OPEN HOUSE SLATED

Press Group In Preview Tour Of Packing Plant

Over 40 representatives of the press and area industrial leaders attended a special tour of the Missouri Beef facilities Monday, conducted by Missouri Beef's president, R.E. (Gene) Frye.

Representatives from the area's newspapers, television and radio stations were in attendance.

The special tour was arranged to help publicize the new Friona plant's dedication and open

house on April 20 and 21. The dedication ceremony, to which the public is invited, is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Saturday, April 20. State senator Jack Hightower of Vernon will act as master of ceremonies.

Jay Taylor of Amarillo is scheduled to be the dedication speaker.

The public open house for the giant facility, largest of its kind in the nation, will be held on Sunday, April 21, between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m.

Frye told members of Monday's special tour that the plant was the latest in modernistic design, both from an automated standpoint, and from a sanitation standpoint.

"I know you have all heard about the tightening of government regulations concerning sanitation in packing plants. We have tried to make our plant the model of sanitation, and we have used tile walls which can't absorb fats or bacteria," Frye said.

The Missouri Beef Packers president added that the plant is constructed so as to accommodate any kind of change which the government might make in regard to regulations.

Frye indicated that the company had a nucleus of key people who have been in training at the Rock Port plant for the past several months. These will train the new production employees who are hired.

The Missouri Beef executive stated that every consideration would be given to hiring construction employees for the production, especially where the workmen have proven to have a desire to stay on. Some 85 per cent of the construction crew has expressed a desire to stay on, he said.

However, he urged that those interested in employment put in their application (through the local Texas Employment Office), since he said the company might screen 800 prospective employees to come up with a work force of 220.

Frye said the company would have to await government approval of their initial test kill before beginning production, and hoped to be in production by May 1. Within 30 days the plant could be up to 50 per cent capacity, and could reach capacity within 60 days, with everything going right, he added.

Dog Catcher Hired; To Enforce Ordinance

The Friona city council Monday night hired a part-time dog catcher, who will work afternoons, from 5-7 p.m., and also voted to have the new dog catcher enforce the city ordinance for keeping dogs within property boundaries or on a leash. All dog complaints should be telephoned to the city office.

The council confirmed a contract for the annual sealcoating of approximately 20 blocks of city streets, awarded to Jake Diel Paving of Muleshoe at a bid of \$8,582.60.

The council authorized payments of \$3,063.93 to Nelson Welch and \$675.20 to Dan Eth-

ridge for repayment of utilities in their respective developments.

Approval was granted for the purchase of an additional two-way radio for the fire department, for the truck stored at Fred White Electric, at a cost of \$700.

In other business, the council authorized the city manager to solicit bids for an additional police patrol car, in accordance with Police Chief Bill Morgan's recommendation.

The results of the city election of last Saturday were officially declared, and the two aldermen elected were sworn

in. Mayor W.L. Edelman also signed a proclamation in connection with National Library Week April 21-27.

ABOUT NEW COURSES

Businesses To Be Canvassed Locally

Some 150 businesses and professional individuals in Friona are being mailed letters in Friona this week explaining two new courses which Friona High School plans to add for the 1968-69 school year.

The subjects are Distributive Education and Industrial Cooperative Training. Both will be instigated through the cooperation of Friona businesses, who can use, or may already be using, part-time student employees.

Distributive Education implies a direct engagement in merchandising activities, with the student having direct contact with buyers and sellers. Industrial Cooperative Training is the learning of a trade or skill such as mechanics, bricklaying, electrician,

carpenter, nurse's aid, dental assistant, etc.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr says "We have visited two schools which have the two programs, Hereford and Spearman, and through our visits we have determined that there is a need for the programs in Friona."

On Wednesday, April 24, members of the high school faculty will personally contact all businesses briefly about the programs. Businessmen will be under no obligation to participate, Farr points out, but adds that the desires and wishes expressed will determine the course the school will take.

Mrs. Caffey Resigns As H-E Instructor

Mrs. Dalton Caffey, who first taught in the Friona school system in 1947, resigned as Friona High School homemaking teacher this week, citing personal reasons for her resignation. The resignation was tendered at the regular meeting of the school board Monday night.

Mrs. Caffey has been homemaking instructor at FHS for 13 years. She taught from 1947-51, and then 1955 through 1957 at Friona High School, and after a four-year absence returned to her position in 1961. The school board accepted her resignation with regrets, thanking Mrs. Caffey for her service to the school.

In other business, the school board extended Porter Roberts' appointment as tax assessor - collector for another year. In his monthly report, Roberts stated that a total of \$1286.53 was collected in school taxes during the month of March.

The board canvassed the returns from last Saturday's election, in which board members

Louis Welch and Dr. Paul Spring were re-elected without opposition. Officers of the board were re-elected during Monday's meeting. Dr. Spring is president, Mrs. V.J. Zeman is secretary and W.M. Massie is vice president.

Sales Tax Defeated By 5-4 Margin Here

The proposition for the city sales tax for Friona was turned down by local voters last Saturday by a 5-4 margin. Actual vote on the issue was 206 against the proposition and 160 votes for.

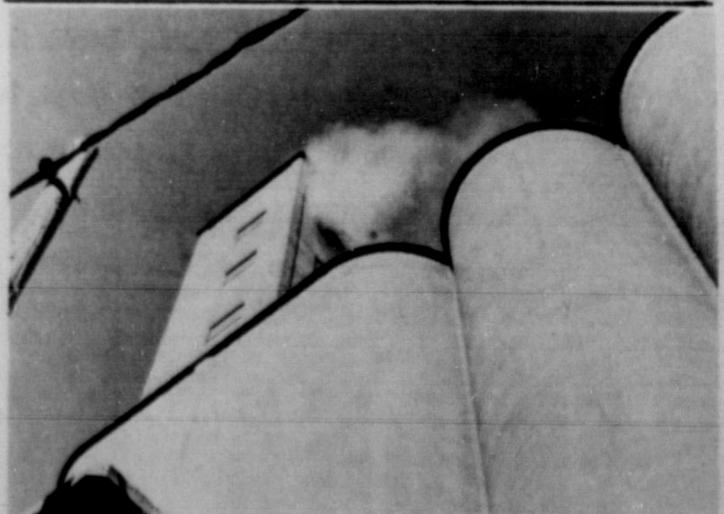
In the city council race, incumbent Rene Shead led the balloting with 296 votes. Robert Neelley, with 241 votes, was elected to fill the other council seat. Ed Clark received 137, and Charles Everitt 55. In the mayor's race, W.L. (Preach) Edelman, unopposed for the position, was elected with 302 votes. Former mayor R.L. Fleming received 11

write-in votes. Nelson Welch received one vote.

A total of 388 people voted in the election, considered a good turnout. However, an even larger turnout had been anticipated in many quarters, because of the sales tax angle.

In the school election held the same day and place, the two uncontested incumbents, Dr. Paul Spring and Louis Welch, were re-elected with 374 votes apiece. Wendol Christian had 333 votes for the at-large position on the county school board.

There were a total of 396 votes cast in the school election.

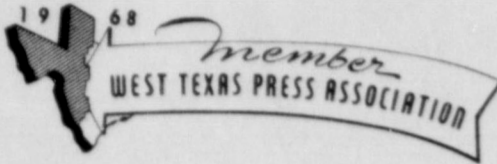

Easter Seal Society In Appeal For Support

A last minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was issued today by Mr. Joe W. Jones, who is the Easter Seal Representative in Farmer County. The Easter Seal provided treatment and services for 17,622 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas last year, Jones said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productiveness of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are doing without services and see that they receive the services they need. As Easter Seal Representative,

Jones is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 21 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

Jones asked that anyone in need of services contact him at Security State Bank in Farwell.

He added that the Easter Seal Appeal will close Sunday, April 14, and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Farmer County.

Pause And Reflect

"And If A House Be Divided Against Itself, That House Cannot Stand."
(St. Mark 3-25)

We are becoming a house divided. The armor of our democracy, so skillfully welded by the founding fathers, is being loosened and pried apart by forces within and without our continental boundaries. Our Fortress of Freedom whose walls were so painstakingly built of noble stones and laid with the mortar of human dignity are not able to withstand the onslaughts of deceit and internal decay.

Our nation, our ideals, our people were not to be conquered by direct frontal assault as was proven in two world wars.

Our foes, motivated by greed and jealousy, finding themselves unable to achieve the unity necessary for victory in war, cunningly changed their tactics both military and political.

There are none so blind as those who will not see, nor none so deaf as those who will not hear and we have been guilty on both counts.

As a result today smoke from our burning Capitol city wreathes the Washington monument.

One can not help but wonder what George Washington's mental and physical reactions would be.

A publication entitled Gentlemen's Journal had on the title page of its Jan. 1692 issue a motto "E Pluribus Unum." On June 20, 1782 this was adopted as the motto for the Seal of the United States.

E Pluribus Unum - One out of Many. That way lies Victory, any other road leads to humiliating defeat.

The downhill path also has a Latin motto - "Divide et Impera" - Divide and Rule. Which shall it be?

As this is being written, Sunday April 7, 1968, we are witnessing a phenomenon of Americana.

Today has been, by presidential decree, set aside for paying respect to the victim of an assassin's bullet.

Whatever our personal feelings toward the deceased we deplore the method that brought about his demise.

Let us get too carried away by eulogies and flags flying at half mast, it may be well to remember that this was the same man who stood in New York City's Riverside Church on the evening of April 4th, 1967 and delivered the most scathing denunciation of our President, our national policies and the men dying to protect the very freedoms he enjoyed.

In that dark hour that precedes dawn Mary Magdalene quietly, almost timidly, approached the sepulchre.

Finding it to be empty she ran to her friends and cried, "They have taken away the Lord and we know not where they have laid him!"

Some day when wars are over, when greed and jealousy are no more, when man has at long last been lifted from the slough of despond; it will not be due entirely to his own efforts. Nor will it be his accomplishments in the areas of science and technology.

The force behind the levitation will come from the power of faith in Almighty God and in that treasure which was "laid" in the hearts of mortal men - love and respect for a risen Christ.

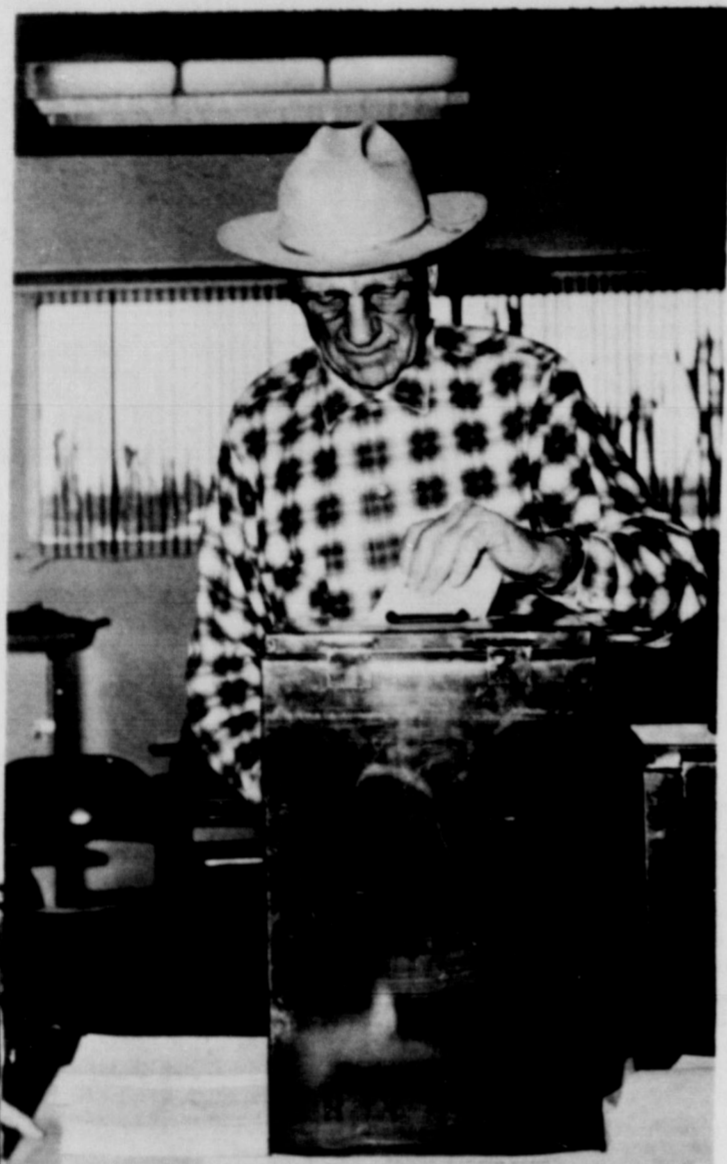

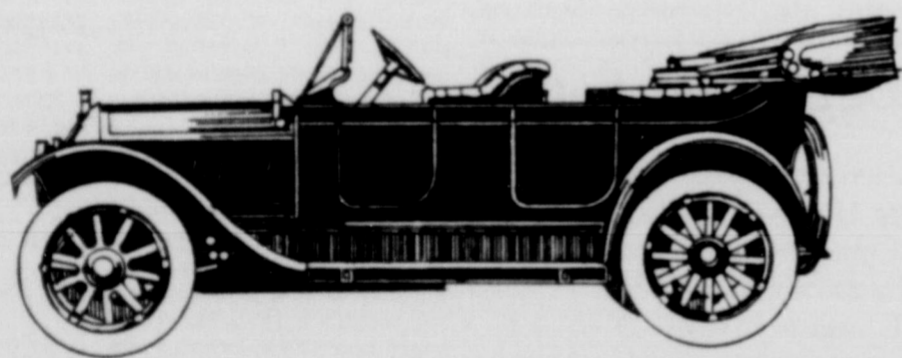

Murphree Adds 220 Record To List Of Achievements

(Special to the Star) Just about the time Danny Murphree appeared on the verge of neglecting to break his own 220-yard dash record, he did just that, accomplishing the feat last Saturday in the Tarleton State meet.

Murphree blazed halfway around the Tarleton track in 21.2, eclipsing by one-tenth of a second his old mark set last spring. In addition to that performance, Murphree, a junior tri-captain, who has gained more recognition for his prowess in the 440 as a Wayland Pioneer, broke the Tarleton stadium record in the quarter with a time of 48.2.

The Pioneers won the meet with 63 points and Murphree kept intact his string of four consecutive wins in both the 440 and 220.

He has run the quarter in 47.2, 48.1 (to tie his previous record), 48.2, 48.2, 48.3, and 48.5. His 220 winning times have been 21.2, 21.8, 22.4 and 22.6. He also ran a 48.0 in the mile relay.

Murphree has also helped the Pioneer mile relay team and 440 relay team to several wins.

Wayland placed first at Tarleton and Central State, second in their own High Plains Invitational and third in the Texas Tech quadrangular. WBC has a cumulative total of 245 points for the year.

The Pioneers will be competing in the Austin College Invitational at Sherman Saturday. The previous week at Texas Tech, Murphree climbed further up the NAIA honor roll by ripping off a blinding 47.2 440 to shatter his old mark of 48.1 set last spring. Although official NAIA status won't be available for some time yet, Murphree's time was considered to be one of the fastest in the nation this year. The previous week in the High Plains Invitational in Plainview he had rallied to overcome the Hardin-Simmons runner in the mile relay for a Wayland win and covered the distance in 48.0. That time would have been good enough for a school record had it been in the open quarter.

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Friona Does Well In Junior Literary Meet

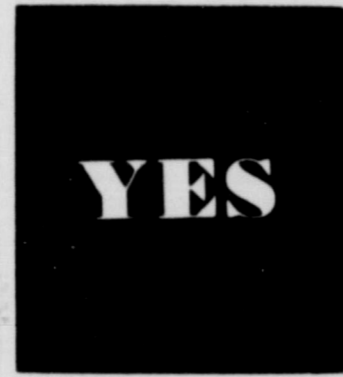

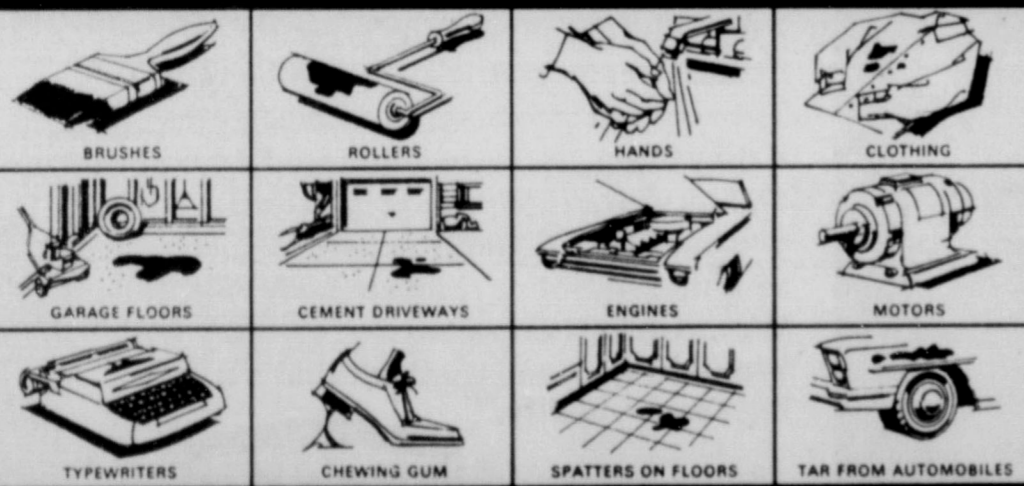

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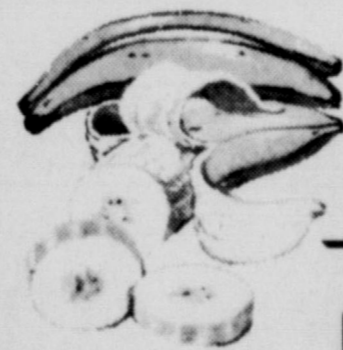

Census Bureau To Study Population Migration

Information to help determine national migration patterns will be sought from local households by the Bureau of the Census in its monthly Current Population Survey the week of April 15, Director Francis H. Wilmer of the Bureau's regional office in Denver, announced today.

Dale Hart is the local interviewer who will visit households in the Friona area.

Questions on household movements during the past five years will provide an insight into amounts and directions of population migration within the country and will be instrumental in forecasting future migration trends.

Other highlights of the April survey include special inquiries on types of work during the previous year, and questions on family size and place of birth of household heads.

These special queries will supplement the regular monthly questions on employment and unemployment.

The monthly surveys are taken in a scientifically selected cross-section of several hundred areas throughout the United

States, according to Director Wilmer. Survey questions are asked of more than 50,000 households in these areas. The identity of those questioned is kept completely confidential and the facts collected are used only for statistical purposes.

Bond Sales Are Noted For Month

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes in Parmer County totaled \$4,108, according to a report received today from Frank A. Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bond Committee. The January-February sales totaled \$7,445 and six per cent of the 1968 goal of \$130,000 has been achieved.

Texans purchased \$15,461,584 in Savings Bonds during February which is an achievement of 8.4 per cent over the same period of 1967. Year-to-date sales in Texas totaled \$31,804,412 and this is 17 per cent of the state's goal of 185.4 million.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Many farmers and ranchers have faced the problem of rapid seepage loss of lakes or stock tanks.

Bentonite is a natural clay which swells 10 to 12 times its dry size when wet. When it is mixed with the soil on the bottom or applied in a layer over the porous soil, bentonite forms an impermeable layer that stops seepage.

There are three methods of applying bentonite, the "blanket method," mixed blanket method, and the sprinkle method.

The blanket method usually results in the most efficient seepage control, but more care must be given in application than with the other methods. In the blanket method, the top 4 to 6 inches of soil from the lake are removed and the surface smoothed with a roller. The area is then covered with a layer of bentonite and the 4 to 6 inches of removed soil is care-

fully replaced.

After replacing the soil, roll or tamp it. If possible, control the flow of water into the lake to avoid damage to the treated area.

The mixed blanket method of application is somewhat less effective than the blanket method, but it is faster. First, all surface rocks should be removed and then the soil plowed or disked about four to six inches deep and smoothed.

The bentonite can then be disked through the soil layer and the surface rolled or tamped.

The sprinkle method of application involves the scattering of coarse particles of bentonite on the surface of the water. The particles sink to the bottom and swell to stop the seepage. Because uniform application with this method is impossible, this method is the least effective of the three.

That brings up the subject of "fibers." A little booklet on "Clothing Action" which gives the information of fabric terms, uses, care, and general characteristics. This can be quite helpful when shopping and it's available from the County Extension office here on second floor of Courthouse. Drop by for a free copy. It can save some sad mistakes when buying fabrics because it does give trade names (as well as other information) which confuses people if they aren't familiar with them.

Harry Nelson Resigns As Mo. Beef Official

R.E. Frye, President of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., announced that at a meeting of the Board of Directors on March 29, 1968, Harry J. Nelson, Executive Vice President of the

Company, requested his resignation from that position be accepted, effective May 31, 1968.

Nelson made his request to enable him to assume the duties of President of a meat packing operation now being organized by a group in a region out of the area now supplying the company's Rock Fort, Missouri, and Friona, Texas plants.

Frye stated that "The Board of Directors is appreciative of the invaluable contributions of Harry Nelson in the formative years of the Company. While regretting his loss from the management team, the Board realizes that his personal opportunity is such that it would not be in the best interests of the Company to act as a deterrent, and therefore, the Board has reluctantly accepted his resignation. The Board also appreciates the fact that Mr. Nelson delayed his departure to permit adequate time to select his successor."

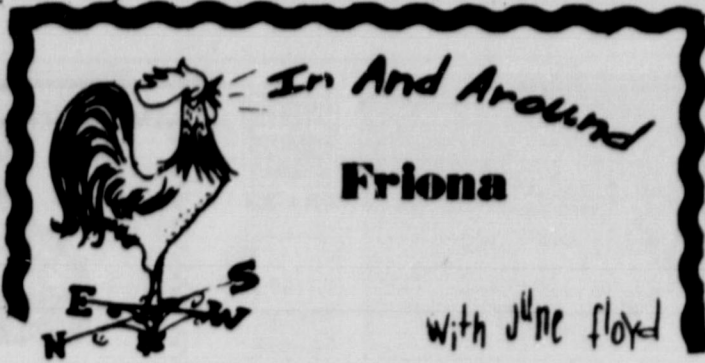

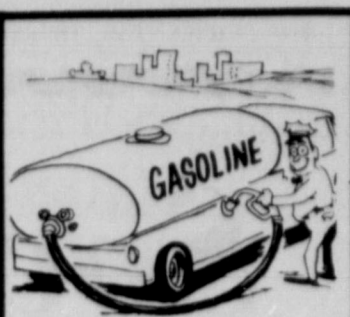

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Building Pace Slows Slightly In March

The building activity slowed down somewhat in Friona during March, according to official city records released this week by A.L. Outland, city manager.

Only four building permits were issued during the month, biggest was for the renovation of the commercial building in the 700 block of Main Street by Eric Rushing. Other permits included a new residence, a

storage building and the enclosing of a residential carport.

Total estimated value of construction represented by the permits came to \$27,800.

There were eight changes of ownership in city properties as reported by the county clerk's office during the month.

Records showed that 11,565,000 gallons of water were pumped during March, an average of 373,080 gallons per day, up considerably from the previous month. Only .52 inches of moisture was recorded during the month, mostly in the form of snow, on four different days.

Three new water taps were made, to bring the total number of active services to 1094 as of March 31. A separation in a main joint caused a street cut and repair at the intersection of Ninth and Pierce Avenue on March 19.

Four new sewer taps were made to bring the total number of active taps to 1036 as of the end of March. Approximately 2,259,738 gallons of sewage were pumped during the month, an average of 72,895 gallons per day and down from the previous month.

Seven fire alarms were sounded during March. Only two were within the city limits, for a total estimated loss of only \$125. Of the five outside the city limits, the losses amounted to \$5,370. The largest single loss was at the Tom O'Brian farm where his shop and garage burned on March 31 during a wind and dust storm.

Police department records showed a total of 40 arrests during the month, 25 on traffic violations, seven for gambling, two each for drunkenness, minor consumption and traffic warrants, and one each for driving while intoxicated and vagrancy.

Four auto accidents were in-

vestigated, with no resultant injuries. Six complaints were investigated on thefts, four on vandalism and one obscene phone call.

There were 17 man nights of jail occupancy.

Two internments were made during the month; J.M. Watson and Kenneth Ray Harvey.

Several days were utilized in street patching after the water leak cut and pot holes caused by snow-melted moisture. Filling of holes and grading of alleys took considerable time after the subsidence of the winter weather.

The annual small animal clinic was held on the afternoons of March 15, and 22 for anti-rabies vaccination. A total of 125 dogs were vaccinated and licensed.

The library reported four new bookshelves built and installed by Rockwell Brothers Lumber Co. during the third week of March. Forty-eight children attended the story hour on Thursday, March 28.

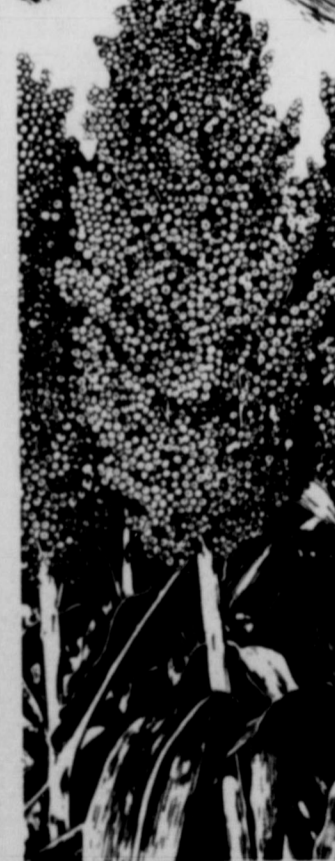
KNNN Slates

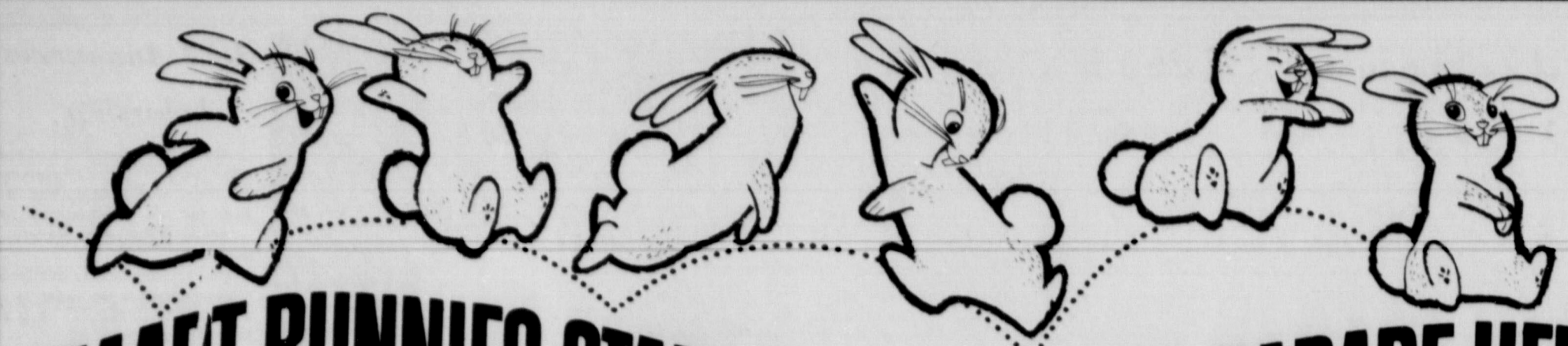
