where the chapter and verse is found in the Bible, that refers to any preacher by "Reverend", "Doctor", and "Father', We constantly hear denominational preachers referring to one another by these terms and other men referring to them as such We read of Reverend Jones. Doctor Smith, or Father Davidson. Where can such be found in the Bible? Do you remember ever reading of Rev. Luke, Father Barnabas, or the Right Reverend Paul? Can you recall a passage that speaks of Dr. Jones? This is an important matter and is one in which you should be interested.

The word "Reverend" occurs only one time in the Bible


"He sent redemption unto his people: he hath commanded his covenant forever: holy and reverend is his name" (Psa. III:9). Here in the language of David we learn that God's name is "reverend". What right does man have to wear a title that is given only to God?

And call no man your Father upon the earth: for one is your Father which is in Heaven" (Matt. 23:8-9). Can instructions be plainer than this? Why will any man attach any title to his name in a religious sense? apostle Peter wrote concerning "brother Paul" (2 Pet, 3:15) Speaking concerning all Christians, the writer of Hebrews tells us that Christ, "is not ashamed to call them brethren" (Heb. 2:11). To call a Christian "brother" should be enough for any man. I hope that I shall always be able to live in such a way as to be worthy of being called "brother" by other Christians or just pain and simple "Jesse"
