MRS. ROOSEVELT WILL BE SPEAKER AT LUBBOCK UNITED NATIONS' CLINIC

Delegations from all over the South Plains are preparing to meet Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt on Tuesday, January 24 when she appears at the Mid-winter Seminar on the United Nations to be held in the Lubbock Hotel, Lubbock, Texas.

Mrs. Roosevelt, former U. S. Delegate to the United Nations, will be accompanied by Clark Eichelberger, executive director of the American Association for the United Nations. She will be present at a morning and afternoon workshop make a luncheon talk and wind up a full-day of activities at Lubbock High School Auditorium where she will make an address.

Delegations to the seminar to which the public is invited, have already made reservations from Littlefield, Borger, Childress and Amarillo announced Mrs. William Dingus, founder of the Lubbock Council for the United Nations and official hostess to Mrs. Roosevelt.

Fees will be \$1 to the workshop and \$2 to the luncheon. The evening program will be free of charge and pre-registration can be made with Mrs. Oscar Ray, 405 Avenue X, Lubbock.

The program consists of an hour long morning press conference beginning at 9 a.m. to which all area press representatives are invited. Mrs. Roosevelt and Mr. Eichelberger will hold the conference in the Ivy Room of the Lubbock Hotel before attending the 1 1/2 hour workshop in the morning.

Moderator for the morning workshop, entitled "Understanding of the United Nations" will be Dr. Donald J. Tate, head of the Business Education Department of Texas Technological College. Speakers and their topics will be Mrs. Ivy Savage, Principal of Roscoe Wilson Elementary School "Organization"; Joe Salem of Sudan, "Community Participation"; Mrs. James Payne, teacher at Colorado City, "Organization Participation"; and Clarence Whiteside, former Lubbock mayor, "Relation to American Foreign Policy". State Representative Wassenger Carr will summarize the morning's activities after which Mrs. Roosevelt will answer all questions relating to the discussions.

Mrs. Roosevelt will speak at the luncheon to be held in the East Ballroom of the Lubbock Hotel & will sit in on the afternoon workshop which is devoted to the topic "Criticism of the United Nations". Moderator for the afternoon workshop will be Judge W. N. Stokes of Amarillo, former Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals. Speakers & their topics will be William A. Sewell of Citizen's National Bank of Lubbock, "Finance"; Peter Monach, vice-president of the Lubbock U. N. Council, "Membership"; R. D. Mack of the Texas Tech Government Department, "Specialized Agencies (UNESCO)"; and Vincent Padgett, Tech Government Department, "Intervention in Domestic Affairs". Dr. Sterling Fuller of the Government Department will summarize the afternoon discussions.

Pre-registration, which can be made by writing Mrs. Oscar Ray, 405 Ave. X, Lubbock, costs \$3 which includes \$1 for the workshop & \$2 for the luncheon, the evening speech by Mrs. Roosevelt being free to the public.

'HOUSE FULL of SILVER and GOLD'

That is a lot of wealth, is it not? Could you decline such riches offered for a little work? A dollar paid for an hour's honest work may be good pay. But a house full of silver and gold to do wrong is very poor pay, even if the work of doing wrong is only a moment.

When Balaam, king of Moab, offered increased reward to hire Balaam to do wrong against God's people, Israel, after the Lord had told Balaam not to go, Balaam said he would not do differently from what the Lord said for the king's house full of silver and gold.

There never was a nobler determination than this. The Lord has repeatedly warned against anyone's taking a bribe-pay to do evil. It never pays to do wrong, even if being paid to do so. The wages of sin is death, be sure your sins will find you out, and you'll reap what you sow.

Balaam said he would not go beyond the word of the Lord, to do more or less than God had commanded, even for the house full of wealth. How many people do you know who will refuse to obey God for one dollar? How many do you know who deliberately refuse to obey God just because it suits them not to do what God commanded? The statement of Balaam is a rebuke to every person who postpones or refuses to obey a command of the Lord.

All heaven has sacrificed to give us a Saviour. That Saviour suffered untold agonies to save all who obey Him. (Heb. 5:8-9) He has commanded men everywhere to repent. He also commanded all who believe Him to be baptized. (Mark 16:15-16) Multitudes refuse to obey these commands on the grounds that the Lord's authority is not sufficient power to make commands imperative, inescapable. Many teach the uninformed that it isn't necessary to be baptized. Such men do not have as much respect for the Lord's word as did rebellious Balaam. He wanted to do as hired to do but refused to come short of the Lord's command, even for a house full of gold and silver.

Balaam did only what the Lord granted him permission to do. But he did not serve the Lord in heart, because he wanted to do the opposite from what God said. Though obedient in letter, he died the death of the unrighteous, and is held up in the New Testament as an example of rejection by the Lord.

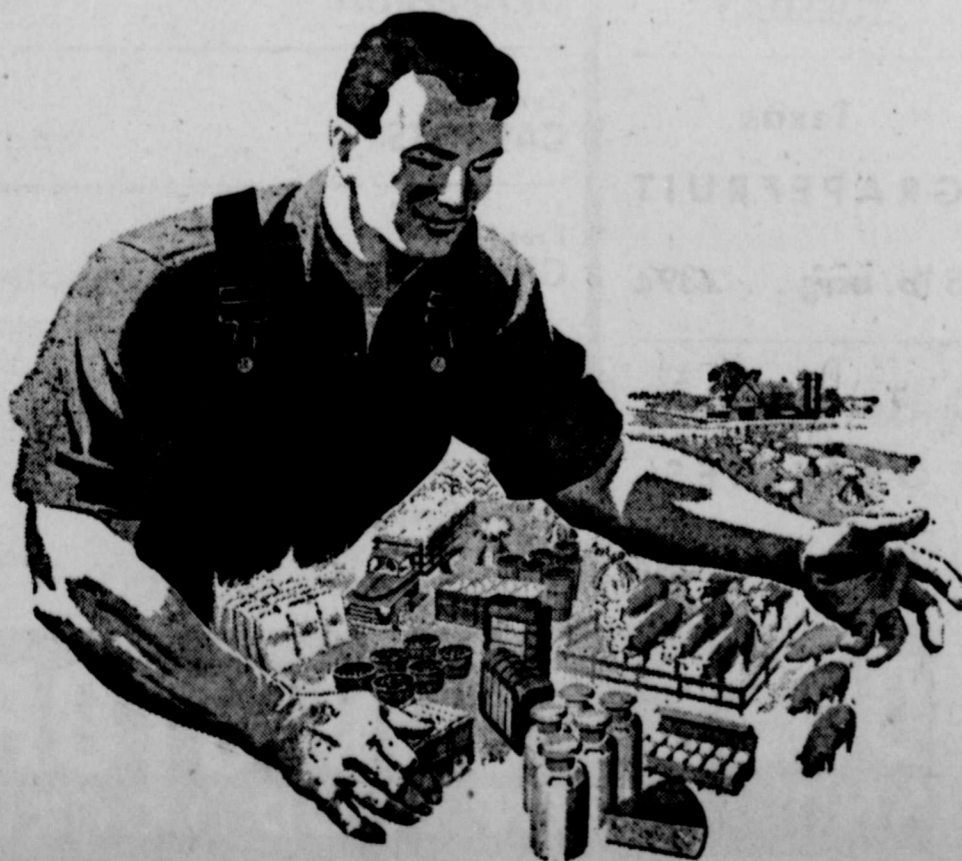

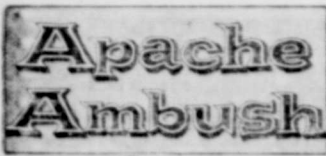

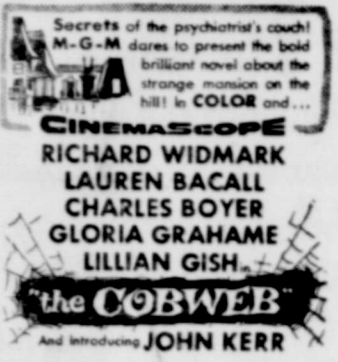
