

Grid Candidates Hit Workout Grind

Richard Nixon's chances to carry Texas appear to be as high as 50-50 at the present time, according to our Austin press representative, Vern Sanford.

Sanford states that depending on whom the Democrats nominate next week in Chicago, Nixon's chances appear high, despite the fact that only two Republican presidential nominees have ever carried Texas.

The first successful Republican in Texas was Herbert Hoover in 1928, carrying the state by 367,000 votes to 341,000. Dwight Eisenhower was the only other GOP candidate to win a majority in Texas, in 1952 and 1956.

Sanford points out that there are several factors which could shake up Texas' habit of going with the Democrat. One is the fact that in 1960, Nixon missed carrying the state by a slim 46,000 votes -- and with Lyndon Johnson the Democratic vice-presidential nominee.

And since Hubert Humphrey -- almost certain to be the Democratic nominee -- is known as being even more liberal than John F. Kennedy and Johnson, Texas' traditionally conservative-to-moderate voters could easily find Nixon more attractive, Sanford reasons.

The state capitol observer says that Nixon's choice of Maryland Gov. Spiro Agnew for the No. 2 spot on his ticket was to solidify the Republican slate as a "law and order campaign" to offset the influence of American Party candidate George Wallace.

Also, of course, Nixon will have the challenger's advantage of being able to attack the incumbent administration on touchy issues -- including the war in Vietnam, the monetary crisis and the racial situation in big cities.

On the other hand, Humphrey will have several pluses in his column when Texans go to vote in November. One could be his vice-presidential pick, which many people think Governor Connally has a good shot at.

Another will be Wallace's candidacy. As an extreme right winger, Wallace will probably draw considerably more votes away from Nixon than from Humphrey, and some estimates of Wallace's votes are as high as 50 per cent in West and East Texas and 30 per cent in Central Texas.

Hough Wins State Shooting Trophy

Hough took the state trophy in the sporter rifle shoot divi-

sion of the two-day meet at the Permian Basin Rifle and Pistol Club in Midland. Also entering the meet was Leon Coffey.

The Friona shooter had the best average of the 15 entrants in the sporter division of the 200-yard competition. Scoring is based on how close together the shooters can place five bullets.

Hough was also standing good in the 100-yard competition, but a slight mishap knocked him out of the running. He figured he was running about third at the time of the mishap.

The winning average for Hough's five shots in the 200-yard event was .6399 minute of angle.

Both shooters also entered the state hunter's rifle shoot on Sunday, but did not place in this category.

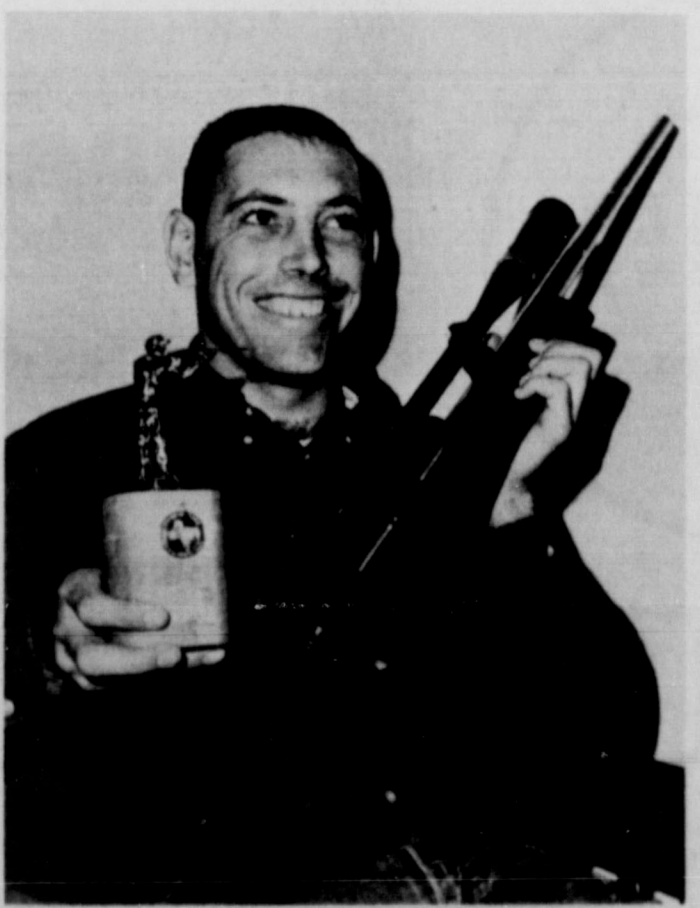
Hough has been competing in the state matches since 1966, but this is his first trophy.

SCHOOL BEGINS AUG. 28

Friona Schools Expect Enrollment Of 1450

School begins in the Friona School System next Wednesday, August 28. High School students and those who will be in grades 6, 7, and 8 will enroll on Tuesday, August 27.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr estimates that enrollment will be around the 1450 mark this fall, an increase of 50 from the average enrollment of last year. Farr says his estimate is probably conserva-

tive. High School principal Raymond Cook asks all high school students to report to the high school building at 9 a.m. Tuesday. They will meet in assembly for instructions.

Students who will be in grades seven and eight are to report to the grade school auditorium at 9 a.m. Tuesday, according to principal Tom Jarboe. Those who will be in the sixth grade

are to report to the grade school auditorium at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Fifth grade students will report at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday morning in the west wing of the junior high school building. Lists will be posted directing the students where they are to go.

Students in the first four grades report to the primary and grade school buildings on the first day of school August 28. First grade students are asked to enter the primary building through the south door. Second grade students will enter the same building in the

center (front) door.

Third and fourth grade students will enter the grade school building through the front door. If this procedure is followed, considerable confusion will be saved, according to grade school principal J.T. Gee.

Buses will run for the first time on Wednesday, which is the first day of school.

The first general faculty meeting will be held on Monday, August 26, at 8 a.m., in the high school cafeteria.

The Friona schools will observe a holiday on Labor Day, which is Monday, September 2.

D-E And ICT Classes New To Curriculum

Classes in Distributive Education and Industrial Cooperative Training are the most recent additions to the Friona School curriculum, according to a recent announcement by Superintendent Alton Farr.

These classes afford students of Junior and Senior standing both practical and theoretical training in a variety of trades and distributive occupations.

Practical work experiences are provided the student through part-time employment each afternoon at some cooperating business or industry within the city. The local school provides technical instruction on supervised basis in specially scheduled classes.

The program will operate under the direction of Don Phillips, Coordinator. Phillips will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate the practical and technical training.

An advisory committee of local business men will be set up by the school to assist Phillips in organizing and operating the new program.

The D.E. - I.C.T. training program will enable that large portion of our students who de-

sire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduating from high school.

Students who are interested in D.E. or I.C.T. training should visit Phillips at the High School between 9:00 and 12:00.

Mary Rando Is Contest Winner

Mary Rando, entered through the Farmer County Farm Bureau, won the District 2 "Talent Find" sponsored by the district Farm Bureau at Lubbock Coronado High School last Friday.

Miss Rando, who will be a senior in Friona High School this fall, will now be entered in the state "Talent Find" by the Farm Bureau, at the Texas District convention in November. Winner of the state contest will advance to a national Farm Bureau contest in Kansas City.

In the district contest at Lubbock, Miss Rando was one of three entries in the talent contest. She was accompanied by Jo Witten.

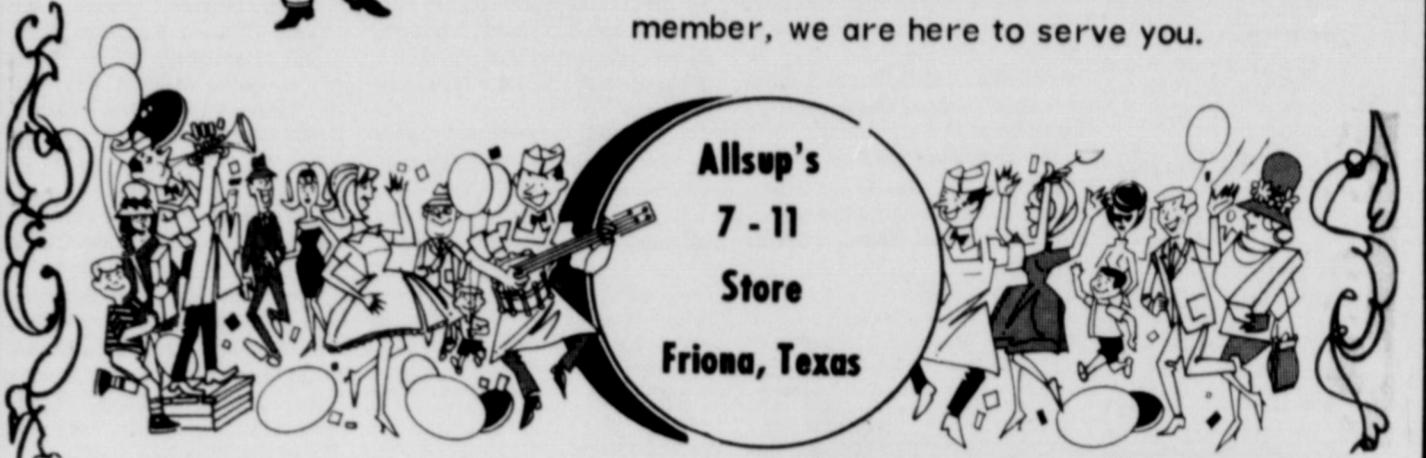

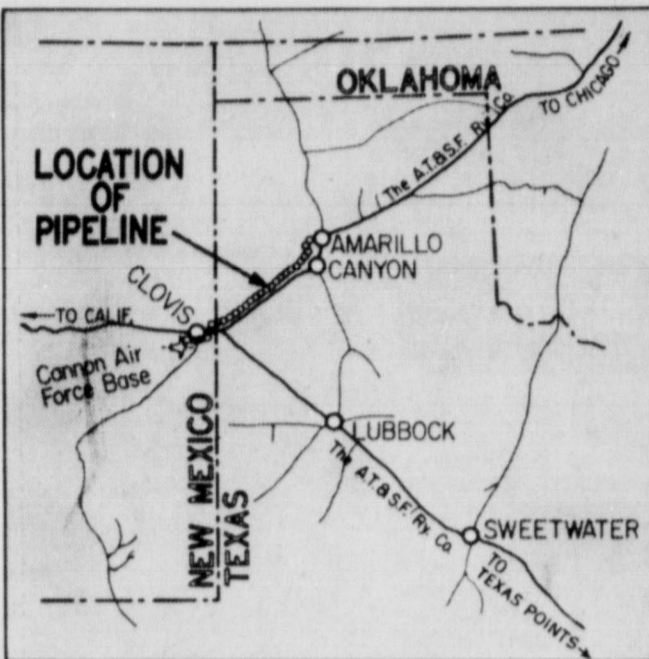

New Amarillo-Clovis pipeline starting operations this week adds another dimension to Santa Fe's marketing and distribution arm.

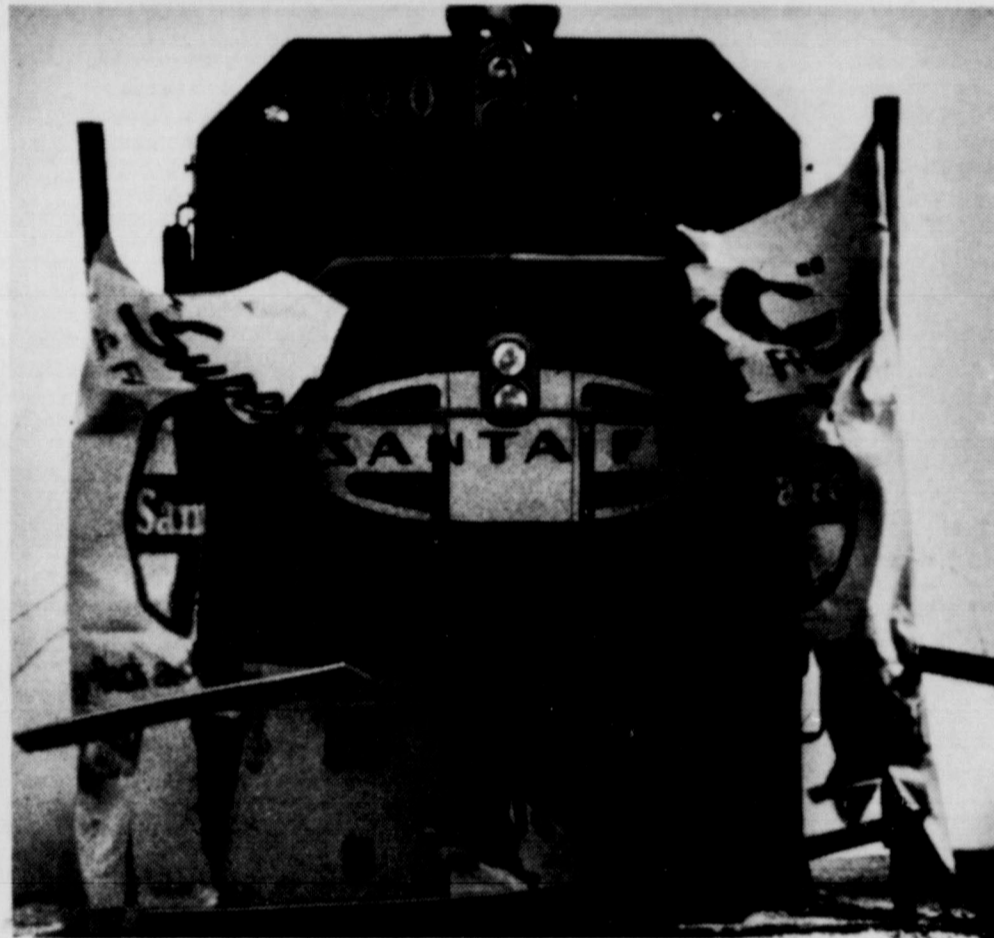

Water Hearing Set

As the result of an invitation from Deaf Smith County Water Association, the House Interim Water Study Committee of the Texas Legislature announced last Thursday that a public hearing on proposed legislation authorizing the formation of a master water import district will be held in Hereford on October 5. House member Bill Clayton, Chairman of the Committee, made the announcement in an address to the Water Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce quarterly conference in Wichita Falls.

The committee recently held a hearing in San Antonio, Clayton said, and on September 6 will have a hearing at Longview for the benefit of the people of East Texas, to be followed by the hearing in Hereford for the West Texas area.

Reports at the Hereford hearing also will be made by the Texas Water Development Board from Austin. Howard Boswell, Executive Director of the Board, will speak on the proposal and the forthcoming Revised Texas Water Plan. Also anticipated are representatives from the Mississippi Delta states, as well as numerous officers of various associations and agencies in West Texas.

The public hearings are needed, according to Clayton, to determine the thinking of the people affected by the water development plan. The public will

be given the opportunity to express its wishes in the formation of their governing water import agency. Testimony will be presented by several groups, and anyone desiring to comment on any phase of the legislative bill is invited to speak or present a written affidavit. The legislative proposal will be published sometime in September through press conferences to be held in Lubbock and Amarillo. Following the hearing and any re-drafting which may be necessary, the bill will be

Next week will begin "Back To School Time", for a great number of people from six years old through seniors in college, graduate students and teachers. Since so many are directly involved in the quest for education, it automatically involves most of the rest of us.

The first few hours, days and weeks are very vital to a beginner's future in school and parents of first graders should give a great deal of time and thought to prepare them for a good beginning.

The following paragraphs were written by a staff writer for the Texas State Teachers Association and should prove helpful to parents and students.

Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 of the school year may be admitted to school. The child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of enrollment.

Some schools, in the interest of good health, require the child to be vaccinated against smallpox before enrollment. Also required may be immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus.

Other information which may be needed is the name of the father, his occupation, where he works, and his phone number. The name and telephone number of the family doctor and hospital used may also be requested. Also helpful can be the address and telephone numbers where parents can be reached in an emergency.

But such details are only part of the picture, and the parents form an important partnership with teachers in getting the child off to a good start.

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP

It will help if the child has opportunities to be away from his mother for short periods before he starts to school.

The child should be taught the safest way home from school. Also teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the way -- and remind him not to go with strangers. Children should learn that policemen are their friends, and give them help when needed.

A child should have definite duties to perform at home, and it will be helpful if he can learn good listening habits.

He should get enough sleep. A good breakfast each morning

will help start the school day right. So will making certain that he is happy before he leaves for school.

A child should learn to dress himself properly. He should be expected to respect the property rights of others, and should learn to do as much for himself as he is able to do. Habits of promptness, obedience, and respect for authority are also helpful.

Parents should show an interest in what the child has to tell about his work at school. Children need to be praised frequently, and to be made to feel successful. They should be encouraged to have playmates.

It is vital for the child to have confidence in his teacher. Remember that your attitude toward the school will be observed -- and copied -- by the child. Do not criticize school or teachers in the presence of the child. If there is a difficulty-- conflict with another child, a difficult activity, a school rule the child does not understand -- take the time to help solve the problem instead of just criticizing the situation.

To get a child ready for school, begin broadening his horizons even before that first day. Reading good books to him will help, as will taking him to places such as the zoo, park, and library. Personal belongings of the child should be labeled.

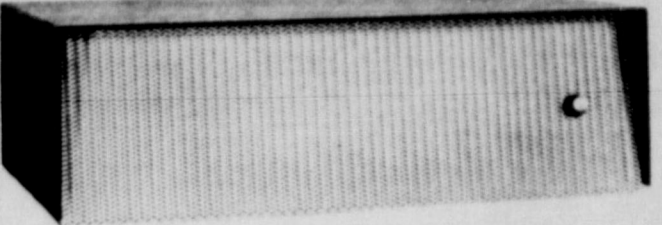
Graveside rites for Connie Lynn Scheel, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Scheel, are pending arrival of the body from the Philippines.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

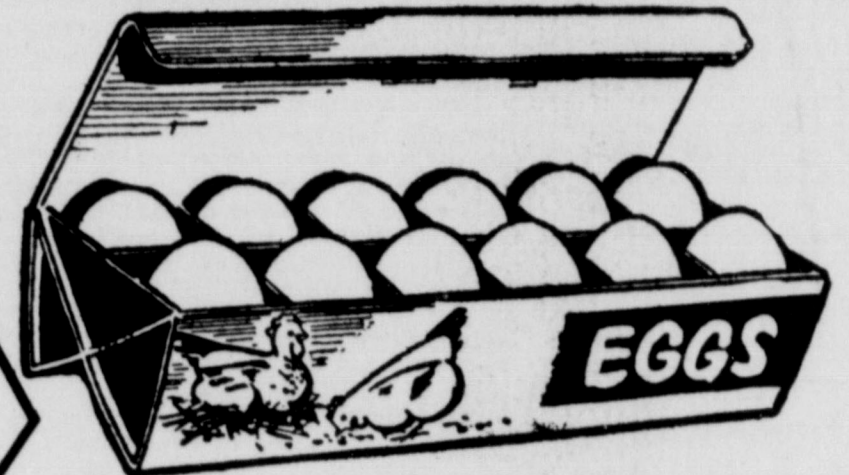
