitt came back for a 48-6 win.

\*The Chieftains held Dimmitt to only four net yards in the first quarter of the 1962 game. This was exactly what the Bobcats had at the end of the first quarter last Friday.

\*The Bobcats made a whopping 505 total yards last week. This was close to the 466 they rolled up in the 1962 contest.

\*Friona completed only one of 14 passes last Friday. In the 1962 game, the Chieftains completed one of 10.

\*The Chiefs scored following a fumble recovery deep in Dimmitt territory. Last Friday, the Chiefs recovered a Dimmitt fumble at the 14, drove to the one, and then scored on an intercepted pass.

Dimmitt racked up an unbelievable 505 yards against Friona - the Chieftains' worst defensive showing in over six years, and they did it in practically three quarters, since they were held to a net of four yards in the opening stanza.

Friona carried the fight in the opening minutes of play, and took an early 7-0 lead. The Chieftains took the opening kickoff and drove for two

first downs to midfield before having to punt. Lowery Harper's punt put Dimmitt in a hold at their own 10. On their third-down play, Dimmitt fumbled, and the Chiefs recovered at the 15 for a big break.

Quarterback Danny Kendrick gave the Chiefs a first-and-goal with a nine-yard gain to the three. Three plays found the Chiefs still at the three, and although Tony Perea dove over the line on fourth down, the ball got only to the one-foot line.

On their first defensive play, the Chieftains got the touchdown which the offense had missed. Quarterback Bill Sanders faded into the end zone to pass, was rushed, and his desperation pass, almost blocked, was grabbed by Joel Osborn for an easy touchdown.

Johnny Barker booted the point, and Friona fans cheered the 7-0 lead with 4:50 left in the opening period.

Early in the second quarter, the Bobcats came to life. Tailback Roy Thomas broke loose for an apparent 76-yard touchdown run, but a clipping penalty brought the ball back to the Dimmitt 44. It mattered little, because three plays later the angry Bobcats scored, with David Land going 10 yards.

The fleet Thomas ran for two points and Friona's lead was gone forever. The score was 8-7, after 4:40 of the second quarter.

Perea made the fans buzz by returning the kickoff 50 yards, almost breaking away. A clipping penalty erased 15 of the yards, though. The Chiefs drove to the Bobcat 33, but were held on a fourth-and-one situation to end their threat.

Late in the half, Friona held Dimmitt on downs and took over following a punt at their own 26. On third down, Kendrick faded to pass, was rushed, and fumbled as he was hit, Dimmitt taking over at the Friona 18.

It took the aroused Bobcats just three plays to score, with Sanders tossing to end Jerry Brady to the touchdown. Land added the kick, to send Dimmitt into halftime with a 15-7 lead.

Whatever hopes that Friona fans had for a Chieftain rally in the second half were meticulously wiped out each time the visitors had the ball to start the second half. The Bobcats ran only 19 plays during the last half, but five of them accounted for touchdowns, including two within less than a minute of each other to start the third quarter.

Dimmitt took the second half kick, and on the second offensive play, Land sprinted 50 yards up the middle to stretch the Bobcat lead to 21-7. Perea returned the ensuing kick to the Friona 45, but fumbled the ball on the first play from scrimmage, and Dimmitt pounced on the loose ball.

Two plays later, Land again got loose, breaking numerous tackles enroute to a 24-yard scoring run. This gave Dimmitt a 20-point bulge at 27-7, and only 1:14 was gone in the second half.

Later in the quarter, Mark Cleavinger of Dimmitt intercepted a Kendrick pass at his own 25 to climax a wild exchange of the ball which saw it change hands three times in four plays.

This time the Bobcats settled down. Thomas, the 148-pound speedster covered the 75 yards in two sprints. He gained 15 yards to the 40, and then dashed 60 yards on a right end sweep. Cleavinger's kick sent the scoreboard on up to 34-7.

Friona had its biggest threat on a drive starting in the third quarter and using up a third of the final period. The team drove from its own 39 to the Dimmitt 16 in a 19-play drive which ended as a fourth down halfback pass from Johnny Barker was slapped down by a Dimmitt defender.

Three plays later, Cleavinger, the reserve Bobcat quarterback, rolled out aroundright end and sprinted untouched, 80 yards for a touchdown against the tiring Friona defenders. This pushed the score to 40-7 with 7:39 left to play.

With reserves taking over for both teams, Nelson Chav-

ers, who replaced Land at full-back, made the end sweep work one more time, this time for 54 yards, and the score was 46-7.

Nor was this the last scoring threat by the visitors, Harper's punt was blocked late in the game, and Dimmitt took over at the 21. The Bobcats had the ball at the 14 when the game ended.

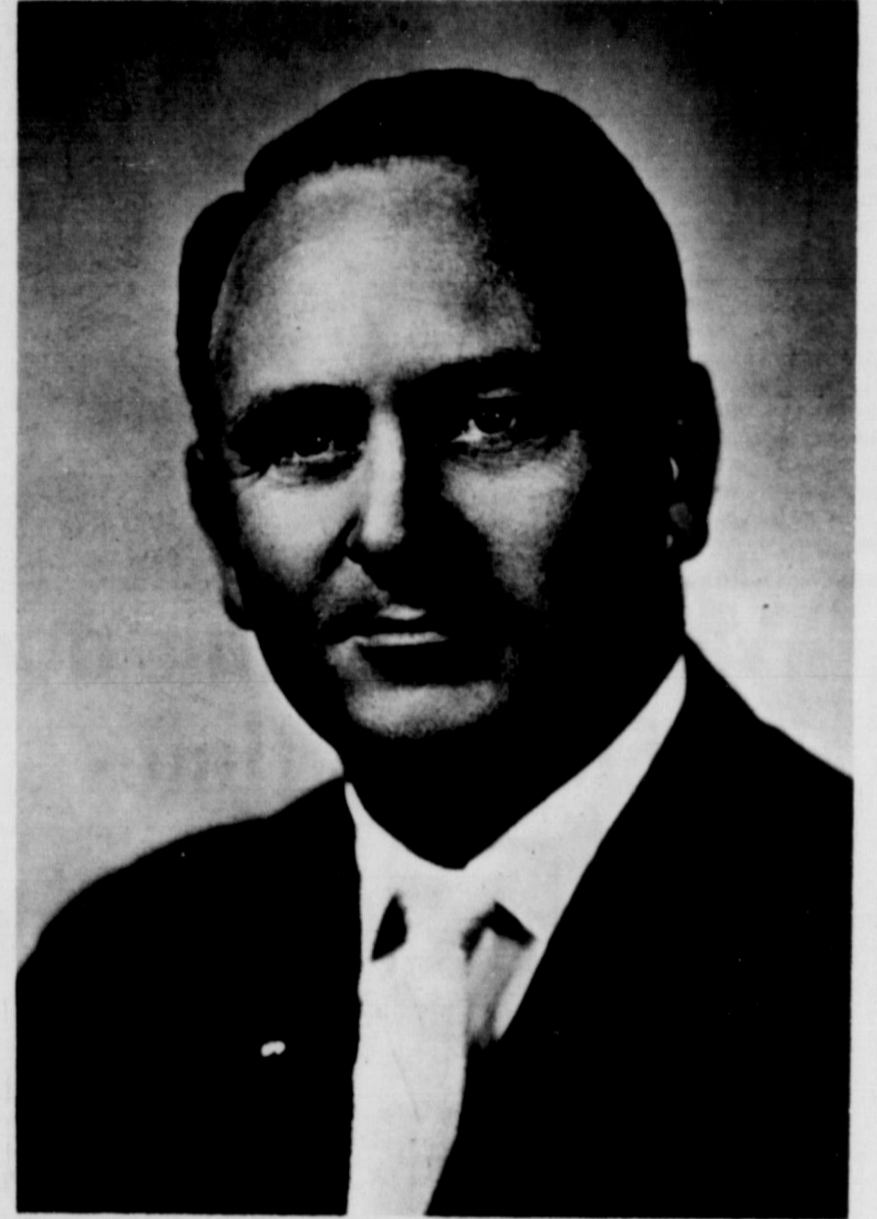
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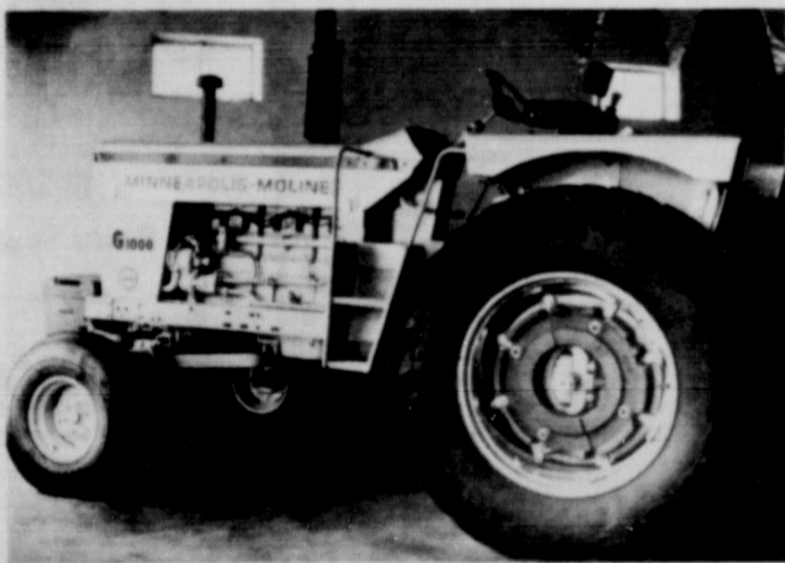
